

LEAGUE MUST HAVE ECONOMIC BLOCKADE

Nations Would Not Be in Position to Cause Trouble With Such a Blockade

SAN BERNARDINO, SPAIN, July 29.—The nations would not be in position to cause trouble with such a blockade, according to a statement issued here today by the League of Nations council in a talk with news paper correspondents on the program of the council which opens its eighth meeting here tomorrow. He considered the meeting an important one because among other things the blockade question was comprised in its agenda. If an economic blockade was applied to a nation which defied the League, Mr. Hainford said he could not believe that nation would be able to resist for long. "A nation would destroy itself in these civilized times by inviting such a penalty," he added. "It is not likely it will often be used since it is not probable the league will offer to defend."

TWO KILLED AND SIX HURT IN TRAIN WRECK

SHERMAN, TENN., July 29.—Two persons were dead today and six injured, one seriously, the result of a collision nine miles southwest of here yesterday between a big gasoline tank truck and a freight motor car. Flames which enveloped the wreckage after the crash were responsible for the injuries of a majority of those hurt. One Allen, Sherman, truck driver, was instantly killed, and C. E. Hamilton, Dallas, died a few hours after being rescued from the flaming motor car by a negro passenger. A. J. Hall, Memphis, Tenn., was most seriously injured, others burned or likewise hurt included Kenneth Shipley, Sherman, William P. Q. Hunter, Honey Grove, Texas, and Roy and J. S. Vandevanter, Frisco, Texas. High speeds at the crash were believed to have prevented Allen from seeing the speeding motor car.

JOHNSON NOT SATISFIED WITH PRIVATE BATH CELL

CHICAGO, July 29.—Although confined in a cell with a private bath, Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, today expressed his disapproval of the Geneva, Ill., jail to which he was removed because the sheriff at the Joliet, Ill., jail permitted Johnson to take an automobile ride and partake of ice cream sodas. Johnson complained that Sheriff Toole of Geneva is not allowing him to live in the style to which he is accustomed. The negro pugilist also is dissatisfied with his lawyer and said he was going to get another one. Johnson is in jail pending federal action for bail. He is under sentence for violation of the Mann act.

MAN REFUSE SIGN MURDER CONFESSION BECAUSE COP MISPELLED MANY WORDS

NEW YORK, July 29.—Robert Baron, 30 years old, of Brooklyn, was taken to Bellevue hospital early today for psychiatric examination as a result of his alleged confession to responsibility for the murder of Patrolman William of Rochester, for which crime Elmer Hyatt was electrocuted last night at Ossining. Baron, who the police say typed his confession, refused to sign it after being told that Hyatt had been executed an hour before. "My life hinges on this; I must see my lawyer first," he said. He also refused to sign a similar statement written by a detective, on the ground that it contained too many misspelled words. Baron's actions following his arrest which was effected while he was telephoning police headquarters, led the police to send him to the hospital for mental examination.

ROUMANIA OIL LEGISLATION NOT DIRECTED FOREIGNERS

NEW YORK, July 29.—Proposed legislation in Roumania relating to the oil supply of that country is not intended to discriminate against foreigners, according to Charles J. Vopicka, for seven years American minister at Bucharest, who has just arrived here on a visit to his family. The oil industry of Roumania promises a great future, Mr. Vopicka said, and American capital should be interested in its development. Roumania, he said, wishes to enter into a "fifty-fifty" agreement with outside business organizations.

CAPTAIN KILLED BY GALVESTON SENTRY

Officers' Refusal to Halt Ends in His Death at Hands of Soldier

GALVESTON, July 30.—Herbert A. Robertson, a veteran of the world war and captain of the local company of national guardsmen, which was shortly to go on duty here with other state troops under the command of General Wolters, was shot and killed early this morning by a sentry at the national guard camp, Thirty-Ninth street and Boulevard. According to information available Robertson was passing the camp in this automobile and when he either failed to hear or disregarded the command of the sentry to halt was fired upon. He died a few minutes later in the emergency hospital at the camp. Robertson had been a frequent visitor at camp and during yesterday and last night had been looking up the men of his company who were shortly to go on duty with other state troops here. At the outbreak of the war with Germany Robertson went to the first officers' training camp at Leon Springs, and overseas with the 9th division as first lieutenant of artillery and later served as aide to division commander. Military authorities are making a thorough investigation of the affair.

ON SECOND READING OF ORDINANCE CITY COUNCIL ADDS CHARGE FOR TRANSFERS

ELECTION ORDERED TO VOTE ON PAVING ORDINANCE

To Investigate Price of Ice—Lease Oil Co. Engineering Department—Grant Pond Laundry Permit

The Wichita Falls Traction company last evening won its fight for a fare increase minus the burden of free transfers. After passing on two readings a franchise amendment raising the fare rate to six cents but insisting upon the issuance of transfers free to the traveling public, the city council yesterday reversed itself on the transfer question and voted to permit the company to charge two cents for each transfer issued.

The action of the council followed a lengthy discussion in the course of which minor differences of opinion developed among the aldermen. When the traction company's application for a fare increase first came before the council several weeks ago, Alderman W. S. Currie, the acting mayor in the absence of Mayor W. D. Cline, recommended the granting of an increase without the imposition of the necessary burden on the company. Currie stood pat yesterday on his recommendation, stating that in his opinion a fare rate of six cents should be granted without transfers.

Alderman W. N. Bonner, who, as public utilities commissioner, investigated the request for the traction company, clung to his earlier expressed conviction that transfers are necessary; that many working men and women now are forced to walk several blocks to their work or pay a double fare. In view of this condition, Alderman Currie declared his willingness to withdraw objection to the transfers, if a reasonable charge might be made by the company for them. He pointed out that a raise in rates of one cent will barely permit the traction company, after several years of operation at a loss, to break even on its investment. Mayor Cline, who also is persuaded that the company is seriously in need of city aid in the matter, has for some time favored granting a larger increase than six cents with an understanding that improvements in equipment and service should be pledged by the company. Inasmuch as the company, however, has not asked for more than six cents, the council finally voted to compromise the matter, and to amend the franchise as to provide for a six-cent fare with a charge of two cents extra on each transfer issued at the intersection of Lamar and Tenth streets.

Acting on a petition presented by the chamber of commerce, and hearing over 200 signatures, the city council directed the city attorney to draw up the papers necessary to order an election to consider the adoption of a general paving law, in keeping with the provisions of the state statute. Such a law will provide for assessing part of paving costs against property owners, under a long-term, partial payment plan. The exact details of the measure will be made public by City Attorney Mann within the coming week.

Complaints made recently to various members of the council in protest against the price of ice cents for ice resulted in a council vote for Alderman Bonner to investigate. CHICAGO, July 29.—Coal operators of the central competitive field were to try their hand today at soothing miners of Indiana and Illinois striking industry by their unauthorized strikes.

The executive committee of the operators' association meeting here was first to consider an invitation from John L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers for a joint meeting to cure all miners' ills.

Indiana operators were unanimously against the joint conference today. They disclosed authority to change the award of the bituminous coal commission without government sanction. They challenged Lewis to have the miners return to work, assure the public's fuel supply and then obtain authority to consider wage changes. Lewis and the union, charged with forcing miners to abide by the contract have "ignored agreement with operators, Indiana producers claimed. Illinois operators declared they do not oppose the joint session but would stand against wage advances until authorized by federal authorities.

Ohio and western Pennsylvania representatives refused to make known their stand.

Refusal of the operators, to confer with union officials, it was believed would halt negotiations for a return to work until there is federal intervention. President Wilson has been appealed to for action. He was expected to enter the controversy as soon as Secretary of Labor Wilson presents recommendations. Tentative plans for a county commercial organization have been formulated by the committee, but no action will be taken until the views of business men at the towns mentioned have been ascertained. It is felt that there are many matters affecting the county as a whole, in the consideration of which the other towns should be represented. It is not the intention to have an organization that will be merely an adjunct to the chamber of commerce, but to give Iowa Park, Electra and Burkburnett an opportunity to accomplish things for the county as a whole and for their respective communities.

FOUR MEN LET OUT IN POLICE SHAKE-UP

"For the Good of Department is Only Reason Assigned for the Dismissals

Affairs in the Wichita Falls police department are running smoothly, and without discord—according to surface indications. But beneath the surface a quiet shake-up and weeding out process is going on steadily.
Two city patrolmen received their "swaking papers" yesterday. Two more will turn in their badges today. The discharges were ordered by Police Commissioner Bradley, who is quietly checking up on the men in the department, his object, it is reported, being to have a "clean house" to turn over to the new chief of police. No direct charges of any kind were made against the men discharged, their dismissals being ordered merely at the commissioner's discretion and "for the good of the department."
Who will succeed goodfellow as chief still remains a matter of mystery and conjecture. The question came up late last evening at the close of the regular city council meeting, but no action developed. Mayor Cline stated that Commissioner Bradley has in mind no particular man for the position, although a number of men have been under consideration.
"Perhaps I have had my sights aimed too high," the mayor added. "I have hoped to get a big man for the job, one with brains and executive ability—but I must admit that is not an easy task."
The aldermen voted agreed with the mayor that the post demands a man of more than mere police ability, and he called attention to the problem that the police department has presented in the last two years. In the main, however, the aldermen had little to say regarding the subject and they were apparently glad to table the matter.
Goodfellow's term as police chief expires tomorrow night, and present indications are that the department will be without a head for at least another week. Lee Huff, chief of detectives, will continue in the meantime to handle routine police matters, under the general supervision of the police commissioner.

Special Election Aug. 22 For County Superintendent

Failure of the state laws to provide for the appointing of a successor in case of a vacancy in the office of county superintendent will necessitate having a special election in Wichita county. The special election will be held on the same date of the runoff primary election, August 22.
E. C. Hall, the regularly elected county superintendent tendered his resignation several months ago and the board of County Commissioners in good faith met and appointed Burl Bryant as the successor.
The validity of this was never questioned. In practically all cases where vacancies occur in county offices the statutes provide that the county commissioners have the power and authority to name the successor to fill out the unexpired term.
With this in mind, upon the acceptance of Mr. Hall's resignation, the board met and appointed Mr. Bryant. No one ever questioned the legality of the procedure, but it was discovered that the attorney general had at some previous years made a decision on this statute.
The statute is clear in every respect but does not contain a single word or clause as to how a vacancy in this seat of office is to be filled. The attorney general's ruling at that time was that since the statute did not provide for the appointing of a successor nor invest authority in any body to appoint a successor the vacancy should be filled by a direct vote of the people since they originally elected the man to office.
It is pointed out that in other places there have been instances where the county commissioners have appointed a man to fill out an unexpired term and in this case the legality has never been questioned. However, in order to avoid any possible complications it has been decided to hold this special election to elect a county superintendent on August 22.
The present term of the county superintendent expired in November, 1920.

BREAD PRICES INCREASE 6.16 PER CENT IN YEAR

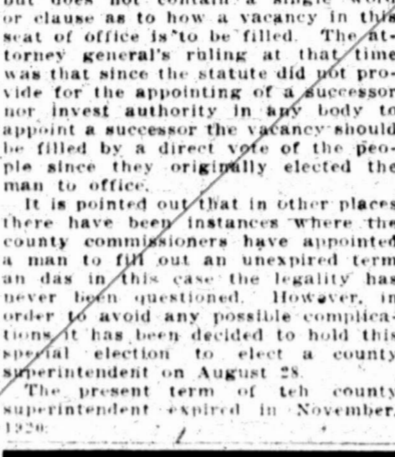
NEW YORK, July 29.—The staff of life has increased 6.16 per cent in price in the last year, according to a compilation of statistics of bread prices in forty leading cities of the country.
Today the average price of a pound of bread is 11.72 cents as against 11.05 a year ago.
A loaf of bread today weighs anywhere from ten ounces to two pounds and the price from eight cents to a quarter. The average is an 18.32 ounce loaf costing 13.44 cents.
New York pays 15 cents for a 22 ounce loaf, Chicago 17 cents for a 20 ounce loaf.
Des Moines boasts the most expensive bread, 14 ounces for 15 cents while Philadelphia a pound costs but nine cents.
The middle west despite its grain fields runs almost a cent to the pound more than eastern cities.
Harrisburg, Pa., and Lincoln, Nebr., are the only cities which show a decline in the price of bread during the last two years.

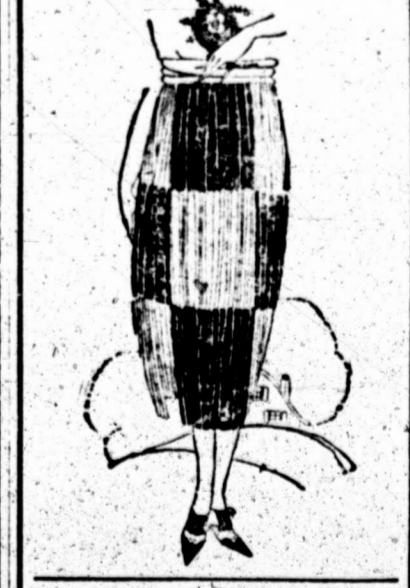

SOME OFFICIALS WANT CONVICT CAMP FOR JAIL PRISONERS

Lively discussions have arisen in and about the county court house and much argument is being presented pro and con. The question which is one worthy of consideration has grown out of the ever increasing number of prisoners held in the county jail.

The statement that a convict camp should be established in order to keep all prisoners busy with a pick and shovel on the county roads caused this stir.

In the presentation of the idea it was claimed that should a camp of this nature be instituted it would keep many men who are inmates of the jail busily occupied and would prevent them from working out the sweet little formula of a smuggled case knife plus an overloading lavatory equals liberty.

It was further argued that should the men convicted of various charges who are serving terms in the county jail be made to improve county roads that it would prove a better remedy towards the making of peaceful and respectful citizens.

As a furtherment of the argument it is stated that it would tend to reduce the percentage of crime, as it is believed that men who endeavor to earn their daily bread by appropriating some one else's property are the kind who would fear widdling the pick and shovel under the rays of the Texas sun.

The rebuttal on the argument seems equally strong. Several men believe that should such an institution be placed in the county there are only one or two men in the county who could make the men work, and if these men were placed in charge the humane society would be kept busy with forced investigations.

Another man stated that there was foolishness in the idea as the number of men who could legally be made to work on the roads are so few in number that it would not be worth while.

He said that it was his belief the majority of men in the jail were men awaiting trial and federal prisoners who could not be made to work.

A county official who is in position to know argues against the idea, stating that there were to his belief about four men who could be made to work and that they were being employed keeping the court house yard free from rubbish and long grass.

NURSERY MILK SUPPLY INADEQUATE FOR NEEDS

Two gallons of sweet milk are required to meet the needs at the Day Nursery in Lamar street where mothers leave their little tots for the day. The supply thus far has only been one gallon and among the many sympathizers of this institution, Mrs. Cusley, who is in charge, hopes to find some philanthropic person, business or organization who would gladly assist toward the fulfillment of this want.

Through the means of a pound party being held Friday afternoon from 2:00 to 5:00 o'clock, the nursery was the recipient of many of the necessities required for the maintenance of an institution of this kind.

BRAVE LITTLE LAD GIVEN SURGICAL AID BY WELFARE COUNCIL

For the past week, a small 10-year old lad, plain but neatly clad has come hobbling up the sidewalk leading to the day nursery. The little fellow is lame and is to be admired, but yet a feeling of pity must not be forgotten.

As he hobbles up the walk he is careful to place his right foot gently and then endeavor vainly to keep from putting the weight of his small body upon it. His foot has swollen to such a size that nothing but his father's shoe could encase it.

The boy is a plucky little fellow. In fact, perhaps too plucky, for this was the cause of his misfortune. He could ride a horse and ride well for a little fellow. But two months ago a horse he was riding proved master of the situation and his rider was thrown. The little fellow recovered himself and laughed. Only his little toe had been hurt, and that didn't hurt very much.

But the little toe soon started to hurt. The larger it got the more it seemed to hurt. The little toe turned red and then to a purplish hue. Through a break in the skin emerged a splintered bone. Through all this our little fellow has kept his pluck and courage.
