

SOVIET PAVING ROAD TO PERSIA BY PROPAGANDA

Bolshevik emissaries are busy in Caucasus district and Trebizond

BELIEVED PLAN IS TO MOVE TROOPS BY ENZELI

Regarded as Doubtful Whether Persia Has Enough Loyal Troops to Hold Passes

By Associated Press. CONSTANTINOPLE, May 28.—Many Bolshevik agitators are in Trebizond, an important port on the southern coast of the Black sea, but the situation there is quiet, according to the messages received here.

The Turkish population is for the most part, opposed to bolshevism but in some of the enforcement of the provisions of the Turkish treaty giving Armenia access to Trebizond, it is feared the nationalists there will join the Soviet movement.

President Wilson's recommendation that the United States accept the Armenian mandate caused much surprise upon publication among American special relief workers who recently left Armenia.

American and British officials, as well as men and women engaged in relief operations, say it is only a question of weeks whether Armenia and Georgia will be avowedly bolshevik. It is asserted that treaties and armistices between the little nations of the Caucasus district are regarded by foreigners familiar with the situation as being engineered from Moscow to gain more time and pave the way for easier access to Persia.

Enzeli, on the southern end of the Caspian sea, is held by the bolsheviks, is the only possible Persian port through which Soviet armies can move upon Teheran. The only passable highway leads from Enzeli by the way of Karvin to Teheran and runs through mountain passes which could be defended. There is some doubt, however, whether Persia has sufficient loyal troops to obstruct the Soviet advance.

The railway from Tiflis through Armenia to Tabriz is a single track line, but may be valuable to the bolsheviks in their investment of persia. It leads into the best grain sections of northwestern Persia and is of such great strategic value that military men confident Soviet military officers will make further attempts to dominate it. Relief workers say the entire Caucasian country is involved in a struggle between the bolsheviks and religious hatred which make it fertile soil for bolshevism.

LOWER PRICES QUOTED FOR FOODSTUFFS AT TULSA

TULSA, OKLA., May 29.—Foodstuffs showed a decline here today. Sugar dropped from 39 and 35 cents a pound to 22 cents a pound and bread was 10 and 9 cents, a drop of 20 percent. Milk prices also tumbled.

HOPE GROWS IN BRITAIN U. S. WILL JOIN LEAGUE

LONDON, May 29.—Hope that the United States would eventually join the league of nations was given renewed strength today as a result of the declaration of American Ambassador John W. Davis here at Portsmouth, that that disavowal with the form of the league covenant in the United States should not be construed as evidence of unwillingness to enter the concert of nations.

SEPARATE INVESTIGATIONS LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE

NEW YORK, May 29.—The strike of coastwise longshoremen, which with other strikes in this port has crippled the movement of freight to a serious extent, was the subject of separate investigations today by Gov. Alfred E. Smith and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

ALLEN INDICATES FIGHT AGAINST RADICAL PLANKS

NEW YORK, May 29.—Strong indications that the republican party will be bidding for trouble if the Chicago convention writes into the national platform a plank dictated by framers of any radical labor legislation, is seen in the remarks of Gov. Henry J. Allen of Kansas in his debate with Samuel Gompers at Carnegie hall last night.

The political party in the forthcoming campaign that has not the conservative courage to stand out and pledge the public protection against the wrong and terror of industrial warfare will travel down the pathway of cowardice to defeat, Governor Allen said.

This declaration came after Allen had called attention to the fact that "Mr. Gompers within the last three days has issued a proclamation calling upon all men of organized labor to assemble themselves around the polls to see that no man goes to congress who is not in favor of Gompers."

Allen and Gompers were matched to discuss the question of right of labor in essential industries to strike if the common welfare is threatened. On the speakers' platform were leaders of workers and others of national repute, including Roger W. Babson, George Gordon Battle, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, Herbert Hoover, James W. Gerard, H. P. Davidson, George W. Jackson, Miss Mary G. Hayes, Warren F. Stone, Matthew Woll and Frank Morrison. Judge Alton B. Parker presided.

Slavery and Freedom.

"The difference between a slave and a free man is that the slave must work when his master commands, while a free man may dispose of himself and his labor according to his wishes," said Gompers, striking the crux of his argument against Allen. Referring to the Kansas anti-strike law, which he was instrumental in passing, Allen said:

"We have not taken away from any man his divine right to quit work, but we have taken from Mr. Gompers his divine right to order a man to quit work."

Allen made a strong plea for the justice of the Kansas industrial court. Allen in closing asked Gompers whether the public has any rights in a strike affecting production and distribution of necessities and if answered in the affirmative, how Gompers would protect the rights of the public.

"I wish him to define for us who had the divine right to forbid the strike men to strike in their outlay strike; who controls the divine right to quit work?" Allen said.

Gompers replied that he did not have time tonight but will live long enough to do so.

"The right to own ourselves," declared the labor leader, "the right to free the body of a man from the control of a judge's decision when we exercise that normal and natural right to stop work, not to commit crime, not to commit an overt act, but to stop work, the right for a man to own himself, to work or not to work, is his right and not the right of government or states or courts."

"It is man's right; it is the human right, from which there can be no departure without taking away the freedom, the liberty and the natural expression of the human."

INFORMATION FAILS TO WARRANT FILING WHITE-CAPPING CHARGE

Another alleged case of "white-capping" was reported to the district attorney by the "evidence" in the case, however, was not sufficient to warrant the filing of a complaint and a warrant which had been arrested in connection with the matter was released.

GREEK TROOPS FIRED ON BY BULGARIAN ARTILLERY

By Associated Press. CONSTANTINOPLE, May 28.—Greek troops advancing upon Dedeagach, on the Egean, are reported to have been fired upon today by Bulgarian artillery near Akchilar. A few shots only were exchanged, the reports indicated. The French have floated the French flag over all the railway stations in Bulgarian and Turkish Thrace and have announced they will continue to operate the railways.

EQUAL TAXATION DESIRE OF WOMEN OF FRANCE

PARIS, May 29.—The women suffrage union of France has congratulated Finance Minister Francosis Marchal upon his rejection of the proposal made by certain senators that women should be exempted from a surtax on bachelors on the theory that women who remain unmarried do not as a general rule do so of their own choice. The suffrage organization holds that women should be equal before the law in all respects.

CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL ADOPTS POLICY OF REFUSING TO WORK FOR MEMBERS OF OPEN SHOP

Wichita Falls is threatened by a general strike of organized labor crafts upon concerns who have enlisted in the ranks of the open shop movement, as a result of a meeting of the central labor body at the Labor Temple last night. All organized crafts of Wichita Falls were represented and the recent walkout of unionized restaurant workers was upheld as well as the action of union painters in removing workmen from jobs where the contractor had enlisted in the ranks of the Open Shop association.

DRASTIC ACTION TO COPE WITH IRISH DISORDERS PLANNED

LONDON, May 29.—British military officials today took steps to meet the critical situation in Ireland, following an attack upon soldiers barracks at Kilmallock where two constables were wounded to death. The barracks were set on fire by a band of 100 men.

MEXICAN IMMIGRATION BEING INVESTIGATED

FORT WORTH, May 29.—Federal authorities began an investigation yesterday of Mexican immigration. Hearings are being conducted behind closed doors. More than 60 women were taken before the investigator yesterday and some of them detained.

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KILLED MOTHER AND FATALLY INJURED FATHER

ATHENS, O., May 29.—Armed posses today hunted the hills near here for Howard B. 32, ex-soldier, who, according to police, shot and killed his mother, aged 70, and fatally injured his father, 73, on their farm early today. The shooting followed an argument over the marking out of a field of corn.

INCREASED RESERVES SHOWN IN STATEMENTS OF NEW YORK BANKS

NEW YORK, May 29.—The actual condition of clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows that they hold \$24,338,800 reserve in excess of legal requirements. This is an increase of \$16,648,450 from last week.

DEBS IN PRISON IS NOTIFIED HIS NOMINATION

ATLANTA, GA., May 29.—Eugene V. Debs, several times socialist candidate for the presidency of the United States for liberation, is serving a 10-year term in the federal prison here for violation of the espionage laws of the country today was notified by a committee from the national socialist convention that he was again nominated by his party for the title role in the 1920 campaign.

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TO SEEK REMOVAL RECEIVER'S FUNDS TO OKLAHOMA BANKS

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., May 29.—Attorney General Freeing of Oklahoma will appear before the United States supreme court next week to protest against the policy of administration of Fred river lands outlined in the report of the federal receiver, Frederick A. Delano, it was learned today.

Freeing stated he will urge that funds in Delano's charge be placed in Oklahoma banks which pay 4 per cent instead of being placed in Texas banks as Delano proposed, which pay only 2 per cent.

FRENCH FIGHT WAY INTO AINTABB SYRIA TURKS LOSE HEAVILY

LONDON, May 29.—A French column fought its way into Aintabb, Syria, and after heavy fighting succeeded in relieving the town, it was officially announced today. The Turks suffered heavy casualties.

STATE OF INSURRECTION IS DECLARED AT BRISTOL TROOPS PATROLLING STREETS

BRISTOL, R. I., May 29.—Troops of cavalry and coast artillery patrolled the streets of Bristol today to prevent a repetition of the rioting that occurred yesterday when striking employees of the National India Rubber Company sought to prevent other workers from entering the plant.

Governor Beekman has declared the city "in a state of insurrection" and was expected to come here to inspect the situation personally.

No strike was made to open the plants this morning, but it was expected that an attempt would be made to resume operations on Tuesday afternoon.

A strike has been in progress at the rubber works for about three weeks.

GRAVE SITUATION IN HUNGARY OVER SIGNING OF TREATY

BUDAPEST, May 29.—Publication of the decision of the Hungarian government to sign the treaty of peace presented by the allies did not lead to disorders, but the situation resulting from the news appears to be grave, according to advices.

Gloom pervaded the city the first day the news was printed. It is reported bodies of many supposed suicides have been found in the Danube and the Napes attributed these to the government's action.

ANOTHER ALTITUDE RECORD BROKEN AT KELLY FIELD

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., May 29.—Another world's record for altitude was broken at Kelly field No. 1 Friday, when Lieut. Harry Weddington took a De Havilland four plane to a height of approximately 19,956 feet with four passengers.

The ship took the air Friday morning and climbed for 1 hour and 10 minutes, returning in 29 minutes. Three enlisted men were in the cockpit and it was sealed over to avoid wind resistance. One man was in the front cockpit with Lieutenant Weddington.

The plane passed through three layers of clouds and at the highest point the atmosphere became hazy and the city of San Antonio could hardly be seen. It was very cold.

The enlisted men who accompanied Lieutenant Weddington were Privates Norman Ellis, William R. Bradley, Joseph Dowd and James J. Madigan. The combined weight of the three men was 762 pounds.

Lieutenant Weddington set a record Tuesday for three passengers and pilot.

DECISIONS IN FOUR CONTESTS TO GOVERN G. O. P. COMMITTEE

CHICAGO, May 29.—Decisions in four of the contests among delegations to the republican national convention probably will settle all of the disputes which involve 122 seats, members of the national committee said today.

Precedents in four major rulings will govern the points raised in the other cases, it was said. Clarence B. Miller, secretary of the republican national committee, arrived yesterday with the briefs filed in Washington in the 122 contests. The national committee will begin consideration of them next Monday morning and for days, it is estimated, will finish all of them.

Aside from the contests in the 10th Minnesota (Minneapolis) and the fourth and fifth Missouri districts, the contests are from southern states, with close fighting indicated in the Georgia and Mississippi district disputes. The calendar of contests as prepared by Secretary Miller includes: Alabama: Fourth district, one delegate each.

Arkansas: At large, four; first district, one; fifth district, two.

District of Columbia: At large, two (three seats); contestants one each.

Florida: At large, four; first, second, third and fourth districts, one delegate each.

Georgia: At large, four; first to eighth districts, inclusive, and 10th district, one each; ninth district, two.

Louisiana: At large, four; first to eighth districts, inclusive, one each; Missouri: Fourth and fifth districts, two each.

North Carolina: At large, four; first, second, third, sixth, eighth, ninth and tenth districts, two each; fourth, fifth and seventh districts, two each.

Oklahoma: Second, fourth and fifth districts, two each; sixth, seventh, eighth and tenth districts, one each.

Tennessee: Sixth and 10th districts, one each.

Texas: At large, four; third, seventh, eighth and 17th districts, one each.

Virginia: At large, four; first to eighth districts, inclusive, and 10th, one each; ninth district, two.

Another sort of contest to be handled either by the national committee or the state delegations involved is the elimination of 56 "excess" delegates from 10 states where more than the allotted number of delegates were chosen with fractional delegations 117 delegates were certified to the convention with only 61 available seats. The states that have elected too many delegates, according to Secretary Miller's records, are the following:

Arkansas: Eleven delegates for six seats.

Illinois: Ten delegates at large for six seats.

Iowa: Twelve delegates for six seats.

Mississippi: Eight delegates for four seats.

Missouri: Eight delegates for four seats.

Nevada: Twelve delegates for six seats.

Tennessee: Ten delegates for four seats.

Oklahoma: Eight delegates for four seats.

Texas: Thirty-four delegates for 17 seats.

Virginia: Three delegates for one seat.

MINIMUM WAGE OF \$6 PER DAY FOR MINERS

KANSAS CITY, MO., May 29.—A minimum wage of \$6 per day for day labor and an advance of 27 per cent on all yardage and tonnage rates and 27 per cent advance on the price of coal for miners for their own use, is provided in the terms of the new biennial interstate agreement between coal miners and mine operators of Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Arkansas. The agreement, practically completed, will be signed within the next few days, it was learned here today.

Pending the report of a committee the tentative price of explosives will remain in effect. Both sides have agreed to accept the committee's decision.

CONFER AT OKLAHOMA CITY ON CROP MOVEMENT PLAN

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., May 29.—Bankers, railroad officials and country farm agents will meet here today to discuss a plan for the transportation of this year's crops in Oklahoma.

ANNUNZIO'S BAND WILL BE RESISTED BY JUGO SLAVS

PARIS, May 29.—Gabriele D'Annunzio, leader of a band of aviators, has occupied the towns of Kavalaj and Susak, according to a dispatch to Le Journal today. The Jugo-Slav government has notified Italy that it considers that the poet's violation of Jugo-Slav territory will be resisted by force, the dispatch added.

INDIAN PRISONER IS SENTENCED TO HANG

LEAVENWORTH, KANS., May 29.—John Aday, Apache Indian, serving a life term in the federal penitentiary for murder, today was under sentence to hang for the murder of Thomas Watson fellow prisoner, on August 12, 1919.

The jury in a special session of the United States district court late yesterday, failed to recommend life imprisonment, which opportunity was given by Judge Woodrough of Omaha.

Aday was received at the federal prison several years ago for the murder of an Indian girl, 15, on an Indian reservation in Arizona. He was alleged to have crushed her skull with a sharp pointed rock.

FAVOR CONSIDERATION INTERNATIONAL POLICE

PORTSMOUTH, ENGLAND, May 28.—Resolutions declaring that the International Law association, in session here, "considers the league of nations should examine the project of an international police force to which each country should contribute its quota," were passed at today's session.

Mr. David Davies, member of parliament suggested in an address that newest weapons of war—poison gas, war planes, heavy artillery and tanks—be added to the league of nations to form the nucleus of such a force and that no state be permitted to make use of such inventions for war like purposes.

PINK TEA BRAND OF POLITICS IS REAL THING

Women's Organization at Chicago Excite Admiration of Old-Timers

WAY TO MAN'S BRAIN IS THROUGH HIS HEART

Fifteen States Will Have Women as Delegates to G. O. P. National Convention

CHICAGO, May 29.—Women political workers are introducing a new technique in national campaign affairs by canvassing the delegates to the republican convention through their wives.

By revamping the old adage—the way to a man's heart is through his stomach—they have made it read that "The way to a man's brain is through his heart," and are acting accordingly.

The work of canvassing the women delegates has been practically turned over to the women's organizations by the national managers of candidates.

Veteran politicians who fought woman suffrage to the last gasp, and who came to Chicago prepared to have a big laugh about the pink tea politics they expected to discover, are being forced into reluctant admiration.

"You've got to hand it to 'em," one of these old timers said today. They have learned in a few months what it took them years to learn. If the work they're doing now is any indication of the future, the women along the same lines, the next generation may see a woman in the White House and it ain't no darned sure it would not be a success.

Probably the first woman's organizations to take up seriously plans for implanting their candidates' propaganda through the wives of the delegates were the Women's League of Illinois, headed by Mrs. Frederick A. Lorenz, and the woman's division of the Lowden campaign committee, of which Mrs. Fletcher Doherty is chairman. The latter body, which claims a membership of 50,000, has already completed plans for getting in touch with some personally acquainted with every woman delegate and with the wife of every man delegate.

The Johnson women's organization was expected to organize late today. Mrs. Raymond Robins has been the head of the informal body which has been carrying on the work in the middle west.

One of the oldest and strongest of the women's organizations is the Leonard Wood national woman's campaign committee, of which Mrs. Virium is chairman. This committee has branches in all the principal cities. Its Chicago headquarters is in the Congress Hotel, where women delegates and delegates' wives will be entertained. Volunteer workers for this campaign will be heard of in speeches, young women take up a vantage point in an automobile at a busy corner and display to the crowds a series of posters containing short sentences laudatory to Hoover.

Mrs. C. C. Pavey, of Columbus, Ohio, is head of the Harding-for-President Woman's Club. This organization will have headquarters in the Congress Hotel. Mrs. Pavey and her co-workers have found the telephone superior to all other methods in getting in touch with women whom they seek to interest in their candidate.

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CROWDS ASSEMBLE AT DALLAS JAIL WHERE NEGRO FIEND HELD

DALLAS, May 29.—James Brown, negro, who was arrested late yesterday following an assault upon a woman near Hale station, just west of Dallas, confessed the crime today, according to the district attorney's office. He is held in the Dallas county jail under heavy guard.

MURDERED MAN TO OBTAIN HIS WIFE

CHICAGO, May 29.—Theodore Lauchis today confessed to police that he murdered John Domeneous, a St. Louis man, because he loved Domeneous' wife, provided money to her and the man's general expenses and other bills and then went to St. Louis where he was to meet Mrs. Domeneous. Domeneous' body was found in a grove near Steger on May 22, three days after he disappeared. Lauchis was arrested through a letter he mailed in St. Louis.

SUNDAY LAW TEST TO BE MADE IN MUSKOGEE

MUSKOGEE, Okla., May 29.—A test case of Muskogee's Sunday "dry" law will be made following the filing of a grocer for selling five cents worth of candy to a small boy last Sunday. The grocer appealed the case and an effort will be made Tuesday to have the council repeal the law which forbids the sale of anything except meat, bread and milk which may be sold until 9 o'clock Sunday morning.

ASSOCIATION NOT TO BE REPRESENTED

LONDON, May 29.—The National Association has decided not to be represented by a team in the Olympic games because of inadequate financial support. It was announced by Lord Chamberlain of the exchequer.

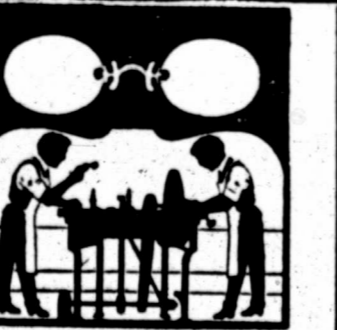
