Enter the Open Shop Association with a flourish. Immediately ads and propaganda in news articles began to appear with the intention to deceive the public into believing that ALL unions were un-American and all members of unions were criminals.

The purpose was ulterior. Unless organizations could be discredited and branded as lawless and un-American, and the public made to believe such propaganda, no attempted destruction of organizations as a body was possible.

Union labor has not seen fit to combat the assertions, insinuations and unfair charges, believing that the public itself would see that they were false. But when, as a mass, we are classed as criminal thugs, it is






