PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 4—The United States submarine S-5 went to the bottom of the Atlantic ocean off Caps Enloyen because a large intake valve-failed to close when the "sub" made a practive dive, in a navy parlance, a "crash dive." There were 38 officers and enlisted men aboard. This was revealed today in the official report made by the commender of the de-stroyer Beaver, which is standing by the battleship Ohio, which today is towing the submarine to the Delaware breakwater. The report discloses that it was largely through the work of the imprisoned men, under the direction of Lieutenant Commander Charles Cooke, Jr., that they were saved and that it was their own desperate effort and not a telephone buoy, as first reported. hat attracted attention of the rescuing ships. The crew learned that the stern of their ship was above water. This supplied a ray of hope and work-ing as they never worked before, they

gouged a small hole through the iron hull. To this they climbed up the side of the ship, standing at an angle of about 50 degrees.




