



How Old Is Mr. Pat Neff?

If He Had Not Passed His Forty-Sixth Birthday on September 12th, 1918. (the day set for registration), He Was Subject to the Draft Law.

Here is an excerpt from Section 3 of the Draft Act approved August 31, 1918: "Persons shall be subject to registration as herein provided, who shall have attained their eighteenth birthday and who shall not have attained their forty-sixth birthday on or before the day set for registration."

It Pat Neft was born any time after September 12, 1872, he was subject to Registration and the Draft.

HE DID NOT REGISTER

HERE IS SOME OF THE EVIDENCE UPON THE ISSUE OF HIS AGE:

(1) The law requires the Tax Collector or his deputy to swear a voter with respect to his age when he issues a poll tax receipt. Here are true copies of Neff's poll tax receipts issued December 31st, 1918, and January 10, 1920:

STATE OF TEXAS. County of McLennan.

(4) On page 2081, Volume 11, of "WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA," 1920-1921 EDITION, appears a character sketch of Mr. Neff. The publishers of this book declare that "Sketches for Who's Who in America are prepared from first hand material only." As a matter of fact, the material is furnished by the subjects of the sketches themselves. In said sketch it is said;

"Neff, Pat Morris, Lawyer, born McGregor, Texas, November 26th, 1872, etc."

(5) W. A. Fraser, a high officer of the Sovereign Camp of Woodmen of the World of America, and a supporter of Neif, Omaha, Nebraska, wired a member of a Woodman Lodge in Texas August 21st, 1920, as follows:

"Neff born '72. Policy issued 1905. Hope he will be your next Governor.'

This means that Mr. Neff's application for a Woodman policy and for membership in the lodge states his birth date as being November 26, 1872. The telegram was in response to telegraphic inquiry as to what the Woodman records show about Neff's age.

(6) MARTINDALE'S AMERICAN LAWYERS' DI-RECTORY is an annual publication in general use by the lawyers of the United States, and each volume contains a brief history of each lawyer. The data for this publication is gotten first-hand, and whenever there is a change in the law partnership, the publishers call upon the particular lawyers affected for correct data. The volumes of this publication can be seen in almost any lawyer's office; they have been examined for the period from 1915 to 1920 and each year Neff is shown to have been born in 1872. Neff has had constant access to these volumes all these years, and if the data about him was incorrect he should have had it corrected.

(7) The Legislative Records during the period of Neff's membership shows his age. The Manual for 1901 states his age as being 28 years at that time.. His birthday nearest to the publication of this manual was November 26th, 1900. This fixes his birth date as November 26th, 1872. The Manual for 1903 shows his age then as being 30 years. His birthday nearest to the publication of this Manual was November 26th, 1902, and this fixed his birth date as being November 26th, 1872. The data for these official records was furnished by the various members of the Legislature. Neff was a member of the House in 1901 and was Speaker of the House in 1903 and it was a part of his official duties to see to it that the records were correctly kept.

(8) Congressman Tom Connally was a member of the House when Neff was elected Speaker. In a speech supporting Neff's nomination for Speaker in 1903, Mr. Connally said: "It is hardly necessary to speak of his service. YOU KNOW HOW HE ENTERED HERE AT THE AGE OF TWENTY-SIX, etc., etc." See page 6, House Journal, 28th Legislature, Regular Session. Neff "ENTERED HERE" in January, 1899. The birthday nearest to his entry into the Legislature was November 26, 1898, and this fixed his birth date as November 26th, 1872, Neff, undoubtedly, would have corrected Mr. Connally if an erroneous statement had been made!

(9) In the issue of January 14, 1903 The Dallas News reported Neff's election as Speaker of the House and gave a biographical sketch. Among other things, it said: "PAT M. NEFF WAS BORN AT McGregor, Texas, Nov. 26th, 1872." Neff, in his recent speeches, has repeatedly said that the Dallas News is correct in its reports.

(10) Every man and woman who has attended the State University will remember that he or she was compelled to fill out a detailed report of his or her family history at the time of matriculation and file the same. Neff attended the University and in his report stated his birth date as being November 26th, 1872

MIND YOU: All of the above evidence came into evidence through a series of years and under circumstances when there was no motive to make incorrect statements and is, therefore, entitled to credibility. Some of it was made under circumstances constituting a violation of the statutes of Texas if it were false; and the rest of it was made when it was of importance for it to be correct. -

Neff now says that he was born November 26th, 1871. and relies upon an alleged entry in a Bible to substantiate, his statement. According to Neff his Bible has been in the family for "seventy-five years," but according to the Dallas News of August 22nd, 1920, "the date in the front of the book (Bible) shows it was printed in 1867," only fifty-three years ago. In this connection the News of August 22nd, 1920, contains an affidavit showing entries in this book PRINTED in 1867, as follows: Marriage of Noah Neff and Elizabeth Sheppard, October 26th, 1854; birth of Edward Neff, Dec. 31, 1855; birth of Charles Neff. April 7th, 1857; birth of Sam Neff, Sept: 25th, 1858; birth of Ben Neff, Nov. 29th, 1860; birth of Robert Neff, August 21st, 1862; birth of Sallie Neff, Dec. 9, 1864; birth of David Neff, Oct. 28, 1866. The last of these events happened one year and the first happened thirteen years before the book itself was printed! This circumstance, under the rules of evidence, would exclude the book from evidence in a court of justice unless the circumstances was further and properly explained. And before it could be offered in evidence in a court of justice the person, or persons, interested in disputing its accuracy would have the right to inspect it for evidence of alterations. With respect to the credibility to be given Bible entries when a man's age is in question the court in the case of St. L. S. W. Ly. Co., vs. Bowles, 72 S. W., 454, said:

"It is insisted that in proving age the record of births. in the family Bible is the best evidence. Such record is hearsay, IT IS NOT THE BEST EVIDENCE." And why it. is not the "best evidence" everybody who gives the matter thought will understand.

If the facts stated in Neff's oaths before the Tax Collector are correct; if the facts stated in the other records are correct, then, without question. Noff had not reached his forty-sixth birthday on Sept. 12th, 1918, and it was his duty to register.

If the facts were incorrectly stated by Neif when he took the oaths before the Tax Collector, and if he knew they were incorrect, then another serious criminal offense was committed?

" If Neff thought he was stating the facts in his" caths before the Tax Collector, and in his campaign cards, and elsewhere, then without question, at the time for registration in 1918 he thought he was not forty-six years old and it was his moral and patriotic duty-if not his icgal duty-to register on September 12, 1918.

If the facts were incorrectly stated in his oaths before the Tax Collector and in his campign cards and elsewhere, why did he state them incorrectly?

The conclusion is irresistible that Neff was either not forty-six years old Sept. 12th, 1918, or he thought he was not forty-six years old on that date. If this conclusion is correct, then Neff either violated the draft law (in the event he was in fact under forty-six years old) or he thought he was escaping the draft in violation of law (in the event the Bible entry is correct), or that he was ignorant of the draft?



NEW YORK, Rug. 28.—Yesterday's recovery was followed by fenewed weakness in the cotton market today. Liverpool cables made a favorable showing, but no improvement was reported in the goods trade, the weather in the South was better and a private crop report giving the condition 70.9, compared with 75.3 a month ago, placed the crop indication at 13,400,000 bates, or 900,000 bales above the official end-July figures. The opening was barely steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 15 points and after the execution of overnight buying orders, the market sold off to 26.68c for October and 25.48c for December, or about 50 to 60 points below last night's closing. The weakness of New Orleans was a good deal of Southern selling.
