PRIDDY OPTIMISTIC OVER OUTLOOK FOR LAND OWNERS

An optimistic feeling as to the outcome of the efforts of the owners of the patented lands within the area now under jurisdiction of the Federal receiver, appointed on the government's intervention in the boundary dispute, marked the report of the special committee headed by M. Priddy, who represented the owners of these properties in Washington, and who make their report to a meeting of the owners held in the court house Wednesday morning. The result of their efforts was reported in detail, along the same lines which had previously been indicated in the press.

Both former Senator Joseph W. Bailey, who was retained by the committee as additional counsel, and Judge A. H. Carrigan and Orville Bullington, local attorneys who have been representing land owners in the litigation from the first, are greatly interested in the case and are in Washington to fight it to a conclusion, Mr. Priddy stated. With reference to the employment of Mr. Bailey as additional counsel, Mr. Priddy reported that the decision had been made after thoroughly looking over the ground in Washington, and on the advice of people who know Washington, that Mr. Bailey was the man for the Texas land owners to get into the case. He stated that Mr. Bailey had waded right into the case, and will be in Washington looking after the case until the Supreme Court adjourns, probably in the course of the present week.

OTHER ISSUES ANSWERED IN OIL PROPERTY SUIT

While the jury in the suit of Pickens vs. the Imperial Petroleum company did find on special issues that the reasonable market value of the lease and wells at the time the contract for sale was made was \$120,000, as reported in Tuesday's Times, it answered the other issues in the case substantially as follows:

That the defendant, L. J. Bryan represented that the two wells were good wells and would produce from 2,000 to 3,000 barrels of flush production per day; that such representations were not true; that such representations were material; that the plaintiffs relied upon these representations; that the defendants after discovering such representations did not waive their right to sue for damages.

Judge Scurry in submitting the special issues to the jury instructed them that if they found that the representations made were false that it was immaterial whether the defendant, L. J. Bryan, knew them to be false at the time or not.

MEXICAN JOURNAL SAY INTERVENTION PLAN HUMBUS

MEXICO CITY, June 2.—Recommendation that a new treaty be arranged between the United States and Mexico, coupled with the advice that if Mexico refused to enter into an arrangement to protect Americans in the United States should intervene in this country, which were made on June 31 by a sub-committee of the United States senate foreign relations committee, are denounced by the newspaper Excelsior today.

"Humbus is at the bottom of the Yankee character," says the journal, "and Barnum was the finished individual of the species."

Commenting on the senate committee's recommendation that a loan be made to Mexico in case a treaty by which practices now authorized by the Mexican constitution are abandoned," the newspaper remarks:

"Truly Senator Fall (chairman of the sub-committee) is trying to dazzle us, as Mephisto did Marguerite, by promising us a loan which he knows he cannot make good. But promising does not impoverish and least of all will it impoverish Senator Fall. The moral aid he offers is of little consolation, nay, it is laughable when at the time he proposes what is the acme of immorality."

OFFICER FATALLY WOUNDED BY UNIDENTIFIED MAN

TULSA, OKLA., June 2.—W. C. Meacham, plain clothesman was shot three times and probably fatally wounded by an unidentified man at Main and Archer streets here about 10 o'clock last night while attempting to make an arrest.

According to Chief of Police Gustafson, Meacham arrested the man while the latter was talking to a friend. Meacham conducted a hasty search finding a large calibre revolver but overlooking an automatic with which the unidentified man shot the detective as Meacham turned to the police call box to call the patrol.

After the shooting of Meacham, the would-be assassin jumped behind a large sign board and made his escape.

PUBLIC UTILITIES BILL PASSED UNTIL NEXT SESSION

AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 1.—There will be no public utilities bill introduced at the present special session of the legislature, but instead, the governor is to appoint a committee to work out a bill on the subject to be presented at the next regular session, it was announced today by Governor W. P. Hobby, following a conference with Mayor Frank Wenzerscraft of Dallas, former president of the Texas League of Municipalities.

MAGNOLIA PICKS UP SAND IN THEIR 43 H. AND T. C. LEASE

ELECTRA, TEXAS, June 1.—The Electra field has this week made a gain of 1000 barrels in its daily production due to the increase in the Kemp Mungler Allen district and the completion of wells in the Burk Cameron field.

The Kemp Mungler Allen field showed a daily production of 1000 barrels for the first ten days in May and it was predicted that this was only a mere start. This belief has been substantiated as the field has for the last ten days in the month made an average of 2,500 barrels. The Gulf Production company, the Texas Pipe Line company and the Sunshine State are the three lines running into the field. The Gulf and Texas runs are made through the Electra stations and the Sunshine State runs go to the Iowa Park loading rack.

There are two wells on the sand in the Burk Cameron field outside of the Bowers and these wells will be completed and on the pump in the next few days. Although the Bowers has pipe line connections, no oil has been run on account of the well not being fully completed. These runs will all be made through the Electra connections and will help to pull the Electra production mark back up to its old 1912 level.

New Sand in West Extension.

The Magnolia Petroleum company has picked up a sand on the H. & T. C. lease, in their No. 43, which is regarded as a new one and was found at 2,680 feet. It has every appearance of being a good well and is showing a heavy gas pressure. It is stated that the hole was filled to the top of the casing over night and the completion is estimated good for at least 100 barrels. The fact that this is the first indication of the sand and that it is the first completion for the district at that depth is regarded with optimism as it will be possible for the wells that have been completed at lesser depths to be deepened should the sand prove to be general.

HUERTA INAUGURATED AS PROVISIONAL PRESIDENT

MEXICO CITY, June 1.—Adolfo de la Huerta, elected provisional president of Mexico last week, took the oath of office at 5 o'clock this afternoon in the chamber of deputies. There was a great military display, the galleries of the chamber were crowded and thousands thronged the streets.

Here and there a camera could be seen as it was held aloft by its owner like a periscope above a sea of humanity. The provisional president appeared to be far from well.

In the special diplomatic gallery were officials of the Chinese legation, who confirmed reports that their government had instructed them to extend de jure recognition of the provisional government.

Gen. Manuel Pelaez, revolutionary leader in Puebla, was reported today to be on his way to Mexico City, but had not arrived here tonight.

HUERTA CLOSES SALOONS UNTIL OBREGON FORCES ARE FIRMLY SETTLED

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, June 2.—Mexico was a "dry" action today by presidential edict of Adolfo De La Huerta, according to word received here.

De La Huerta's order closed all saloons opposite here and was declared as to permanency of the order varied but the Mexican consulate here today said the step was taken as the first move in a campaign by the new government against gambling.

Crowds that flocked from this city to Santa Cruz and Matamoros were advised that saloons would be reopened in a day or so after the Obregon regime had been firmly established in Matamoros.

Permanent passports into Mexico hereafter must be issued thirty days and will be recognized in any part of the republic, Alberto Ruiz Sandoval, inspector general of Mexican consulates, announced today.

Passports heretofore granted safe conduct only in the "forty-mile zone" on the lower side of the border.

Sandoval also announced that effective today one-day passports will be issued gratis. Previously they cost one dollar each.

TWO WOMEN HURT IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., June 2.—Miss Mona Clark was seriously injured and her sister Theresa Clark suffered a fractured right arm when their motor car collided with another car at a street crossing here late yesterday. The young women are the daughters of George F. Clark, chairman of the state board of public affairs.

Witnesses stated that Miss Clark was driving at a fast rate of speed when she collided with the other car. Other occupants of this car were slightly injured.

WILSON URGES DELAWARE MEN TO VOTE FOR SUFFRAGE

The telegram read:

"May I not as a democrat express my deep interest in the suffrage amendment and my judgment that it would be a great service to the party if every democrat in the Delaware legislature should vote for it?"

The Delaware assembly is reported to be ready to take final action on the amendment today.

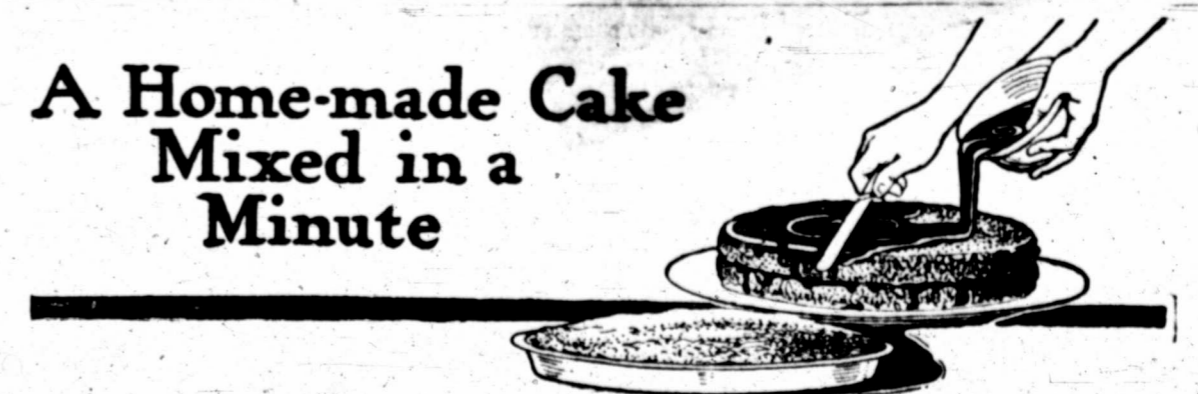

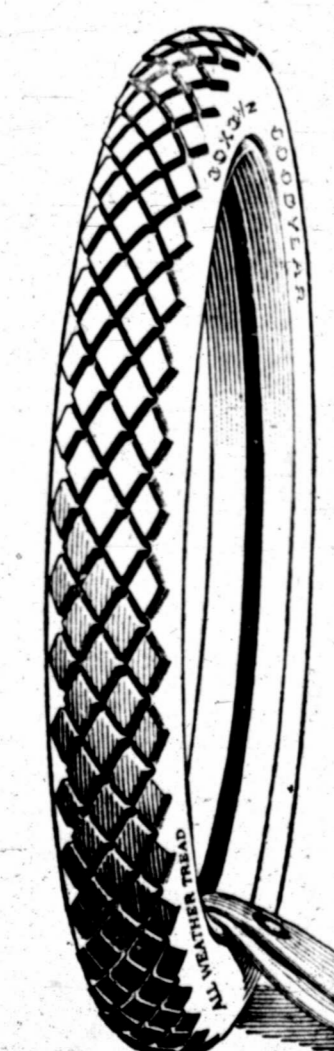

PLANS TO ESTABLISH PLAY GROUND SYSTEM NOW BEING FORMULATED

A city-wide system of neighborhood playgrounds, with a recreational instructor to supervise things, is to be established this summer through the block community plan, if plans formulated at a meeting Tuesday afternoon can be carried out.

The meeting was attended by a number of block and district chairmen, and after discussing the summer plans, it decided to call a general meeting for next Tuesday night, at a place to be announced later. At this meeting the plans will be more definitely considered. In the meantime every effort will be made to complete the block organization so as to have the entire city covered.

P. N. Haightelting, community service worker, who has been sent here for duty, told the chairman that he thought the question of playgrounds the most important one at present, and his view that the organization should concentrate on this, met with general favor. Mr. Haightelting declared that establishment of playgrounds need not be expensive, as simple, "home-made" equipment could be installed on vacant lots at a small cost.

Mr. Haightelting also said that the services of a recreational instructor, for supervision of playground activities, would be available early in the summer, and this matter will be discussed at the meeting next Tuesday.

The first step to be taken is that of completing the block organization system, which now comprises more than half a hundred blocks and which can be readily extended to cover the entire city within a short time. An effort will be made to organize all remaining blocks during the next two weeks.

All parts of the city were represented at Tuesday afternoon's meeting. Mrs. J. A. Kemp, chairman of the civic bureau of the chamber of commerce, presided.

The women, speaking individually, declare that they and their families do not intend to trade with houses who are not members of the association."

The committee assured Mrs. Smock that the cards would be put in the windows of the members as quickly as they could be prepared.

NINTH STREET PROPERTY OWNERS ENDORSE PLAN FOR MAKING THAT STREET PAVED BOULEVARD

Plans for making a paved boulevard on Ninth street were endorsed Tuesday night at a meeting of the property owners at the Chamber of Commerce, and steps were taken to sign up petitions without delay. Cement for the paving is available, according to city officials. If prompt action is taken, and the property owners who favor paving hope to obtain the necessary signatures with little delay.

Julian Montgomery, city engineer, discussed the paving plans, saying it was desired to have a heavy and durable type of concrete work on the street. He recommended that a 20-foot parkway be provided between Van Buren and Kemp, with solid pavement between Van Buren and Broad. Elimination of curves and dead space, where feasible, was also favored by Mr. Montgomery.

Councilman W. S. Charles, street commissioner, said that concrete was immediately available for the work if the property owners would act promptly. On account of the width of the street and the durable type of paving planned, the cost is estimated at about \$800 per 50-foot frontage.

Superintendent Albritton of the traction company promised the co-operation of that concern in the paving work, and also promised that the poles in Floral Heights will be removed from the center of the street so as to facilitate the beautification plans.

Upon motion of Judge P. A. Martin, seconded by C. H. Clark, the property owners went on record as favoring paving; there were four negative votes.

One property owner in each block was designated to obtain signatures for his block. Some blocks are already 100 per cent signed and others partly so. Rev. Father Boniface indicated that the Catholic church and academy would do their part; he left the commencement exercises of St. Mary's to attend the paving meeting.

BLOCK PARTY ORGANIZATIONS WILL HAVE NOTHING TO DO WITH OPEN SHOP

The "block party" organization or community service being fostered by the Chamber of Commerce has no part in the open shop movement, according to a statement issued today by Mrs. J. A. Kemp, chairman of the City Betterment and Beautification Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Kemp's statement follows:

"It has come to my attention that notices in the local papers have left the impression that the open shop fight will be carried to the block party organization throughout the city and I hasten to correct and deny absolutely this statement which was unauthorized.

"The block party organization or community service is a sincere, unselfish effort to help and benefit all of our people. We want our families, rich and poor alike, regardless of political or religious beliefs, to have the opportunity of meeting together in the block parties to promote neighborhood civic attractiveness, proper improvements, to establish children's play grounds, wholesome recreation activities and to make our people enjoying living in Wichita Falls.

"It is the desire of those who have fostered the block party movement that the citizens should leave their politics and religion out of these meetings. All are welcome to the gatherings. While every citizen has a right to his opinion about the open shop or any other question, that movement is being handled through proper channels and the block parties proceed as they have been started as enjoyable neighborhood social gatherings where all citizens may come on a common footing of interest in the city and its upbuilding. Their private views have nothing to do with the block party meetings.

"The block party movement has spread throughout the city and has

meant much to the lives of the people. All of us on the city betterment and beautification committee are deeply gratified at the remarkable interest that has been taken. We now have a representative of the National Community Service with us who is starting children's play grounds and recreational work. We hope to stimulate and enjoy the use of the parks. The block party movement should be carried to every neighborhood in order that all our people may come to know the joy of meeting and working with their neighbors for a better neighborhood and better city."

MRS. SMOCK TELLS WICHITA CLUB OF NEED OF WORKERS

"The women of the Civic League are in this fight until it is finished," Mrs. F. B. Smock, president of the Civic League, told the members of the Wichita Club at their Wednesday luncheon in appealing to the club women members to obtain more workers from their families, in order that the women now working may take more rest from the work. "Over 100 women have called up and volunteered for this work, but we need more workers in order to keep the lifts so distributed in order that the work, which is rather hard for the women who are not used to it, may take more rest.

"I believe that the end of the present work will see full crews in all the Open Shop restaurants and the work of the women will have been done. The proprietors are getting additional help in their restaurants with every day.

"There is still some amount of intimidation going on, and that is the thing which keeps the restaurants from obtaining their full crews without delay. Several people who have been hired to work in restaurants have later failed to show up, being afraid to work but they are slowly being obtained and this week will see them full.

"Any of the women who will volunteer for this work should call Miss Florence Jackson at Curlee and Johnson's office, telephone 1821. They can leave their name and address there and we will get in touch with them. Miss Jackson is running our employment bureau. Or they can call me at

my home, although I am not at home at night until about one o'clock."

Mrs. Smock also paid a tribute to the work of the volunteers who have taken their places in the kitchens or in waiting on the tables. "They have responded in a remarkable manner in this crisis, and they have served the public and served them well," she said. "The women of the town are in thorough sympathy with this movement, and in addition to actually serving in person, they are helping it in other practical ways—for instance, doing the trading for their families in the right place." Among others who talked in connection with this movement were W. Newton Maer and C. W. Reid, president of the club.

"A few more days will see the situation well in hand, and will I believe result in the drifting from our city of some of the agitators who are responsible for the conditions which have been prevailing here," said Mr. Reid, after paying a warm tribute to the work of the women.

The work of the Boy Scouts of America, both during the war and war work and at the present day in moulding the ideas of the boys toward citizenship of the right sort, was discussed by J. P. Fitch, southwestern representative of the Boy Scout organization. Mr. Fitch also called attention to the drive for funds which will be inaugurated here Friday which will enable the work in Wichita Falls to be put on a systematic basis such as obtains in other of the large cities of the state, with a well organized council of possibly 25 of the leading citizens of the city, a paid executive to devote his full time to the work, a regular headquarters for the work, purchase of equipment and the like. He said that there were now eight troops of Boy Scouts in the city, averaging about 25 boys to the troop. The campaign was endorsed by the club on motion of W. S. Curlee.

The music for the luncheon was furnished by R. C. Adams and other local musicians, and following a dinner was an entertainment furnished by several performers from the Wichita theater, through Charles Kirkpatrick, manager.

When the Cooks and Waiters of Local No. 158, Wichita Falls, Texas, went out on a strike May 20, I wanted to state that this local never realized what an interesting party they were. I also want to say that we refuse absolutely to hide our light under some musty old box. We proclaim to the public at large what clever discerning persons say about our organization, we never did believe in being secretive. Our nature is open and frank. So here is where we are going to ask the author of "Mustard Gas" printed in the Times, what his meaning was in regard to saying all union men were heathens and that his suggestion would be the same motto used in France, and not buy any goods from an employer who employs union labor, or, in other words boycott all goods made by union labor; or goods that have not received the O. K. of the open shop.

We realize that some people regard all members of organized labor as bolsheviks, but nevertheless, 70 per cent of the cooks and waiters in Wichita Falls have honorable discharges from the United States army and many of them fought in France. We are proud of their records in the service and are proud of our rights under the American constitution. We consider the insinuations of the author of the "Mustard Gas" article as an insult, if anything coming from an anonymous source can have that dignity. If the 70 per cent of the cooks and waiters of Wichita Falls who served under the American flag, many of them on the battlefields of Europe, are not Americans, we would like to know just whom he would call Americans.

GOVERNMENT OUGHT TO SET PEOPLE OF COUNTRY LESSON OF ECONOMY

GALVESTON, TEX., June 2.—While the gravity of the national economic situation was not questioned, the consensus of opinion among bankers who attended the 1920 Texas Bankers' association here was that there was no danger of a financial panic.

Some bankers declared they were "overjoyed at the prospect of getting their feet back on the ground," through restriction of credits to all unessential industries.

Speaking before the convention on "money and the foreign exchange," Henry D. Harris, vice president of the National City bank of New York, declared that the stringency in investment money would not be abated for several years.

Mr. Harris declared his belief that solution of the whole problem lies in the federal reserve system, the great system of banking in the world today.

Mr. L. Gill, vice president of the Federal Reserve bank, New York, former commissioner of insurance and banking of Texas, told the convention that the government should set the nation on a sound economic basis.

Mr. E. Longmire, vice president of the Farmers National bank of Kansas City, said he would like to be optimistic, but "this is a time when everybody might better use the utmost caution and refrain from speculation."

Mr. W. Hoopes, commercial National bank of Houston, and former deputy governor of the Dallas federal reserve bank, declared "there never was as great an incentive to save as now."

House bill permitting school trustees to fix the salaries of teachers in rural districts was passed finally in the house, after being amended so as to restrict the trustees to a maximum of \$150 salary monthly for a teacher.

In the senate the Cox gas bill, already passed in the house, was reported favorably by senate committee on civil jurisprudence.

LONDON, June 2.—The audacity with which the Sinn Fein carried out their raid yesterday afternoon on the King's Inn, in Dublin, amazed the London press.

The affair is expected to cause a lively debate in parliament this afternoon. It is understood that Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, regards the situation in Ireland as most grave.

The latest destructions include the military barracks at Cullybackey in County Antrim, at Lescane in County Galway, and at Kibbenny, County Cork.

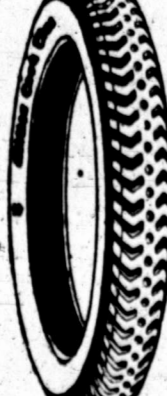
