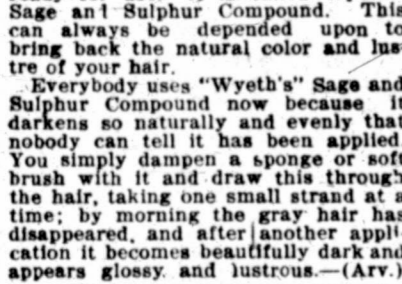

**COOKS AND WAITERS STRIKE IS PRACTICALLY WON ROTARIANS TOLD**

The cooks and waiters strike is practically won, Mr. T. B. Smock, president of the Civic League told the Rotarians at their noon luncheon Thursday in reporting the work of the women of the Civic League in the restaurant strike, work which was inaugurated at the preceding week's meeting of the club, with the response of the members of the club for help in the fight to the finish, and will stay with the restaurant men as long as needed.

Mrs. Smock paid a warm tribute to the work done by the women of the organization, as well as to the men who are working in the Open Shop association. "The women, both within and without our organization, have responded wonderfully, and have done wonderful work," she said. "It is really surprising, even to them, what they have been able to do. I for one, am very proud of the women of the city."

Suggestion that it behooved all of the Rotarians and the members of their families to be observant of the cards which are to be placed in the windows of members of the Open Shop association showing their stand in the matter and to do their trading there, was advanced by W. M. Friddy. Mr. Friddy also related that he was a witness of an individual who went into a store and priced a rather expensive hat, and when just on the point of buying it he watched the man, and that he repeated the performance in other places in the city.

"While we have won this strike," declared T. B. Smock, in this connection, "we must work unremittently to wind up the loose ends before we relax our vigilance."

"And our winning of the strike is due to three things. First, and principally, to the women of the town, who have worked faithfully in this connection. And in this connection a great deal of credit is due to Miss Florence Jackson, who has had charge of the organization of the women's work parties.

"Second, it is due to the public, who have been solidly in support of the movement.

"And in the third place to the restaurant men, two of them Americans, and the remainder Greek citizens, who have taken up this fight for a principle in spite of the fact that at least in the beginning, it meant a loss of dollars and cents for them to do it. They should be given full credit for the way they have stood the gaff in defense of this American principle."

### A. L. HUEY FILES SUIT AGAINST ELECTRIC CO. FOR ANNULMENT FRANCHISE AND FOR DAMAGES

Alleging discrimination against the citizenship of Wichita Falls in the point of service rendered in favor of the service rendered in the oil fields, and further alleging breaches of contracts for the wiring of the Scotland addition, the annullment of the franchise of the Wichita Falls Electric Co., and damages in the sum of \$35,000 are asked in a suit filed against the company by A. L. Huey in the 20th district court. Under its franchise the defendant impliedly agreed and was under the duty and obligation of furnishing electric light service to all the residents and citizens of Wichita Falls, Texas, the plaintiff says in this connection, and its first and primary obligation in the furnishing of lighting service and electricity is, and should be to the citizens of Wichita Falls, Texas, and to take care of them in the service of electric lights; the defendant has wholly neglected its implied contract and agreement, as well as the direct contract and promise and agreement to this plaintiff, and has failed, refused and neglected to furnish to the citizens electric light service in that portion of the city above described, but, on the contrary, has devoted its efforts to serving people outside the city of Wichita Falls, and spending large sums of money and using material that was highly necessary to complete its service and extensions in said city to other parts of the country and has been discriminating against the citizenship of Wichita Falls and furnishing electricity and power from its plant in said city to the oil fields of Wichita county and outside towns in Wichita and other counties, to the prejudice and damage of the people within said city of Wichita Falls, and especially to this plaintiff. Plaintiff alleges three definite contracts in his petition, with the agent of the company. First, he declared, as agent of the Scotland Realty company, and realizing that the lots in Scotland addition would have a better market value if provided with water and light facilities, he approached the agent of the electric company and asked for the extension of these facilities to the addition. On being told that the company was not in a financial condition to buy the materials to make this

him in this particular in the sum of \$30,000; and that the defendant well knew that failure to carry out its promises would damage the property of the defendant. Further damages of \$10,000 for alleged discrimination against the plaintiff and the citizens of this section of the city generally by the plaintiff contrary to its implied contract for equal service to the entire citizenship of Wichita Falls. A total of \$30,000 only, however, is named in the prayer. The petition of the plaintiff was filed by Cox and Keys. The Scotland addition is the addition lying north of the city and across the Wichita river.

**NEW JUDICIAL DISTRICT CREATED STEPHENS COUNTY**  
AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 3.—A house concurrent resolution by Representative Reeves of Grayson county, was adopted today in the house directing the state board of control "to enter immediately into an investigation" of the whereabouts of "The Twin Sisters" and other famous caverns of the Confederacy which were taken from the capitol grounds many years ago. Senate bill proposing the creation of the 30th judicial district in Stephens county, was passed finally in the house. A bill was introduced by Representative Parnell proposing an extension of time for the development of oil permits covered by lands involved in the federal receivership of the Texas-Oklahoma dispute.

### PRODUCTION AGAIN CLIMBS UP AROUND 100,000 BARREL MARK FOLLOWING RECENT DECLINE

Production in the Wichita Falls district is again around the 100,000 barrel daily mark. Burkburnett, recovering more than half of the loss shown last week, which was attributed to bad weather and various other conditions in the outskirts of the Waggoner pool. The production is now approximately 99,000 barrels daily with both the C. Birk and Michna tract and the Kemp Munger Allen district furnishing a prospect of additional completions for the next several weeks.

The Iowa Park production is still reported as 3,000 barrels daily. Burkburnett's total is 85,000 barrels daily with the Texas pool's production 4,000 barrels daily. Electra's average is 4,000 daily. Petrolia is 450 barrels and Slicky 300 barrels.

The Waggoner pool a westward extension in the producing line on the Michna tract is affected by the Hull Tex Oil company's No. 2 Michna, in lot 2 block 1 of the Tidwell subdivision, reported a 500 barrel well. Other interesting and important completions are expected in this Michna tract shortly. This Hull Tex well got the sand around 1610 feet, it is reported, a similar depth to the producers on the southeastern corner of the Michna, and more than 30 feet of oil sand was drilled. This Michna, like the Birk tract, has a very thick pay strata, according to the logs of the completions, and there is only a tightness, or slight break in the sand, instead of two oil sands, as it was at first the general opinion.

The record completion of the Michna tract this week is the Old Colony United Oil company's No. 1 Michna, in the southeastern part of block 819, a 1000-barrel well. This well is in the section where the recent record completions have been made by Emerich and Danziger and others, who have been developing this section, since the above named operators opened up the territory considered condemned.

The Texas company's C. Birk tract, which joins the Michna on the south, furnishes two big completions for the past week. The No. 12 is a 1200-barrel well, originally reported as making 1600 barrels. It increased this much in production after the first two

days by actual gauge. The No. 13 is an 800-barrel well. The No. 12 drilled 40 feet of oil sand and stopped drilling still in oil sand.

The Waggoner pool completions have been very few this week, there being in addition to the above named completions a 300-barrel on the A. A. Morgan tract, the Baker No. 3 A. A. Morgan and the Queen Seven Oil company No. 1 Taylor, around 50 barrels. The latter is on the northern edge of the pool.

The Burkburnett townsite pool has three completions, the first in several weeks. All belong to the Gilliland Oil company on the J. G. Hardin tract, west of the townsite. The No. 28 is reported making 25 barrels, the No. 65 50 barrels and the No. 66 40 barrels.

In the old Burkburnett pool the Humble Oil and Refining company has a hundred barrel well on the John Serrien farm, their No. 27. This is producing from the 1700-foot sand, or the regulation Burkburnett semi-deep sand.

Two more old Burkburnett district completions are reported, both for the Magnolia Petroleum company. The No. 42 Schenker is reported as a 300-barrel well and the No. 5 Anderson as an 80-barrel well.

In the South Burkburnett district shallow field there are several good completions reported, from the regulation 1200-foot depth. The Pioneer production company's No. 3 Roller is a 100-barrel well, the Schaffer and Manikin No. 5 Daniels is making 150 barrels, their No. 6 Daniels, 175 barrels and their No. 7 Daniels 175 barrels.

The No. 3 Daniels of the Texas Interstate Oil company is also reported as a recent completion, making 100 barrels.

The Texoma Oil company's No. 2 Dodson is also reported completed, a 600,000 cubic foot gasser. This is the first gasser in Wichita county, and may mean a considerable development of this section for gassers. This gas is to be used for making casing head gasolines. It is reported, but is also suitable for use for commercial fuel, and may have an important bearing on the fuel shortage in this

### Open Shop Has No Place in Wichita Falls

Labor Unions have existed in Wichita Falls for years. Closed shop agreements have been entered into with beneficial results to proprietors and working men. Wichita Falls has prospered.

Enter the Open Shop Association with a flourish. Immediately ads and propaganda in news articles began to appear with the intention to deceive the public into believing that ALL unions were un-American and all members of unions were criminals.

The purpose was ulterior. Unless organizations could be discredited and branded as lawless and un-American, and the public made to believe such propaganda, no attempted destruction of organizations as a body was possible.

Union labor has not seen fit to combat the assertions, insinuations and unfair charges, believing that the public itself would see that they were false. But when, as a mass, we are classed as criminal thugs, it is time to call a halt.

Union labor did not know, does not now know, who may have attacked the non-union waiter, other than that it was not a member of organized labor. The Executive Board stands ready at all times to aid in the prosecution of men who violate the law.

Union labor is not a violator of laws. It is not un-American. It is not hostile to the sense of right and justice. It is not Bolshevistic. No charges can be sustained on these counts and the Open Shop Knows it. It is propaganda for the purpose of arousing prejudice.

Working men will organize whether or no. When they organize they will bargain collectively and when they cannot bargain collectively they will strike, employers to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Open Shop Association forced the issue. The consequences are certain. They are here. Wichita Falls' prosperity is waning. It will continue to wane until this open shop fight is over, because the business of the city depends on payrolls. Union labor is still working. The open shop is standing still. On the decision of the contractor, the merchant and the laboring men rests the future prosperity of the city.

ARMY OF 17,000 NEEDED HARVEST WHEAT CROP

Five new offices, location of which has not yet been determined, will be opened in those three states, it was further announced. Figures today showed a total of 60,000 harvest workers will be needed to gather the wheat crop, estimated to total 11,500,000 acres.

25,000 ELEVATORS NEEDED TO SAVE OKLAHOMA CROP

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., June 3.—To house Oklahoma's expected wheat crop of 60,000,000 bushels, 25,000 temporary elevators must be built within the next 30 days, according to a statement today by John A. Whitehurst of the state board of agriculture. Letters have been sent to all county councils of defense urging them to cooperate with citizens in taking an active part in the "save the grain" campaign. Facilities for storing only 20 per cent of this year's crop are available now he said.

STANDARD OIL SUFFERS \$1,000,000 LOSS

GREELY, KAN., June 3.—Bullington and equipment of the Standard Oil company's pumping station here were believed to be a total loss following a fire caused by ignition of oil spraying on a boiler late yesterday. The station was valued at about \$1,000,000.

BOLL WORM COMMITTEE SEEKS REGULATED ZONE

AUSTIN, TEXAS, June 3.—The pink boll worm investigating committee is scheduled to make its report to the legislature today. Since the committee concluded its inquiry into the reported infestation of pink boll worms in the southeastern portion of the state, it has been engaged in the preparation of a report. The report will recommend a regulated cotton zone and there will also be a feature which will provide for immediate destruction of cotton affected, which will in a measure meet the objections of the federal horticultural board. The Tillotson educational bill which carries an appropriation of \$2,500,000 to supplement the available school fund and to be used to increase salaries of school teachers, is scheduled to come up for consideration in the house today. In the senate the Dayton teachers' bill, which proposes to permit teachers from other states to teach in Texas, when holding a certificate, without taking an examination, is on the calendar for today. The Cox gas bill may be taken up for consideration in the senate. Report of the pink boll worm investigating committee was read in both branches of the legislature today. The committee, as a result of its investigation into the pink boll worm menace recommends the passage of a regulated zone in the infested area in southeast Texas as embodied in the Wolters-Cureton bill. The committee also recommends an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to reimburse the farmers for any cotton destroyed under said bill, and an adequate appropriation to the agricultural department for enforcing the proposed law.

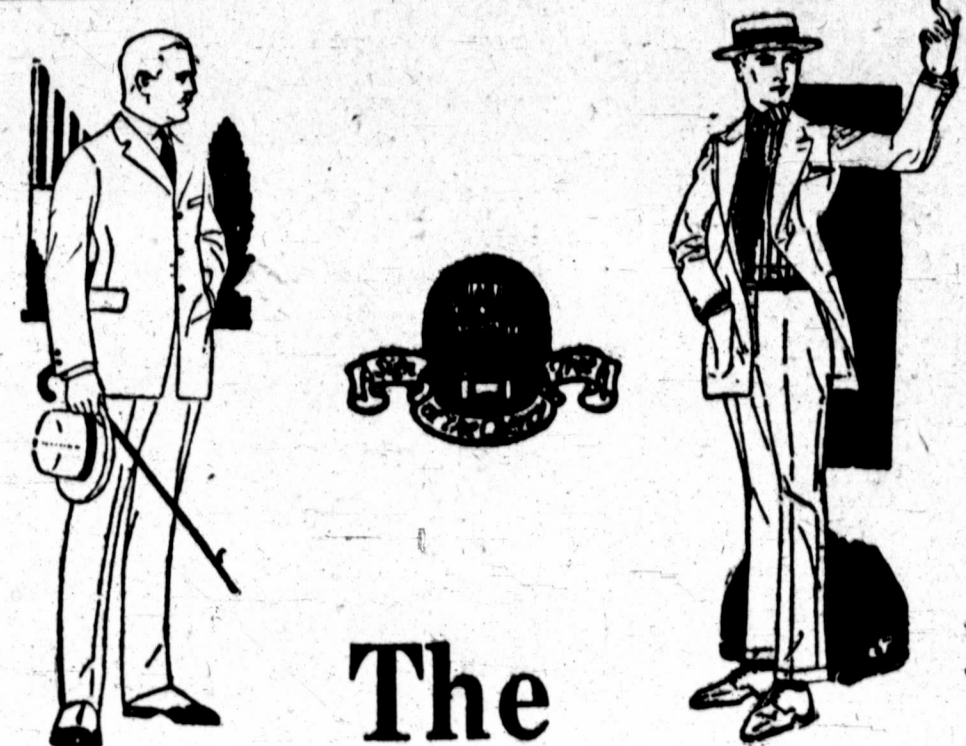

### SELECTING JURY TRIAL OF HAGGARD IN THIRTIETH COURT

H. H. Haggard, oil operator, is on trial before a jury in Judge H. F. Welton's 30th district court on a charge of forgery. Haggard is charged by indictment with the forgery of the name of Miss Ruth Benefield to an oil lease. The bill of indictment was returned by the special grand jury in session the latter part of May.

It is doubtful if much testimony in the case will be secured today as both prosecuting and defending attorneys are exercising great care in the selection of the trial jury. Fred Weeks of the firm of Weeks, Morrow, Weeks & Francis is aiding District Attorney Fletcher Jones and County Attorney John Davenport in the prosecution of the case, while the firm of Morgan & King is representing the defense.

Haggard has figured in numerous civil proceedings filed in the local courts in recent weeks growing out of alleged oil operations in this section. More than 100 writs of garnishments were issued against Haggard's bank account by stockholders in companies alleged to have been promoted by Haggard. Haggard retaliated by filing cross petitions against persons who originally filed against him and there are now several cases seeking damages pending against persons who filed debt and foreclosure proceedings against Haggard.

In the cross charges, Haggard alleges that he has been materially damaged by numerous persons who persistently file debt and damage suits against him, all of which are without foundation.

### GALVESTON TIE-UP THREATENS SERIOUS CONSEQUENCES HERE

The tie-up in freight shipments through Galveston by reason of the strike conditions prevailing there, which has called forth an ultimatum from Governor W. P. Hobby to authorities of the city of Galveston, is a matter of very grave moment not only to this section of Texas, but throughout the state and portions of states adjacent, and may contribute toward an intensification of the present financial stringency, unless efforts to open a free movement for the export of farm products of the Southwest are successful, according to a number of letters from prominent local business men which have in the past few days been addressed to the Governor at Austin.

The fact that the only outlet for the exportable surplus of the farm products of Texas, is through the port of Galveston, and that under present conditions the ready export and sale of these crops are extremely necessary, being the only source for the obtaining of a considerable quantity of new money in the state with which to relieve the present tight conditions prevailing, threatens a disaster to the whole state, unless these conditions are at once corrected. It is pointed out in these messages, the fact that many sections of Oklahoma and Kansas and other states in this section are equally dependent on movements through Galveston further emphasizes the fact that the matter is more than a local matter for Galveston, and justifies the use of the machinery of the

entire state for their correction. It is added in these messages.

"A great deal of the surplus of the 1920 crops has already been sold to Europe, naming Galveston as the point of export, ships have been chartered to carry these crops, and it is a matter of vital importance to the people throughout the whole southwest that nothing be allowed to stay in the way of carrying out these contracts," one letter points out.

"If the port of Galveston should be allowed to become or remained closed to this traffic, it would have the effect of shutting off these products from a market, when it is of extreme necessity that they should be marketed," the letter continues.

"The only other possible point of export to these products is New Orleans, which commands a considerably higher freight rate which renders its use, if not absolutely prohibitive, resulting at least in the imposition of a severe penalty upon the farmers of Texas who produced these crops, and the business men who are concerned in their marketing, at a time when it is extremely important that their resources be utilized to the fullest extent in order that the present situation should be met and relieved, not only for themselves but for the people of the state, all of whom will be affected thereby in some degree and in some means, either directly or indirectly."

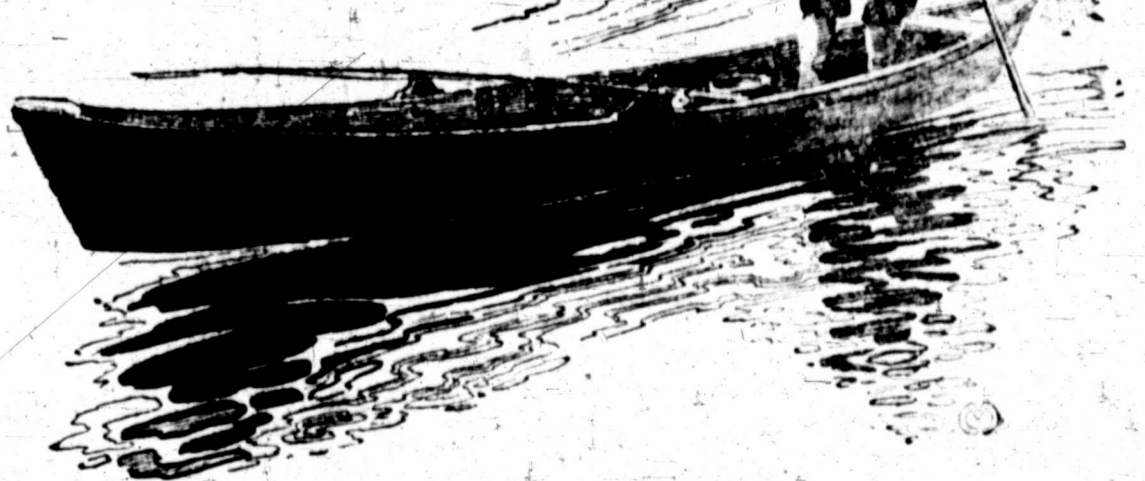

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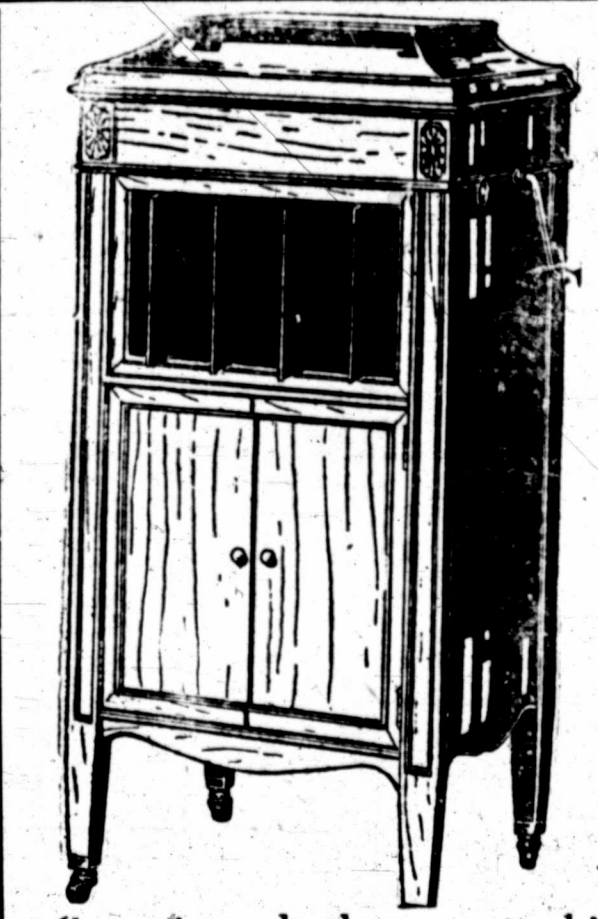

### VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

#### The Open Shop Question.

To the Wichita Daily Times. In regard to the open shop question I will take up first the article of "Mustard Gas" in Monday's paper. It is not worthy of reply, but I will mention it as it most fairly exemplifies the narrow, selfish and un-American spirit of most of those who are propagating the open or non-union shop. His letter convinces me that the state has been remiss in its duty to those who came out of the war, affected by the strife of the horrible strife, and that the state should sacrifice economy for speed in finishing the building of its asylum on the shores of beautiful Lake Wichita, as it is sadly needed.

But I did not start out to discuss the state's duty, but the open shop, and I will state that I have worked under open shop conditions for twelve years, working an average of two hours daily for less than a decent living, so I claim to be qualified to give the true facts of the matter. Owing to the selfish greed which seems to be born in all men and seems to be magnified a thousand-fold by the accumulation of wealth, it has been the case, hence the day, that the working class could not get a fair measure of justice in their relations with their employers. They were forced by injustice to organize for their own protection against human (Satanic) greed. So the union, or closed shop, which is not closed against any fellow workman, is their only protection from the unjust, greedy and selfish employer, and is to the advantage of the fair and just employer; and as the union shop is the workman's only guarantee of justice, any one who thinks the American workman is going to be robbed of that guarantee without some protest on his part has sized up American working men wrong and ought to sit down and think some more, as he has been merely kidding himself so far.

And in regard to the oft-quoted virtue of fairness to all employees as individuals standing alone, claimed by the open shop advocate, I must be excused for being a doubting Thomas, as you know I have had twelve years of it, and my experience has been similar to millions of others. Furthermore, it is a well known fact that at least three of the strongest local open shop men are prejudiced on the subject, they being at the head of four large industries that they run on the open shop system which, as every one knows means long hours and small pay. So I, for one, refuse to let these men define Americanism for me.

Now, before closing, I would call the reader's attention to another angle of the question. I have heard one of the open shop leaders referred to as a just and honest man by a fellow workman. Conceding as much, I am not a horse thief, but would it not ap-

pear illogical, and lay me open to suspicion, were I to insist that my neighbor leave his barn unlocked, his bull dog chained and sell his shot gun to the junk man? My neighbor, not being a fool, would very likely add a burglar alarm, begin sleeping in the barn, and keep an eye in the direction of my premises, and could you blame him? You would not.

Now, as to the claim of the open shop men that they will treat all men right without the influence of the union, excuse me for doubting their consistency. We all concede that it is fair and right for us to put a two-cent stamp on the letters we mail, but if it was not compulsory, and was left to every one's sense of honesty, and the compulsion was removed that but few of us would go to the trouble and expense of buying stamps. It is the same in an employer's relations with the employee. In the first case we put the postage on the blink; in the second case the employee would suffer a like fate. And then could the Lord save the nation? Maybe so, but let us so conduct the nation's affairs that it won't need it.

Love and nature are the themes of Lewis James' tenor solo "Hiawatha's Melody of Love." The tenor duet by Lewis James and Charles Harrison is "Underneath the Southern Skies," an appealing nature song with a harmonious orchestral interlude.

The Peerless Quartette sings "Who'll Take the Place of Mary?" a ballad with an even balance between its lyrical sentiment and musical harmony. This is coupled with "Mother's Hands," a tenor solo by Lewis James.

The first Columbia Records made by Frank Kampain, the popular vaudeville yodler, are "Emmet's Cuckoo Song" and "Emmet's Lullaby." "Jean," an amusing song of a persistent serenader, is very well sung by the Peerless Quartette. This selection is coupled with Frank Modeste's sympathetic tenor solo, "What a Day That'll Be."

Orchestra Selections. This is a variety of four of this month's Columbia Records. Prince's Orchestra plays "Smoky Mokes," a two-step cakewalk which might perhaps be classed among the dance selections, and "Happy Days in Dixie," with an incidental chorus by the Peerless Quartette.

The Philharmonic Orchestra of New York plays a picture from "The Mikado," which is a medley of most of its important airs, and also that other medley from Mile Modeste which makes that opera's overture.

Instrumental Solos. Patrick J. Scanton, who holds the record of having played for the greatest Irish reel and jig dancers in the world, furnishes the fifth variety in this month's Columbia records with four accordion solos. They are "Swallow Tail," "Greenfields of America," "Liverpool," and "O'Neil's Favorite," and they all have a flavor of the "ould sod."

The sixth variety consists of Percy Grainger's three piano solos—"Molly on the Shore," an Irish reel; "Brahm's Valse in A Flat," and the "Juba Dance," a southern negro selection. This composer-pianist's flying fingers have gained Grainger hosts of friends. Sascha Jacobsen's violin solos furnish the seventh variety. He plays that ultra popular fox-trot, "Dardanelles," and the waltz, "If You Could Care," from As You Were. The fox-trot is the leading jazz sensation of the day, and the waltz is one of leading symphony artists.

Other Varieties. The "Boston Commandery March," and the "Colonel Bogey March," both by the Columbia band under the di-

rection of Charles A. Prince, furnish band selections as an eighth variety in this month's Columbia records. The Fiske University Jubilee Singers sing two appealing negro folk songs, "Oh! Bohn, Massa Jesus, Reign," and "Most Done Traveling," which form variety number nine.

The tenth variety consists of two Hawaiian guitar duets, "Hawaiian Smiles," a waltz, and "In the Heart of Hawaii," by Louise and Perera.

Two screaming comic Columbia records by Harry Hersfield of "Abbe the Agent" fame, form variety number eleven. They are "Abe Kabbibbe at the Ball Game," and "Abe Kabbibbe Dictates a Letter."

Two speeches by prominent men recorded for the Nation's Forum, round out a dozen varieties. Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts, talks on the subject of "Law and Order," and the other speech presents the first opportunity to hear Bainbridge Colby, our new secretary of state.

"Khaki Boys' March" is an unusual ball solo, made in England, with an accompaniment by the British orchestra. This is one side of this month's novelty record.

"When My Baby Smiles at Me" is an extra funny fox-trot by the Ted Lewis Jazz band. This is the first

Columbia record in which they make their trombone laugh. And it's some laugh—the father of all laughs, in fact, because it engenders so many more. This dance is coupled with that widely popular new fox-trot, "Rose of Washington Square," played by the Kentucky serenaders.

The Columbia Saxophone Sextette plays two new fox-trots for Columbia records this month, "Who wants a Baby?" a medley fox-trot, and "The Crocodile." This sextette is made up of the pick of more than 60 saxophone players, and its dance records show that the picking was good.

The Columbia Dance Orchestra plays "Swanee," a medley one-step introducing "Come to the Moon," and the Happy Six plays "Mystery," a medley fox-trot with an incidental chorus sung by Jack Kaufman.

Art Hickman's orchestra from the St. Francis Hotel, San Francisco, plays "Hold Me," a fox-trot with an incidental piano duet by Hickman and El-

lis, and "Dance With Me Again," a one-step. Prince's Dance Orchestra plays the one-step "Oriental Stars" and the fox-trot "Bound in Morocco." The Yerkes Jazamba Orchestra contributes the medley fox-trots "Left Alone Again Blues" and "Alexandria from Aphrodite." The Columbia orchestra plays "Delliah," a medley waltz, and Prince's Orchestra performs that beautiful waltz "In Shadowland."

Finally the Columbia Mexican band plays a native waltz entitled "Among Flowers," the coupling of the bell solo, "Khaki Boys' March," completing this month's novelty record.
