By United Press. WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The department of justice is conducting an investigation into the textile industry to determine whether the closing of cotton and woolen mills is due to a conspiracy by manufacturers to con-tinue high prices, it was learned today at the office of Attorney General

Attorney General Palmer, a week ago sent into New England an agent who now is directing the investigation. District attorneys have been instructed to give him every assistance. Information reaching not only the justice department but also experts in the bureau of markets and the com-

merce department, officials said, in-dicates that manufacturers now are closing their mills to prevent stocks of cotton and woolen cloths from piling up. This would create a shortage and higher prices when the fall de-

mand began.

Officials here today were studying the closing of cotton mills at Fall River. Mass. Cotton mills in Georgia and North and South Carolina are

The closing down process seems to be striking textile mills in all parts of the country. Thousands of workers are being laid off or discharged. Idle woolen spindles numbered 949,066 during the month of July, ac ording to commerce department reports. Idle worsted spindles totaled 757,973.



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
