rock, with her Seabright pilot aboard, was evidently holding inshore for a fair breeze.

Resolute held on to the port tack and the two yachts began to converge. The Resolute managed to cross Shamrock's bow at 1:28 and tacked to starboard.

Resolute leads. Resolute tacked to port a minute later, but Resolute herself came about and established herself on Shamrock's weather port. Resolute was leading by 100 yards.

As the two sloops stood in shore, Shamrock again endeavored by footing to force to reach her rival, but Captain Adams kept Resolute higher into the wind and ate further out to weather.

Both yachts seemed to lose speed as they shot under the lee of shore.

At 1:35 Resolute was leading by 200 yards and the wind had breezed up to six knots.

With more than half of the course to the outer mark covered at 2:15, it was estimated by newspaper men on the destroyer following the sloops that Resolute was leading by one-fourth of a mile.

At 2:32 the yachts were still standing in toward Long Branch and it seemed possible that when they came about the mark could be fetched on a long tack.

Resolute gained slightly on every hitch as the sloops tacked the Jersey shore. At 2:45 the wind was making steady to eight knots and there was every prospect that the yachts could cover the course within the time limit if the wind held.

With the yachts holding off shore, it looked as if they would be able to make the turning mark. Resolute was leading by three-eighths of a mile. The wind had increased to nearly 10 knots an hour and the sloops lee rails were awash.

At 2:50 the yachts were still standing off shore for the mark, five miles ahead. The breeze increased to 12 knots, the best that has favored the sloops in the 1920 series. Resolute was nearly half a mile ahead, according to estimated wireless from the destroyer.

At 2:58 Resolute was within two and a half miles of the turning mark and a half mile ahead of Shamrock. The wind continued at a full 12-knot rate

and the regatta committee boat started back for the finish line.

Postponement at fifteen minutes intervals was ordered at 11:30 today by the committee directing the America's cup.

With scarcely a breath of air on New York bay, the cup sloops idled around the Amherst channel lightship, the starting point, awaiting for a blow.

At 12:30 the regatta committee hoisted signals for the course, a beat south by west to a point about eight miles off the Amherst lightship.

The preparatory signal was blown at 12:45 for a start at 1 o'clock. The wind was very light, but the yachts seemed to pick it up and moved fairly

The warning signal was blown at 12:55 when both sloops were jockeying for position.

Shamrock crossed the line 22 seconds after the starting signal had been blown and Resolute followed 41 seconds after the signal.

Captain Adams of Resolute made no effort to gain the weather berth and let Shamrock cross the line first. Both yachts crossed on the starboard tack within fifty yards of one another. Both tacked a few minutes after the start and at 1:10 started for the Jersey shore.

At 1:15 Shamrock had a lead of an eighth of a mile and appearing to be gaining rapidly in the four knot breeze, Resolute, although to windward, was still holding the port tack for the Jersey shore with Resolute a quarter of a mile to windward of Shamrock.

SANDY HOOK, N. J., July 21.—A well-kept calm with a bit of ground swell on the America's cup racing lanes were prevailing wind and weather conditions this morning when skippers and crews of Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock IV and the American defender Resolute swarmed on decks to get up sail for the day's contest that may mean return of the cup to the other side of the Atlantic.

A victory for the Shamrock would give the emblem of yachting supremacy of the sea back to Great Britain. Resolute must capture three straight races in order that the cup may still remain in the trophy room of the New York Yacht club, where it has reposed continuously for well over 40 years.

Early prospects today were not even promising for a drifting match and the hopes of the yachting flotilla that the challenger and defender would have at least one good race in a real wind disappeared with the first weather observations. In fact, it looked at an early hour as if the contest would have to be postponed.

The steady winds that favored the Lipton craft yesterday and brought a winner over the finish line, vanished early in the night. Not a puff of air came from any quarter. Smoke from the stack of Sir Thomas Lipton's steam yacht Victoria rose straight to the zenith and hung there a dark, immovable column. A coppery sun burnished the sea that lay almost motionless below.

The racing crews took one squint at the weather and then went to work making sail.

Lipton Had Luck. Resolute's sailors declare Sir Thomas has had all the luck. They say in the first race Shamrock was beaten when an accident to Resolute forced her to withdraw, giving the race to the challenger. That Shamrock was badly beaten in the second race, but Resolute could not win because the wind failed to rise before she could finish before the time limit and that yesterday in the

streaky winds Shamrock caught all the favoring breezes and won on luck.

The fishermen hereabouts insist today that Shamrock could never have beaten the American boat without Capt. Andrew Jackson Applegate, Seabright, New Jersey fisherman, who sailed on the Lipton sloop, yesterday and imparted to Skipper Hurton a better knowledge of wind and tide conditions.

"An American had a big hand in turning the trick for the British boat, anyway," say the fishermen, who cannot decide whether they should make Captain Applegate a hero or otherwise.

Take a good fisherman in these parts. There is no rule in international cup racing preventing an American from sailing on board a foreign craft.

The race today, if sailed, will be 15 miles to windward, or leeward, and return. Racing conditions provide that a contest shall not be started later than six hours before sunset, which means that if the yachts are not sent away by 3:22 o'clock (daylight-saving time), the race will be called off.

Resolute also plans to take aboard a Jersey fisherman for his knowledge of local tide and wind conditions. It was said today that a Red Bank skipper had been shipped.

Col. Duncan Neill, Sir Thomas' representative on the Shamrock, said today that yesterday's contest was almost a duplicate of that of Saturday.

"We got the wind yesterday and were lucky," said Neill, "while Resolute held the wind on Saturday, but, unfortunately for her, was unable to finish before the limit."

Shamrock's sailormen agree that Resolute is a fine boat and that, while they believe Shamrock can beat her, boat for boat, they do not see how Shamrock can concede the American defender a time allowance of seven minutes, and one second and expect to win.

The air was dead flat at 9:30 o'clock this morning and a gray haze lay on the sea.

After getting up sail Shamrock at 9:45 took a tow for the starting line. Resolute was still at her mooring, getting up her canvas.

TEXAS SCHOOL FUND IS HIGHEST PER CAPITA IN STATES HISTORY

AUSTIN, TEX., July 21.—The highest per capita appropriation of Texas school funds in the history of the state was made Tuesday evening when the state board of education set aside \$14.50 for each of 1,255,116 school children in Texas, a total of \$181,791,200. The new appropriation shows an increase of \$5 per capita over the figure for the last scholastic year for which the appropriation was \$9.50. The increase was made possible by the great increase in property valuations and the revenue derived from schools from the tax on the gross production of oil.

OFFICERS ASKED TO LOOK OUT FOR STOLEN BONDS

F. N. Bryant, an official of the Guaranty State Bank of Sumner, Texas, has requested the police department and the various banks of this city to watch for a large amount of Liberty Bonds and War Savings Stamps that were stolen from his bank on July 15. According to Mr. Bryant, between four and five thousand dollars worth of the valuables were lost and he anticipates that they will be disposed of in this city.

FINAL CONFERENCE BETWEEN HUERTA AND PETROLEUM MEN

MEXICO CITY, July 21.—What is said to be a final conference between Provisional President de la Huerta and the petroleum men will be held next Saturday, says Excelsior. Among matters to be discussed will be the date from which the petroleum interests must pay the taxes imposed under the Carranza regime and recognition of devaluations of petroleum claims made since that time. SHIP TONNAGE CONSTRUCTION IN ENGLAND EXCEEDS U. S.

LONDON, July 20.—Total tonnage now building in the United Kingdom exceeds the amount under construction in the United States by 1,672,000 tons, according to returns published today by Lloyd's Register of Shipping. The aggregate amount under construction now in great Britain is 2,578,000 tons, the highest amount ever recorded.

GERMANS TRYING HARD TO GRAB BULK OF RUSSIAN TRADE

BERLIN, July 8 (By Mail).—Though some German officials concerned with Russian affairs look skeptically for the moment upon trade possibilities with Russia, certain economic authorities, including Food Minister Schmidt see in Russia a future golden business opportunity for Germany. And, while one group of officials scoffs at the Russian claims as to ability to deliver goods to the rest of the world, another group is carefully planning for the later conquest of the east. Germany feels that she is in a strategic position to get a generous share of the Russian trade and is inclined to think that in the long run she can outstrip England, America and France in this field. Minister Schmidt's views of the situation as expressed to the Wirtschaftsrat are a clear indicator of the German feeling about the problem. "With respect to our ability to com-

pete on the world market, we will have no neasy position in the future," he said. "We will soon have sharp competition, especially with America. The concentration of all financial power in the United States, as it developed during the war, must lead directly to formation of world trusts. England also has assembled strong forces within itself. Greater prospects are offered us through approaches to the east. The Russian market offers many possibilities for trade relations with us. It concerns us as one of the nearest markets in which we have, as far as England and America are concerned, the indisputable advantage of a more favorable territorial situation."

Meanwhile, it is significant that Russia is pursuing a systematic campaign as respects future trade relations. Establishment of an agency here under Wigdor Kopp, followed by Krassin's visit to London are known to be part of a carefully planned scheme whereby Russia should plant her business relations again in foreign lands. Germany, as previously pointed out, takes with a grain of salt the astounding figures of what Russia is able to do at this moment to export, pointing out that transportation facilities are lacking for such undertakings—even if the supplies are at hand. And Russian exports here are inclined to believe that there is considerable rooming as to what Russia has on hand for export. However, while some officials take

this attitude, business men and many government authorities are overlooking no bets. Germany proposes to be in "on the ground floor" once business does open with Russia. There are many German business men who know the Russian language and customs from long previous experience, and they count this knowledge as an asset which America and England possess in a far lesser degree. The German business man regards Russia as "virgin territory" at this time. That is to say, he realizes that its wartime exhaustion plus the ravages of economic disintegration under bolshevism will make it a fruitful field for the outside world. And with this knowledge, he hopes to be able to act a lead in the business race once that gets under way. He does not underestimate the strength of his opponent—England—who is also trying to get the inside track.

WHY?

WONT A SLATE-PENCIL WRITE ON PAPER?

Writing of all kinds is due either to friction or the application of liquid to the surface of paper. In writing with a lead pencil, the marks are being made because the friction between the paper and the surface of the pencil wears down the graphite and leaves a resultant mark. The process of writing with a slate pencil is essentially similar to painting a wall or a fence. The liquid is applied and is partially absorbed and partially evaporates through the action of the air.

In writing with a slate pencil on a slate surface the latter is rough enough to cause the necessary friction and the mark which appears is the result of this. But paper is not hard and rough enough to produce this effect, and the slate pencil merely glides over the surface, without doing more than indenting it. For the same reason, it is not possible to write upon glass with an ordinary pencil. Because of the smoothness of the glass there is not sufficient friction to wear away the graphite, though glass may be readily marked with soft wax crayons.

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OPEN SHOP ISSUE LINE OF CLEAVAGE

Demonstrative Crowd Hears Four Candidates For Legislature Speak at Vernon.

VERNON, TEX., July 21.—With an interest aroused here in their race which compares favorably with that in the governor's contest, the four candidates for the legislature from the district composed of Wichita and Willbarger counties spoke to a large and very demonstrative crowd on the court house lawn here last night. All of the candidates outlined a constructive program which included planks in the interest of better school and road facilities and similar progressive measures.

The principal point of cleavage developed in connection with the open shop movement, which gave rise to the only fireworks of the debate—principally between B. F. Johnson and F. G. Sanson, both of Wichita Falls. Johnson, who spoke first, attacked the open shop movement in a very moderate tone. He declared the belief that the average honesty and integrity of the labor unions to be as good as that of the open shop association, paid his respects to the bankers and "vested interests" declaring that it was his belief that it was more right for a banker to extort from the public than for a "high jacking" plumber to do so, and declared that no one had ever heard him voice approval of either the plumbers or waiters strikes in Wichita Falls.

Johnson congratulated his opponent on the moderation of his tone in the discussion of the open shop movement, declaring that it indicated a return to reason on his part. He discussed the open shop and labor in a moderate way, declaring himself to be in favor of labor unions as long as they behaved themselves. He compared the present state of the unions, with the radical element which he declared had drifted in in the past few years, to the state of a boy who had eaten green apples, and the open shop to a bottle of castor oil.

"When the green apple element is purged out of the unions, the castor oil bottle will be again laid on the shelf," he declared. He stated that he belonged to the open shop association of Wichita Falls, and declared that he was proud of it. Furthermore, he accused his opponents with injecting the issue into the race.

Cel. R. F. George, Burk Burnett coal

merchant, the fourth speaker, devoted the greater part of his talk to a denunciation of the extravagance of the present legislature, and based his appeal on the voters principally on a platform of rigid economy. Col. George did not mention the open shop question. The rest of his talk was devoted principally to a discussion of his personal and family record in the various wars of this and neighboring nations, of his grandfather with General Taylor in Mexico, of his father with General Lee in Virginia, and of himself with General Francisco Madero, in Mexico. The record of martial services won a regular ovation from all factions represented in the crowd.

A striking feature of the discussion of the candidates was provided in the diversity of their records—Sanson having been member of the Panama canal organization, Wyatt having served the government as a vice consul in Hong Kong and various other oriental posts, Col. George having a long military service in Mexico, with Johnson alone confined to a domestic career, although divided throughout the four quarters of the state, north, south, east and west.

CINCINNATI WATER SUPPLY IS CUT OFF
Weary and Tired City Dwellers Climb Many Flights Of Tiresome Stairs.
CINCINNATI, July 21.—The business section of Cincinnati was without water this morning as a result of the breaking of a 48-inch main which flooded the territory in the vicinity of the break.

The hydraulic elevators in the office buildings could not operate and the necessity of the office had to climb the stairs to reach them. Scores of manufacturers were unable to start because of the fear of boiler explosion. A great residence district also was affected and hundreds of people gathered at the fire plugs with buckets to catch the trickles of water that came from them. To check the rush of water from the broken main it was necessary to close the valves in mains of other sections of the city and this caused a temporary famine.

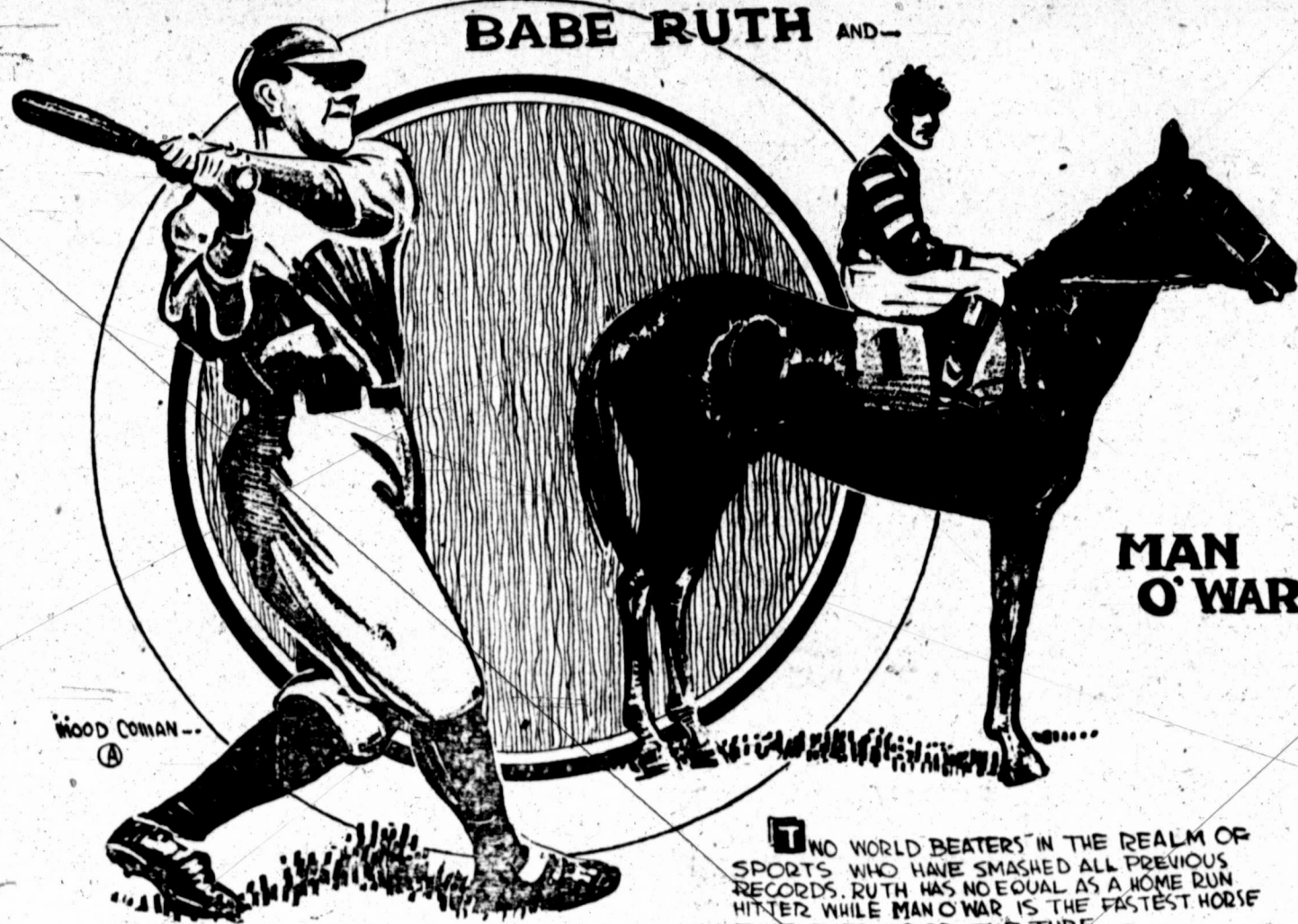

That Wichita Falls is a leader in pursuits other than commercial and industrial, and that the same energy and enthusiasm which has characterized her business successes in the past few years is evidenced in other lines of activity is shown by the work of the men's Bible class of the First Christian church.

PARNELL WARNS OF RADICAL EFFORTS

Member of Legislature Speaks At Luncheon of Wichita Club Wednesday.

A brief political speech by Representative J. D. Parnell, and the start of a movement to campaign against increases in county tax assessments were the features that attracted the spotlight at the weekly luncheon of the Wichita club today. The club attendance was unusually large, but the members who had expected several political and drinks to follow luncheon were disappointed.

Parnell, who was introduced by President C. W. It was generally understood that favorable action would be taken on the Wichita club's proposal for an interchange of club courtesies among various Texas cities.

H. H. Clark brought up the matter of the tax assessments levied by the county authorities, declaring they were based on inflated values and urged the

club to take action at once. County officers late Tuesday arrested a man at Burkburnett in connection with the death of William F. Gilley, at Newton on Saturday night. The suspect was arrested by Frank Watkins, a deputy sheriff on duty in the oil regions, and was later brought to Wichita Falls by Sheriff Bob McFall and Deputy Sheriff Charlie DeBout, who went to Burkburnett following report of the arrest. Officers here have advanced the theory that Gilley fell a victim to highwaymen and that no personal feelings entered into the murder which county officials characterize as one of the most cold-blooded homicides ever committed in Wichita county.

Gilley was found late Saturday night in a dark corner in the heart of Newton with a bullet wound in his head. The injured man was rushed to the Wichita General hospital but died Sunday night.
