

TELE. SENATE RATIFIED SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

GAS WELL OF TWO AND HALF MILLIONS NEW DEVELOPMENT

BROUGHT IN ON REXFORD TRACT, THIRTEEN MILES NORTH-WEST OF CITY. SEVEN AND HALF MILLION GASSER A MILE NEARER

A gas well that the geologists show is flowing 2,500,000 cubic feet daily was brought in last Saturday on the Rexford tract, 13 miles northwest of Wichita Falls by the Jones-Light Oil Company.

The geologists estimate that the well will develop into a real gas field. The Texoma people already are drilling an effort to the Jones-Light gas, and several other companies are at work in the same section of the field.

The gas company declares it is doing its best, but that it could not get more gas. But the Lone Star Gas Co. can get gas, if it will simply pay a just price for it.

Officials of the Texoma and the Jones-Light companies are ready and willing to sell their gas to the Lone Star company for distribution in Wichita Falls. The Noble casing head plant at Burkhardt is at present paying 12 1/2 cents for the gas from the Texoma well on the Dodson tract, but it might not even be necessary for the Lone Star corporation to meet this price for the gas.

GOV. BICKETT URGES N. C. SOLONS ACCEPT SUFFRAGE GRACEFULLY

NORTH CAROLINA MAY AS WELL SWING WITH THE TIDE AND VOTE FOR AMENDMENT. STATE RIGHTS NO LONGER EXIST, BICKETT DECLARES

RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 13.—Declaring that women should have "the first right to speak when the issue is whether or not the world shall be governed by reason and right, business, or by blood and iron," Governor Bickett today issued a message today calling upon the North Carolina legislature to accept the "inevitable and ratify the federal woman suffrage amendment."

The governor warned his democratic friends that the most they would be able to do by defeating the ratification effort would be to delay for six months a movement you are powerless to defeat.

Retracting his belief that federal suffrage could not be avoided, Governor Bickett today declared that he was going to support the amendment. He said that the question was whether this nation shall enter an alliance with 21 of the most powerful nations of the world, or whether it will forever deliver humanity from the burdens and horrors of war.

Local conditions were dismissed with the statement that the governor was impressed with "the wisdom of or the necessity for woman suffrage in North Carolina." He feared, he said, that those women of the state who did not believe in woman suffrage were "unconsciously offering to harbor a very serious birthright for a very sorry mess of pottage."

JEWELS OF SLAIN RUSSIAN ROYAL FAMILY INTERCEPTED BY U. S. CUSTOM OFFICIALS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—More than 100 diamonds, supposed to have been a part of the famous jewels of the Russian royal family and addressed to the United States, were intercepted by customs officials at the port of New York.

The self-declared financial wizard was at liberty on \$35,000 bail—\$25,000 on the federal charge of using the mails to defraud, and the other \$10,000 on a state charge of larceny.

After his surrender to authorities yesterday, Ponzi rushed home to his wife. She was waiting to him on the lawn of their beautiful estate.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Aug. 13.—Following closely the arrest of T. R. Stevie, prohibition officer for this district, in the charge of having liquor in his possession, Chief of Police A. S. Muesey, was arrested late yesterday evening by a federal marshal charged with bootlegging and carrying liquor.

PORT WORTH, Aug. 13.—Directors of the Texas League will meet in Fort Worth tomorrow to consider what action should be taken against Galveston for the withdrawal of the club from the game on Monday.

INCREASED EXPRESS RATES ARE GRANTED

WASHINGTON, August 13.—An increase of 12.5 per cent in express rates was authorized today by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Request of the American Railway Express company for increases averaging 25.16 per cent were found not justified by the commission with the exception that rates on milk and cream may be equalized with those contemporaneously applied by the rail-road lines between the same points.

SHOWERS FALL OVER THE COTTON BELT OF WEST PART OF STATE

STAMFORD, TEX., Aug. 13.—Showers have been falling over almost all of the cotton belt of west Texas in the last three days, according to reports to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The rainfall at Stamford for the week has been considerably over an inch, practically all of the moisture having been absorbed by the soil. Cotton is not needing moisture at all and maize which is now heading will not stand a great deal more rain.

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SOLONS DUBIOUS OVER ITS CONSTITUTIONALITY

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CANTU WILL ABANDON OFFICE AFTER DEC.

Proposal Made by Rebel Chief Will Probably Be Rejected by Huerta.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 12.—Eduardo Cantu, the governor of Sonora, has announced that he is willing to abandon his rebellion against the government if he is permitted to remain in office until December, when he agrees to surrender his office to the successful candidate, according to advice received by the government. His proposition, it is believed, will not be accepted. Huerta would give him a choice to benefit from the export taxes from the new cotton crop and from the sale and ransoming concessions.

Cantu has desired trying to compel Chinese and Japanese to join his forces, leaving the displeasure of the United States, it is stated in reports. The Chinese and Japanese are en route from the east coast to Mazatlan by way of the Panama canal, permission for their transit through the waterway having been obtained from the United States government. The boats will carry the second expedition against Cantu from Mazatlan and will probably debark the troops at Guaymas.

SUGAR IMPORTS EXCEED EXPORTS FOR THE YEAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Imports of sugar into the United States during the fiscal year of 1920 exceeded exports by over six billion pounds, according to a summary of the country's foreign trade in sugar at the department of commerce today, and amounted to 7,587,192,000 pounds. Sugar exports for the year amount to 1,444,000,000 pounds, an advance of more than 200,000,000 pounds over 1919.

TWO DAYLIGHT ROBBERIES DRAW 50-YEAR SENTENCES

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 12.—Harry Taylor, charged with the daylight robbery of Frank, Frank Company payroll of \$2,100 on June 12, was sentenced to 50 years in the penitentiary by a jury in the criminal court here late yesterday. A large trunk fell on top of him. He was rendered unconscious by the accident, and it was feared for a time he was killed. He was rushed by a surgeon, where his wounds were dressed. He is said now to be out of danger, though in serious condition. He was injured about the face and head.

Wibarger Crop Conditions.

VERNON, August 12.—Light showers are still falling and crops are reported in record-breaking condition. An elderly man, who has taken a fancy to the little girl is being hunted for by the police in the belief he may know something of the girl's disappearance.

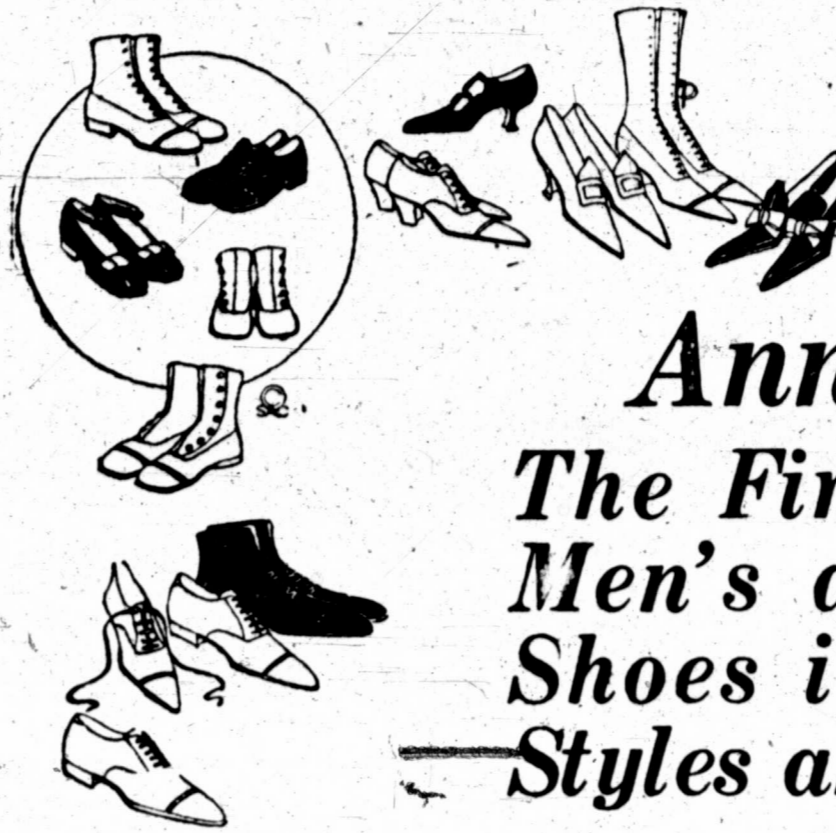

AMERICAN STEAMER RUNS AROUND OFF HALIFAX
HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 13.—The American steamer Montana went around early today five miles east of Louisburg and has been abandoned by her crew who landed safely, according to wireless messages received here by the marine and fisheries department.

GREEK PREMIER SLIGHTLY WOUNDED BY ASSAILANTS

PARIS, Aug. 13.—Prime Minister Venizelos of Greece, attacked by assassins here last night is not dangerously wounded, his physicians said today. He was to be operated on for removal of the bullet which lodged in his shoulder blade when two Greek officers fired eight shots at him as he was entering the Lyons railway station here. Another bullet grazed his thigh.
The assassins are believed to be members of Greek royalist cliques. They gave the names of George Kyrie, army reservist, and Apostolos Theopropis, former naval officer, now a journalist.
Their attempt to kill Venizelos was believed to be part of a plot to restore former King Constantine to the throne.
The police had been warned of the plot and Venizelos was closely guarded as he entered the station. As the two assailants began firing, detectives hurled themselves upon them. Most of the shots went wild. Both were disarmed before they could empty their pistols. The police had difficulty in getting them away from the crowd. Venizelos was taken to a private hospital.
The assassin's bullet which split the shoulder blade of Premier Venizelos of Greece into four pieces, was removed today in an operation which was declared successful. After the operation, it was announced the premier's condition was very satisfactory, but that absolute rest was necessary. He had a good night.
The bullet was removed by the aid of a radiograph.

CHICAGO'S WATER SUPPLY POLLUTED BY SEWERAGE

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—The entire water supply of Chicago has become dangerously polluted by sewage, driven northward from the Lake Calumet and South Chicago districts by the wind. Health officials are using large quantities of chlorine in the water but have advised the people to boil their supply. Health Commissioner Robertson also declared that the large number of bathers at the Chicago beaches had contributed to the contamination.

EMBARGO DECLARED ON GALVESTON GRAIN SHIPMENTS

GALVESTON, TEX., Aug. 12.—With 1,200 cars of wheat congested here and 4,800 more en route, the permit system of shipping grain to this port for ocean transport was suspended today.
Suspension of permits creates a strict embargo. Failure of ten vessels to arrive for the cargoes was responsible for the ban on shipments from inland, port car service officials said.

LLOYD GEORGE ALLUDES TO POSSIBILITY OF WAR

LONDON, Aug. 12.—A significant reference to the present crisis was made by Premier Lloyd-George in addressing a meeting of coalition liberals today. After expressing fervent hope for cooperation between England and France (the premier continued, apparently alluding to the possibility of war with Russia):
"Then the terrible question of peace or war has to be decided, our first duty as a government is to the people who trust us not to commit their treasure to any unjustifiable adventure. Nothing but the most imperative call of national honor, national safety and national freedom can justify war. Before this country is committed to it, even in the most limited form, it must be satisfied these are in peril."

LOCAL MARKETS OFFER MANY INDUCEMENTS TO HOUSEKEEPER

The local markets are offering to the housekeeper inducements which, though of course not comparable with the August markets in normal times, are, considering the outlook a month ago, attractive.

Sugar, which everyone expected would go higher, has taken a decided drop and from 24 cents a pound has declined to 21 cents. Though it's price does not exceed by a cent the result to mind the 20th-century days when sugar could be had at 20 pounds for a dollar, yet the drop amounts to more than 20 per cent.

There is not much on the market just now that can be preserved in sugar except watermelon rind, but which other aspects of the season, it is glad to turn to that friend of our childhood (and of our maturity), the watermelon. Its sweet content is unsurpassed in cooling refreshment on a hot summer day and its very rind may be turned into a sweet morsel for the holiday of winter.

At the present time also there may be had beans, peas, cucumbers, lettuce, tomatoes, okra, peppers, both hot and sweet and turnip greens, all of which may be successfully canned. Without the use of sugar, these vegetables are necessary in the diet, not only in winter when meats enter so largely into the daily menu, but also at the present time when they are so common.

Cantaloupes and cucumbers are also in market now, the cucumbers at prices greatly below those which prevailed but a short time ago.

The wise buyer will always prefer the home-grown article when it can be had, and is not inferior to that which is shipped in, for several reasons: it is fresher; it has had less chance to have become contaminated by contact with unclean things; you pay your money for produce at the store instead of having some unknown Jap who lives and spends his money somewhere else, you're building up a business that will be in your community; you keep that money in circulation here at home; you save the freight and several middlemen's profits. Worth while, isn't it?

Grease and flour are down, but this condition is by no means sure to last. What is decided in price and flour followed. Wheat has gone back to its former price, and flour may be reasonably expected to regain it. Recent rains have injured the unthreshed wheat, making it worth only 20 cents a bushel, than that which was threshed before the rain. There is no adequate reason for the present drop in the price of grease, which is the cause of the fluctuation of prices. It is expected that the speculators to sell their hoards. Grease normally remains up 10 to 15 cents, when the cotton seed goes down to 20 cents a bushel, and has been down 10 cents in the past few days.

Potatoes have recently declined from 10 cents to 7 1/2 cents, due to the new crop, and sweet potatoes are beginning to come in and should soon be plentiful.

There are neither cherries nor berries, and but a few strawberries, but the latter are there in such quantities, in many quantities, owing to the prevalence of insects which have destroyed them.

INCREASE OF 4,000 IN NUMBER OF CHILDREN EMPLOYED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, August 12.—Four thousand more children are working in Chicago today than a year ago, according to Clyde A. Brown, acting director of the city vocational guidance bureau.

The increase in child labor is said to be general in the middle west. The increase was noted in Missouri, Kansas and North Dakota.

Necessity of the child helping the family and the fact that of driving, investing, and other business and security of adult labor together with the discovery by employers that women and children often could take the place of men were cited by Mr. Brown among reasons for a similar increase in child labor in other parts of the United States.

Minnesota officials report that child labor is nearly doubled in that state. The great increase, they say, is among children of the "white collar" class whose parents have been forced by rising prices to permit their children to work. About 2,000 under 16 years of age are now at work in Minnesota.

Wisconsin statistics on child labor for the year are not yet tabulated but officials say enough returns are in to indicate a considerable increase over previous years. Some 10,000 under 16 years have been reported receiving \$100 a month.

E. C. Jennings, Texas state labor commissioner, reports an increase of about 10 per cent in Texas child labor over last year. Postponement of compulsory school attendance, he says, has been a factor.

State Labor Commissioner Claude E. Conville of Oklahoma says more violations of child labor laws have been brought to the attention of his office this year than previously, from which he deduces an increase in juvenile workers. Conville said the increase in violations was probably due to the fact that there was 29 per cent more jobs in the state than workers.

A. E. Erick, Iowa state labor commissioner, recently reported that approximately 1,000 more youths had been employed in the past year to child labor in those states as almost negligible. St. Louis reports a decrease in child labor from 1,000 to 500 last year. The state factory inspector reports that the federal tax on child labor is given as the cause of the decrease.

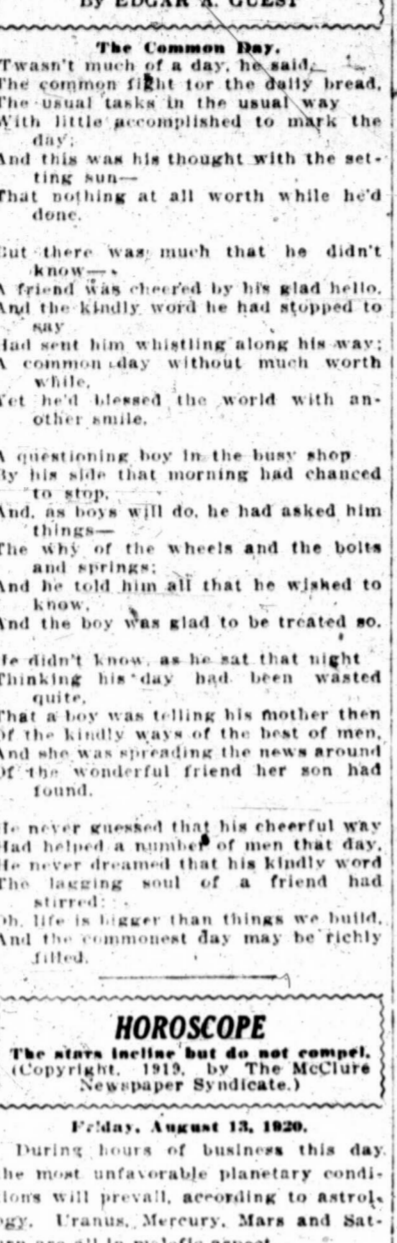

RUSSIA IS DIVIDED IN THREE SECTIONS

Bolshevik Regime is Directing Governmental Affairs Without Encountering Storms.

TERIJOKI, FINLAND, RUSSIAN
soviet government in Russia has been such that today the vast Russian territory from the Pacific to the Baltic is divided into three distinct sections, in the attitude of the people toward bolshevism.

In a recent 4,000 mile trip across the entire country from Vladivostok to the Finnish border, the Associated Press correspondent observed that soviet support diminished with increasing distance from the capital at Moscow, where the supreme fiat for iron-clad militarism are issued.

In the remote eastern sections of Siberia the bolshevik admit failure to establish their system and are seeking to create a buffer state known as "The Far Eastern Republic." Siberia proper from Irkutsk to the Ural, where eight months ago bolshevism was welcomed as a relief from the Kolchak regime, is ready for another change to anything which will bring economic betterment. Proceeding further westward the traveler finds soviet support diminished with increasing distance from the capital at Moscow, where the supreme fiat for iron-clad militarism are issued.

The appointment of food, as well as the relative proximity to the military headquarters, apparently is a vital factor in maintaining soviet support. Everywhere through Siberia one hears stories that the peasants are refusing to plant their fields or raise stock because of repeated requisitions. Throughout the central part of the eastern region, where the military oppression has been largely eliminated, efforts are being made to establish card systems for the exchange of manufactured goods in return for agricultural products.

The government leaders urge faithfulness and sacrifice on the part of the people until they can end civil war and foreign aggression by military victories. They assert that any failure which may have attended their efforts to thoroughly establish the soviet program, has been due to backwardness on the part of the Russians or to foreign interference.

In Omsk, center of the Siberian grain districts, there is at present a shortage of bread, which apparently is not due to scarcity of grain. Reports indicate it is the result of a boycott conducted against the government most by the peasants because they are not satisfied with the terms of exchange in exchange for products. The situation consequently has resulted in a shortage of clothing and other manufactured products and textile machinery for the rural population.

In the far eastern country, where a compromise has been made with features of the bolshevik system, there is indication that concessions would be made in attempts to gain economic contact with the outside world through the Orient. There are evidences in that section of private rights to property, free trade and invitations for exploitation of the natural resources by foreign capital. These steps are said to have been taken with Moscow approval, and M. Krasnotchekoff, the new government's foreign minister, is reported in Moscow for the purpose of obtaining documents giving bolshevik recognition to the republic's independence in commerce and trade.

Late Action.
NASHVILLE, TENN., August 12.—It was regarded as a certainty early today that the Tennessee legislature would not settle the question of ratification of the federal woman suffrage amendment today as planned by suffrage leaders.

The senate was expected to vote on ratification, but the house, unless it should be agreed to take the ratification resolution from the committee on constitutional conventions and amendments was not expected to act until next week. It was not believed this would be done.

The miscarriage of plans of the suffrage leaders resulted from a decision of the house committee late last night to defer a report on the resolution on Monday in order that the committee-men might have more time for consideration. Chairman Gwin of the senate committee, which with the house committee, conducted a joint hearing on the resolution, announced it would make a favorable report today. Speaker Todd of the senate said yesterday that body would adopt the resolution within an hour after it convened today.

Another issue which served further to beloud the question of legality of ratification presented itself today with the announcement that Attorney General Thompson had given to Representative L. D. Miller of Hamilton county a written opinion declaring that a majority of the republic's members of the legislature is considered to favor ratification. Heretofore it had been taken for granted that the constitutional majority, 17 of the senate total of 33 and 50 of the house total of 99 votes, would be necessary.

Two-thirds of each house constitutes a quorum to pass upon the amendment. Mr. Thompson said, adding that action is political and non-legislative, according to a ruling of the state supreme court and that the measure does not require the governor's signature.

The other question of legality, upon which was based virtually all the argument last night at the committee hearing, hinges upon the contention that the Tennessee constitution prohibits action on an amendment by a legislature unless the legislature had been elected after the proposed amendment was submitted by congress.

Endorse American Stand.
America's attitude of opposition to the bolshevik government was endorsed by the note.

The French government has reached the same conclusions as the Washington government with regard to Russia, said the communication. "We can not have official relations with a government which is conspiring against our institutions and whose diplomats are instigators of revolution."

"France, like America, believes that it is necessary that an independent Poland shall be maintained and desires the maintenance of the territorial integrity of that country."

"The American government, desiring to aid the Russian people, has faith in their future. France endorses this declaration unreservedly. France has never varied from its desire to support the principles formulated by Washington."

"Acting in this spirit France has decided not to approve the armistice conditions offered to Poland unless they conform to these principles."

"In the same spirit, France, after mature examination, has recognized General Wrangel, who has announced that these principles are acceptable to him."

Because of their superior pitching staffs, Brooklyn, Cincinnati and Chicago look the best for the pennant to most of the "experts."
