An aggressive fight was announced yesterday by Governor Cox in his ad-dress at a picnic of local democrats, in which he declared the democrats would be on the offensive and charged the republicans with ploughing around the stump, and presenting opposition of "expediency pure and simple" by appeal to various groups. The governor also declared his acceptance speech would be so plain that it could be understood by school children, Throw Open Homes

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 5.—Government troops which will be sent into Lower California to put down the insurrection led by Esteban Cantu, governor of that state, are being mobilized at Gaymas and Puerto Isabel, in the state of Sonora, and at other ports, General P. Elias Calles, secretary of war, said last night.

"Cantu has not more than 1,000 men," he added, "and they are not of the fighting kind. Most of them are saloonkeepers and gamblers."

Compulsory military service is the only way of solving Mexican military problems, the general declared, and he expressed himself as favoring, the establishment of five-military zones—the northern, southern, central, Atlantic and Pacific.

POLICE QUIZ BABY COUGHLIN'S ABDUCTOR OVER HOWAT'S REVOL

Despite Incriminating Evidence.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5,-"The Crank" disclosed as August Pascol of New Gretna, N. J., refused to reveal the whereabouts of Little Blakely Coughlin unless he is granted immunity in the kidnaping.

He is bartering now to exchange the child, stolen from his parents home in Norristown, Pa., on June 2, for his freedom. He is said to have gone as far as to admit the 15 months old baby is hidden in Atlantic City.

A woman, long suspected as having a part in the kidnaping looms up afresh today. An acquaintance of Pascol's while he lived here says he knows Pascol has a woman friend. The state police and postal agents are now her track and believe she has the

Pascol only recently bought a farm at New Greina and drove from this city in a motor car last Thursday to take possession. He is said to have taken three or four rifles and a quan-tity of liquor to the New Jersey farm. Pascol, the police learned today, op-ened an account with a Philadelphia bank on June 21, four days after the father of the kidnaped child had placed \$12,000 in a hiding place near his home. The first deposit was \$1,-Later larger sums were added.

PHILADELPHIA. Aug. 5 .- Although they gave out considerable information regarding the man under arrest in con-nection with the kidnapping of Blakely Coughlin, the 12-months old son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Coughlin of Norristown, Pa., on June 2, federal officials today still declined to reveal his identity. It was said that important developments in the case were ex-

pected within 24 hours.

The prisoner, who, the authorities say, is the writer of the letters signed "The Crank" and who is alleged to have swindled Mr. Coughlin out of \$12,000 on the promise to return the missing boy was still being questioned today. Postal authorities and Pennsylvania state police, who made the ar-rest, express the belief that he not only is the swindler, but the actual abduct-

The man under arrest is a resident of New Gretna, N. J., '8 miles from Egg Harbor, where he was captured last Monday. He recently purchased a house at New Gretna and purchased an automobile. Prior to that time he lived for about six weeks in a rooming house in this city. While there he was said by the proprietor to have shown every

indication of prosperity.

George A. Leonard, chief postal inspector, said the prisoner is about 40
years of age, of foreign birth and well educated. Apparently he has no relatives in this country. His home, which was searched without revealing any evidence of the missing child, Leonard said, was one of refinement and showed no traces of having been occupled recently either by a woman or a baby. 

But this time the passenger travel also is going to take up some part of the burden through a horizontal increase of 20 per cent on passenger fares and a 50 per cent surcharge gainst sleeping car passengers. Pasnger fare increases will yield nearly \$234,000,000 a year and the sleeping car surcharge more than \$43,000,000, 000, which, atop of the recent 25 per cent increase in sleeping car fares, will make patronage of the Pullmans like a real luxury. 


