INJURED LIST REMAINS AT 200; **INVESTIGATION DEVELOPS THAT** TRAGEDY WAS RESULT OF BOMB

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 .- William J. Flynn, chief of the bureau of investigation, department of justice, declared this after-noon that he was positive that a bomb had caused the explosion in Wall street yesterday which took a toll of 37 lives, injured about 200 persons and caused property damage running into the millions.

Chief Flynn made his announcement; shortly after Fire Commissioner Dran-nan had reported to Mayor Hylan his nan had reported to Mayor Hylar als belief that a homb was responsible for the disaster and the police had begun to swing to the homb theory as op-poned to that of a collision between a powder wagon and an automobile. Certain at least of the cause of the explosion, federal agents and city po-lice increased their search for the driver of a wagon drawn by the one horse which was blown to pieces. No trace of him has yet been found. "There is absolutely no daubt that it was a bomb," said Chief Flynn. "An

important development in the last two hours has convinced us of this. The bomb was apparently placed by a per-son who was within four blocks of Wall and Broad streets when the ex-plosion occurred."

that a time bomb was placed on the wagon and that the driver hurried from he scene just after arranging for the explosion to occur at noon Expert Chemista Arrive.



Morrow is Principal Speaker At Luncheon Of Business Council Friday.

After showing that annual expendi tures in Wichita Falls trade territory aggregated \$511,000,000 annually, Jud Morrow, secretary of the chamber of commerce at Vernon, gave statistics at the weekly luncheon of the Business Council Friday showing that the aggregate of Wichita Falls manufacturing and jobbing business was about \$90,000,000, or less than 20 per cent of the total buying power of its territory.

Mr. Morrow was the first speaker of tures in Wichita Falls trade territory Mr. Morrow was the first speaker of

the council from other cities.

He urged organized effort to secure for the manfacturing, wholesale and jobbing interests of Wichita Falls all the trade that rightfully belonged to them. He sketched a territory on the map of Texas and Oklahoma which he said rightfully belonged to Wichita Falls on account of its geographical location and its transportation facili-ties. This territory was about 300 miles in length and about 150 in width. Mr. estimated its population at He said that in this territory Wichita Falls jobbers could deliver goods to better advantage than those from any other centers.

He spoke of the value to the commer-

cial life of the city of the newspapers which were carrying the advertise-ments of its business institutions out into its trade territory and advocated wider use of the local newspapers in towns in its territory by the business

interests of Wichita Palls.

The importance of the ship-by-truck movement was emphasized. Mr. Morow also emphasized the importance of good entertainments to the commercial growth of the city. Good newspapers, good rands and good entertainments were important factors in helping develop any commercial center, he said.







A large majority of the active members of the exchange were present when the opening gong sounded and business proceeded in normal fashion with a fair degree of activity.
