

ANCHQUAKES TOLL OF 500

REPORTS STATE 10,000 INJURED AND 100,000 ARE HOMELESS AS RESULT OF DISASTER IN ITALY

ROME, Sept. 11.—The number of victims of Tuesday's earthquake was still uncertain today but officials announced tents and barracks were needed at once for 100,000 homeless. The latest reports from relief workers indicated possibly 1,500 persons were killed and 10,000 injured.

NEW ANGLE IS SPRUNG BY REPUBLICAN NOMINEE IN SATURDAY SPEECH.

SAYS IT MIGHT INVOLVE COUNTRY IN A CONFLICT

Also Attacks "Ineffective Meddling" Policy of the Democratic Toward Business.

MARION, O., Sept. 11.—Suggestion that America has been duped by "hooking discrepancies" in the French and English text of articles in the Versailles treaty purporting to safeguard the Monroe doctrine was made today by Warren G. Harding. These discrepancies might readily involve us in conflict, he demanded that those advocating acceptance of the league covenant bring forth an explanation.

This new angle on the treaty issue was sprung in a double-barreled broadside on the Wilson policies made by Harding today speaking to delegations of business men from Chicago, Michigan and Indiana.

The other half of Harding's speech was directed against the "ineffective meddling" policy of the democratic administration toward business. Eight years of democratic administration have increased the "ineffective meddling" and "we have become the ineffective prodigals of the world," he said.

Harding quoted from the French text of article 11 of the league covenant, charging that it is a "complete reversal" of the English text, both of which are official and best of the signatories of the American plenipotentiaries.

"This difference," he said, "might very readily involve us in unhappy conflict." "One wishes to be both charitable and considerate, but it is hard to believe this very marked discrepancy was perpetrated without intention. Clearly, either America is being deceived or the representatives of the nations have sought to deceive the American people," he said.

Harding explained he did not believe the president would knowingly be a party to deception of his country and he would not accuse foreign representatives of trying to dupe America, but there is a misunderstanding which he said should be clarified before any prudent business man would sign it.

NUMBER OF LARGE CHEMICAL PLANTS COMMANDED BY METAL WORKERS.

ORDER THE SEIZURE OF 200 ADDITIONAL PLANTS

Action Is Taken to Prevent a Lockout According to Late Report from Rome.

MILAN, ITALY, Sept. 11.—Statement is issued in this city as to the possible seizure of the confederation of labor relative to the movement on the part of the metal workers to occupy and operate industrial plants abandoned last night.

The trouble started last week when metal workers in the Milan area went on strike, declared a lockout. Workers anticipated that by locking themselves in seizure of industries and establishments of large and small plants spread to other branches of labor.

The confederation of labor was reported to have ordered the seizure of 200 additional plants to prevent a lockout.

The result has been that Signor Agnelli, after leaving Signor Giolitti, has urged owners of industrial plants to meet the men in a conciliatory manner.
