MONTREAL. June 17.-President Samuel Gompers took the floor at the American Federation of Labor con-

American Federation of Labor convention here today to warn against endorsement of government ownership and operation of railroads.

Gompers cited acts of Presidents Cleveland, Roosevelt and Taft to show that government employes are prohibited from exercising many political industrial rights.

"All railroad workers will become government employes," said Gompers, "if this convention endorses government ownership and government operation of the railroads and if the government is persuaded to follow the endorsement of this convention."

"No man is more loyal to the United States than I, and yet I would not give it more power over the citizen ship of America than it now has."


Gompers took the floor only after it seemed certain the convention was willing to put the American Federation of Labor on record for government ownership and operation of the railroads provided in the Plumb plan.

Probably few interest in the State, if any, have suffered more from the "closed shop," as the effects of that principle are being exemplified by the longshoremen. Whatever the progress of the "open shop" movement, the most effective propagands in favor of it is being supplied by the advocates and practioners of the "closed shop." This is hardly a paradox, for it must be obvious to all, save pur-blind labor leaders, that it is the tyranny of organized labor, its ruthless disregard of all interest but its own, that is driving men into expousing the "open shop" cause. The "open shop" may afford no asylum for the victims of the "closed shop" but they think it does, and it is that belief which makes it attractive to them. The "open shop" movement is solely a defensive movement, and is in no sense an offensive movement against organized labor. hTe future of the "open shop" movement lies largely even chiefly, in the wit and will of those who preach the "closed shop." They can arrest it, and perhaps even end it, by conforming the policies and practices of organized labor to a just sense of the rights of others. By continuing to be despotic and by continuing to make men had interests against whom they have no grievances the chief victims of their strikes, they will not only promote the "open shop" movement, but make it irresistible. The tyranny of organized labor has come to be one of the heaviest energies of this country, and one of the most formidable obstacles to our social progress, and those consequences must eventually destroy it."—Editorial Dallas News.

College, College Station.
