COX AND ROOSEVELT LAMBAST HARDING

GERMANS REFUSAL COAL DEMANDS TO CAUSE OCCUPATION

MARSHALLS FOCH AND WILSON SUMMONED CONFERENCE DISCUSS OCCUPATION.

ALLIES WILL PROBABLY BACK POLES IN FIGHT

Should the Russians Refuse An Armistice, Allies Plan Supply Unlimited War Material.

SPA, BELGIUM, July 14.—With summoning of Marshall Foch and Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, allied occupation of German territory and other measures to enforce the Versailles treaty seemed inevitable today.

Germany's flat refusal to meet the allied demand for 2,000,000 tons of coal monthly resulted in suspension of the conference and calling of the allied military leaders. Plans have already been completed for action against Germany and unless some solution of the situation is reached today the French army on the Rhine will be ordered to proceed into Germany.

Although the German foreign minister, Herr Simons, declared Germany was without military means to resist an allied invasion, members of the Belgian delegation said today that there was likelihood Germany would attempt to prevent occupation of the Ruhr by force.

Herr Simons insisted that the limit of coal Germany could deliver to the allies was 1,100,000 tons monthly to be increased to 1,700,000 tons in October, 1921. When Simons had delivered this statement, M. De La Croix, presiding, declared this was not acceptable and adjourned the session sine die.

Occupation of the Ruhr would have little effect, as Germany would lose this district even if the delegation promised deliveries of coal as demanded by the allies. Simons said German experts had been informed miners would refuse to work the necessary hours for producing coal as demanded by the allies. Simons proposed to the allies that Germany deliver 50,000 tons of coal daily after October 1, 1920, and 65,000 tons daily from October, 1921. He emphasized these deliveries could only be made if Germany were permitted to operate the mines of upper Silesia, now in the hands of Poland.

In event the Allies decide to invade Germany to enforce the peace treaty, Belgium and France will form the nucleus. Volunteers will be recruited from all countries. No other nation will be asked for regular troops. Meantime, the Allies will face a difficult situation in regard to Poland. It was learned that should the Moscow government decide not to accept the allied offer of an armistice, the allies will furnish military supplies and war munition to all anti-bolshevik forces. At the time a rapid economic blockade would be inaugurated against Russia. It was admitted that British troops would be sent to Poland. Russia but all nationalities would be encouraged to join the anti-bolshevik movements.

It was understood Japan would be given carte blanche in Siberia. Allies would aid Ukraine in event they intervened in Russia.

Secret Sessions. Several secret sessions were held between the allied delegates and Polish representatives today. No action has been taken on the resolutions question, pending disposition of the coal problem. A member of the British delegation said there was little likelihood of the conference reaching the question here and adding another difficult situation would probably be held at London shortly.

Although reports reached here stating the Bolsheviks had accepted the allied armistice proposal, confirmation was obtainable from the British delegation. It was believed if Lloyd George had received the acceptance of the Moscow government he would find no time in making it public, owing to its certain effect on negotiations with the Germans and the quieting effect it would have on the Polish front. Marshall Foch and General Petain arrived here early today. Field Marshal Wilson was expected momentarily. These military officials will confer with the allied delegates and present plans for military action on the Ruhr.

BOLIVIAN PEOPLE OPPRESSED BY GUERRA REGIME; LOSS OF SEAPORT DAMAGED PRESIDENT

BUENOS AIRES, July 14.—Overthrow of the Bolivian government by the republicans was a popular movement constituting the protest of the people of Bolivia against the anti-democratic policies and practices of President Gutierrez Guera, and his supporters, Jose Maria Escalier, leader of the allied delegates, and probably next president of that country, declared in an interview with the United Press today.

Gutierrez Guera has long prevented real freedom asserting itself in Bolivia. Escalier said. "He substituted the worst kind of oppression. In addition to this the government's recent defeat in an attempt to get a seaport for Bolivia greatly damaged Bolivia's national prestige at home and abroad. The people wanted their incompetent government taken out of office and they adopted direct action

COTTON REPORT IN JUNE SHOWS GAIN FOR CONSUMPTION

ACTIVE SPINDLES SHOWS AN INCREASE OF 539,748 IN COTTON STATES.

GAIN OF 2 PER CENT OVER JUNE OF LAST YEAR

Increased Consumption in Cotton States As Well As Non-Productive Ones.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Cotton consumed in the cotton growing states was 56.4 per cent of the country's total consumption during June, compared with 54.4 per cent a year ago, the census bureau's monthly report today disclosed. There was increased consumption both in the cotton growing states and the rest of the country compared with a year ago, but the increase in the southern states was double that of the remainder of the country.

Active cotton spindles during June showed an increase of 539,748, of which 539,748 were in cotton growing states. Cotton consumed during June amounted to 555,521 bales of lint and 23,260 of linters, the census bureau announced today.

During June a year ago, 474,330 bales of lint and 15,083 of linters were consumed.

Cotton On Hand. Cotton on hand June 30 in consuming establishments was 1,544,323 bales compared with 1,714,171 bales in June, 1919, and 1,363,049 bales of lint and 263,804 of linters a year ago; and in public storage and at compresses 2,394,439 bales of lint and 274,645 of linters compared with 2,745,771 of lint and 207,781 of linters a year ago.

June imports were 19,435 bales, compared with 17,229 in June, 1919, and exports were 241,450 bales, including 2,350 bales of linters, compared with 99,169 of lint and 3,710 of linters in June last year.

Cotton spindles active during June numbered 34,502,757, compared with 23,993,558 in June a year ago.

June statistics for cotton growing states are, consumed 213,474 bales, compared with 228,820 in June last year.

On hand June 30 in cotton consuming establishments 757,260 compared with 639,918 and in public storage and at compresses 1,635,169 compared with 1,511,356.

Cotton spindles active during June numbered 15,083,044, compared with 15,441,206 in June a year ago.

CAPT. L. FLATEAU, PIONEER TEXAN DIES IN ST. LOUIS

DALLAS, July 14.—Captain Louis Flateau, pioneer Texan and Confederate veteran, died this morning in a hospital after a long illness. It was learned through a message received by a daughter here. Captain Flateau was 73 years old and was born in San Augustin, Texas.

He served in the artillery of the Confederate army, and had devoted most of his life to inventions, at one time ranking third as a inventor of patents registered in the United States patent office.

In his youth Captain Flateau was a pilot and steamboat captain operating craft on the Red, Mississippi and Trinity rivers. He was recently elected president of the Mississippi Pilots Association, with headquarters at St. Louis.

GEN. WOLTERS CONFERRED WITH GOV. HOBBY TODAY

AUSTIN, July 14.—Brigadier General J. F. Wolters, in command of the state troops at Galveston, reached here today and had an important conference with Governor Hobby on the strike situation. The conference was also attended by Attorney General C. M. Curston and Adjutant General Cope. The nature of the conference was not disclosed, but it was declared that there was nothing to make public on the subject. It is learned unofficially that the conference does not indicate the probable withdrawal of the troops.

FIRE FIGHTERS WALK OUT IN MEMPHIS

MEMPHIS, TENN., July 14.—Despite efforts of several civic organizations to adjust the situation, it was stated today that no agreement was in sight which would avert the threatened walkout of city firemen here tomorrow and plans were under way to organize a volunteer fire fighting force to meet this emergency created by the wholesale resignations of members of the Memphis fire department when their demands for increased wages were not granted.

Demands for an advance in wages, because of increased living costs, were presented and the resignation filed by a committee representing the fire fighters union, but were not granted because of a provision of the city charter fixing salaries of the men which according to an opinion by the city attorney, precluded any change in wages. Yesterday the demands again were presented and the resignation filed to become effective at noon tomorrow.

It was stated that about 270 of the 300 men employed by the department will quit.

J. Edgar, fire and police commissioner, stated today that if the men carried out their plan, none will be re-employed.

FUSION PLATFORM SCORES GOVERNMENT

CHICAGO, July 14.—A majority report of the platform committee of the fusion party was finally prepared today. It represented chiefly the labor party opinion and members of the committee of 48 stood ready after presentation to serve police that Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, generally proposed as the fusion nominee, would not run for president.

The preamble and two planks of the majority report were given out. The preamble declared that in the United States "the power of government has been stolen from the people," classed the peace conference as "a greedy spectacle," said the "masters of our government league themselves with the money masters of other nations to prevent self-determination by helpless peoples"; declared that effort is now being made in the United States "to stifle discussion and strip rights and liberties from Americans."

"Election of federal judges and establishments of the initiative referendum under the treaty of Versailles," and offers of recognition to "selected governments in Russia and Ireland," with "refusal to go to war with Mexico at the behest of Wall street."

WANDERER UNMOVED BY RELATIVES VISIT

Spent \$60 On Julia Schmidt and Admits He is a Big Sucker.

CHICAGO, July 14.—Carl Wanderer was transferred today from Hudson avenue detention home to the county jail where he was placed in "murderer's row." He is the strangest and the calmest inmate in the history of that row, police said.

It was expected that during the day the two murder indictments against Wanderer, voted Monday by a grand jury, would be returned before Chief Justice Crowe of the criminal court. They were delayed to permit the public to question Wanderer further.

The state's attorney will ask Judge Crowe to assign the case for trial as soon as possible and ask for the death penalty, it was said.

The prisoner spent the greater part of the day looking over half a dozen prayer books and Bibles, which were brought to him by his father and his sisters, Laura, his twin, and Mrs. Edward Roth, whom he saw for the first time since he was placed under arrest.

His kinkief wept when they were led into his presence. He was the only one unwept.

"Much obliged for the books," said Wanderer, "and don't take this so hard. I'm real sorry about it, of course, but a man's got to take his medicine." The former army lieutenant, who slew his wife and a hired man whom he had engaged to be on hand so he could be killed and be branded as a highwayman, said that death by hanging cannot come too soon. He said he has but two regrets, one that he killed two persons; the other that he spent too much money on Julia Schmidt, the 17-year-old girl who caught his fancy some time before he fired his wife.

"I must have blown in all of \$600 in taxi for less than twenty years' ride," he said. "Wasn't it the big sucker?"

CLEVELAND, O., July 14.—Coal consumers of the United States will have no real worries until about the year 1926, according to state and government inspectors attending the eleventh annual convention of the Mine Inspector Institute of America here today.

Hard coal will give out in 150 or 200 years, but the soft coal supply will be inexhaustible, J. W. Paul, chief mining engineer of the United States bureau of mines, said. The inspectors foresee evidence of enough soft coal to run the country six thousand years.

FRENCH PRESIDENT STILL INDISPOSED

PARIS, July 14.—Failure of President Paul Deschanel to resume his executive duties today, as had been promised by his political supporters, gave rise to a new crop of rumors regarding his physical and mental condition.

Friends of the president insisted he would be able to officiate at ceremonies in celebration of Bastille. The best available reports said his condition was only slightly improved.

Conflicting reports of Deschanel's condition were heard and in political circles it was declared measures would be taken to name a vice president to take the president's office in case like that existing.

Newspapers opposed to Deschanel flatly declared the accident suffered by Deschanel had been the result of mental derangement rather than the cause of such affliction, as has been intimated in some quarters. On the other hand, a delegation of political leaders visited the country house where Deschanel is convalescing and reported him mentally sound but in a state of physical exhaustion.

All newspapers carry editorials discussing the president's condition, some declaring his illness is no wise serious and that he is showing rapid improvement. Other newspapers argue with equal warmth that there is no hope for his recovery in the near future.

CHICAGO BOY KILLS SELF BECAUSE HE COULDN'T SEE SWEETHEART, SAYS FRIENDS

CHICAGO, July 14.—Friends of William Farwig, 16, Muskegon, Mich., believe today that the boy ended his life because he couldn't see his sweetheart.

Police dragged a logoon in Washington park for the body when the boy's landlady said he had threatened to end his life there. The boy's father said he brought the boy here to cure his infatuation for a Muskegon girl. On July 4 they went home. The boy was found on returning to Chicago, he said.

LA FOLLETTE WILL NOT BE CANDIDATE ON FUSION TICKET

FORTY-EIGHTERS UNABLE TO GRASP RADICAL VIEWS OF LABOR FACTION.

SINGLE TAXERS WITHDRAW AND NAME OWN TICKET

Reis Says Single Taxers Were Unable To Obtain Platform and Candidate Suitable to Party.

CHICAGO, July 14.—Senator LaFollette does not deem himself "available as a candidate" for the new party presidential nomination. He sent word to the convention that he did not want the nomination.

Immediately after Chairman Walker had announced LaFollette's decision not to accept a nomination, Lester Harlow, leader of the world war veterans entered the fight and demanded that LaFollette accept despite his wishes.

He charged that the convention was "grossly ridden by a secret intriguing clique," and that its leaders were concealing LaFollette's platform for fear the convention would adopt it. His passionate appeal started an uproar and delegates demanded the platform be read.

Little progress was made by the new fusion party during the first two hours of its convention today and an hour's adjournment was called. The platform was not ready for presentation and the convention was kept occupied with minor details of business.

The committee of 45, at an early morning caucus decided to continue its state and national organization regardless of the action of the present convention and to meet separately tonight to consider the convention action.

Senator LaFollette was still being represented in platform conferences. But there were few indications of what decisions were being made.

At 11:45 a. m. the platform conference ordered the typing of a third version of a fusion party platform and sent word to the convention that it would report at 1 p. m. The convention adjourned until that time.

This latest platform attempt was made by the fusion party and a group to meet Senator LaFollette's ideas in its planks on foreign relations and naturalization. The fact could not be absolutely confirmed because it was not reported in the press.

CHICAGO, July 14.—John R. Rathom, publisher of the Providence, R. I., Journal, will be an important witness for Mrs. Mary C. Melvin, who with the aid of Gaston Means, is fighting to prove the guilty of the murder of the late James C. King, whose estate, now valued at \$5,000,000, will become Mrs. Melvin's property if the will is held genuine, contrary to the contention of the late King's estate.

They petitioned Circuit Judge Baldwin to permit Mr. Rathom to make a deposition that Means showed him the contents of the will in October, or November, 1915. Judge Baldwin consented.

It is the contention of the Northern Trust Company, trustee of the estate, that Means, before he showed the will to any one, made a prolonged and thorough investigation of King's life and of his friends, companions and business associates. He made this investigation from 1915 to 1917, the company asserts, and it was not until 1917 that he produced the will.

He did not make an investigation before he showed any one of the will. Mrs. Melvin's attorneys declared. "He showed the will to Rathom in 1915. Rathom then found it. He asked Mr. Rathom to investigate the will in the studio of the Providence Journal, because he wanted to send photographs to various typewriter manufacturers so that he could determine what typewriter was used in writing the will."

HARDING'S "FRONT PORCH LISTENING POST," COX SAYS

FRONT PORCH, LIKE LODGE, PENROSE AND SMOOT OLIGARCHY, REMOVED FROM PEOPLE.

HARDING'S PERSPECTIVE IS FROM ISOLATED VIEWPOINT

Campaign to be Dedicated in Bringing Peace With Honor and Adjustment Of Affairs.

COLUMBIA, O., July 14.—Charging that Senator Harding, the republican presidential nominee, had made his "front porch listening post" Governor Cox, the democratic nominee, today issued a statement replying to Secretary Harding's statement of yesterday that the Wilson administration had added the League of Nations upon him as the chief campaign issue.

Governor Cox's statement said his campaign will be dedicated to a task of "bringing peace with honor," of readjusting the affairs of civilization and of creating a new day out of which he will make the best of the lessons of the past."

The governor declared the things Senator Harding believes vital and pertinent "from his isolated perspective will not, in all probability, be so regarded."

The governor's statement, given to the newspaper correspondents at the morning conference, follows: "I recognize the eagerness of the governing class of the press who are assigned here to develop a copy daily. I have no disposition to discourage that enterprise, but at the very outset it is well that we have an understanding of a very fundamental phase of the present situation."

Listening Post. "Senator Harding has made two definite announcements, that he purposes to bring to the fore of 30 years ago, and that he will make of his front porch a listening post. This means that he will be as far removed from the running of the government as thought as he would be removed from the heart beats of the American people for a year or more."

"My conviction will be dedicated to the task of bringing peace with honor, of readjusting the affairs of civilization and of creating a new day out of which we will make the best lessons of the past. Therefore, this front porch listening post will be a listening post. His last statement was regarded as the statement of what has been said in the senate time after time, so that if this campaign on the one hand develops into mere Democratic propaganda, the senate, you will very readily perceive the uselessness of daily repetition."

Roosevelt Flays Harding. HYDE PARK, N. Y., July 14.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, replying at his home here today to the charge of Senator Harding that President Wilson had forced the Democratic nominee to accept his views that the League of Nations should become the dominant campaign issue, declared he was "quite willing, as I know Governor Cox is, to let the American people decide whether they will go back to the conditions of 1914 or whether they will join with civilization and humanity in this great step forward."

The attempt of Senator Harding yesterday, he said, "to befo the true League of Nations issue by dragging in the name of President Wilson is merely further evidence of the historical fact that a certain type of senatorial mind, cares more about squaring an account with the past than about the welfare of the nation. It is, of course, well known that seven-eighths of the opposition of this senator is not to the League of Nations, but to the person of the President of the United States himself."

History will take care of the great part of Woodrow Wilson's record. But the Democratic party enters the campaign with the clear cut purpose of proving that the war has not been fought in vain. Senator Harding says: "The League of Nations is merely a treaty and the League will be ratified."

"He is right. No one, probably not even Senator Harding himself, knows what would happen should the Republic be rejected."

VILLA'S MANIFESTO REJECTED BY HUERTIA REGIME; BANDIT PLANS NEW REIGN OF TERROR

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., July 14.—The Huerta government in Mexico has refused to meet the terms of the manifesto issued by Francisco Villa that unless the constitution of 1857 is restored and the 1917 constitution abolished, Huerta will start a new reign of terror tomorrow. It was reported here this morning. Other demands made by the bandit are the immediate resignation of P. Elias Calles as minister of the north in charge of all operations in Chihuahua.

The perpetual revolutionist demanded that these terms be met before July 15 or he would upon a reign of terror that will be worse than any before. The Huerta government is said to be holding out for Villa's unconditional surrender and will not accede to the manifesto.

GERMAN HANGMEN STRIKE FOR HIGHER WAGES

LONDON, July 14.—The hangmen of Germany have gone on strike for increased wages, says a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph today, quoting Berlin newspapers.

At Meiningen, according to the dispatch, the execution of a murderer could not be carried out, as the Halle and Meiningen hangmen refused to work.

WOMEN TO SERVE ON JURIES IN ENGLAND, REPORTS STATE

LONDON, July 14.—In accordance with an act of parliament already passed, the lord chancellor announced today that after July 15, women are liable to serve on juries under the same conditions as men. Husband and wife will not be permitted to serve on the same occasion, however.

lians win. One branch of his supporters, such as Senator Miram Johnson, assures the nation that a Republican victory means no League of Nations. Another branch led by such men as former President Taft, assures the nation that a Republican victory means the acceptance of the League with certain undefined reservations.

Imaginary Ghosts.

"The rest of Senator Harding's statement is the usual vague summoning forth of bogies and imaginary ghosts or horrible pictures of American soldier boys waging war in Poland, Russia and Turkey; and at the end he talks in glittering terms about the charge of a surrender of the republic."

"I yield nothing in my devotion to the United States to Senator Harding, or to any of his followers. Rather I believe they are the ones who fail to visualize the great future and independent future of this nation."

"One of the prominent issues is thus becoming early and clearly drawn. A Democratic victory means ratification of the treaty and the League of Nations, which as the world knows, is already signed and clearly drawn. A Republican victory means that the United States with Russia, Mexico and Turkey shall remain outside. The election of Cox means that in case there is a war, the United States in participation with the other civilized nations of the world, will through the League of Nations, solve international difficulties and prevent a recurrence of the holocaust of 1914-1918."

dent differences had developed between individuals influential in the former 41 organization.

CHICAGO, July 14.—Hope for the survival of the new fusion party was at ebb tide as the all night conference of the new body's resolutions committee dragged along today in an effort to get together on a platform acceptable to Senator LaFollette.

The extreme left, which yesterday controlled the amalgamation and forced its platform desires on the more conservative elements in the convention, struck a snag when it met the veto power of the probable presidential nominee of the new party, forty-eighters who constitute the right wing of the fusion, are bitterly opposed to the more socialistic ideas of the radical labor faction. In this stand, they have the support not only of LaFollette, but of several minority organizations subscribing to the political combination.

The first evidence of a possible breaking up of the new party movement appeared last night's session when the single taxers withdrew, adopted their one plank platform and nominated presidential candidates.

For president, they chose Robert C. McAuley of Philadelphia and for vice-president they selected R. C. Barsum of Cleveland. They quit the new party, Jerome C. Reis, a single tax leader, said, because it was not only apparent they could not obtain their platform desires and a candidate committed to them, but also because they "could not stand the socialistic ideas" of the dominant labor group.

NAVAL OFFICE IS ESTABLISHED HERE

Announcement was made yesterday of the establishment of a permanent naval recruiting station in the White building, 719 1/2 Indiana street, with J. M. Joehrendt, machinist's mate first class in charge of the office. The Wichita Falls office is a subsidiary branch of the state office in Dallas.

Joehrendt is an "old timer" in the naval service, having served several "hitches." He has also been around the world several times, and has seen service on many of Uncle Sam's large battleships and destroyers.

In speaking of the opportunities offered by the navy, Joehrendt stated, more and better opportunities for advancement were offered at this time than ever in the history of the service.

"The fighting sea forces of the country are short about 46,000 men," he said, "and the recruiting officers are making wonderful opportunities to young men over the entire country to enlist for a period of two, three and four years."

"There are 55 various lines of work a man may pursue in the service," he continued, "even though a man enlists without any previous experience in the branch he is accepted in, the government will train him, and after an enlistment will turn back into civil life a highly trained man, capable of securing lucrative employment."

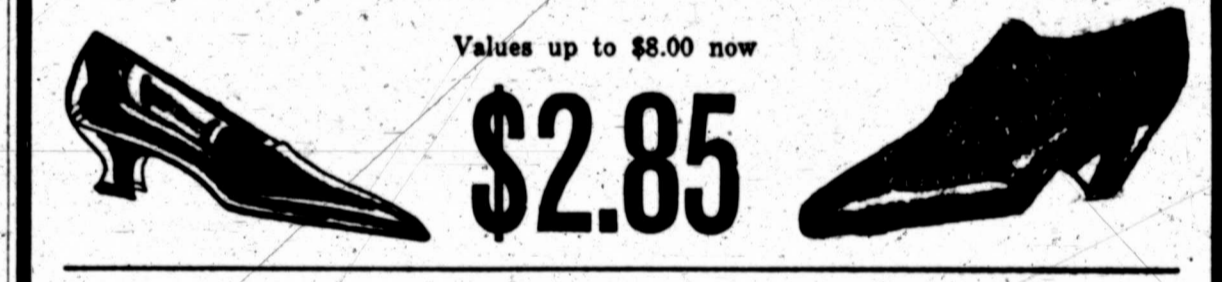

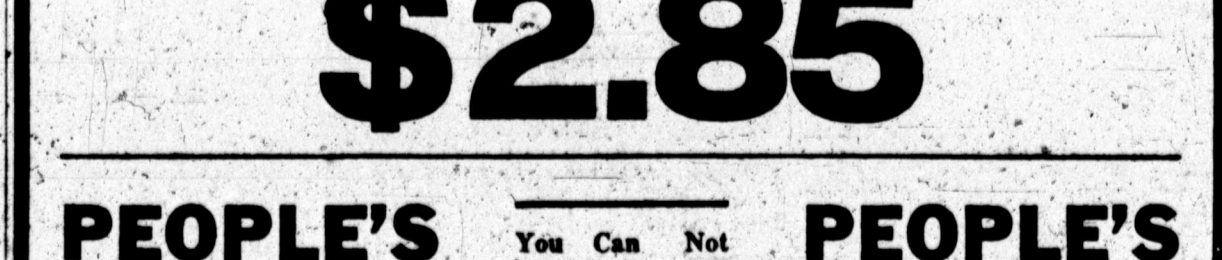

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LEAGUE OF NATIONS IS LEADING ISSUE

By RAYMOND CLAPPER
United Press Staff Correspondent.

MARION, O., July 14.—Warren G. Harding has opened his defensive and eagerly accepted the democratic challenge to a finish fight over the League of Nations.

His statements welcoming a "national referendum" on the league issue was viewed as his most emphatic utterance thus far and also as a skillful attempt to split the democratic party in this question. His purpose, it was believed here, was to "smoke out" Governor Cox on the league issue and force the democratic standard bearer either to line up solidly with President Wilson on the league question or come out for strong reservations or break with the White House on the leading issue of the campaign.

Either course it was believed in the Harding camp, will drive a wedge between the administrative forces and those democratic leaders who opposed President Wilson's course in the treaty fight.

When word reached the republican nominee that Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic vice presidential candidate, had declared the League of Nations should be the leading issue, he suspended work on his acceptance speech and issued a prompt acceptance of the challenge.

Harding's statement showed a fighting spirit which put enthusiasm into his advisers here.

His scathing references to the entanglements which he believes would result from America's participation in the league are expected to draw the fire of administration supporters and indications are for a hot pitched battle before the campaign has gone far.

His statement today was taken by some to foreshadow a firm anti-league stand by Harding in his speech of acceptance. He frankly declared that America would be involved in the score or more wars now raging in Europe should we join the league and he drew the inference that America would be called on to supply its army and navy to help settle them.

DOC DISCOVERS PAINLESS GALLSTONE REMEDY

CHICAGO, July 14.—A painless method of treating diseases of the gall bladder, which, it was claimed, would eliminate surgical operations in more than 50 per cent of such cases, has been perfected by Dr. Frank Smithies, associate professor of medicine in the University of Illinois. It is announced at the Augustana hospital clinic, where Dr. Smithies demonstrated his method.

Dr. Smithies' device consists mainly of a small, egg-shaped perforated ball, about one-quarter of an inch in diameter and one-half inch long, and 30 inches of rubber tubing about the size of a lead pencil. The ball is easily swallowed by patients, and the contents of the gall bladders are painlessly drawn through the tube with a suction syringe.

SMALLPOX EPIDEMIC REPORTED IN PENNSYLVANIA

CONNELLSVILLE, July 14.—With an outbreak of smallpox here yesterday the authorities were called upon to face a perplexing problem. The municipal hospital, located a half mile from the city limits, has been stoned and when the authorities arrived on the spot all that remained of the building was a few boards. The victims are being quarantined in tents.

TWO INJURED TUESDAY NIGHT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

An automobile accident in which two persons sustained injuries, one of whose may prove serious, occurred near the Big Wichita river bridge south of town at 4:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. According to the stories given the police, a car driven by M. H. Pope, 237 W. Thirteenth street, was being driven rapidly along the driveway near the bridge and following this machine was a service car driven by William Rivers, 1900 Indiana street. Pope is said to have slowed down and turned sharply, bringing his car directly into the path of the one behind him. The two collided and the car driven by Rivers was overturned, pinning the occupants underneath. Ed Willburn, of Austin, Texas, received a badly sprained back, a lacerated hand and attending physician stated that he had possibly sustained internal injuries. F. J. Kerr, a Durkburnett oil man, was also riding in the machine but escaped with nothing worse than a bruised foot. Rivers was not hurt.

Pope was charged with reckless driving and gave bond in the sum of \$25 for appearance for trial.

ST. LOUIS GIRL RESCUED FROM HAVANA KIDNAPERS

HAVANA, July 14.—Jesse Costello, 19-year-old daughter of John Costello of St. Louis, said to have been missing from her home since April 25, was rescued tonight by detectives who raided a house in the Jesus Del Monte suburb of Havana and arrested a cypriot woman named Milano Marina, and her son and daughter, George and Anna.

The raid was made at the solicitation of the girl's father, who the police say, has been on the trail of the child's alleged abductors for more than a month. Besides abduction of the child, Costello charges the cypriots with having given him \$1,750 in money which, according to the authorities was found in the raided house.

GODDARD GOES BEAUMONT TO FIGHT HEBONIC PLAGUE

AUSTIN, TEX., July 14.—C. W. Goddard, state health officer, left today for Beaumont to confer with Dr. J. F. W. White, past assistant surgeon of the United States public health service, in the making of definite arrangements to extend the hebonic plague survey now nearing completion in Beaumont and Jefferson, to other sections of the Texas coast quarantine area.

Two members of the committee who yesterday visited the town of Florin, a Japanese settlement nearby, reported at the hearing last night they found but two Japanese children on the street. The visit was unannounced.

John Reese, the only American merchant in the town, told the committee-men that the word had been passed among the Japanese to keep the children out of sight while the committee was in this part of the state. The two visitors were Congressman King Swope of Kentucky and J. Will Taylor of Tennessee.

TWO NEW YORK BANKS PLAN MAKE BIG MERGER

NEW YORK, July 14.—Reports of a pending merger of the Bankers' Trust company and the Liberty National bank with capital stock aggregating \$10,000,000, were circulated in Wall Street today. Dominant stockholders of the two institutions, it was said, virtually have agreed on the terms of consolidation.

The total resources of the two institutions, according to a statement on June 30, are \$618,094,711 and an institution resulting from such a merger would be exceeded in point of resources only by the National City bank and the Guaranty Trust company.

PARIS, July 14.—All France was in holiday garb today in celebration of the "French Fourth of July." Bastille day, the anniversary of pulling down the Bastille in Paris July 14, 1789. 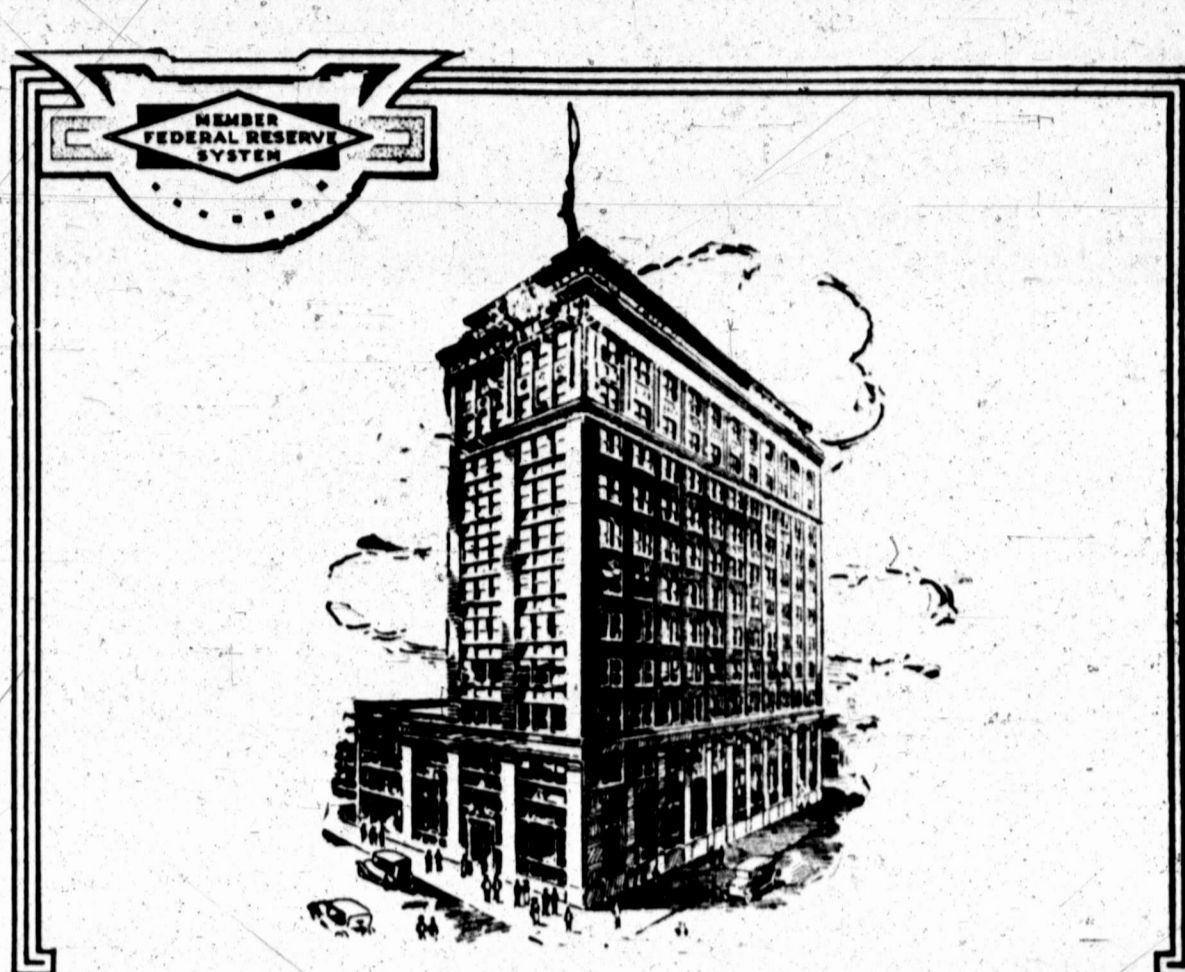

Any citizen of Wichita Falls whose faith in his home town's future may at times weaken slightly can gather a lesson from the announcement today that Haltom & Friedly, jewelers of this city and Fort Worth, are planning to spend \$30,000 to give Wichita Falls one of the most beautiful jewelry stores in the south. The new store will be at Eighth street and Indiana avenue in the space now occupied by the Wichita State bank.

AT AGE OF SIXTY-NINE DR. C. H. HOBBS TAKING A POST-GRADUATE COURSE

Dr. C. H. Hobbs, of Lund, Utah, is a visitor in Wichita Falls—that's merely a social item.

He is the uncle of H. Finley Weldon, judge of the 30th district court—that's something to make Judge Weldon proud.

He is 69 years old, and is preparing to take a post-graduate course at Galveston in the medical department of the state university—that's news.

Although he has been absent from this state for several years, Dr. Hobbs is widely known throughout Texas through his former connection with the state board of education. He was associated with the board for five years in organizing the free schools system of Texas, and was principal of one of the state summer normal schools that were fostered by the Peabody and Slater funds. The last year that he served in that capacity nine of the thirty-one senatorial districts applied to have him appointed as director of teachers in their districts—"the biggest compliment I have ever received," he told a Times representative today.

Dr. Hobbs has had a remarkable record along educational lines. He is an alumnus of Washington and Lee university, of the class of 1874, and is also a graduate of the Southern Baptist Theological seminary. In 1878 he became president of Dallas Male and Female college, which position he resigned three years later to become associated with the state board of education in organizing the free schools.

When his health broke down in 1913, he decided to learn something about the weaknesses of the human body—the result being that a few years later he hung up his stethoscope as a physician, having successfully been graduated

from the Hospital College of Medicine in Louisville, Ky.

For ten years Dr. Hobbs practiced medicine, and then a long siege of double pneumonia sent him to California in search of health. He found it, went to Lund, Utah, became a farmer, and settled on a homestead there.

And now at the age of 69, this teacher, preacher, physician and farmer is going back to school again—because he declares he is "full full of pepper and wants to learn more about the diseases of the eye."

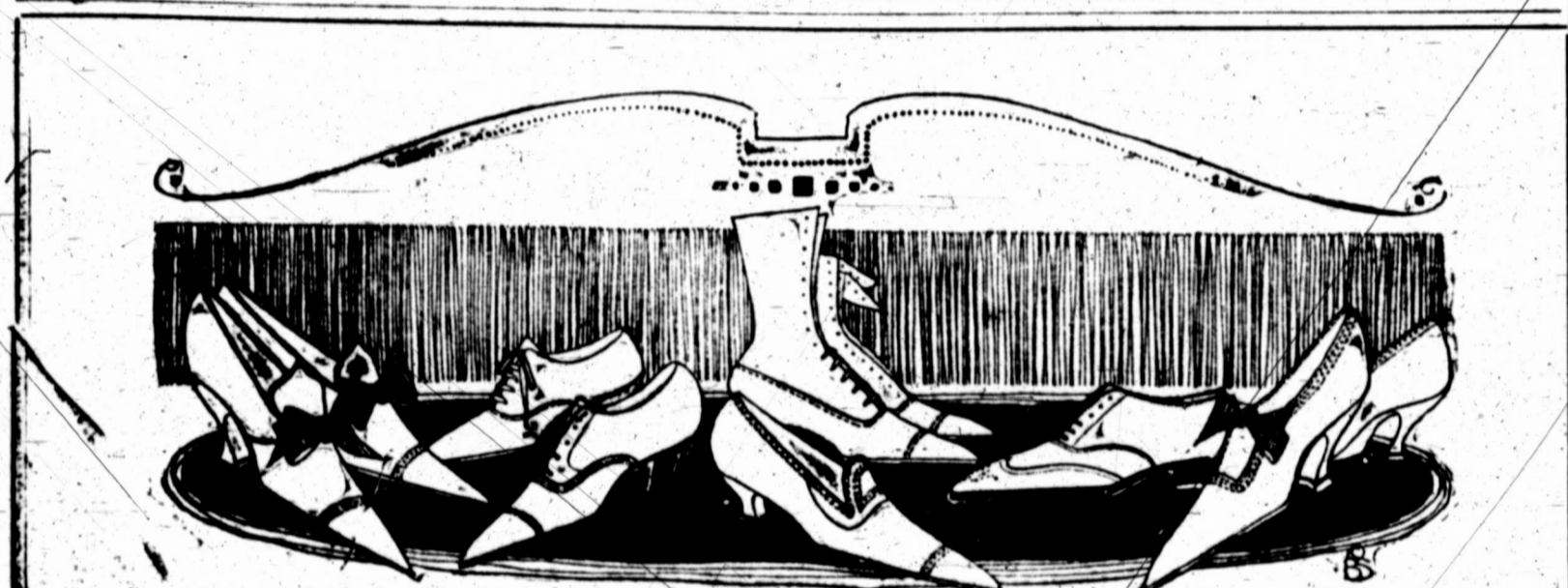

THE COLUMBIA RIVER DISTRICT

By W. C. EDWARDS

SEATTLE, WASH., July 10.—The drive from Portland up the Columbia river is one of the most beautiful scenic trips in America—some who have seen much say in the whole world. The paved roadway extends now for 78 miles and it is to be completed this fall to the Dalles, a distance of 100 miles and forming a part of the national trans-continental highway. For 25 miles from Portland the trip is through fertile farm lands. Then one comes into view of the magnificent Columbia river and the road skirts the river at an elevation of from a few hundred to 1,000 or more feet above the water.

The road had to be made out of the cliffs along the river. It was a difficult engineering feat, but the bulk of the necessary material was adjacent to the survey everywhere, and this explains the fact that the 45 miles of river roadway cost only \$1,350,000, for an asphalt macadam construction of a maximum grade of not over five per cent. The river is constantly in sight except where the trees intercept the view. One cannot find words to express the beauty of the natural scenery as it unfolds. The river and the driveway and the beauty of the canyon are in themselves wonderful enough, but profuse nature has gone further in its contributions and added a series of beautiful waterfalls in plain view of the drive. Multnomah falls are generally deemed the most attractive, with the water falling sheer for hundreds of feet into a pool on the side of the cliff, thence for a second drop to the rushing creek below. It is 420 feet from the top of the fall to the bed of the creek. Horseshoe falls are only little if any less beautiful.

At the summit of the road along the river a handsome stone structure has been built with all conveniences and a tower from which one may look up and down the noble stream for miles and miles. Far below men and horses dragging skids look like pygmies. From the summit house the road descends in a figure eight and then carries on up the river, clinging to the cliff sides here, broadening out there and along tunneling through the solid rock for a safe location.

Portland is a beautiful city, the most attractive in many ways one has seen on this trip. From the fair in 1908 (and the San Francisco fire and earthquake helped it, as it did all the other coast cities), Portland's growth has been most gratifying to its citizens—and one does not find a great bunch of "boosters" in even the liveliest of Texas cities. In 1905 it probably had 124,000. Today it has 255,000 and still is growing. The city has over 400 miles of paved streets—some of the Texas cities can make a showing comparable to that. They have spent \$10,000,000 public money in municipal elevators and wharves, many hundreds of thousands on bridges, a city dry-dock and other improvements. Now they are taking seriously of voting another \$10,000,000 with which to dredge out an island in the middle of the Willamett river and use the soil for "making" ground alongside the river, which is now subject to overflow. These Portland folks not only believe in their city, but they are willing to back their belief with their money.

Oregon Paving Law.
One reason for Portland's having so much paving is the Oregon paving law. In Texas the municipality usually pays one third of the cost—with the result that unless the city has the available money the property owners, no matter how desirous they may be of making the improvement, are helpless. Then the bonded law in Texas prevents the enforced collection of the pro rata of the paving cost except after long time. In Oregon when a majority of the property owners on a street desire to pave, they indicate it by a petition and that's about all there is to it. The city orders the paving done, lets the contract and assesses the entire cost, including street intersections, against the property, the laws providing a way to enforce collection of the cost. Near or home, Oklahoma cities have the benefit of the same kind of law. And the results are obvious.
What Oregon needs—and the Oregonian cheerfully admits it—is more people. It is difficult to believe that with all the stables to big cities it has (Portland is the largest), the entire state has not more than 700,000 people. But speculative land values—they

are in Oregon as they are in older states—have seriously retarded immigration, and there is a lot of talk of a graduated land tax or even a single tax law.

Seattle.
Seattle is the largest city on the north coast. Its business district and waterfront indicate a big volume of business. But in comparison with San Francisco it falls lamentably short in a business way; and in civic attractiveness it is far behind Los Angeles and Portland. It is not fair probably to form a conclusion about a city after only a few hours' stay. But it is certainly dirty and unkempt by other Pacific coast city standards, and its shops and business houses outside the center remind one more of an old eastern city than they do of the bustling, pushing, thriving west. It is the most cosmopolitan city on the coast. Foreign types, even the apparently Americanized, predominate on the streets and in the theaters, and it is different from the other metropolises even in this section of the United States. One does not wonder that I.W.W.'ism has gained a greater hold here than in other coast cities. They have carried socialistic ideas far, and one of them is municipal street car ownership. It is true San Francisco has some municipal lines, but here they are all owned by the city (except some interurbans), and where San Francisco still has five cent fares, the city-owned lines being a real factor to that end, here the fare is 10 cents with the riders able to get four rides for a quarter. As said, however, it is not fair to form a final conclusion about a city too soon. Seattle unquestionably is a great business center that has outstripped both Portland and Tacoma in population. One

wonders if its pre-eminence as a railroad center and its possession of the Alaskan trade are not the only reasons and that all-round attractiveness—which in the end will determine the race for civic supremacy—has been quite forgotten.
This is a country of magnificent distances. Leaving here Saturday, one gets to Denver, Colo., the following Tuesday. It required 20 hours continuous traveling by rail to get here from San Francisco. Seattle is a long, long way from Texas.

ANTWERP CROWD PROTEST AGAINST ACTIONS OF POLICE

What These Words Mean.

Do you realize that the headline, or the three-line item, or the little notice on the back page, are the record of some great moment or some tragedy or some disappointment for someone—and, in a lesser degree, for someone's family?

For instance, on the final day of the republican national convention, when the first vote was taken and Johnson had only 104 votes and was shown to be out of the race, though my heart had been given to another candidate, I still felt a perfect wave of sympathy for Johnson rush over me. I remember the time I was defeated for a class office once, and I imagined my chagrin and disappointment multiplied by a million.

Then, down in one corner, in small type, was a three-line announcement that someone or other had won the tennis championship of New England.

Not a dramatic fact in itself, but think what an event for Mr. Someone-or-other! Think how excited he must have been when he played the last few points that gave him the victory, and how it must seem to him today as if the whole world resounded with his triumph.

IS THE RAINBOW VARI-COLORED?

The effect which we know as the rainbow—a word derived from its shape and the fact that it is seen after a rain—is due to the rays of the sun passing through drops of water or bits of moisture in the air and being separated by these drops into the primary colors of red, orange, yellow, green, blue and violet or indigo. A similar effect, but without the bow-shape, may be obtained by placing a triangular piece of glass or prism before the eyes and looking at it in the sunlight. The glass breaks the light up—forces the various component colors apart, and proves that the yellow appearance which we recognize as sunlight, is, in reality, made of a number of other tones, blended together.

Occasionally, when the sun is quite strong, two rainbows will appear, one within the other. This is caused by the fact that the rays of the sun are reflected by the upper part of the raindrops, as well as by the lower—but the colors of the two rainbows are placed in precisely the reverse position to the primary, or lower one. The transitory rainbows, seen when a watering-cart is sprinkling the street or when a garden hose throws its spray high into the air, are, of course, due to the same cause as the rainbows in the sky.

In these cases, however, the effect is usually of short duration because the moisture remains in the air for only a few moments.

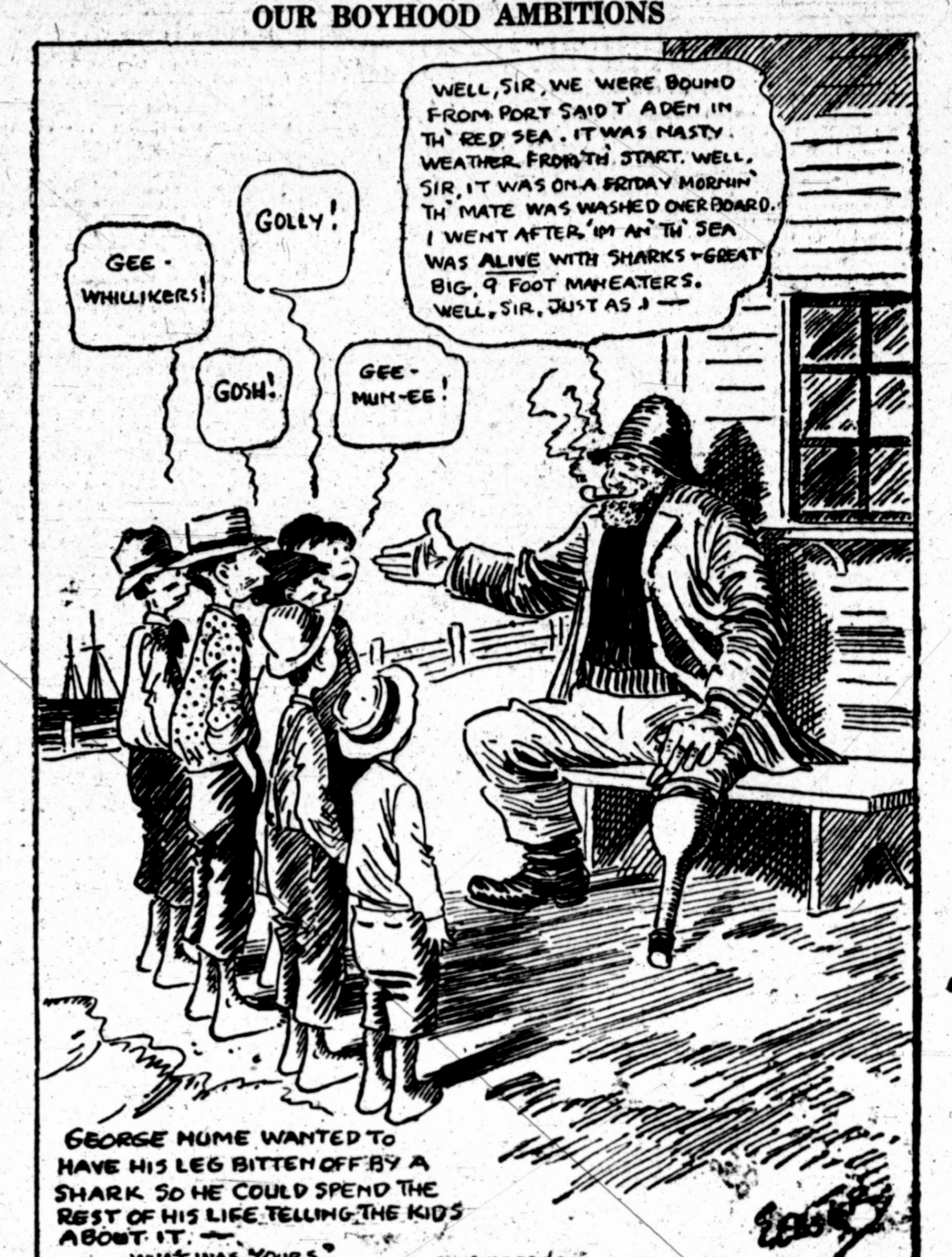

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GEISSLER KILLED MRS. DE CORDOVA

NEW LONDON, CONN., July 14.—Further evidence to strengthen the authorities' contention that Bernard Geissler, chauffeur, killed Mrs. Arthur de Cordova, wife of his employer, and then shot himself, was disclosed today. Authorities learned that Geissler acted strangely before the murder. He was practicing with a revolver, other chauffeurs staying at the summer resort here, said.

Recently Geissler had remarked to a friend, "not to be surprised if you see my name in the headlines in newspapers."

A lock of blonde hair was found in an envelope in Geissler's pocket. On the envelope was written:

"In case of accident or death place this under my pillow."

Mrs. De Cordova's hair was blonde. Geissler had some trouble with his wife and she brought action seeking an allowance pending a suit for separation on grounds of cruelty.

That Geissler and Mrs. De Cordova had made a previous pilgrimage to the spot on the road where the shooting took place Monday night, was stated by several persons today.

Several persons who passed the auto backed into the bushes alongside the road shortly before the shooting, were found by officials. It was learned that the bottle of whiskey, found half emptied in the auto after the murder, was full when the two left the hotel several hours previously.

The dead woman's husband left her with his wife's body last night. He was convinced that Geissler had done the shooting.

Mrs. Geissler was expected here early today to claim her husband's body.

Unrequested Leave.
NEW YORK, July 14.—Infatuation of the chauffeur for a woman who never returned it.

That was the motive for the murder, Mrs. Arthur De Cordova, wife of a wealthy New York broker, and suicide of Bernard Geissler, her chauffeur, according to a statement today by attorneys for the dead woman's husband.

De Cordova returned to New York late last night with the woman's body. Later he held a conference with Mrs. Geissler, the chauffeur's widow. Neither would disclose the subject of the conference.

NEGROES INFURIATED OVER LYNCHING OF ED ROACH

ROXBORO, N. C., July 14.—Rumors that negroes were coming from Reidsville, near here, to "blow up" Roxboro because of the lynching of Ed Roach, negro, by a Person county mob last week, for an alleged attack on a white girl, caused town authorities to place armed guards about Roxboro last night. The night passed quietly and the authorities do not believe there will be any trouble.

BERLIN.—A man supposed to be a robber broke into the home of Field Marshal Hindenburg and fired at him. The bullet went wild and the intruder escaped.

ST. LOUIS.—John W. Stephens of Mart, Tex., who killed his wife here June 24 and shot himself, indicted on a charge of first degree murder.

10,000 PETROLEUM GO ON STRIKE IN MEXICAN FIELDS

MEXICO CITY, July 13.—Ten thousand workers in the petroleum field around Tampico have struck, according to reports received by the department of labor, industry and commerce, and private advices state the number of men idle is nearly twice that figure. The men demand a 75 per cent wage increase.

The strike will affect United States interests more seriously than Mexican, according to interviews with workers printed in the Excelsior.

MEXICO PLANS CHANGE IN TARIFF LAWS

MEXICO CITY, July 13.—Sweeping reforms in the tariffs charged by railways, especially freight rates, are being planned by the secretary of communications and public works, says the Excelsior. Changes in the rates will be made after a conference with all interests involved, the department having adopted methods pursued by the United States interstate commerce commission.

CONFERENCE COTTON GROWERS IN PROGRESS

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Cotton growers representing half a dozen states were here to attend today a conference called by the federal horticultural board to discuss the questions arising out of federal control of cotton planting in the pink boll worm infested areas of Texas and Louisiana.

Both Texas and Louisiana have enacted new laws dealing with eradication of the pest, and it is said the action of these states may have some effect on several contiguous states in putting into effect quarantine measures and establishing non-cotton zones.

The conference, Chairman Mariett of the board announced, is expected to develop an agreement between the cotton states and the government on some uniform plan of enforcing both state and federal restrictions on cotton planting to prevent the spread of the pest.

CLERKS MISFEARON FAILS TO INVALIDATE BILL

AUSTIN, TEX., July 14.—Failure of the enrolling clerk to insert the enacting clause in the senate bill providing for the increase in salary of \$21 per month for deputy county officials, does not invalidate the bill, according to an opinion by Assistant Attorney General C. L. Stone. An exhaustive search of senate and house journals for the recent called session shows that the bill passed both houses in the regular with the enacting clause attached, declares the opinion.

FULKERSON AGAIN BEGINS SERVING PRISON SENTENCE

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., July 14.—M. M. Fulkerson, Alva banker, convicted for embezzlement, today began serving his seven year sentence in the state prison after he had been at liberty almost a week yesterday. He gave up the pardon granted by Acting Governor Waldrep and in a signed statement, declared he did not want his freedom if the granting of the pardon had been illegal, which was the contention of the attorney general.

MEXICAN ARMY TO BE RE-ORGANIZED

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Reorganization of the Mexican army on the Chilean system has been entrusted to a board appointed by President de la Huerta, said dispatches received today by representatives here of the new government. The board has been instructed to submit its report at the earliest possible date.

The dispatch also described the recently reported revolutionary movements of General Oseña in Tamaulipas and of Guajardo in Coahuila, as in no sense constituting a menace to the regime of law and order which the new government has inaugurated.

Denial was made of reports that Gen. Pablo Gonzales had become involved in a revolutionary movement in the north, the assertion being made that General Gonzales was living quietly at his home in Monterey, Nuevo Leon.

WASHINGTON STRUCK BY VIOLENT WINDSTORM

SPOKANE, WASH., July 14.—Violent windstorm, accompanied by a cloudburst, wrecked buildings and did damage to grain which will run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars in southeastern Washington last night.

Pullman, Winona, Wawawai, and a half dozen other towns in Washington reported farm houses unroofed and barns demolished. No loss of life was reported.

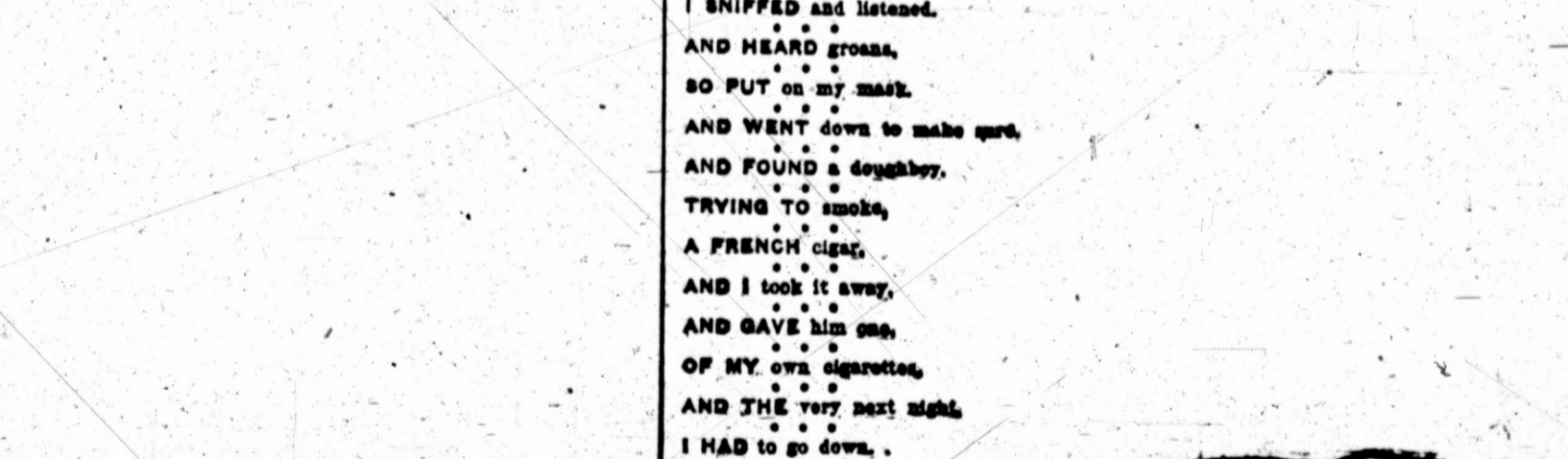
