HOBBOY PARDONS "UNCLE" BILL EDWARDS AS BIRTH-DAY PRESENT FROM STATE

AUSTIN, July 16.—After being refused executive clemency at the hands of former Governors Colquitt and Ferguson, "Uncle" Bill Edwards, eccentric Texas convict, aged 76, today wrote the governor for a pardon as a birthday present on July 15, 1930.

"I feel in my mind, conscience and heart that I have paid the penalty of my crime," wrote "Uncle" Bill. The governor promptly granted the pardon, especially as the petition was also signed by numerous citizens of Eastland and Callahan counties.

Edwards was given a term of 25 years in the penitentiary by a jury in the district court of Eastland county and has served nine and a half years of the term for the killing of a man named G. A. Rogers. Edwards is said to have become almost a millionaire during his confinement in prison by the discovery of oil on his 320 acres in Callahan county. He had previously refused to accept executive clemency on the grounds that he had not yet atoned for his crime.

FIVE "ABSENTEE" VOTES HAVE BEEN POLLED

Five citizens of Wichita Falls have availed themselves of the privilege of casting their votes in advance under the provision of the absentee voting law, it was announced Thursday afternoon by Will T. Harris, county clerk. Each declared that he would be absent on election day. All qualified voters who will be absent upon election day are entitled to cast their vote in advance by going before the county clerk and depositing their ballot in an envelope which is sealed and held by the county clerk until election day. The voter must present his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate or go before a notary public and swear that he is a legal voter.

CITY COUNCIL TO ACCEPT PROPOSAL WATER WORKS CO.

CAREFUL EXAMINATION OF CONDITIONS AND CONTRACTS TO BE MADE BEFORE ACTION.

JOKER MAY BE HIDDEN IN CONTRACT ARTICLES

Company Will Accept \$800,000 Bond Issue As Purchase Price of Plant.

The city of Wichita Falls last night definitely committed itself to acceptance of the local water plant in exchange for the municipal bonds voted last February for the purchase of the plant—but the trade remains subject to a formidable array of conditions imposed upon the Wichita Falls Water company that may offer a legal loophole through which the city can crawl to safety if it so desires.

Briefly, the city council passed a resolution accepting the proposal made by C. E. Calder, representing the water company, and at the same time included in the resolution a number of "subject to approval" clauses which may again break off negotiations. The resolution, however, was of more than ordinary importance in view of the fact that it will bring definite action of some kind after more than six months of discussion—and in that respect, at least, it was satisfactory to the water company.

Calder's proposition, as explained in yesterday's Times, provided for removal of the stumbling block caused by the city's inability to find a market for its bonds. In lieu of a cash trade, Calder proposed to accept the city's bonds in the amount of \$500,000, and to turn over the water plant to the city July 21.

Afterman Bonner last night expressed the opinion that the city owes careful consideration of certain encumbrances that may rest upon the property of the water company. He called specific attention to a suit now pending in which Henry Sayles claims a preference right to some 530-acre tract of Lake Wichita.

"If Sayles has any right at all," Judge Bonner explained, "the court undoubtedly will consider it a money right, and will give that Sayles is entitled to a judgment. This may be an item of considerable size."

Calder, however, finally agreed to be responsible for this matter, if the case should be decided against the water company. The discussion then switched to the terms submitted in Calder's written proposal, and both Judge Bonner and City Attorney Mann advised the council that the city should be further protected through careful examination of all titles, deeds and abstracts concerning the property. Mayor Cline expressed himself in favor of the trade for the plant if it could be made subject to a time period for attorneys to pass upon the legality and validity of a number of matters under question.

After debating the proposition almost three hours, Judge Bonner submitted a resolution to the council which was adopted. For the information of the many citizens keenly interested in municipal control of the water works, the Times prints below this resolution in full:

"Resolved, That the proposal of C. E. Calder for the sale and purchase by the city of the waterworks system of Wichita Falls, after due consideration, be and is hereby accepted, subject only to the provisions and conditions hereinafter stipulated. The mayor is hereby ordered to furnish Mr. Calder a certified copy of this resolution and the action of the board.

"It is ordered that the mayor take all necessary steps to have issued the said bonds of the city, and to obtain the approval of the attorney general thereto; and generally to do whatever may be necessary in the premises, after the conditions herein contained have been complied with.

"Now it is provided that all title papers, contracts, deeds, abstracts and other instruments in connection with this transaction, including the two contracts of date February 2, 1920, styled 'General Contract' and 'Pumping Agreement' respectively, shall all be subject to the approval as to their rates, terms and conditions, by the city council; and as to their legality by the city attorney—it being further provided, however, that any objections which may be found to any such shall be set forth in writing by the council and by the city attorney, either or both, within 10 days from and after the delivery by the said C. E. Calder of complete and certified abstracts of title, and further provided that any objections not so made within said time shall be deemed waived.

"If objections be made by either the council as to the rates, terms and conditions or by the city attorney as to the legality, then the same shall be filed with the city clerk within said time, and a copy thereof mailed to the said C. E. Calder at Dallas, Texas; and thereafter the said C. E. Calder shall have 10 days within which to meet, cure and perfect any such objections made by either the city council or the city attorney. But if at the end of said time the said C. E. Calder shall not have met, cured or perfected such, and shall state that additional time is desired, then a reasonable time shall thereafter be allowed.

TAMPICO OIL MEN APPEAL TO GOVERNOR

Bolshevik Incite Oil Workers in Tampico Field State Petroleum Men.

MEXICO CITY, July 15.—Managers of petroleum companies at Tampico have appealed to General Manuel Pelaez, military governor of the state of Tamaulipas, to prevent alleged bolsheviks from forcibly hindering laborers from working. BRALLEY-GOODFELLOW DISPUTE PRESENTED TO COUNCIL BY MAYOR CLINE.

Public Hearing of Charges Against Goodfellow To Be Held at an Early Date.

The city council, sitting in special session last night, directed the city attorney to take whatever action may be provided in the city charter to force immediate action on Police Commissioner Bralley's request for the resignation of Robert Goodfellow, chief of police.

himself to an opinion. The matter was brought to a "show down" on the insistence of Bralley that action was imperative in view of the fact that it was publicly known that discussion existed within the police department, and that the work of the department could not be carried out satisfactorily until harmony was restored.

Mayor W. D. Cline presented the matter to the council in a brief speech that reflected an earnest desire to be absolutely fair and impartial: "Within an hour I must leave the city on a visit to New Orleans," he said. "I cannot be here to take action with you gentlemen, but I wish to make it clear that, although I may be a poor fighter, I am not running away from any issue and am not seeking to evade any responsibility.

"I hold no opinion on this case. I hold nothing against Chief Goodfellow in any way. My stand is simply this: I cannot hope, as nominal head of the municipal government, for the city to function properly unless I look up you gentlemen in your various departments as long as I believe you are attending to your duties faithfully. In view of this there is no course for me to pursue other than to give my support to Commissioner Bralley. If he is wrong, a public hearing will bring out the facts. But I must proceed now on the assumption that he knows more about the affairs of the police department than I do.

"I am not criticizing Chief Goodfellow; let me make that very plain. The nearest I can possibly approach to a criticism is to say that if he is unsatisfactory to Commissioner Bralley, he is unsatisfactory to me—that is all. Alderman W. N. Bonner declared that his years of training as an attorney and judge precluded his viewing the situation in any but a judicial light. "I can only reserve my judgment," he explained, "until I have heard the entire case presented by both sides. I realize it is my duty also, as the mayor has so expressed himself, to support any present action that Mr. Bralley may take."

MAN KILLED IN FALL FROM OIL DERRICK

In a fall from the top of an oil derrick to the ground, 40 feet below, Tom Howard, an employee of the Crude Oil Marketing company, was killed on the company lease in the K. M. A. field Thursday morning. Howard was working with his nephew, H. P. Doss, the two being engaged in pulling sucker rods from the well. Doss was operating the hoisting machinery while his uncle was attaching the clamps to the rods as the cable was lowered to him, and it is believed that after failing to attach a clamp to one of the rods that Howard retained his hold on the cable and was drawn to the top of the derrick. Other employees who were working nearby shouted to him to hold to the cable and he would be lowered to the derrick floor, but the man evidently became frightened and just as the controlling machinery was reversed and the cable began its descent he released his hold and fell from the full height of the derrick.

Both arms and one leg were broken in the fall and he received internal injuries. An ambulance was called from Wichita Falls, but the man was dead before it arrived. The body was brought to the Markie & Lunn undertaking parlors and prepared for burial. It was shipped to Rosebud, Tex., Thursday night to the home of Mr. Howard's mother and the funeral services will be held from that place. Mr. Howard was 34 years of age at the time of his death, was unmarried, and came but recently to work in the oil fields. Little is known of him but those with whom he came in contact stated that he was an efficient workman and was well liked by his fellow employees.

An allied commission should be sent to Eszen to provide for food and clothing for miners.

The allies must grant Germany credits immediately for purchase of foodstuffs.

If the Germans accept the allied ultimatum the reparations questions will be referred to the reparations commission and the conference probably will be adjourned tonight.

The German delegates held a conference this morning to discuss the answer to the allied coal ultimatum.

Dr. Walter Simons, German foreign minister, told correspondents after the meeting he believed an agreement with the allies could be reached.

"The allies are close enough together now to enable us to reach an agreement."

SPA, BELGIUM, July 16.—The German delegates at the conference here have agreed in principle with the terms submitted to them by the allies, as to Germany's deliveries of coal, but will ask for certain articles in the allied note.

They made this announcement just before entering into conference with the allied ministers this afternoon.

The German delegation at the conference here sent word to the supreme council this morning that the German reply to the allied ultimatum on coal deliveries would not be ready before 4

o'clock this afternoon. The Germans are expected to ask modification of the terms of the protocol. The reply was due at 11 o'clock this morning. From what could be learned during the morning, the thing that was standing in the way of acceptance by the Germans of the allied terms was the clause providing for occupation of the Ruhr valley unless the coal deliveries reached a total of 6,000,000 tons by Oct. 15, 1920. Dr. Walter Simons, the German foreign minister, told his colleagues when they met to confer over the allied conditions, that this subject had not been mentioned during his conversation with Premier Lloyd George and Millerand yesterday, when a verbal agreement was virtually reached. The Germans, it appears, were greatly annoyed to find it in the text of the terms handed them in the note of last night.

PARIS, July 16.—The Russian empress and her children were burned alive after the execution of Emperor Nicholas at Ekaterinburg, it is alleged in statements attributed to Alexis Dolrovia, formerly courier to the empress, published here today. Dolrovia said he made vain attempts to save his mistress and her children. The empress and the children, Dolrovia declared, were taken to a woods where a fire was made into which the royal victims were forced. Every time they sought to get out of the flames, Dolrovia said, they were driven back at the point of the bayonet.

Tatiana, the empress' second daughter, fled from the pyre three times and eventually fell pierced through by a bayonet. The empress and Alexis, hair to the throne, clasped in close embrace, walked almost automatically into the flames and disappeared in a whirl of smoke, according to Dolrovia.

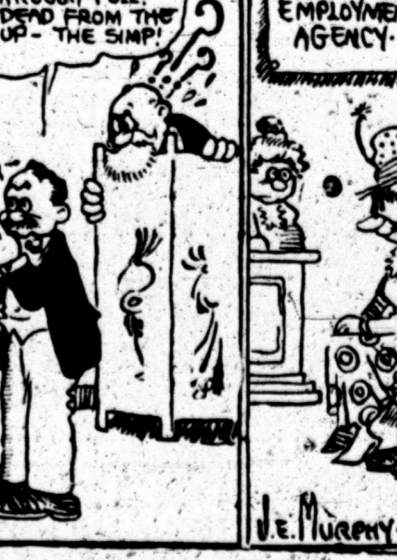
