





### SWANSON TENDERS HIS FELICITATIONS

#### Congratulates Johnson On His Victory In Winning Legislative Nomination.

Showing a fine spirit of good sportsmanship and a desire to be of service in the future, and taking his defeat philosophically, F. G. Swanson today sent a letter of congratulation to B. F. Johnson, winner in Saturday's fight to obtain the democratic nomination for representative in the state legislature from the 101st district.

Swanson's letter follows: "Dear Mr. Johnson: I hereby submit cordial congratulations on your brilliant victory in the Democratic primary for nomination for representative in the legislature. The unofficial returns from the primary as published will in all probability be confirmed by the official figures. I indicate that you have carried every precinct in the district including Wichita and Wilbarber counties by a plurality vote, that you also carried most of them by a majority vote, and at least one by unanimous vote, which unquestionably most conclusively nominates you for representative and in view of party status insures your election in November."

"I have never in politics or otherwise tried to make or create 'principles' or obstinate opposition out of what the but differences of opinion to which all are entitled. Democratic methods in elections provide methods for determination of questions on which opinions are held and for choice of individuals to act as representatives, and for period of office, decision in primaries and elections should be respected."

"Primary, election, and party decisions as well as all politics at best are but series of compromises of composite individual views to secure the maximum for all in decisions made for the time being, and being methods provided for self-governing people to determine questions and to be respected in law and order and respect for the law, cheerfully accept all such decisions, as I think all should to avoid chaos, lost motion, etc., and to secure best team work for accomplishing results for benefit of all in the district. The Wichita spirit that has accomplished so much for the community in the past is widely known. Notwithstanding differences of opinion, 'grafting', 'grafting', a sort of let-down in morale throughout society that has also affected Wichita Falls and surrounding territory, there are none who should not be able to face the facts; all cease trying to 'pass the buck' and excuse themselves because others also are involved, and all in efforts to reorganize social forces for continued development and progress for all, might for the future try to see others as they see themselves. There is no good reason why such policy can not be adopted as regards all measures that will come within your province as a legislator, at least, and progress in better roads, better roads, better efficiency in expenditure of taxes should result."

Notwithstanding physical strain, I have enjoyed the campaign, and the better knowledge of the political and social problems, views of voters and opponents, and accepting most cheerfully the verdict at the polls and the designation of the next representative for the 101st district, assure you and your supporters I am most willing at all times to do at least my part in meeting the obligations of all citizens to cooperate and work together for the best interests of the district, and in line with good sportsmanship which I think has characterized the campaign. I hope there will be no reluctance on your part or associates in calling for whatever aid may be at any time rendered."

### CLYDE ROACH, FIREMAN, HURT IN TRUCK FALL

Clyde Roach, fireman of No. 3 Truck company, was dangerously hurt early Sunday morning, when he fell from the seat of the truck heading into the street as the truck was breaking thirty miles an hour in answer to an alarm at Call field. Roach was rushed to the Call field hospital, where it was found his shoulder blade and several ribs had been broken. He was reported "resting comfortably" today, and is expected to recover.

The fireman had complained of feeling ill only a short time before the alarm sounded for a fire at the Motor Tavern near the former aviation field. With the truck running at practically its speed limit it was remarkable that Roach was not more seriously injured. The fire was out before the firemen arrived. The tavern, a one-story frame structure, was about one-third wrecked by flames and water. The origin of the blaze is unknown.

Raw wool is almost unobtainable at any price, but finished woolen goods are showing no depreciation, and the shutdown of the American Woolen company's mills probably is intended to bear further the price of wool and to bull further the price of woolens. Wool and woolen products now take their place alongside the anomaly of cheap hides and high priced shoes, and add further to the puzzle of the producer who has wool and hides to sell and of the ultimate consumer, who has woolen garments and leather shoes to buy at prices higher than modern times have known before. "A great deal is heard of reasons why no substantial reductions in prices may be expected," notes the New York Times market commentator, who is usually well informed on the true inwardness of things, "but not enough of the necessity of scaling down profits. The latter seems to be something which each factor wishes the other to take into account and put in practice. The absence of mutualism in this price scaling, he thinks, is the cause of the fact that so few orders are being placed except in small quantities because the buyers 'seem convinced that they will gradually acquire what they need at constantly lowered levels. They are not disturbed by reports of shutdowns of mills and factories. . . . They are rather concerned with the question of what kind of demand they will have from the general public unless the prices of goods can be materially reduced." One reads today that prices of clothing are to tumble, but next day one sees an authoritative denial and that higher prices can be expected. One has heard of the "peak" of high prices being reached, only to read later on that the advance on necessities of life during the current month was anywhere from 1 to 5 per cent and that the average increase runs around 2 per cent over the past year or so. How much of the continued increase is natural, resultant from short production, strong demand and a plenitude of currency no man definitely knows. But Samuel Untermyer, urging that high prices, taxation and election expenditures be made subjects of discussion in the pending national campaign, charges that "never have the percentages of profits or the returns on capital in business been so extortionate. Among the manufacturers and middlemen every department of industry is honey-combed with pools, combinations, secret understandings or gentlemen's agreements. The laws that were intended to restrain these combinations have completely broken down. . . . Public regulation, publicity as to costs and taxation, are the only remedies and the need for them has become imperative. There is something economically unsound and morally indefensible in present conditions. There is no question that is touching so many people's lives as these—the low prices of the raw products and the exorbitant prices for the finished products. The demand for some action that will either improve the situation or disclose 'what happens in the dark' to point the way to curative action is growing stronger; Mr. Untermyer's suspicions express the inchoate thought that has lain in many minds.

That there are fewer heat prostrations since the city went dry is the belief of the New York City Health department, basing the belief on observations made during June. Men not saturated with alcohol, department officials told reporters, stand up better and work better in hot weather than do drinking men. "Now that the universal habit of drinking has passed," said Dr. Royal S. Copeland, New York Health Commissioner, "I believe we are going to have fewer 'sunstrokes.' . . . Here is another way of looking at it—less money spent in drink means more money with which to buy other things, and so some of those who might have become victims of the heat are now so well fortified with good food that their strength has mounted until they are past the danger mark." (he formerly had also been wet). The wet had abandoned all desire for the open saloon, but he said he still wanted his wine and beer. The dry told him that he too, used to be that way, but he wasn't that way any more. "Four years from now," the former wet told the present wet, "there'll not be enough delegates for a wet plank to secure a roll call"—which needs only one-fifth of the national convention. The light wine and beer plank in the platform received the vote of every wet delegate at San Francisco. From previous announcements the contest was expected to be very close. But just 356 votes were cast for the plank with 726½ against; and 276½ of the 356 came from eight states. And of the fifty-odd delegations, while many were unanimously opposed to the wine and beer plank, just one—New Jersey's twenty-eight—was recorded unanimously in favor of the Cockran resolution. There are more prohibitionists in the United States today by many thousands than there were on January 16 last. Their number will increase steadily the longer dry conditions last.

**SITTING UPON THE SAFETY VALVE**

"I really love her with all my heart and yet she has little mannerisms that get on my nerves so that I have to go out of the house to keep from bursting out about them," a husband once told me in regard to his wife. (It seems like an intimate thing to discuss with a third person; but we were all three very dear friends and he meant no disrespect.) "Why on earth don't you tell her about them, pleasantly? She'd be glad to get rid of them, I know." "Oh, would she?" he said. "I think I've tried that and several things but I know her too well." "What happened?" "When he tried the Safety Valve. . . . Well, here's one example. She has a way of humming when she is working and she always hums the same tune—and always out of tune—you know she can't keep a tune to save her life. Well, one day when I was terribly tired I said to myself, 'I'll try to try a new tune if she hums that one.' I said it jokingly and I thought everything would be all right, but not a lot of it. She laughed with me at first and stopped humming, but then she got that silent, depressed way she always has when something is wrong and by and by it came out—I didn't love her the way I used to because I used to like to hear her hum even if she didn't keep the tune. I just put up with things whether I like them or not. It's the easiest way."

**The Easiest But Dangerous Way**

But one could see from the expression on his face as he said it that it was not the pleasant way, and that the cumulative effect was most unfortunate. "Do you know what I think that wife was doing—sitting on the safety valve?" "It is almost inevitable that any two people should have small mannerisms, little not very pleasant tricks that wear heavily upon each other in the close contacts of married life. . . . Mostly these mannerisms are things that could easily be gotten rid of, and would be if each allowed the other a reasonable degree of frankness about them. Under such conditions they are harmless. . . . But when either party resents any suggestion that improvements could be made, and takes the 'There was a time when you wouldn't have noticed' attitude, then a condition of high pressure that may lead to real trouble may develop."

**The Other Side of the Case**

"I think women are more apt to take this attitude than men—partly, I suppose, because love means more to women than to men, and because they have more mental leisure to think about it. But men are sometimes guilty, too. . . . Of course it isn't an easy thing to tell people about their mannerisms, and the man who does it carelessly or roughly or derisively, instead of as gently and tactfully as possible, is as much to blame for future trouble as the woman who 'sits on the safety valve.'"

Of the Nine Diamonds Called the "Curse of Scotland!" (Copyright, 1920, by Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.)

Of the many interesting explanations of this problem, probably the most satisfactory is that which is connected with massacre of Glencoe. The order for this slaughter was signed by the Earl of Stair, John Dalrymple, then Secretary of State of Scotland and the man who was instrumental in bringing about the union between England and Scotland. The coat of arms of the Dalrymples bore nine lozenges or diamonds on the shield and it was because of this, according to many students of heraldry, that the expression arose. It is a certainty that the phrase goes back at least to 1715 because on October 21 of that year, there appeared a caricature showing the young Chevalier attempting to lead a herd of bulls across the river Tweed, with the nine diamonds lying before them. Another ingenious explanation is the one which is connected with the theft of the crown of Queen Mary, which contained nine diamonds. To replace these, a heavy tax was levied upon the Scotch—a tax which was referred to as "the curse of the nine diamonds."

## DISAPPEARING BEDS MANHATTAN CRAZE

Person Cannot Disappear Inside The Wall With Knees Up And Mouth Open.

NEW YORK, July 24.—Residents of Manhattan Island, in their eternal flight for space, have perked up their ears at the announcement by a New York realty syndicate that it will build a \$450,000 apartment house, whose distinguishing feature will be "disappearing beds." Officials of the syndicate are silent as to what form the "disappearing beds" will take during the day time. They dismiss the matter by saying that "disappearing beds" and many other labor saving devices will be installed.

Architects, however, have given their opinion on the proposed innovation. The beauty of "disappearing beds" is that the bed cannot disappear while the occupant is lying in it on his back, with his knees up and his mouth open. This was the chief drawback to the old-fashioned folding bed, or contained any of the latter's cranks and "uncertain tendencies."

The architects say that a "disappearing bed" is a bed at night and an oil-burning lamp at day. It is a bed that can be slipped under the bathroom floor or tucked away behind the aquarium, or that it may be sunk into a trap door in the floor and an Oriental rug placed over it, so that the tell-tale cracks may not be seen.

## REPORT OIL OPERATIONS IN BAYLOR COUNTY

The Baylor County Banner publishes the following concerning oil operations in that county:

The Harry Van Ness Oil Syndicate began the drilling of an oil well on their lease five miles southwest of Seymour on a contract that called for 2,000 feet. After that depth was reached formations seemed so favorable that it was proposed to drill to a depth of 4,000 feet. However, on account of legal complications, this project has not yet been financed. Therefore, a proposition has been put up to home people for them to complete the well and have a share in all that has been done thus far.

In brief the proposition is this: \$10,000 will be raised locally for the purpose of sinking the well another thousand feet. Those who put up this money will acquire half interest in a well that has cost about \$80,000, with exception that casing and machinery are reserved. The deal also gives to the new company a half interest in the 160 acres on which the well is located, and all of the 160-acre Tackitt tract adjoining the well. Home people will have entire charge of drilling operations. Messrs. Romick and Lawrence will continue the drilling, and they have each taken a nice share in the project. A large part of the money has been raised and those behind the plan believe the proposition will succeed. The fact that Messrs. Romick and Lawrence are going into it show their faith in the well. In fact, there has been much general faith in this well all along. A showing of oil has been encountered, but was mixed with water and had to be cased off. Good progress is being made on near-
