# Seven Killed and 65 Wounded in Riot READY TO ACT IN 12 HOURS IF ORDERED BY THE ADMIRALTY;

Johnston City, Illa, Ans. 6.—Although TWO PEOPLE KILLED West Frankfort was quiet today after a night of wild rioting, Major W. E. Satterfield, in charge of militiamen here, this afternoon telegraphed Ad-jutant General Dickson for 500 addi-Jutant General Dickson for 800 additional treops. Major Satterfield exprensed the helief that the rioting might be renewed at any moment.

More than 200 militiamen, members of five companies of the ninth Illinois infantry, are on duty here but Major Satterfield expressed the opinion that this number would be insufficient to quell the trouble.

Several men' were killed and more than two score injured in the ricting which followed the discovery of the bodies of Tony Hemphill and Amiol Calenterra buried near Royalton, Sus-picion that the murderers were mem-bers of the foreign colony precipitated the attack on the foreigners.
