Deposits at Friona State Bank set another record at the June 30 mid-year point, it was disclosed this week.

Bank deposits stood at \$8,526,897,96 at the close of business on June 30. At the same time a year ago, a new all-time high had been established for the date with deposits of \$7,818,933,51,

This year's total beats the former record by nine per cent, or \$707,964,45.

Other figures showed loans standing at \$7,218,308,65 as compared to \$5,450,981.62 and total assets at \$9,-223,131.43, compared to \$8,553,148.62.

The deposit totals are up by more than \$2 million over the similar date two years earlier.







20 YEARS AGO-JULY 8, 1949


