

LEAGUE OF NATIONS AGREEMENT REACHED

LEAGUE NATIONS PLANK MAY BE STRAW THAT CAUSES DISCORD IN RANKS G. O. P. PARTY

COLISEUM, June 10.—While awaiting the report of the platform committee, the republican national convention held a brief session this morning and then, much to the disappointment of the galleries, took a recess until 4 o'clock this afternoon.

When the convention assembled the platform committee was engaged in the struggle over the plank on the peace treaty and it looked as if much time might be lost.

There was a consideration of plans to go ahead with nominating speeches when the platform report, but there was objection to that and it was abandoned.

While the convention managers were about to adjourn, the word came from down town that the platform sub-committee had agreed on a report and a few minutes later Senator McCormick presented a motion for a recess until 4:30 o'clock but there was a roar of eyes and noses from the delegates and galleries and Chairman Lodge was compelled to call for a standing vote on which he decided that the majority wanted the recess.

Immediately at the conclusion of the prayer, Senator McCormick of the sub-committee on resolutions took the platform. "I have to report that the committee has unanimously agreed upon a platform including a paragraph dealing with the treaty of peace."

For a moment, the irreconcilable forces in the select committee, dominated by Senators Borah and McCormick, seemed taken back. They sprang to arms then in full force and from that time until after 1 o'clock this morning, the battle raged furiously behind the locked doors of the hotel bedrooms where the committeemen in shirt sleeves and worn by the long strain searched every avenue for possible escape from an open break.

It would be necessary, he explained, for the sub-committee to perfect its draft and submit it to the full committee, which would consider it "line by line."

At 11:20 o'clock Secretary Miller of the republicans called for the latter report from the platform committee.

At a conference of the leaders, however, it was decided to recess until four o'clock when the platform report of the platform committee will be received.

From that meeting Senator Smoot carried the problem to another venue, the select committee, in the senate, Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, chairman of the convention. Senator Borah also saw Senator Smoot and the latter expressed his opposition to a proposal that the struggle continue all night.

Chairman Lodge got the convention in order at 10 o'clock and called to the delegates to clear the aisles and sit down. Cardinal Gibbons offered the prayer. The republicans were about to enter the convention hall and a wave of enthusiasm extended up into the band stands.

Representatives of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks and southern delegates made lengthy addresses against the negroes' demand for membership, declaring that the negro was being given "a square deal."

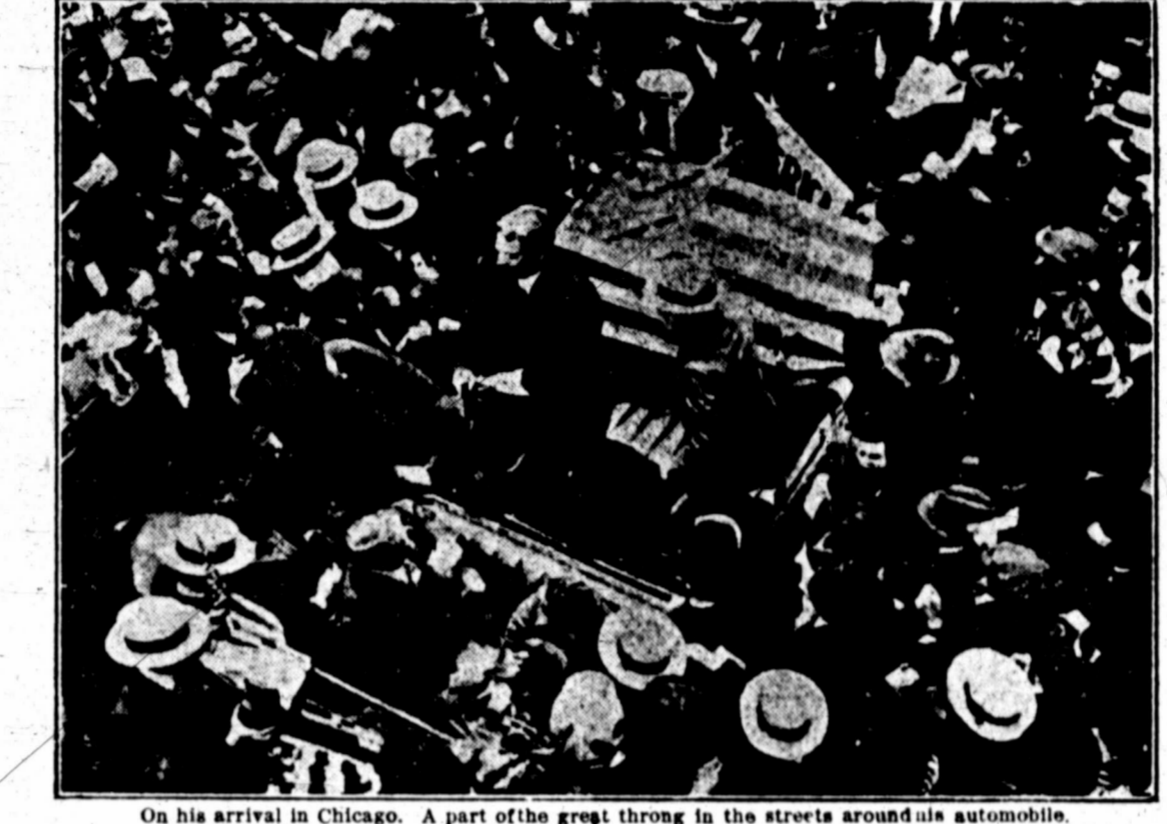
How the agreement would affect the nomination of a candidate except to hasten it by removing the big cause of delay did not become immediately apparent.

Other delegates, led by Charles E. Sumner of the State Typographers and Electrotypers union, demanded that the federation insist that the "color line" be abolished by the clerks' brotherhood or revoke its charter.

Over night the league of nations issue had become suddenly upward to a position of overshadowing importance, almost of menace, in party councils. It was the rock on which the special harmonizing sub-committee on platform split after hours of fruitless labor toward a compromise.

When the mass of the more than 1,000 footers delegates arose to resume the conference of 12 months old Blakely Coughlin revived today with the arrival of a second letter from Savannah, Ga.

NEW YORK, June 10.—A dark horse boom for Gen. John J. Pershing for the democratic presidential nomination was set in motion here today.

Senator Lodge gave the adherents of the opposing side on this question a chance to show their feelings in the issue of the League of Nations.

CHICAGO, June 10.—A league of nations plank drafted by Elihu Root was accepted as a basis of compromise to the resolutions committee.

It is understood there is no specific mention of the League of Nations, but there is a denunciation of the course of the president in the conduct of foreign affairs, in which he is blamed for failure to secure peace.

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CHICAGO, June 10.—When the resolutions sub-committee went into session again this morning, the league of nations plank still threatened a party split, a tentative foreign relations plank was under consideration.

It was indicated that although references to the league of nations were still in a formative stage, the sub-committee probably would accept the tentative draft so far as it related to Mexico, Armenia and the peace resolution.

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### CONSTRUCTION AND SPECULATION MUST AWAIT HARVEST

The cutting out of speculation and the slowing down of new construction, in which he finds the business men wherever he goes co-operating, and which is being favored by the federal reserve system and bankers throughout the country, is more than a measure of good business, and a helpful step toward the resumption of normal financial conditions, but is a patriotic duty for the country's business men in view of the need of labor for the harvesting of the country's food crops, so badly needed throughout the world, declared Frank Kell Thursday following his return from a business trip to various points over the state.

"It may be distasteful to some, and hurtful to others, but it is a paramount public necessity for all to aid in the resumption of normal conditions," Mr. Kell said.

"The abnormal financial conditions obtaining at present were brought about by the war, and it is up to all as a patriotic duty, and as a measure to do all in our power to bring things back to normal conditions."

"We are just entering the harvest of what now appears to be the next largest wheat crop the country has ever raised—a crop every bushel of which must be saved in order to supply the food so badly needed throughout the world."

"With new construction bidding against the farmer for labor, there will be no prospect for the relief from the present shortage of farm labor, and much of this crop may be lost."

"The government report just issued indicates that the present crop of winter wheat alone will be 504,000,000 bushels, by far the largest in the history of the country, and that there will be nearly 300,000,000 bushels of spring wheat, making at present a preliminary estimate of approximately 800,000,000 bushels crop, which added to the surplus carried over last year's crop, gives us nearly a billion bushels of wheat."

"Every bushel of this wheat, which will bring high prices, will be needed with which to supply the food shortage throughout the world."

"Therefore, the saving of every bushel of the crop becomes a matter of not only national, but world-wide importance. Consequently, labor, which will be released in the cities from the slowing down of new construction can all be employed at high wages in the harvesting of the cereal crops of the country, to the benefit of itself, of the country at large and of the world, all of which are dependent on these crops for their food for the coming year."

**SALARIES OF TEACHERS INCREASED AT ANSON**

ANSON, TEX., June 10.—The salaries of the teachers of the Anson public schools have been increased from 20 to 30 per cent more than was received by them last year. One more teacher has been employed for the next term than was for last term. This makes a total of 12 teachers here.

There were 603 students enrolled here last year. The scholastic census for Anson independent districts has just been completed, giving 496 scholastics. This means between 700 and 800 enrolled for next year, including transfers and overs and unders.

W. A. Byrum, superintendent, has been successful in gaining affiliation for the English department of the high school. He has the assurance that about \$1,000 worth of improvements will be added to the science department.

**BUSY SESSION EXPECTED FOR BUSINESS COUNCIL**

Three matters of importance are to come up for attention at tomorrow night's meeting of the Business Council of the Chamber of Commerce, the tax valuation question, the tourist camp site plan, and the report of the committee on traffic regulations.

The latter report is expected to meet with considerable discussion as various views are entertained as to the best means of handling the downtown traffic situation.

This week's meeting will be held at the usual time and place, arrangements for the noon luncheon not yet being perfected.

**INCREASED COTTON ACREAGE IN JONES COUNTY**

ANSON, TEXAS, June 10.—Practically everywhere in Jones County the farmers are busy with their young crops. Only a very small portion will have to be replanted as conditions have been ideal for the planting and growing of the young stuff. Cotton is being chopped and the food stuffs being cultivated and everything is in excellent shape.

There will be about twenty-five or thirty per cent more cotton in Jones County than in 1919 owing to the fact that only a very small acreage has been devoted to small grain.

### 192 FELONY COMPLAINTS PENDING IN CRIMINAL COURTS WICHITA COUNTY

One hundred and ninety-two felony complaints are now pending in the criminal courts of Wichita county, according to Wayne Summerville, assistant county attorney. More than 700 criminal cases have been filed in the county court since last September but many of these cases have been disposed of either by trial or agreement.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—An embargo on the supply of cars for movement of bituminous coal in carload lots to any Lake Erie ports for transshipment by water except on a permit was ordered today by the Interstate Commerce commission, effective June 13.

### PALMER RULES WILSON CAN SIGN MEASURES 10 DAYS AFTER CONGRESS QUITS

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Attorney General Palmer has made an informal ruling, which has been communicated to President Wilson, that the chief executive has 10 days after the adjournment of congress in which to sign bills and resolutions.

This rule may change the status of a number of bills which the president killed by "pocket veto," explaining that he had not had sufficient time in which to consider them. These measures include the waterpower bill and the resolution repealing most of the special war-time legislation.

### SOUTHERN DELEGATES PLAN FIGHT FOR RECOGNITION

CHICAGO, June 10.—A mass meeting of southern delegates, started in a hotel lobby with some 300 attending, was held last night in the interest of demanding recognition of the south on the republican national ticket.

Virginia and North Carolina both have vice presidential candidates in the field and speakers from other southern states advised that they unite on one man or the other and that the southern delegations should join in support of the man so named. A committee representing all southern delegations was appointed to canvass the situation and report to a second mass meeting tonight.

Among speakers were Col. Henry W. Anderson and Representative Stemp of Virginia and former Senator Butler of North Carolina.

### MANAGER PREVENTS PANIC FOLLOWING FIRE AT THEATER

Over 500 people walked coolly out of the Empress theater today at 1:30 when a fire broke out in the roof of the theater.

When the fire was first seen by the audience a short rush for the exits followed. Mr. Harwell, manager of the theater, was in his office at the time, and seeing a panic was imminent, urged the people to take their time and file out slowly. They obeyed him and everyone reached the street in safety.

As far as can be learned the fire started from the wiring in the roof of the theater, directly over the center of the orchestra seats. Mr. Harwell was unable to state the amount of damage done though the smoke and water loss will be heavy. He said that plans for remodeling the theater were already under way and that this opportunity would probably be taken to fix it over.

The Marshall and Purdum store, adjoining the theater suffered a slight smoke and water loss. The blaze was stopped quickly by the fire department.

Emil Hermann, Wichita Falls artist who has been executing a number of commissions, portraits of prominent Wichitans, will leave Saturday for a summer to be spent in various Eastern art centers. He has postponed his going for a week, being engaged with first sittings for several new orders, which include portraits of Mrs. C. W. Seider, Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Waggoner, Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Bashara and small grand daughter of Mrs. Lillis Morgan. He will do the major part of the work on these and numerous other local commissions at his New York studio during the summer, and will have them ready for an exhibition with which he will formally open his art school and studio in Wichita Falls next fall.

Ivory miniatures will form a considerable part of the exhibit. Mr. Hermann announces, among them to be miniatures of the deceased daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kemp and the late Herbert Hughes. He will also have on display composition sketches of five large mural panels he has a commission for, to be placed in a new million dollar theatre in Columbus, Ohio. He also expects to have an interesting announcement regarding art exhibits to be held in Wichita Falls during the coming winter, some time during the summer if present plans go through.

**Arctic Cold is Misunderstood.**

### BOGER-ARD-MAER FLOWS WEDNESDAY

Parted casing, when the 5 3-16 casing was being pulled to reset in the Boger-Ard-Maer No. 1 in Block 41, has made a fishing job on this test, but the well made two flows Wednesday afternoon while the fishing was in progress, according to reports from the field. The well has been swabbed oil with some water while making the necessary runs to claim the discovery exemption, and now the water is being cut off.

The gas pressure, as well as the quantity of oil which was made even with the water trouble, is regarded as very favorable indication for the well, when it can be properly completed.

The Prescott-Phoenix well is being cleaned out for completion and is still entirely free from water, according to reports.

### "THUGGERY" DENOUNCED AT ROTARY LUNCHEON

A threatened verbal clash which gave indications of leading to fairly warm proportions between A. E. Myles and Mayor Walter D. Clines in connection with the alleged "thuggery" which has gone on here since the cooks and waiters strike featured the closing minutes of the noon luncheon of the Rotarians Thursday, was proceeding being interrupted with an adjournment soon after the fireworks had gotten under way. The incident was opened by Mr. Myles' declaring that this "thuggery" was a shame and disgrace to Wichita Falls, and asking the mayor, who was present, pointed questions in connection with the activities of the police department. The mayor replied by referring Mr. Myles to the police commissioner for information concerning that department, to the sanitary commissioner in connection with sewers, etc. Mr. Myles made a warm reply but further rejoinders were prevented.

T. D. Smock, one of the directors of the Open Shop association, declared that the association had no complaint against the city officials in connection with these events, as the men planning them were able to pick the time and place where they would be pulled off, and consequently had the advantage of the police. The Open Shop association does expect, he said, that the city officials will bend every effort in running these matters down after they have been perpetrated.

J. A. Kemp, member of the committee representing the Rotary Club, which with committees representing the Wichita Club and Chamber of Commerce lodged a protest with the county commissioners in connection with alleged inequalities in assessments of property in the county, reported for the committee that the commissioners stated that they wished nothing but fair and equitable assessments, and that the court was now sitting as a board of equalization to hear complaints from property owners who felt that they were not treated equitably in the matter of these assessments.

J. W. Bradley, chairman of the Rotary Club committee conducting the drive here in the interests of the Texas Home and Aid Society stated that the \$5000 quota had nearly been secured, and announced that every Rotarian was "expected to do his duty" in the campaign.

### RECONSIDERATION OF BILL EXEMPTING BONDS IS PLANNED

Reconsideration of the Parnell bill exempting municipal and other public bond issues from state taxation, the enactment of which was stricken out in the house of the legislature Monday, is being taken up now by the house, with a good prospect for final passage, according to a message received here Thursday morning from Porter Whaley, general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who is in Austin in the interest of the bill.

Failure of the bill for passage on the previous occasion is attributed to the belief entertained by some of the members of the legislature that the legislation would be unconstitutional, without the first submission of a constitutional amendment. It is understood here, however, that a recent decision along somewhat similar lines has since been brought to the attention of the members of the house which inclines them to the belief that the measures will be constitutional.

Passage of the bill means much to the city of Wichita, Falls, Wichita county, the Wichita county school districts, and every similar district in the state which has voted bonds for improvements and now finds that the bonds can not be marketed because the state save at a prohibitive discount. The bonds can not be marketed within the state under the present taxation, which makes their acquisition prohibitive. Texas being one of the very few states in the union to tax such securities, the act has simply resulted in driving Texas bonds to other states, and the state of Texas has never derived any benefit from the measure.

Flood of messages from individuals, chamber of commerce, public officials and individual citizens is being sent members of the legislature, urging support of the measure. The measure had no opposition from members of the legislature, except for their former belief of its unconstitutionality. With this objection disposed of, its passage is confidently expected here.

### EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGED AGAINST FORMER PARTNER

A partnership between J. P. Casey of Wichita county, oil well drillers, which is said by Reynolds to have been brought to a close several weeks ago, resulted in an embezzlement charge being filed against Casey in Justice C. J. Arrington's court late Wednesday on information furnished by Reynolds.

Reynolds asserts that he entrusted Casey with approximately \$700 to the care of his former partner and further alleges that Casey collected the debts and used them for his own purposes. Reynolds arrived in Wichita, Falls late Wednesday and immediately left for Newton accompanied by a deputy sheriff who went armed with a warrant for Casey's arrest.

### NATIONAL NEIGHBORS DAY IS SUGGESTED BY JAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Cardinal Gibbons, through the national committee on community organization of which Franklin K. Lane is president, has issued a proclamation suggesting Saturday, June 12 as Neighbor Day, to develop a spirit of neighborliness and friendliness.

Cardinal Gibbons' proclamation, similar to others by the governors of Ohio, Wyoming, West Virginia and Arkansas is as follows:

"The celebration of a National Neighbors' Day on June 12 would be a splendid means of promoting local community organization. I regard this kind of organization as an excellent means of breaking down racial and other prejudices, and of teaching men and women in a practical way their duties of Christian charity and helpfulness toward their fellows. It should prove effective in promoting genuine and sympathetic Americanization."

"JAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS." The committee on community organization is responsible for the birth of the idea of Neighbor Day. It grew out of the national conference on community organization which was held in Washington March 19 and 20. It is planned to have Neighbor Day become a nationally recognized day for the purpose of bringing the people, foreign born and native, into closer relationship by order to give them an intimate knowledge of the needs of the community. The sponsors believe that if a real spirit of community interest prevails under the stimulus of a yearly neighbor day on June 12, that no radical propaganda can withstand the welding together of local community organization.

The senate today took up for consideration its pink boll worm bill which proposes the establishment of regulated cotton zones in the pink boll worm infested territory of southeast Texas. The house has already passed to engrossment its bill of this subject.

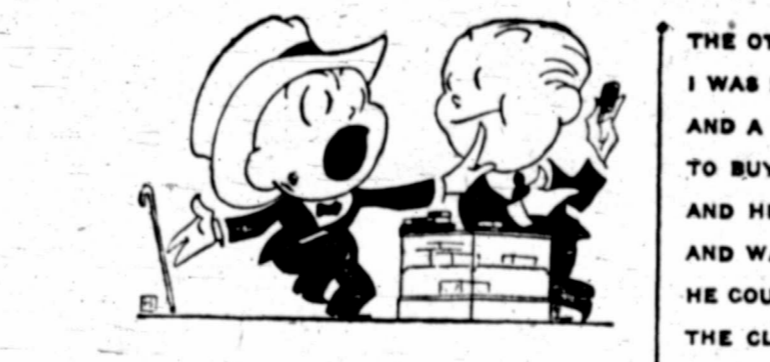
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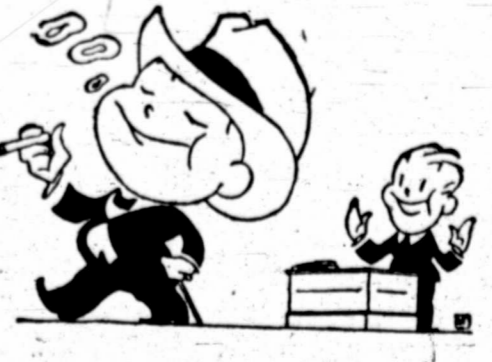

### ROCK ISLAND MAY BUILD LINE FROM WAURIKA-ARDMORE

Rock Island interests have completed a survey for an extension from Waurika to Ardmore, and have opened negotiations for the lease of the Ringling line from Ardmore to Ringling, according to apparently well founded rumors current in local railroad circles to the effect that that line is contemplating such an extension for the near future, in connection with a projected extension from Waurika to Wichita Falls.

Such an extension, which is believed here to be very likely of early realization, fits in well with the other lines now projected and under construction which will give Wichita Falls short line access to new and old oil fields in this part of the state, and which is expected to eventually make Wichita Falls operating headquarters for a considerable portion of the Mid-Continent fields, as it now is for the largest single field, the Wichita County pools. With the Rock Island extensions giving more direct access to Oklahoma City, and various Oklahoma oil fields, and the Hamon and Kell line to Breckenridge, Ranger and Dublin and other operating points to the south, together with the prospects that the next big oil strike will be somewhere in the Texas Panhandle, which Wichita Falls alone has direct and short rail connections, this city will occupy by far the best strategic position of any of the oil operating centers of the Southwest for headquarters for operation over a wide territory. Such rail connections will also serve to further strengthen the position of this city as the independent refining center of the state, as the demands of the independent refineries here outstrip the amount of crude they are able to secure at home. The increase of these rail connections will also be felt in other lines of business than the oil business, considerably strengthening the position of the city as the railroad center of Northwest Texas and Southwestern Oklahoma, and strengthening its position as a jobbing and general industrial center.

# FIRST SOLDIER'S BODY TO ARRIVE SATURDAY

When the body of James P. Cato, American soldier who died on October 8, 1918, in the base hospital at Brest, is placed in its final resting place at Electra, Texas, where his grave can be tenderly watched by loved ones, one of the dead soldier's often expressed wishes will be fulfilled, according to Robert P. Cato, his father, who was in Wichita Falls today, making arrangements for the reception of his son's body, which is expected to arrive on Saturday, having left Hoboken on June 8.

"We have all been so anxious to have his body brought back," said Mr. Cato, "and he himself before going across said he was coming back to his native land, whether he came alive and well, or dead, and we are now so gratified that we will have all that is left of him with us, to be buried where the rest of the family will eventually lie. The question of returning the bodies of the American dead had been of great interest to us, and it helps our sorrow to know that he will soon rest in the place that he loved so much."

This Wichita county boy, one of the first to die overseas and the first whose body has been returned to his home for final burial, landed in Brest on September 20, after suffering from pneumonia, dying on October 8. He had been at Camp MacArthur, Waco, for training for less than two months before receiving his orders. He was a private in the medical corps.

For 11 years he had resided in Wichita county, assisting his father in general and stock farming. He had been a member of the Baptist church and unmarried. He is survived by his father, his step-mother, three own brothers and one half-brother, and two own sisters and two half-sisters. The funeral arrangements will be made on the arrival of the body. The arrangements will be made by the Red Cross Home Service Section and Major Perkins, acting in the dual capacity of head of the American Legion and commander of the local national guard cavalry unit.



# OFFICIALS WARN CITY TO PREPARE FOR ANOTHER "GASLESS WINTER"; CONTRACT GUARANTEES NO RELIEF

Citizens of Wichita Falls were warned by Mayor Cline and members of the city council to prepare for another "gasless winter" following a two-hour discussion with officials of the gas companies of the new contract proposed by the companies. "People will do well to prepare for another gasless winter by providing other means of fuel," said this statement. "There is no guarantee offered by this contract that there will be a sufficient gas supply for this winter."

After discussing for more than two hours the proposed contract between the City of Wichita Falls and the North Texas Gas company by the provisions of which the gas corporation is privileged to materially increase the present rate from 50 cents per thousand cubic feet to 67 1/2 cents per thousand cubic feet and later to 75 cents per thousand cubic feet, the city council recessed at noon Thursday without taking definite action.

The aldermanic board will convene at 8 o'clock tonight in the mayor's office at which time a vote will be taken upon the contract, councilmen announced at noon Thursday as they departed from the mayor's office. The early stages of Thursday forenoon's session was open but an executive session was asked at 11 o'clock and all visitors including President C. M. McKinney of the North Texas Gas company, were requested to leave the room. The executive session continued until noon. Aldermen present were Houser, Curlee, McLowell and Bralley with Mayor Cline presiding.

The outstanding feature of the new contract with the North Texas Gas company is contained in the first paragraph which follows: "It is agreed that the North Texas Gas company, party of the first part, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, shall be authorized to charge the sum of seventy-five cents gross per cubic foot for natural gas for domestic purposes, less the discount of ten per cent, for prompt payment of monthly bills now prevailing under the rules of said North Texas Gas company, making the net rate sixty seven and one-half cents per thousand cubic foot for domestic use, which rate shall apply for a period of twelve months and following contingencies shall have effect after the date when either of

have been connected with the main pipe line of the said Lone Star Gas company from West Texas fields at Joshua Junction, Tex.; or when the North Texas Gas company has secured by lease or purchase the pipe line for gas from the City of Wichita Falls to the Walters field in the state of Oklahoma; or when said North Texas Gas company has built or caused to be built from the Keys field in Oklahoma a pipe line from the Magallowa gas wells situated about nine miles east of said Keys field, it being, however, expressly provided that the increased rates herein authorized shall not be effective at any time prior to Sept. 1, 1920."

Additional provisions of the contract provide that "from and after the expiration of the 12 months period above named, the rates shall become effective, the basis of charges shall be the said gross sum of 75 cents per 1,000 cubic feet plus 3 cents for every additional cent over the average sum of 5 cents per 1,000 cubic feet paid for gas by the Lone Star Gas company in the field, less discount of 10 per cent; it being, however, expressly provided

that in no event shall the net cost to the consumer making prompt payment under existing rules of North Texas company be more than 75 cents per 1,000 cubic feet for domestic use for the period of two years after the expiration of the above period of one year, and provided further that in no event shall the price of gas for domestic purposes exceed \$1 net, per 1,000 cubic feet, during the life of the present franchise granted by the City of Wichita Falls to the North Texas Gas company.

"The North Texas Gas company as a condition upon which the rates above stated shall become effective, agrees to make an extension of its mains in the city of Wichita Falls, and to construct additional mains as follows: At least 7,000 feet of additional 10-inch line and 12,200 feet of additional eight-inch line.

"Except as herein specifically provided, existing contracts between the City of Wichita Falls and the North Texas Gas company and all ordinances regulating the supply and distribution of gas to the citizens of Wichita Falls shall remain in full force and effect.

Mayor Walter D. Cline freely expressed himself and feeling that "while the contract was not what it should be, yet the best available under existing conditions.

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GOVERNMENT SCORES POINT IN DEMPSEY TRIAL COMBAT

Past History Aired by Government in Trial Fight. Wife Testifies.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—United States District Judge Doolin ruled today that Mrs. Maxine Dempsey might testify to non-confidential relations in the trial of her divorced husband, William Harrison (Jack) Dempsey, world heavyweight champion, on a charge of espionage of the draft.

The defense was overruled when it objected to a question as to what Dempsey contributed to Mrs. Dempsey's support from July to November, 1917, during which period they were separated, according to her testimony. She testified to having received a total of \$40.

Figures Reveal Astonishing Recovery By Belgium of Wrecked Industries; Country Fast Approaching Normal

By FRANCIS H. SIBSON. Vice President of the Guaranty Trust Company, New York. Belgium as we predicted a few months ago is rapidly returning to normal. There is perhaps no phase of the Belgian economic situation today more hopeful than the swift recovery of Belgian industries, which for five years were in the hands of the Germans who were bent on their destruction. Reports of progress during the early months of 1920 are even more astonishing than the figures for 1919.

Take particularly certain metallurgical industries. These plants were systematically wrecked or derelict from improper operation, and Germany. Here are a few striking figures showing the percentage of restoration to normal pre-war production in these lines: Locomotives and steam engines, 100 per cent; rolling stock and railway material, 80 per cent; boiler making and repair, 75 per cent; foundries, 60 per cent; bolt making, wire drawing and nail-manufacturing, 30 per cent; manufacturing of bicycles and automobiles, 55 per cent; machine tools, 30 per cent; general mechanical production, 70 per cent; electrical equipment, 100 per cent; iron bars, 102 per cent; cast-iron, 62 per cent; steel, 40 per cent.

The extent of industrial recovery is indicated also by the number of people employed. In a group of enterprises representing mining, metal and quarries, 261,548 workmen were employed in December, 1919, as compared with 230,538 in December, 1918. A list of 2,693 other enterprises shows that 239,712 workmen were employed in December, 1919, as compared with 412,462 in December, 1918. It is estimated that 76 per cent of the better workers were employed in December, 1919, as in December, 1918.

Belgian glass industry is well known throughout the world for its brilliancy and high quality. Of the eight large plate glass factories, seven were in operation again in November, 1919. All of the window-glass factories are in full or partial operation. In value the production is much above normal, as wholesale prices are five or six times pre-war quotations. In the manufacture of goblets and fine glassware 23 out of about 30 factories have resumed operations. The manufacturers of plate and window glass have more orders than they can fill and demand both at home and abroad being very heavy.

barley, oats, rye, potatoes, sugar beet, etc. During the war, on account of the scarcity of food, the soil of Belgium was cultivated to the utmost. There was not a piece of tillable land that was not utilized. But the military operations, especially on the Ypres and Yser fronts, and the flooding of that part of the country, rendered large districts unutilizable. Some of these lands have already been restored to use. Belgian horticulture which enjoys a well-earned reputation did not suffer from the effects of the war, and is carried on as usual. Belgium continues to export its beautiful hot-house grapes.

Foreign Trade. The present condition of foreign trade is most encouraging. The increase in the number and tonnage of ships entering the Port of Antwerp in 1919, as compared with 1918, is a striking example of the recovery of the country. In 1919, the tonnage was 1,146,819 tons, in 1918, 5,309,876; the number of ships in December was 459, with aggregate tonnage of 636,348 as compared with 95 ships and 144,333 tons in January, 1919, and 613 and 835,257 in March.

Before the war Belgium ranked fifth among the nations as a market for normal business activity. Today, she still ranks fifth, being surpassed only by the United Kingdom, France, Canada and Italy. During the war, Belgium's exports to the United States amounted to \$11,045,582. For the calendar year 1919, these exports were \$7,700,100, but this period included the early months of the year when Belgium's exports amounted to \$12,000,000. Since February, 1919, Belgium's exports to the United States have increased rapidly and steadily.
