DEMOCRATIC HEADS PREPARED HOLD PRE-NOTIFICATION MEET

GOVERNOR BUBY WINDING UP AFFAIRS BEFORE THE NOTIFICATION. WILL CARRY FIGHT INTO THE REPUBLICAN CAMP

Democrats Charge Republicans With "Ploving Around the Stump." DAYTON, OHIO, Aug. 5.—With his presidential nomination ceremonies only two days distant, Governor Cox, the democratic candidate, was hard-pressed today with preliminary details and closing up Ohio executive and personal affairs to be free for the campaign after next Saturday's event.

Many democratic leaders, including George White, chairman of the national committee, and Senator Harrison of Mississippi, head of the speakers' bureau, were reported en route here for pre-notification conferences. The advance guard of democratic pilgrims also was expected.

Make-up of the special campaign committee and the speaking itineraries of Governor Cox and his running mate, Franklin D. Roosevelt, are the principal affairs remaining to complete the campaign organization. Announcements are expected soon after Chairman White and others prominent in the Cox-Roosevelt organization can consult.

An aggressive fight was announced yesterday by Governor Cox in his address at a picnic for local democrats, in which he declared the democrats would be on the offensive and charged the republicans with ploving around the stump and presenting themselves as "expedient pure and simple" by appeal to various groups.

Throw Open Homes To care for the crowds expected on Saturday, Dayton residents are being asked to throw open their homes for the week-end and also donate automobiles to meet visiting delegations.

Arrangements at the Montgomery county fair grounds, where the democrats will take place, were well toward completion today, the temporary amphitheatre for the notification and national committee, the press and distinguished guests being virtually finished.

POLICE QUIZ BABY COUGHIN'S ABDUCTOR

"The Crank" Maintains His Innocence Despite Infriminating Evidence.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—The "Crank" disclosed an August Pascol of New Orleans, N. J., refused to reveal the whereabouts of Little Blakely Coughlin unless he is granted immunity in the kidnaping.

He is bartering now to exchange the "Crank" from his parental home in Norristown, Pa., on June 2, for his freedom. He is said to have gone as far as to admit the 15 months old baby is hidden in Atlantic City.

A woman, long suspected as having a part in the kidnaping, looms up afresh today. An acquaintance of Pascol's while he lived here says he knows Pascol has a woman friend. The state police and postal agents are now on her track and believe she has the child.

Pascol only recently bought a farm near Philadelphia in a motor car last Thursday to take possession. He is said to have taken three or four rifles and a quantity of liquor to the New Jersey farm.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—Although they gave out considerable information regarding the man under arrest in connection with the kidnaping of Blakely Coughlin, the 15-month-old son of George W. White, George H. Coughlin of Norristown, Pa., on June 2, federal officials today still declined to reveal his identity. It was said that important developments in the case were expected within 24 hours.

The man under arrest is a resident of New Greens, N. J., 18 miles from Egg Harbor, where he was captured last Monday. He recently purchased a house at New Greens and purchased an automobile. Prior to that time he lived for about six weeks in a rooming house in this city.

LEWIS UNRUFFLED OVER HOWAT'S REVOLT WITH KANSAS MINERS

IN TELEGRAM HOWAT VIRTUALLY DEFIES PRESIDENT OF THE MINERS.

LEWIS IGNORES TELEGRAM CHARGING COLLUSION Work, Upon Order Emulating From Lewis.

By United Press. INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 5.—Alexander Lewis' long telegram denouncing and defying his superior, John L. Lewis, to end the Kansas miners' strike, failed to ruffle the tranquility at headquarters of the United Mine Workers today.

It was not believed Lewis would reply to Howat's charges of collusion between the coal operators and Lewis. Howat's telegram had not been received here today.

Members of the executive board of the miners union were in Kansas today investigating the strike of Kansas miners which led to the scathing denunciation of Howat by Lewis.

Howat, according to the big chief, fostered and fomented the strike which took more than 3,000 miners from their jobs and caused suffering to the workers. The Kansas leader led the minority and Lewis led the majority in the controversy over whether to accept the proposal to end the nationwide strike last November.

He spent one night in the Marion county jail and was released only when he promised the court to comply with its orders. It was announced today that he is being held in custody from President Wilson thinking him for prompt action toward ending the unauthorized miners' strike in Indiana and Illinois.

HOWAT'S RECORD

Howat defied Governor Allen to dig coal with volunteers last winter. Allen seized the mines and opened them to the public.

Howat defied the Kansas industrial court which subpoenaed him for examination. District Judge Cuyler sent him to jail for contempt of court.

Howat defied the industrial court law insisting it would not stand in the courts. The Kansas supreme court upheld the section of the law under which Howat was jailed.

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RAILROADS PLAN TO OFFER \$400,000,000 BONDS TO PUBLIC

PROCEEDS OF LOAN TO BE APPLIED TO PURCHASE OF NEW EQUIPMENT.

OFFER WILL BE MADE WITHIN FOUR MONTHS

Repairs of Present Equipment Will Be Tremendous Item in the Expense of Railroads.

By RALPH A. COUCH United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Railroads will offer approximately \$400,000,000 of bonds to the public in the next three or four months, it was learned here today at the bureau of railroad economics, unless present prices are upset. Interest rates will be at least seven per cent.

Quick sales of the securities will result in more being put on the market, it was said.

The proceeds will be applied on purchase of new equipment of which more than \$10,000,000 worth will be needed in the next 12 months, according to present plans. Part of the money for equipment will come from the revolving fund administered by the interstate commerce commission under the transportation act.

Railroad officials now are conferring with investment brokers to arrange for sale of the securities. Conference were held on Monday and Tuesday in anticipation of the rate increases allowed railroads by the interstate commerce commission.

FERRIS WINNER IN SENATORIAL RACE

Defeats Gore by Majority of 25,722 Votes, According to the Late Returns.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 5.—Senator Thomas P. Gore today issued a statement conceding the democratic nomination for United States senator to Scott Ferris.

Gore's statement follows: "I ran a handicap race and lost. Whatever regret remains relates to the result rather than to the race itself.

"As this brings down the curtain on my public career, I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the people of Oklahoma for all they have done for me in the past, and to express my appreciation to my friends for their fidelity in this contest. I shall continue to wish and work for the triumph of the democratic principles, liberty of thought, speech, conscience, the press, etc. If possible, I have a keener appreciation of the state of affairs and a deeper desire for their improvement and a deeper desire for their political hope or ambition than that of the Oklahoma first among the states of the union and the United States, first among the nations of the earth."

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 5.—Complete returns from 2,111 of the state's 2,569 precincts from Tuesday's primary election, today gave Scott Ferris a plurality of 25,722 over Senator Thomas P. Gore for the democratic nomination for United States senator. The vote was: Ferris, 94,122; Gore, 68,399.

As additional reports filtered in from the country districts Gore began to cut the lead of Ferris but he still held a comfortable lead. Ferris' victory was reported as a surprise. Thirty-seven counties have furnished complete returns.

W. Harold of Oklahoma City was leading a field of 13 other candidates for the republican nomination for United States senator, incomplete returns from a score of counties showed.

EFFORTS OF POLES TO STEM TIDE RED ADVANCE IS FUTILE

GAINS OF SIX MILES A DAY MADE BY RUSSIAN REDS ON POLISH FRONT

LONDON GREATLY DISTURBED OVER GRAVE SITUATION

American Aviators Battle Against the Cavalry and Infantry of the Reds.

By Associated Press. Efforts by the armies of the Polish republic to stem the tide of the Russian bolshevik invasion which threatens Warsaw seem to have been futile.

Brest-Litovsk, the last bastion in the permanent defenses east of the Polish capital, is in the hands of the bolshevik armies; and Lomza, an important railway junction and strategic base to the northeast, and Kovel, northeast of Brest-Litovsk, have been given up by the Poles.

West of Brest-Litovsk, the Poles still hold the great forts that have made that city one of the strongest fortresses of eastern Europe, but bolshevik troops have been flung across the Bug river further to the northwest, and it would appear that bolshevik conquest of the Poles from their defenses.

The Russians are advancing in Echehon after the tactics adopted by General Mackensen when he led the German armies in the great Danube campaign during the world war, and the Poles are repeatedly being outflanked and forced to leave positions they have held for days against frontal attacks.

AMERICANS TAKEN PRISONERS BY THE BOLSHEVKI; OTHERS ESCAPE AND REACH FINLAND

WASHINGTON, August 5.—Thirty Americans are being held prisoners by the bolsheviks in the vicinity of Almgard, according to four other American refugees who have come out from soviet Russia recently, the state department was advised today by its representative at Viborg, Finland.

KENTUCKY POSSE SEEKS TO FIND NEGRO ASSAULTER

LEXINGTON, KY., Aug. 5.—A posse of several hundred farmers and county officers armed with guns, ropes and pitchforks this morning continued to scour Madison, Jessamine and Fayette counties in search for Buford Monday, mulatto, 23 years old, charged with having assaulted Mrs. Charles Sauer, 16 years old, of Valley View, Madison county, Ky., 15 miles from here.

CHICAGO POSTAL CLERK NOW SLIGHTLY RELIEVED

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—The situation involving possible "resignation" of Chief postal clerk was partially relieved today when word was received that the postoffice department at Washington had extended from five to 15 days the time allowed 31 clerks to answer charges of "meddling in politics."

LEVERETT TESTIFIES SAND BAR IS RED RIVER LINE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 5.—That a sand bar in the bed of the Red river and not the north bank of the stream is considered the boundary line between Texas and Oklahoma in making assessments against property owners in Jefferson county, on the southern border of Oklahoma, was the testimony of T. B. Leverett, assessor for that district, who testified in court today in the Red River boundary case before T. S. Tyler, special federal commissioner, here today.

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REPORT OF ENGLAND'S THREAT DECLARE WAR ON THE SOVIET UNCONFIRMED BY OFFICIALS

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Statements printed by extremist newspapers here that Great Britain has threatened to declare war against the Soviet Union if bolshevik advance into Poland is not halted, have not been confirmed in authoritative quarters.

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LONG WINNER OF MO. SENATORIAL PRIMARY

Spencer Appears to Lead the Field for Republican Nomination in Primary.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 5.—Political interest in Missouri today centered on the race for the democratic senatorial nomination as the returns of Tuesday's statewide primary continued to drift in from the rural districts.

With unofficial and incomplete returns from about fifty of 114 counties and St. Louis giving Breckenridge Long a majority of 14,541 votes over former Federal Judge Henry S. Priest, the closest of his two opponents, the Globe-Democrat an independent republican paper, by whom the vote was compiled, announced today that Long will win with a plurality which may exceed 10,000. His principal strength lies in the rural communities, returns indicate.

DESTROYER PATROLS MIAMI HARBOR PREVENT WESTERN UNION LANDING BIG CABLE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Five United States destroyers continued patrolling the harbor of Miami, Fla., today to prevent a British ship making a cable landing there.

Officials here said the order of President Wilson to the navy department to prevent by any means necessary the landing at Miami of the Western Union cable from the Barbadoes was fully supported by the states.

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BOMBING PLANE SEIZED AT MEXICAN BORDER

CALEXICO, AL., Aug. 5.—An American built bombing plane, intended for shipment into Lower California, was seized here by United States customs officials.

Lieutenant T. C. Payne, American aviation instructor in the "army" of Governor Cantu who in revolt against the Mexican federal government, was denied a passport by immigration officials. Payne had been sent by Cantu to purchase the plane in Venice where it was built after the American state department had previously refused an export license.

Quiet continued in Mexico, just across the border from this town.

WALKER RESIGNS COLLECTOR OF INTERNAL REVENUE

AUSTIN, Aug. 5.—A. S. Walker, collector of internal revenue for the south Texas federal district, has tendered his resignation to the commissioner of internal revenue, effective Aug. 21. Collector Walker will go into business for himself at Dallas, he says.

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CHICAGO POLICE GET IN LIVELY BATTLES

Evil Doers Run Amok and Chicago Police Harpooed Fear of the Gang.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Police fought three gun battles with bandits and burglars today. Four men were captured, two of them seriously wounded, and four escaped. Two of the latter were believed to have been hit.

The first clash occurred when a squad of detectives tearing the south side in search of men suspected of complicity in the murder of Detective Sergeant Frank McGurk, encountered three men in an automobile. The men, at a command to halt, got on speed and their machine got beyond control, crashing through a store window. The trio opened fire. The detectives returned it, seriously wounding one man. The other two escaped, though one was probably struck.

Half an hour later, the same squad encountered three bandits who had just held up a pediculator. In exchange of shots resulted in capture of two of the men, one of whom was badly wounded.

Police, called to a south side home by Milton Davis, Jr., who heard noise coming about his mother's apartment, ran outside and shouted for help. Fought a lively battle with three men who were being the control, crashing through a store window. One was captured. Another was believed to have been arrested.

HUERTA ATTEMPTS TO DISSUADE CANTU FROM REVOLTING IN LOWER CAL.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 5.—Provisional President de la Huerta has sent a commission to Esteban Cantu, governor of Lower California, in an effort to dissuade that official from continuing his revolt against the federal government.

Huerta sees entertainment by the provisional president that the conflict can be settled without bloodshed, according to the Universal.

BIES FROM HUIRES SUSTAINED WEDNESDAY

W. A. Williams, an employee of the Gulf Pipe Line company, sustained burns which proved fatal when a gasoline engine which he was operating exploded Wednesday. The accident occurred at the company's plant located several miles east of Electra. Mr. Williams was working with a power-driven pump when the engine operating the machine exploded, throwing blazing gasoline over him. The body was burned to a crisp before help arrived. No reason could be given for the explosion.

The body was brought to Wichita Falls and is being held at the Merkle and Lunn Undertaking parlors, pending the arrival of the dead man's wife, who was expected here from Toke, Texas, today.

WASHINGTON—Parley P. Christensen, presidential nominee of the farm-labor party, offered his services to the national woman's party in an effort to induce the Tennessee legislature to ratify the suffrage amendment.

WASHINGTON—Joseph P. Tumulty, secretary to President Wilson, will represent the president at the ceremony notifying Governor Cox of his nomination for the presidency, it is known.

CHICAGO—William V. Coughman, vice-president of the International Harvester Co. died.

LONDON—Premier Lloyd-George twice received a deputation of Irish unionists and nationalists, who urged him to grant dominion home rule for Ireland.

PITTSBURGH, KANS.—Alexander M. Howa, president of the Kansas Mine Workers union, sent a telegram to John L. Lewis, president of the International union, refusing to abide by instructions from Lewis that striking Kansas miners return to work.

AMERICAN PEOPLE PAY NEARLY FIVE AND HALF BILLIONS IN TAXES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Announcement by the treasury that the American people paid in taxes during the last fiscal year that ended June 30, 1920, the stupendous sum of nearly five and a half billions of dollars, to be exact \$4,930,894, has caused considerable astonishment in official circles, and also brought forth statements from the few congressmen still in Washington that retrenchment must be made somewhere. The five and a half billions represent only federal taxes and do not include state and municipal taxes.

The federal tax collected in the last fiscal year was the greatest in the history of the government, and the greatest in the records of the internal revenue bureau, which was established in 1862.

Of the great total nearly four billions was from income and excess profits taxes. The second New York district has the greatest revenue producer for Uncle Sam, this district, which includes Wall street, giving up to the tax collectors more than one billion dollars.

Cost of collecting the great tax was trifling, for \$100,000 daily amounted to 25 cents for each dollar.

The smallest district, in point of revenue paid, was the New Mexico district which also includes Arizona. Collections in that district were \$4,554,283—a mere bagatelle compared to the huge sum extracted from the second New York district.

Senator Harding, in his speech of acceptance, has promised to cause a revision of the federal tax laws. No doubt Governor Cox will make the same promise, when he delivers his speech of acceptance. Nearly every congressman of both great parties will echo their leaders and also make the same pledge.

The next congress will seriously consider how to reduce the federal taxes and it will take the ways and means committee of the house and the senate finance committee many months of deliberation to bring this about. In fact the first and principal business of the extra session of the 67th congress, which the new president will call soon after March 4th will be consideration of tax reduction.

"SCOTTY" IS ARRESTED BY
DEPUTY SHERIFF DODGEM

Accosted on Ohio street Wednesday, H. T. Scott, commonly known as "Scotty," was placed under arrest by Deputy Sheriff Charlie Dodgem. A \$5,000 appearance bond was furnished and he was permitted to go. Under the terms of an appearance bond he is required to appear before Justice of the Peace R. V. Gowan within three days. It is said that Scotty had nothing to say about the affair in which his partner, Jim Lemmons, met death at the hands of his wife.

WILBARGER COUNTY FACES AN UNUSUAL ERA OF PROSPERITY

Crop Conditions Are Encouraging and Much Building is Now in Progress.

By A. C. MCCONNELL. VERNON, TEXAS, August 5.—With about one hundred oil wells being drilled in Wilbarger county and quite a number of other locations made for deep tests, the oil situation is looking very promising and with the excellent rains that have fallen lately, the 1920 crop and future of Wilbarger county looks like a decided success.

With a fair winter and excellent rains this spring wheat in Wilbarger county is in almost unbelievable condition, and Vernon, with its largest grain elevator in this section, is expected to get its share of the money from the sale of crops. Vernon's cotton market is the leading one in northwest Texas and a wide variety of crops and products have been shipped from Vernon in 1919-20.

The diversified farming era is taking hold fast in the county and the incomes of Wilbarger county farmers are steady throughout the year and abnormal in the fall period.

Land values in Wilbarger county are increasing daily and the area in cultivation has made rapid increases within the past three years. Production has increased to something like 25 per cent within the same time and land values have increased about 50 per cent in the county, while in Vernon it has increased from 100 to 200 per cent.

The past three years' crop in Wilbarger county has been good and taken with the large revenues derived from the oil industry, has left the county in a most prosperous condition.

Within six months the bottling activity of Wilbarger county and Vernon is not of the boom type, but the logical result of a normal development of Wilbarger and Vernon whose bottling activity was retarded by the scarcity of building materials and labor incident to the war.

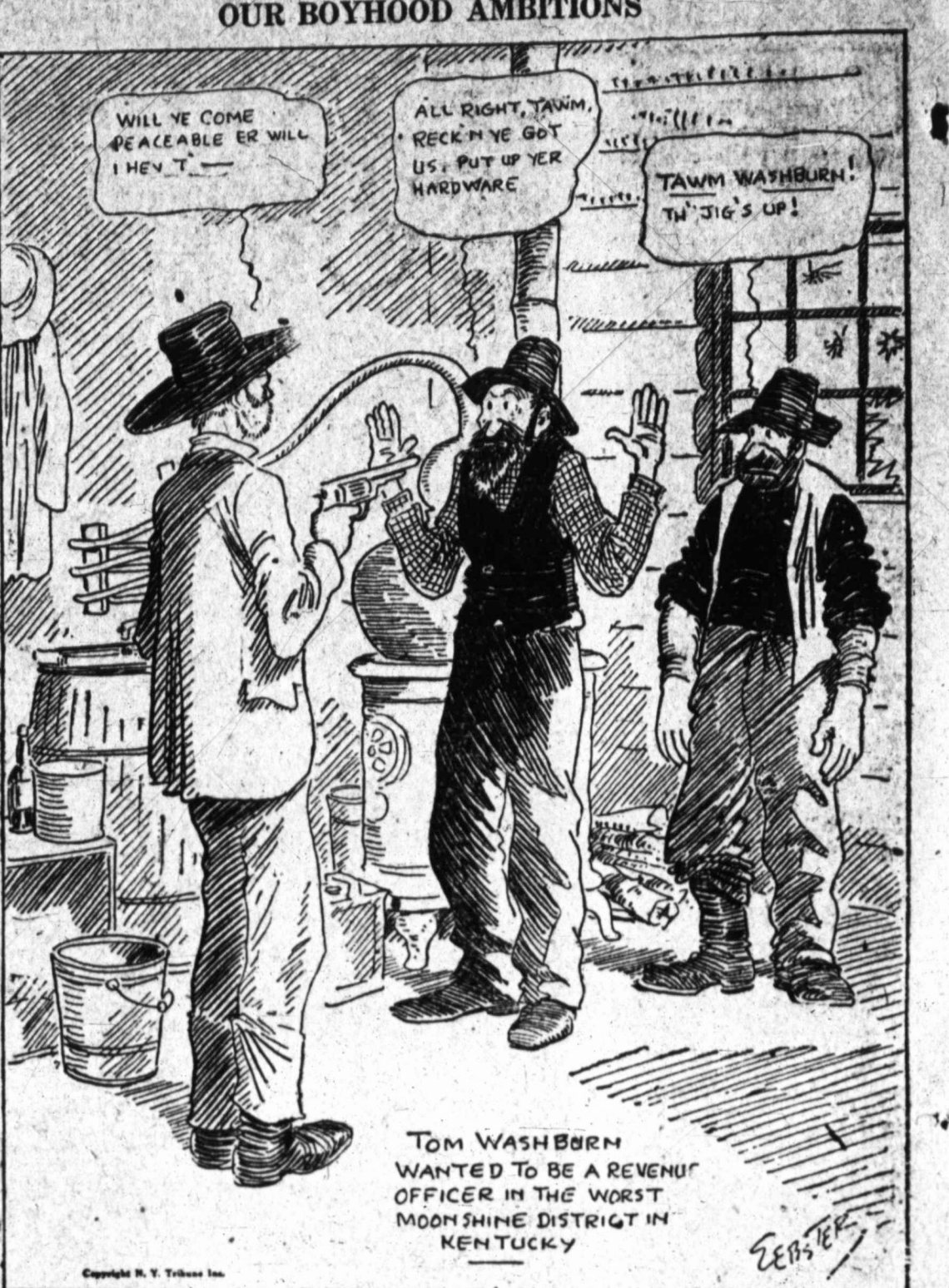
