



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
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A Methodist Preacher-Citizen Espouses Baptist Laymen's Political Cause

If that man is sincere and lofty in his integrity, I can trust him and do trust him always to act up to that loftiness of purpose and grace of character. Such a man in my judgment is Pat Netf-worthy of perfect, private and public trust, clean in record, conscientious in duty, gracious in personality, brilliant in intellect. Christian in character, knightly in derotion-I hail him as the next governor of Texas.




