BOLSHEWIK FORCES CONTINUE TO DRIVE POLISH ARMY BACK

HASTY EFFORTS MADE TO THROW UP DIRT FORTIFICATIONS AGAINST REDS

WARSAW DREADS THE OUTCOME OF RED DRIVE

Red Cavalry Raiders are Within Sixty Miles of Warsaw, Forcing Poles to Evacuate

LONDON, Aug. 2.—With the bolsheviks demanding a surrender of Poland as the price of peace, fighting is continuing near Warsaw and Lemberg, according to the official communiques of both sides, received here today.

A Basle dispatch from bolshevik sources said the bolshevik delegates had informed the Polish representatives the offensive would not halt until they had agreed to turn their country over to bolshevik military occupation for five years, surrender all war material, give up several big cities and seven per cent of their railroad equipment.

The bolshevik official statement received here today by wireless, showed the red troops advancing at Lomsha, 90 miles northwest of Warsaw, and at Bielek, 100 miles east of it. However, to confirm the reported capture of Brest-Litovsk. The reds were 20 miles northeast of that fortress at Kobryn, according to the bolshevik official dispatch from Warsaw said the soviet cavalry raiders were operating sixty miles north of that city. They apparently were scouting considerably in advance of the main forces and this indicated Polish resistance had virtually ceased in that particular area. The Warsaw communique placed the bolsheviks at Brody, 45 miles east of Lemberg.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—The main bolshevik forces are operating northeast and east of Warsaw at distance ranging between 90 and 120 miles from the Polish capital, according to the soviet official communiques from Moscow today.

"In the direction of Lamsa (80 miles northwest of Warsaw) we forced the Bohar and Naral rivers," the wireless said.

"We advanced to the westward of Bielek (110 miles northeast of Warsaw) and occupied Bielek (approximately 100 miles east of Warsaw) and the Bieleveshel station.

"Northeast of Kobryn we occupied a number of villages, breaking through the resistance of the Polish troops."

Kobryn is 20 miles northeast of Brest-Litovsk, unofficially reported to have fallen to the reds. The communique indicated fighting at various places on a 150 mile front.

Lemberg is in Danger. LONDON, Aug. 2.—Russian forces are 55 miles from the important Polish city of Lemberg on the direct line of the railway leading to Warsaw, according to Warsaw official communiques received here at 1:10 p. m. today.

"Fighting at Brody (45 miles east of Lemberg) is continuing, according to our sources," the statement said. "The Russian losses at Toporov were very heavy. The bolshevik chief of staff was among those killed. Our troops have pushed attacks along the Sereth River."

Red Demands. PARIS, Aug. 2.—The bolshevik armistice delegation has been confronted by the following demands from the bolsheviks, according to a Basle dispatch today, quoting a soviet source:

The Poles must renounce claims to Vilna, Minsk, Grodno and Cholm. All war materials and seven per cent of the nation's total rolling stock must be surrendered.

Poland must submit to military occupation for five years. The Russians shall be permitted to take over Poland's coal and salt mines as security for the soviet administration in that country until 1921 after which the Poles will be allowed to decide on their future form of government.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Bolshevik cavalry raiders are operating 80 miles north of Warsaw, according to a dispatch from the Polish capital, received here at 4:00 a. m. today.

At an early hour today no definite word had come of the Russian-Polish armistice negotiations. British officials were plainly worried. They feared the reds intended to accomplish a complete Polish disaster rendering them absolutely helpless before imposing their drastic terms of peace.

The hot breath of battle was being felt in Warsaw today. Dispatches from that city told of a spirit of dread creeping through it, as news came of the advance of the bolsheviks continued unchecked. With Trotsky's armies menacing the capital from the north and the reds threatening to force for a desperate defense of the city itself. The people went into the fields with pick and shovel and under the direction of army engineers commencing throwing up earthworks on all sides. They labored at top speed, many falling exhausted. Meanwhile, the engineers were driving staves and mooring barbed wire across the principal roads down which red cavalry might swoop in a sudden descent upon the town.

Newspaper offices were besieged for word of the Polish armistice delegates who, under promise of the bolsheviks that the international armistice rules would be obeyed to the letter, had disappeared into the mysterious "out there" beyond the front, somewhere behind the soviet army's lines and from whom it was said some time since the ranks of the red troops closed at their heels.

Army Reorganization. At the war office every effort was being made to plan re-organization of the army so that some resistance could be offered in event the armistice failed. Huge war maps showed the recent gains of the reds and the staff officers with these maps before them, tried repeatedly to establish communication with the generals in the field.

This was very difficult owing to the radio silence which the armistice demanded. Marshal Pilsudski was dispatched to Lemberg to direct the defense of that important city, but it was feared it could not be held without reinforcements being sent there.

The war office was brought into visual contact with the results of recent battles as many detachments of staff officers were sent to the front.

COAL ESTIMATES SHOW MILLION BALE INCREASE IN JULY

GOOD GROWING WEATHER ATTRIBUTED FOR INCREASED PRODUCTION

11,450,000 BALES IS ESTIMATE FOR THIS YEAR

Crop Conditions are Seven Points Higher Than Reported This Time Last Year

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Increase of more than a million bales in the prospective production of cotton over the indicated yield a month ago, was forecast today by the department of agriculture. A total of 12,519,000 bales was estimated from the condition of the crop July 25, while 11,450,000 bales was forecast from the condition June 25.

Good growing weather during the last month caused much improvement in the prospects of the crop, the condition having advanced from 7.7 per cent of a normal in June 25 to 74.1 per cent on July 25. The crop's condition is seven points higher than it was a year ago and a little more than a point below the 10-year July average.

Condition of the crop by states on July 25 was: Virginia 74; North Carolina 77; South Carolina 77; Georgia 68; Florida 64; Alabama 67; Mississippi 71; Louisiana 71; Texas 74; Arkansas 78; Tennessee 76; Missouri 81; Oklahoma 85; California 85; Arizona 85. All other states 55.

Mexico Crop. WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—This year's cotton crop in Mexico probably will reach between 175,000 and 234,000 bales, Trade Commissioner Cunningham estimated today in a report to the department of commerce.

BANK'S DEPOSIT IS \$1,251,950 TODAY

Record Breaking Deposits Made in Wichita State Bank Today

Bandits Hold-Up Messenger and Escape with \$2,900

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 2.—Four negro bandits in a motor car today held up a negro messenger of the Troost Avenue Bank, snatching \$2,900 in cash, and escaping with \$10,000 and checks aggregating \$10,000 and \$50,000.

Followed Messenger. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 2.—Tente May, a negro messenger for the Troost Avenue Bank, on the way to the Commonwealth National Bank in an automobile today was held up by four negroes in another automobile at Twenty Third Street and Troost Avenue, and the money taken from him.

He and the four negroes followed almost from the time he left the bank with the money but at a distance. They closed on him at 23rd street, drew him into their automobile, and covering him with revolvers demanded the money. He gave it up.

First reports to the police were that the hold-up men had gotten \$2,900 but officials of the bank said later the loss was but \$2,900 and that it was in cash. There were no checks or other negotiable paper, they said.

COMMUNIST LEADERS WENT TO JURY TODAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—The case of William Brown Lloyd and nineteen others charged with participating in a conspiracy to overthrow the government, went to a jury in state criminal court at noon today.

By agreement of counsel, if a verdict were reached before five p. m., it was not to be announced before that hour. The trial, the first brought under the Illinois sedition law, is regarded as a test case and similar prosecutions in other parts of the country probably will hinge on the result of the Lloyd case.

Lloyd and his companions were specifically charged with organizing the communist labor party for the purpose of forming an alliance with the third international of Moscow and establishing a soviet government in the United States through the medium of a revolution that was to take the form of a general strike.

The arrests were made in the nationwide roundup of "reds" last New Year's day. Indictments were returned soon after. The trial began May 18, after 53 days had been spent in getting a jury.

COAL MINERS OBEY ORDER OF LEWIS TO RESUME THEIR WORK

STRIKE WHICH LASTED WEEKS AT END UPON ORDER OF PRESIDENT

PRODUCTION WILL BE NORMAL BY FRIDAY

Danger of Coal Famine Disappears and Officials Say Supply Will be Normal

By United Press. INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 2.—Coal miners who have been tying up the Illinois & Indiana fields by unauthorized strikes are returning to work today in compliance with the order of John L. Lewis, union president, according to word at headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America here.

"If the people do not get coal now it will not be the fault of the miners," a statement from miners headquarters said. "The statement said most of the miners who were idle last week are at work today."

"Numerous dispatches have been received at the headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America from local unions in Illinois and Indiana and all say the same thing—that the miners are returning to work in compliance with the order issued by John L. Lewis, international president," the announcement said.

"It is safe to say that a majority of the men who were idle last week are at work today and the others will be at work within the next day or two. They will produce all the coal the country needs, but it will be the duty of the railroads to haul it to the consumers. Of course the miners cannot do that. If the people do not get coal now it will not be the fault of the miners."

Lewis issued an order Saturday directing the miners to return to work, thus ending the strike of day men and monthly workers which suspended operation in most of the mines in the two states.

Return to Work. SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Aug. 2.—Coal is being hoisted in Illinois today. Many miners' locals held meetings yesterday and are back to work today, according to President Frank Farrington of the Illinois miners union today. Farrington estimated that 75 per cent of the men are working.

Officials of the operators' association, however, declared this figure is too high and stated many of the men will not return before Wednesday as a number of locals will not meet until this afternoon and tomorrow. While reluctant to give a definite estimate they indicated that probably 50 per cent of the workings of the state are in operation. They declare coal production will reach normal by Friday if the mines get sufficient cars to handle the output.

Coal Conspiracy. CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—Chief Justice Robert E. Crow, addressing the August state grand jury today, asked that jury to begin immediately an investigation to determine if there is "a criminal conspiracy in Cook county to bring about a coal famine for the purpose of manipulating prices."

"A coal famine threatens Chicago and unless it is relieved before winter, hardship, suffering and possibly death will result," he said.

Many of the principal bituminous operators of Illinois and Indiana have their headquarters in Chicago.

Refuse Obedy Orders. PEORIA, ILL., Aug. 2.—Disregarding the instructions of both their national president, John L. Lewis and Frank Farrington, state president, to return to work, not one of the 2,000 striking mine workers of the Peoria sub-district returned to the mines today.

BOOZE REPORTED PLENTIFUL IN THE BIG WINDY CITY

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—Booze is going into circulation in Chicago faster than prohibition officials can round it up, according to official reports made this afternoon.

Members of V. Dalrymple, federal enforcement officer, that from January 6 to July 1 his forces had confiscated \$2,100,000 worth of liquors. In the same period, according to Captain Hubert Howard, state prohibition agent, \$2,445,000 worth of liquor was stolen from licensed dealers.

TOLEDO, Aug. 2.—Frank Wisner, 35, of Clutier, Ia., is being held in the Tama county jail here charged with the murder of his uncle, Frank Linhart, 83, also of Clutier, while the two were on a fishing trip.

An indictment against Wisner was returned by the Tama county grand jury late Saturday. He was taken into custody early Sunday at his uncle's home where he resides.

The indictment alleges strychnine, concealed in sausage, caused Linhart's death. The men are alleged to have quarreled over money matters.

FRISCO TO SPEND OVER \$300,000 IN IMPROVEMENTS

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 2.—Three hundred thousand dollars will be spent in improving Frisco state lines, J. E. Hutchinson, general manager of the Frisco railway, announced today. Improvements amounting to \$28,000 will be made in Oklahoma City, Hutchinson said.

The improvements consist of additional round houses, stalls, engine pits, tracks, turn tables and the doubling of the Frisco traffic capacity.

DRUNK HOGS LANDS MAN BEHIND PRISON BARS

RED RIVER OIL CASE READY FOR TRIAL

Local Men in Oklahoma to Participate in Taking of the Testimony

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 2.—With the arrival today of Thomas M. Gregory, former United States attorney general, C. M. Cretton, attorney general of Texas and his assistant, W. A. Keeling, all was in readiness for introduction of testimony in the Red River case which will be taken on Wednesday August 4.

Judge R. H. Ward, representing the interests of the Haas Petroleum company, of Wichita Falls, and George Smoot, attorney for several Texas claimants to parts of the disputed river bed area, are in Oklahoma City for the hearing mentioned above.

It is probable that Judge A. H. Carrigan and Orville Bullington, local attorneys who are representing various lease and royalty owners interested in the Red River boundary contests, will not attend Wednesday's hearing. The testimony to be taken on that date, according to Judge Carrigan, concerns only the river bed property and does not affect any patented lands.

TYLER ON TRIAL FOR DEATH OF ROBERTSON

GALVESTON, Aug. 2.—The trial by a general court martial of Private J. C. Tyler of Center, Texas, the national guardsman who last Friday night shot and killed Captain Herbert A. Robertson, a citizen of Galveston and member of the national guard, was begun at Camp Blutchings at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon. The hearing was open to the public.

The shooting of Captain Robertson followed his failure to stop his automobile, which he was driving past the residence of the late captain's widow, who was on a sentry duty.

The trial of Tyler by court martial was begun despite demands of civil suit attorneys that the man be turned over to them. In announcing that the hearing would be open to the public, Brigadier General J. E. Wolters also invited the members of the Galveston county grand jury to attend the hearing.

Funerary services for Captain Robertson were held this morning under the auspices of the League of Nations, of which he was a member. General Wolters and his staff attended the funeral.

TEXAS THREATENED WITH SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

AUSTIN, TEX., Aug. 2.—Unless the proposed amendment to the state constitution removing the 50 per cent school tax limitation is adopted, a shortage of teachers will continue in Texas, Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, declared today.

Miss Blanton said salaries in northern and middle states are 100 per cent higher than in Texas, and this results in attracting many Texas teachers to those states. She declared, however, she believed Texas will retain a fairly proportion of teachers whose loyalty to their state is such that they prefer to work in Texas at a low salary than go elsewhere.

MARQUIS OF QUEENSBURY DIES IN SOUTH AFRICA

JOHANNESBURG, UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA, Aug. 1.—Percy Sholto Douglas, ninth Marquis of Queensbury, is dead here, according to an announcement.

The ninth Marquis of Queensbury was born October 13, 1868, succeeding to the title upon the death of his father in 1906. He was a former midshipman in the British navy and later was lieutenant in the third battalion of the King's Own Scottish Borderers. He was twice married and is survived by two sons and one daughter. His eldest son, Francis Archibald Keith Douglas, Viscount Brumlangen, will succeed to the title.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 2.—Employees of the Frisco lines not embraced in the wage award recently granted by the railway labor board will receive the same average increase as granted members of the various railroad brotherhoods. It was announced at the general offices of the road here today.

PONI DENIED CHARGES OF THE BOSTON POST

BOSTON, Aug. 2.—Charles Poni, the "bushel-basket millionaire," today emphatically denied charges made in an article published in the Boston Post today, that he is "hopelessly insolvent." The article was written by William H. McMaisters, whom Poni engaged as a publicity agent.

The charge of insolvency was expected to bring thousands of Poni's investors to the little office in Pl Alley today. The promoter declared he has twice as much as is needed to pay his obligations.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN THE WHITE HOUSE AND OHIO HAS BEEN LIMITED

COX NOTIFICATION WILL BE HELD ON SATURDAY

Formal Announcement is Expected After Conference Today

By ED L. KEEN. United Press Staff Correspondent. COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 2.—Relations between the democratic candidate for president and the present occupant of the White House are the subject of much speculation these days in the candidate's home state.

The fact that the nominee's communication with the White House has been limited to the one brief conference held with the president shortly after the convention as well as the fact that he has not submitted his forthcoming acceptance speech for the presidential O. K. is regarded by political observers generally as a deep significance, and by some as foreshadowing far-reaching consequences.

Various motives are ascribed, but the one prevailing opinion is that the Cox is determined that there shall be no misunderstanding as to the actual leadership of the party in this campaign. Some even go so far as to predict the practical shelving of "Wilsonism."

The text of the acceptance speech, which I haven't yet seen—will probably be mostly the same as the one which as Cox's attitude toward the president and his policies. Judging from recent developments, especially the statements made in Washington by chairman George White, of the democratic national committee and his rather obvious avoidance of the White House, the construction placed in some quarters upon the current political conference that the two were in complete accord, was not entirely correct.

Doubtless no points of difference in the course of the current comparatively brief conference which was of the most general character. Details, notably of the paramount issue, were not gone into. There was not sufficient time for even a casual discussion of the candidate's and the president's personal views as to "reservations." Therefore there was no opportunity for any expression of objection or approval of the particular manner in which Governor Cox intends to interpret the party platform's declarations regarding the League of Nations, etc.

Naturally, both are in accord with the platform. Wilson approved it at the time and Cox would not be the candidate today if he could not stand on it. However, there was quite enough justification for the harmony statements issued immediately after the conference.

Divergence of Opinion. But there is room for considerable divergence of opinion as to interpretation of the platform of the league issue. The Cox and Wilson ideas as to what constitutes a "reservation" are very likely to not run along parallel lines. If they do, say these political observers, the situation could be there to Cox's submission of his interpretation for the president's formal approval, before going to the country with it. As it is suggested, there may be details in the platform of other democratic principles, or even policies of administration in which the candidate does not agree entirely with the present incumbent.

The practical ignoring of the president by the candidate in the preparation of his acceptance speech is emphasized by the fact that his frequent consultations with other democratic leaders, but a still more striking illustration of the apparent lack of close co-operation between the candidate and the president, is the absence of reference to the Taft campaign in 1908 in which the then occupant of the White House (Roosevelt) played so prominent a part in the nomination process and deciding the activities of his "residual" legatees.

In no other quarters is interest in Cox's pronouncements of next Saturday less than among the republican campaign managers. For should it prove that Cox has actually, or in effect, cut away from the Wilson influence, they will be deprived of what they have considered one of their best talking points.

"Wilson is the best argument we have at this time," observed one of the leaders a few days ago. He is not so sure now.

Notification Announcement. By Associated Press. DAYTON, O., July 2.—Announcement of the formal program for next Saturday evening by Governor Cox, of his nomination for president by the democrats was expected following a conference today between the nominee and the Dayton arrangements committee.

A number of visiting delegations of the point event scheduled to precede the notification address of Senator Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, chairman of the San Francisco convention and the acceptance speech of Governor Cox. The governor has not been in communication with Senator Robinson for some time and the democratic national committee is trying to reach him.

The governor set aside today to confer with the nomination planning committee and with an extra stenographic force to clear his desk of state and personal papers. Preparations for Saturday's ceremonies and visitors.

Completion of the democratic campaign organization late this week, when many leaders are expected here for conferences with the presidential nominee, is expected including an announcement after approval of Governor Cox of the special campaign committee of fifteen members, which George White, chairman of the national committee has been composing.

Governor Cox hopes to secure considerable recreation, including golf and horse-back exercise this week, in training for the arduous traveling campaign ahead.

ROADS BEGIN WORK ON REVISION OF PRESENT TRANSPORTATION RATES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Reasons requiring an increase of interstate rates are very persuasive, it is declared in a report sent to various state railway commissions today by the three representatives of those commissions who sat with the interstate commerce commission during public hearings on the bill and a half dollar rate case.

"When all matters are considered," says the report, "and remembering that where 13 men are considering controverted questions and proposed policies their differences of opinion must be composed of deep significance, we believe that the conclusion, considering all things, is just and fair and we give it our approval."

The increase, as permitted under the ruling will probably go into effect September 1, 1920. The operating revenues of the railroads under present rates and conditions are recognized by all persons as insufficient. A part of the responsibility to meet the situation rests upon the state commissions. Such increases as will be made effective September 1, 1920. The report is signed by William D. H. Alney, chairman, public service commission of Pennsylvania; Royal C. Dunn, of the Florida railroad commission, and John A. Guher of the Iowa railroad commission.

Invited to Conference. "We participated in the conference in the same manner as members of the commission," the state commissioners' report declared, "and invited them to take part in the discussions and express our views with full freedom. The members of the commission gave to the case intense and efficient application, examining and discussing it with the evident desire to reach correct conclusions and apply the increase in such manner as to deal justly with the railroads."

"The questions presented were very numerous, involving the commerce of the whole country and the entire rail transportation of the United States, many of these questions being of complex character. Any decision of the case looking to the observance of the statute affects in some way every citizen of the United States."

"Speaking generally, every controverted question concerning all classes and commodities, and all rates, rules and practices of the rail carriers and all the theories of shippers and carriers were presented and urged in the testimony and in argument before the commission and given careful consideration in its deliberations."

"The commissioners were not of one mind on all questions and their conclusions in many cases were the result of compromise. It is the opinion of the other men who were taken into account, and that there must be some surrender by each before an agreement could be reached. In some instances the conclusion of the majority is not the view expressed in the ruling. On some of the questions our views were not in full accord with the majority and in some instances we three state commissioners did not have unanimity of view."

Readjustment of Rates. WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Readjustment of the whole rate system of the nation's transportation systems was started today with a view of putting in effect by September 1, the freight, passenger, mail and excess baggage and milk rate increases authorized last Saturday by the interstate commerce commission.

While tariff experts are working on the general rate schedules, the carriers will make applications to the various state commissions for advance in interstate rates to correspond to those in effect by September 1. ROADS BEGIN WORK ON REVISION OF PRESENT TRANSPORTATION RATES

EXPERT TARIFF MEN GET DOWN TO WORK ON JOB

Pullman Increases of Fifty Per Cent Was Opposed by Company Before Commission

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Reasons requiring an increase of interstate rates are very persuasive, it is declared in a report sent to various state railway commissions today by the three representatives of those commissions who sat with the interstate commerce commission during public hearings on the bill and a half dollar rate case.

"When all matters are considered," says the report, "and remembering that where 13 men are considering controverted questions and proposed policies their differences of opinion must be composed of deep significance, we believe that the conclusion, considering all things, is just and fair and we give it our approval."

The increase, as permitted under the ruling will probably go into effect September 1, 1920. The operating revenues of the railroads under present rates and conditions are recognized by all persons as insufficient. A part of the responsibility to meet the situation rests upon the state commissions. Such increases as will be made effective September 1, 1920. The report is signed by William D. H. Alney, chairman, public service commission of Pennsylvania; Royal C. Dunn, of the Florida railroad commission, and John A. Guher of the Iowa railroad commission.

Invited to Conference. "We participated in the conference in the same manner as members of the commission," the state commissioners' report declared, "and invited them to take part in the discussions and express our views with full freedom. The members of the commission gave to the case intense and efficient application, examining and discussing it with the evident desire to reach correct conclusions and apply the increase in such manner as to deal justly with the railroads."

"The questions presented were very numerous, involving the commerce of the whole country and the entire rail transportation of the United States, many of these questions being of complex character. Any decision of the case looking to the observance of the statute affects in some way every citizen of the United States."

"Speaking generally, every controverted question concerning all classes and commodities, and all rates, rules and practices of the rail carriers and all the theories of shippers and carriers were presented and urged in the testimony and in argument before the commission and given careful consideration in its deliberations."

"The commissioners were not of one mind on all questions and their conclusions in many cases were the result of compromise. It is the opinion of the other men who were taken into account, and that there must be some surrender by each before an agreement could be reached. In some instances the conclusion of the majority is not the view expressed in the ruling. On some of the questions our views were not in full accord with the majority and in some instances we three state commissioners did not have unanimity of view."

Readjustment of Rates. WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Readjustment of the whole rate system of the nation's transportation systems was started today with a view of putting in effect by September 1, the freight, passenger, mail and excess baggage and milk rate increases authorized last Saturday by the interstate commerce commission.

While tariff experts are working on the general rate schedules, the carriers will make applications to the various state commissions for advance in interstate
