3,500,000 WORKERS AFFECTED BY LABOR TROUBLES IN YEAR

STRIKES COST WORKERS \$175,000,000 IN WAGES, UPON BASIS OF \$5.00 PER DAY.

STEEL STRIKE CAUSED GREATEST FINANCIAL LOSS Employees Lost Approximately \$7,000,000,000 in Value Of Curtailed Production.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Approximately 3,500,000 workers were affected by labor controversies, strikes and lockouts in the United States during the government's fiscal year which ended June 30, it was estimated unofficially here today on the basis of reports now being prepared for Director Hugh Kerwin of the conciliation bureau, department of labor.

The reports when completed will show that the bureau was asked to mediate in a total of 800 cases, involving approximately 1,655,000 workers, Kerkin believes, or about half the number involved during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919.

Strikes are not breaking out as fast as a year ago, said Kerwin, but they are much more costly now than formerly. It seems as if workers now wait to make sure they have what they consider a perfect grievance before beginning a strike.

Both employers and workers, however, seem more willing to ask this bureau for assistance than formerly.

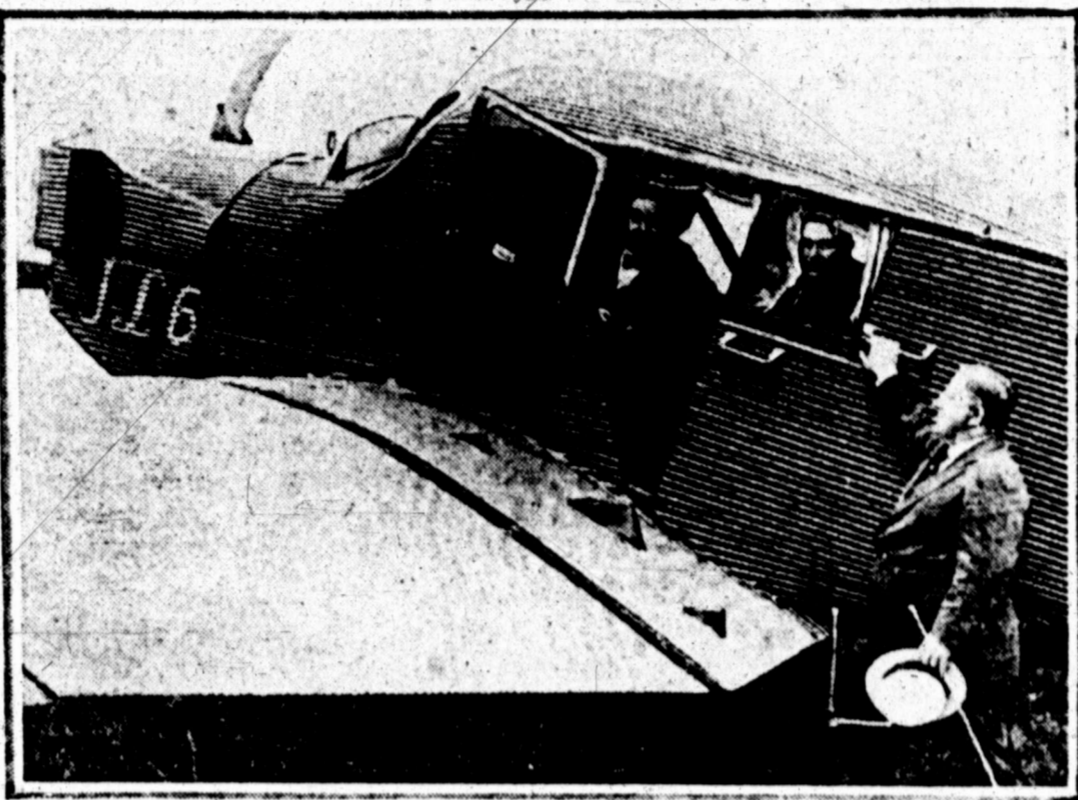

AFGHANISTAN RULER SEEKING TO SUCCEED SULTAN OF TURKEY AS LEADER OF MOHAMMEDANS

Three Quakes Yesterday Cause People to Fear World War Near End.

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS. CONSTANTINOPLE, July 17.—Afghanistan is claiming to be the great Moslem nation and the Omir of Afghanistan is working to succeed the sultan of Turkey as commander of the faithful, according to rumors reaching this city from Ankara, where a series of pan-Islamic conferences have been in session for several months.

This congress, in which representatives of Afghanistan, Syria, Turkey, Arabia, India, Persia, Azerbaijan, Crimea, Egypt and Tripoli are participating, is said to chiefly concern with filling the office of commander of the faithful in such a manner as to unify the Moslem world.

A few weeks ago it was agreed that the post should go to the leader of the chief Moslem nation and Turkey's right to the leadership was not challenged.

The Moslem congress apparently is a continuation of the plan for consolidation of the Mohammedan world originated by Enver Pasha, former Turkish minister of war, and leader of the young Turk party, and fostered by the former imperial German government.

ALLIES TO ASSIST GERMANY FLOAT ITS LOAN TO PAY DEBTS

ASSISTANCE ASKED BY GERMANY IN MEETING OBLIGATION GRANTED.

Belgium Give Priority in Reparation Payment

SPA, BELGIUM, July 17.—Allied governments will take appropriate measures to assist Germany in floating loans intended to meet her internal requirements and to assist her in the prompt discharge of her debt to the allies, according to the agreement signed here today by representatives of Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium and Portugal settling problems relative to reparations.

Belgium is given priority in the payment of 2,000,000,000 gold francs and the agreement enumerates the securities which will be accepted by the allies arranged for a method of valuing the ships surrendered by Germany and her allies under the various treaties.

At tonight's meeting Judge J. P. Martin will preside, and Dr. A. Kemp will introduce Mr. Thomason.

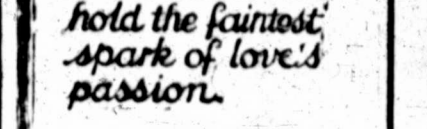

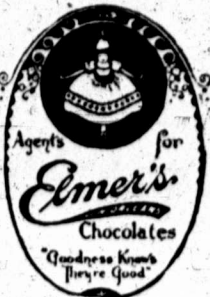

RED CROSS COURSE ADOPTED BY SCHOOLS. Educational authorities in Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma have adopted as part of their regular curriculum in the high schools the Red Cross courses in home nursing, according to an announcement by southwestern headquarters of the American Red Cross at St. Louis.

Similar action will probably be taken in Missouri and Kansas, the announcement adds. Corps of Red Cross instructors are being recruited in each of the three states and the new subjects will be commenced by the high

school students at the beginning of the fall term. In Oklahoma a corps of 24 instructors will be selected, according to an announcement by the state department of health which will work in co-operation with the Red Cross. The general classes will be given by the regular home economics teachers and "Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick," a Red Cross publication, will be used as a text book.

All demonstrations and technical instructions, however, must be given by graduate nurses, their expenses to be paid by the Junior Red Cross or the

school boards. The home nursing courses are endorsed as a valuable elective by the high school inspectors of Oklahoma City.
