

CLOSING MEETING OF CAMPAIGN FRIDAY

All Candidates Expected to Join in Open Air Speaking at Corner Ninth and Indiana.

Candidates for office in Wichita county have entered the home stretch of the campaign and will pass under the wires at the joint speaking at the corner of Indiana avenue and Ninth street at 8:00 o'clock Friday evening.

The second of the series of joint speaking here was held Wednesday night. Candidates for the legislature and county judgeship spoke as did also J. O. Wheat, candidate for justice of the peace.

Wheat closed the speaking with a reading of verses that brought much applause and cries for wheat.

F. C. Swanson, candidate for the legislature, defied the "open shop crowd" to cite any expression of his giving approval to the plumbers' strike and said that he did not charge with a radical until after he had exposed the manner in which some of the bankers of the city had taken advantage of the independence of the bankers.

He declared that he would seek to have enacted laws that would protect investors in oil and other companies, if sent to the legislature.

He also declared that some of his opponents were seeking to make an issue of something that had no place in the campaign and pleaded for a spirit of co-operation and understanding between the forces in industry.

He said he would be untrue to himself, however, if he did not make acknowledgment of the belief that organization had been a boon for the workingman.

F. Johnson declared that he was not the candidate of any clique or faction and that he had not brought the open shop issue into the campaign.

He said that he was not an open shop candidate but said that he was proud to be a member of the open shop.

He said that he joined the open shop because he believed it to be a declaration of independence of the state that whether elected or not he would continue, as he had done in the past, to give freely of his time and effort to the service of the community.

DAUGHTER CHARGES FATHER WITH KILLING 26 PEOPLE

STEELE N. D., July 22.—In a frenzy of hatred for her father, Mrs. Frances Sheldon, 17, today reiterated charges that 26 skeletons will be found buried on his farm. The father, James C. Clayton, 61, and his son, Roy, went to trial here today charged with statutory offenses against Mrs. Sheldon and her sister, Laura.

NEW YORK, July 22.—A request for the negotiation of a treaty of commerce with the present government of Russia or its successor, "be made conditional upon reimbursement to American business houses and individuals who are dependent and self-reliant, but often through confiscation by the soviet government, is made in a letter to Bainbridge Colby, secretary of state, from the American-Russian chamber of commerce, made public today.

FRED K. SMITH'S ANSWER TO M'FALL'S CHARGES

To voters of Wichita County: My opponent through the columns of the Wichita Record News, has seen fit to attack me and my campaign manager, charging me with circulating "mud slinging" propaganda, and in a letter addressed to the voters of Wichita County he makes use of the following language: "I understand (because I have not seen the letter) that he (meaning me) makes an accusation in this letter that I, some sixteen or eighteen months ago, struck a prisoner with a silver wrench or some other kind of wrench."

CLAY TABLET MAY ADD YEARS TO WORLD'S RECORDED HISTORY

"Recent deciphering of a clay tablet which may add a thousand years to the span of recorded history—for it contains a code of laws said to antedate a code of Hammurabi by a millennium—is another reminder that archeologists are finding stranger true stories than fiction can reveal," says a bulletin of the National Geographic Society.

"The pick and the spade of the explorer have resulted in astounding revelations," writes Albert T. Clay, who has deciphered some of the most famous of the documents.

"Above all else, one of the greatest surprises is that the earliest peoples, instead of being barbarous or uncultured, were civilized and possessed a culture of a high order.

"Several ancient libraries and immense archives have been found. Years ago the library of Ashurbanipal (688-626 B. C.) was discovered at Nineveh.

"In more recent years temple and school libraries have been found at Nippur, Supur, Laras, Babylon and Enoch. The libraries of the first three sites belong chiefly to the third millennium B. C.; those of the last two belong to later periods.

"But especially large archives of these documents, numbering several hundred thousand and belonging to the third and fourth millennium B. C. have been found at Tello, Nippur, Drehem, Jarka and recently at the very day.

"A young man sends his endearing inquiry concerning the health of his beloved, saying: 'To Biba, thus says Jimu-Marduk may the gods Shamash and Marduk permit thee to live forever for my sake. I write to inquire concerning thy health. Tell me how thou art. I weep to Babylon, but did not see thee. I was greatly disappointed. Send the reason for thy leaving, that I may be happy. Do come in the month of Nisannu. Keep well always for my sake.'

"The Code of Hammurabi, written about 2000 B. C. upon a large and somewhat irregular stone, is perhaps the most important monument of antiquity that has been found for a century. It is the product of a civilization of a high order. In codifying his laws Hammurabi used every-day life of the ancient Babylonian than by a careful study of the Hammurabi Code.

"The code recognizes three grades of society—the aristocrat, or gentleman, the poor man, or plab, and the slave. Among the ranks of the first mentioned were the professional men, the officers, and the tradesmen. The second class included the freedman who had been a slave.

"It has been the custom with most people in a large part of the ancient as well as the modern Orient to base a betrothal upon an agreement of the man or his parents to pay a sum of money to the girl's father. In Babylon this 'bride money' together with the gift of the father and other gifts.

"The Code of Hammurabi fixed the charges of physicians and surgeons. If a physician cured a broken limb or healed a diseased bowel, his fee from the patient was five shekels; from the commoner, three; and from the slave, two. The surgeon for an operation upon the upper class received 10 shekels; the lower, five, and a slave, two.

"In order to discourage the surgeon from making rash operations, severe penalties were fixed in case of unskillful ones. If the patient died, the surgeon's hands were cut off. In the case of a slave, he had to replace him with one of equal value. If the slave's eye was put out, he had to pay half the value of the slave."

MICHIGAN MAN IS FOUND DEAD IN CHICAGO HOTEL

CHICAGO, July 22.—M. P. Poindexter, 41, said to have a wife and four children in South Haven, Mich., was found dead in a hotel room here today. Mrs. Ora Walters, 31, occupant of an adjoining room, was arrested. Mrs. Walters declared she heard a shot in Poindexter's room and investigating found him dead. Later, according to the police, she admitted she and Poindexter were intimate. She said she had been his private secretary. Mrs. Walters told police she believed Poindexter committed suicide because of financial troubles.

100 NEEDEY CHILDREN IN THE OIL FIELDS

Many Need Decent Homes While Others Need Food and Clothing

Bradley Reports.

Calling attention to the fact that there are not less than 100 children in the oil fields around Burkburnett who are sorely in need of food, clothing and decent homes, John Bradley today made an earnest appeal to the Rotary club for aid in financing the work of the Texas Children's Home and Aid Society. The club several weeks ago pledged itself to raise \$5,000 for the work, but the fund is still more than a thousand dollars short of that amount while the need for the money is becoming increasingly great.

"It has been a difficult matter to raise this fund at this particular time," Bradley said. "Many men who in ordinary times would have given generously have turned deaf ears to our requests. But I know that if you men could see a part of the wonderful work being done by Miss Hendricke for the helpless children of our county you would not let this movement fall for lack of financial support."

A. E. Miles offered the suggestion that an alphabetical list be prepared, reported at the next meeting and that

every member of the club promise to call upon one man or more in an effort to complete the fund. The suggestion was adopted by the club, and it is hoped the fund will be exceeded before the drive closes.

The July birthday committee of the Rotary club "fell down on the job" saddy this noon, only one member of the committee furnishing any entertainment. Hubert M. Harrison introduced his little daughter, three years, to the Rotarians, and Miss Juanita, with a smile as winsome as moonlight in a park, sang the club's favorite song, "Frisbie Flower." An ovation that would have delighted even William Jennings Bryan, accustomed as he is to applause, followed the song—and Miss Juanita could have obtained the vote of every person applauding, which shows a marked difference between her and William J.

Announcement was made by the entertainment committee of the club that a watermelon party and "swim feast" will be held next month on the grounds of the Wichita Rod & Gun Club.

Also (and this is a matter of more than ordinary import) Rotarian Harry Bray, unsolicited and with a generosity that was exceeded in quantity only by the number of wrinkles in his rugged, weather-beaten countenance, stated that he would donate to the Civic League a "free sheet-iron garbage pail." The gift was accepted, although it was pointed out that if the Rotarians continue to eat as they did tonight there will not be sufficient waste from their plates to come under the later classification of garbage.

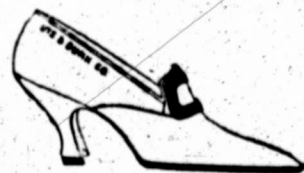

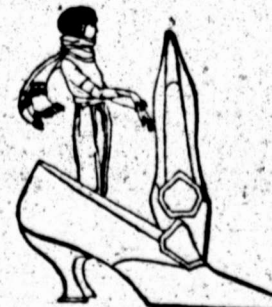

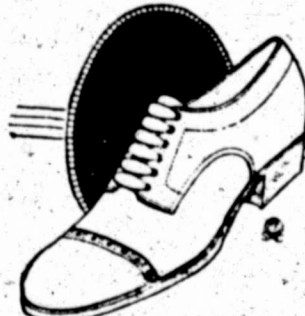

Police Affairs Will Come Before Council Tonight And Some Definite Action Expected.

Tonight the members of the city council will remove the cover from the pan containing the police scandal stew, and will decide whether the savory mess is ready to serve to a waiting public. Police Commissioner Bralley will be ready to present written charges demanding the removal from office of Chief of Police Goodfellow and Goodfellow, according to late and apparently authentic reports, will stand pat, refuse to resign and will demand that every charge against him be proven before he will surrender his place in the city's official family.

Chief Goodfellow's sudden change of mind was the outstanding feature of today's developments in the police department muddle. Although the chief could not be located by reporters at the time the report first was circulated, it was learned by the Times from an extremely trustworthy source that Goodfellow has "taken back" his earlier statement that he will offer his resignation to the council. According to the Times' informant, Chief Goodfellow declared this morning that he will not resign, and will not quit his job unless Mayor Cline orders his removal after the question has been voted on by every member of the council attending tonight's session.

Mayor Cline returned to the city from New Orleans at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and was prepared to occupy the chair tonight. Alderman W. B. Curlee, who left Colorado Springs Wednesday morning by automobile, will not reach the city before Saturday, in all probability, and Alderman J. M. McFall is still in California. The mayor and Aldermen W. N. Bonner, M. O. McDowell and W. Q. Bralley will constitute a quorum, however, and in view of Bralley's insistence upon action, there is small possibility of the police question being ignored tonight. Chief Goodfellow's earlier statement that he would resign because he could "no longer get along peaceably with the police commissioner" has caused considerable discussion around the city hall regarding his successor. Prominent among the names of men mentioned for the post of chief of police are John Taylor, B. M. Perkins and Lewis Jernigan. In the opinion of many the army experiences of the two first named men have peculiarly qualified them for the difficult position. Jernigan, those on the inside declare, was seriously considered for chief of police at the time Goodfellow was appointed, and he has many friends in the city who respect his record as a county officer and who believe he could handle the police affairs of the city satisfactorily.

FINAL CLASS TONIGHT FOR VOLUNTEER LEADERS IN RECREATION WORK

The final class in the course for volunteer recreational leaders, which has been conducted here in Wichita Falls during the past three weeks by B. T. Twichell, of Community Service, Inc., under the auspices of the Wichita Falls community service, will be held this evening in the basement of the First Presbyterian church, Tenth and Huff streets.

During the three weeks' course, classes have been held in five sections of the city with an individual attendance of approximately 200. The work has been offered in several widely scattered points rather than in one central location, in order to make the course available to the residents of all sections of the city. The meeting tonight, however, is offered as a means of getting the volunteer workers throughout the city better acquainted

with one another, and to provide an opportunity of demonstrating the recreational work which may be done with a large group. The meeting is open to all who are interested in community activities, regardless of whether they have attended earlier classes. The nature of the instruction offered will be such that those who have been unable to take the full course will in no way be handicapped in taking part. The meeting is scheduled for 8:00 o'clock.

K. M. A. NO. 6 WILL BE DRILLED IN TODAY

Sand Found At 1725 And Is Rich Looking—No. 7 Is Just Above Sand.

The Kemp-Munger-Allen Oil Company's No. 6 well is on the sand, and will be drilled in this evening, according to J. A. Kemp, who visited the field this morning. "The sand looks mighty good," Kemp said on his return. "And I believe we'll get a first-rate producer. The well hit the sand at 1725 feet, which is slightly less than the depth of the other wells. My field man reports that the sand is apparently as rich as any hitherto found in the field." The No. 7 well of the company, which is being drilled direct offset to the famous No. 1 that opened up the K. M. A. territory, also is just above the sand, and will probably be brought in early next week. The No. 8 is on the west line of the lease.

CONNECTICUT OIL CORP. WILL DRILL ON MANKINS DOME 4 MILES WEST K. M. A.

The Connecticut Oil Corporation, backed by eastern capital, has obtained a 5-acre lease on the Mankins dome, a mile and a half southwest of the Panther pool and about four miles west of the established Kemp-Munger-Allen field. It was announced today that the corporation is already up, and the company expects to begin drilling early next week. Charles J. Leggett, who recently completed the Bunker Ard well in the K. M. A. pool, will be in charge of the rig. The contract calls for a depth of 5000 feet. If the 600-foot sand already discovered on the Mankins dome proves worth development, the corporation will also drill several shallow wells on the 30 acres. Three men only are backing the new corporation, F. C. Wood and H. E. Phillips, of New York city, and J. W. Mettler, of Wichita Falls. Mettler will be in charge of the corporation's affairs, here and act as general manager.

COX DECLARES NO TRUTH IN REPORT

Denies That Senator Bailey Helped Finance Paper—Speaks Highly Of Thomas B. Love.

COLEMAN, July 22.—Reports that Joe Bailey or his friends are using a story that Bailey helped Governor Cox acquire his start as a newspaper publisher to further the former senator's campaign for governor brought a sharp and emphatic denial from the Democratic nominee for president today. The Cox camp was further annoyed by reports that Bailey is making extravagant professions of friendship for Ohio's governor on the one hand and championing the cause of the open shop advocates on the other.

Nothing can be further from the truth than that there is the slightest political harmony between Cox and Bailey. "This can be stated on the highest authority. As to the report that Bailey has stated that he helped Cox in a business way, Cox said: "I am quite certain that Senator Bailey never made this utterance for the simple reason that it is not true."

Confidence in Love. "I have the highest regard for Mr. Cox's character, intelligence and democracy," said Governor Cox today. "It has been a genuine pleasure to make his acquaintance, and I anticipate that it will be a tower of strength to me in my campaign. His mind seems to operate constantly a stream of thought that keeps the millwheel of progress turning toward the new day."

Appointment of Love on the subcommittee of the national committee which conferred with Cox yesterday about campaign plans and the election of a new chairman for the committee was at the nominee's suggestion. It indicated that Cox is willing to work in absolute harmony with the ablest of the former McAdoo leaders for the moral success of the Cox-Roosevelt ticket.

GENERAL STRIKE IS CALLED IN VERA CRUZ

Unloading Of Ships Will Be Suspended Indefinitely; Reds Cause Trouble.

MEXICO CITY, July 22.—A general strike has been declared in Vera Cruz, according to Excelsior. Unloading of several ships will be suspended tomorrow.

In consequence of the recent strikes at Vera Cruz and Tampico and those on the Mexican railway, a government investigation into alleged activities has been instituted.

Celestino Gasca, federal district governor, in a statement to the press tonight, declared that Mexican bolsheviks found guilty of law violations would be severely punished, while foreign offenders would be expelled from the country.

Interviewed recently, Governor Gasca denied the existence in the new government of any member with bolshevik tendencies and asserted that altogether there were few bolshevik agitators in Mexico.

DEALS FOR THREE TESTS IN MONTAGUE COUNTY HAVE BEEN CLOSED

NOCONA, TEX., July 22.—A deal is on for a test well on the Wallace survey, now a part of the Greenhaw ranch, the well to be drilled by Anchor, Greenhaw and associates, and to be started within forty days from July 16th. Progress on this well will be watched with much interest, as an effort is being made to locate it on the northwest extension of the Montague-Holcherly dome.

A terrific and considerable amount of material on a test well at Coppert's Switch, and about two miles east of St. Jo. This well is to be drilled by Wichita Falls and Burk Burnett operators.

Escrow papers and forfeit money is being put up on another deal which calls for a test within 90 days. This will be an interesting test also. A geologist is to make the location.

Several wells are being planned out north, but is hardly probable that any of them will be under steam until after the hot weather is over.

With reference to the surrounding oil fields, this county has the best location of any undeveloped district of the Red River region. Keep your eye on Montague county.

the name of the man who to my mind was the greatest constructive American statesman that ever lived."

Long before noon the delegations began to tramp on one another's heels and the candidate had to abandon hope of shaking hands with all of those who came. He took his position on the steps of his porch, and smilingly waved acknowledgements as the howling throng marched past.

One of the show spots of the procession was the American Republican Club of Pittsburgh, which in flowing black capes and high grey stove pipes and carried star spangled parasols.

Senator Harding got an extra round of applause from the delegation when he led Mrs. Harding down the steps and presented her as "the head of this family."

MARION, O., July 22.—Senator Warren G. Harding was to be notified today of his nomination for the presidency, but it was not to be quite as simple that—anyhow he had already suspected it.

Some 10,000 words were to be exchanged in the presence of some 50,000 neighbors, friends and distant acquaintances, between Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, chairman of the notification committee, and the candidate.

It was a great day for Harding's home town. From all over Ohio and from many distant states the pilgrims came. They poured out of every train and moved in cheering detachments through gaily decorated streets toward the Harding home for a glimpse of the candidate before going on to Garfield park, where the formal notification ceremonies were to take place at 2 p. m.

Autos came in over every road and early in the forenoon they had packed the narrow streets until it seemed the place could hold no more.

Over 50 special railroad trains were run. Visitors passed through as colonades as they entered Mount Vernon avenue and paused beneath the court of honor constructed by local friends in front of the Harding home, over the protests of the candidate, who had desired the utmost simplicity. There was nothing to mark the Harding house for strangeness except that all faces were turned towards it.

Delegates marched up waving banners and Harding penants. The arrival of each delegation at the front porch brought Senator Harding out for greeting. Calls for Mrs. Harding brought her out with her husband many times.

Ballers Flap. The day's activities got under way at 1 o'clock when Senator Harding raised the flag on the old weather beaten pole which stood on the McKinley lawn in Marion during his porch campaign in 1916.

A delegation of militant suffragists was due at 1 o'clock, headed by Miss Alice Paul of the national women's party. They carried banners calling on Harding to urge an unanimous republican vote in the Tennessee legislature for the suffrage amendment. Mrs. H. C. Havemeyer and Miss Rue White.

DRAFT DESERTERS ROUND-UP PLANNED

100,000 Scattered Throughout Country; Harris Goes On Warpath For Scamps.

By A. L. BRADFORD, WASHINGTON, July 22.—A nationwide roundup of more than 100,000 draft deserters will be started soon by the war department as a final effort to bring to justice men who failed to answer the call to America's draft army during the war, Adjutant General Peter O. Harris said today.

The war department is preparing a mammoth list of names of men who can be classified as actual draft deserters. This list, expected to be completed soon, was estimated to contain names of 100,000 "blackers."

Operatives of the detection agencies of the federal, state and municipal governments are to be called on to assist in the round-up, it is said.

The final list of draft deserters will be published as the first step in the round-up.

Fifty dollars reward will be offered for delivery of a deserter.

Every man of the war department's "blacker list" will be subject to military court martial, General Harris said. They will be in the same category as Erwin Bergdoll, brother of the more notorious deserter, Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, and who surrendered himself yesterday after being a fugitive since 1918.

The men on the list hearing completion are shown by war department records to have disregarded draft calls after they registered. The so-called draft evaders are those who failed to register.

FANS MUST CHANGE TACTICS IF BASEBALL IS TO REMAIN HERE

"This is one of the most disgraceful scenes I have ever seen on a ball field and should anything like it occur again, I will do all in my power to see that Wichita Falls is not granted a baseball franchise next year."

The above statement came from the lips of one of the high San Antonio club officials yesterday afternoon in the club house following a fan's unwarranted attack on Empire Miller. Just how much influence he would have in switching a franchise is not known, but his attitude is typical of that of many others.

Gambling and gambling alone was responsible for yesterday's outbreak at Athletic Park. Seldom, if ever, in the history of baseball was a home club been accorded the moral support that is being given the Spudgers. Gamblers are, in the main, responsible for the riding given the players, but there is another type of fan, which is not at all scarce at Athletic Park, which ought to be ousted.

Day in and day out, there are a half a dozen would-be rooters who sit in the front of the stand (some in the boxes) and do nothing but ride the players when they are losing. A fan pays his money for the privilege of hollering. It is true, but he ought to have more common sense than to sit at a game every day and pan the men for what HE thinks are bones. Some times he calls the play right, but more often he does not. He is the laughing stock of the people around him, but hasn't got brains enough to realize it. People have been known to stay away from the Park rather than go and see the continual din that is created by a few. It is a well known fact that an empty barrel will make more noise than a full one.

The incident in the club house was by no means the only disgraceful scene that occurred at yesterday game. Manager Sam corrected one of his players, for evidently disobeying orders. The player took it upon himself to argue on the diamond and was told to get back into the game and argue later. Instead of upholding Manager Sam for correcting his men when they should be corrected, these same would-be rooters proceeded to hop on him and he immediately became the target for unnecessary abuse. It's a safe bet that 99 per cent of the fans did not even know that the manager and players were talking about. Yet they hollered. Why? If a club manager hasn't the inalienable right to correct his men when and where he sees fit, who has?

The local fans will certainly have to change their tactics if baseball is to remain in Wichita. The big majority of fans want baseball here; but the guy who said that "one rotten apple will spoil a barrel of good ones," spoke volumes. If the fans would get after the few would-be's and the numerous gamblers and refuse to countenance their methods, the game would be a whole lot better off.
