

HIRAM JOHNSON IS PRAISED BY GOV. COX AS A PROGRESSIVE

DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE AGAIN FLAYS "BIG BUSINESS" AND G. O. P. LEADERS.

COMPARES PRE-CONVENTION CAMPAIGNS OF REPUBLICANS

Refers To Charges Made By Colonel
Roosevelt In The Campaign Of
Nineteen Twelve.

SACRAMENTO, CALIF., Sept. 17.—In an address here today opening his California campaign, Governor Cox of Ohio, democratic presidential candidate, praised Senator Hiram Johnson, republican, who resides here, as an exponent of progressivism and again flayed "big business" and republican leaders supporting Senator Harding.

Although they differ fundamentally on the League of Nations, Governor Cox said he admired Senator Johnson for frankness and lack of ambiguity or hypocrisy.

"He and I do not agree on international politics," said Governor Cox to a large throng of people at a noon meeting, "but I respect the man for his candor."

"I have looked with admiration on the fight which he has made throughout the years against reaction. He fought it with Roosevelt and he continued consistently the contest which began in 1912 through the primaries and the convention of 1920, just as Roosevelt would have done."

Would Have Carried Ohio.
"As an Ohioan, I give to you the assurance that the observation made by a distinguished citizen of our state to the effect that Hiram Johnson was a blackguard and unfit to associate with decent men, is not the view of our people. If Hiram Johnson had been a candidate before the republican primaries in Ohio this year, he would have carried them."

"If the reactionary senatorial oligarchy gains control of the government in this campaign, it will so manipulate the power of patronage that the progressive republicans will either be compelled to join another party or to form one of their own."

Parallels Is Drawn.
"Let me draw a parallel between the campaign of 1912 and 1920. Eight years ago Colonel Roosevelt charged that the nomination was made by reactionary forces in defiance of the rank and file as expressed at the primaries. In 1920, precisely the same thing was done and Senator Johnson was humiliated the same as Colonel Roosevelt. To his neighbors, when he returned home from the Chicago convention this year, he expressed no bitterness and said plainly that he would rather come back to his home state defeated than to have been nominated in the room of a Chicago hotel by reactionaries of big business. His further observation was 'A few men have set at naught for the time being the American primary system.' It is to deny it, that there are many Cranes, Shotts and representatives of Morgan and Co., who arrogate to them-

selves the right of selection of candidates, notwithstanding what may have been decreed by the people themselves.

Cannot Understand.
"I am unable to see by what process of reasoning the political party which has given to Boss Barnes of New York, a distinct status of leadership in this campaign can expect the progressive friends of Theodore Roosevelt and Hiram Johnson to give it support. Barnes was the captain of the pirate ship. In the language of Roosevelt, he was the connecting link between crooked business and crooked politics. Doubtless, the return to Barnes is another evidence of going back to morality."

"Never were so many obligations to designing interests being assumed by the party of reaction as in this campaign. Under the belief that disturbed conditions following the war, make political victory certain, methods are followed unblushingly and without concealment."

Evidence of Resentment.
"In this great western country, where I have been now for two weeks, I find many evidences of resentment. I am convinced that the currents of progressive thought will be running so high by November that unholy enterprises will have been completely engulfed."

Governor Cox's California campaign was an effort to secure the electoral vote which four years ago clinched the re-election of President Wilson.

Leaving Sacramento at 1:35 p. m., the governor was anticipated keenly by his address tonight in the San Francisco auditorium where he was nominated in the early morning of July 8 last. He expected in that speech to contrast sharply three circumstances of his nomination with that of Senator Harding, at Chicago.

OIL DEVELOPMENT IN WILBARGER COUNTY IS DELAYED BY WEATHER

RECENT HEAVY RAINS AND BAD ROADS IS HOLDING UP OPERATIONS.

LITIGATION ALSO DELAYS SEVERAL OF COMPANIES

Favorable Reports Are Received From a Number Of Wells Being Drilled.

VERNON, TEXAS, Sept. 17.—Recent unusually heavy rains, bad roads and legal litigations are retarding factors in oil developments in Wilbarger county at the present time. Unfavorable weather conditions are holding up development of practically all wells as it is impossible to transport supplies and materials over the roads which are almost impassable.

Litigation is also retarding the development very much. It is said that about half of the cases of the 124 civil cases on the docket of the district court now in session pertain to some form of the oil industry here. Some of the cases have been settled out of the court, but a heavy civil docket confronts the court and in the meantime the wells under controversy are shut down awaiting the outcome of litigation.

The oil situation this week remains unchanged, but favorable reports still come from wells in operation. The Smith-Greene-Greshaw well south of Vernon, in section 19, block 14, near the Sigler well and offsetting the vast acreage under lease by the Waggoner Ranch Oil company, Haseltine syndicate, Sigler Oil company and others, is demanding its full share of attention.

Retarding Factors.
Water troubles as well as pumping facilities are the retarding factors in the further development of the well. Water is continuing to seep through the perforated liner along with oil, coming up from the five strata encountered in drilling. About twenty-five feet of open hole permits the water to come up from around the casing. The well was put on the pump, but the pump was rendered useless by the excessive gas coming from the hole, and since the pump was put out of commission little development work has been done on the well, hard rains interfering. Another pump is being installed and the water, oil, slush and mud will be pumped from the well. It is said the well is gassing heavily and the oil is being packed with mud and slush. Under these conditions the present capacity of the well cannot be ascertained at the present time. Prevailing estimates place the production of the well from 40 to 100 barrels. Two 150-barrel and 300-barrel storage tanks have been placed by the well. The well has been pumped only intermittently and no correct gauge is possible. The well will be drilled deeper and the production increased as prevailing opinion is that the yield can

be increased by deeper drilling. The depth is now around 2,100 feet.

Belle Black of Acreage.
Lee Flowers, who is drilling near the Sigler well, has sold 400 acres in block 10 of the Waggoner Ranch Oil company subdivided to Eric Cranfill and C. G. Maddox of Wichita Falls. Flowers and associates retain 240 acres which they say they will not dispose of at any price. The Flowers well has been the center of much interest lately and some startling developments should be forthcoming from the first soon. Shales and sands from this well have been analyzed and the report of same is that the well has unusual possibilities. Casing is being set at the well.

The Jeffrey-Ayers well on the Vaughn farm, near Tolbert, which created some excitement some time ago, is shut down on account of litigation. Contentions have arisen as to the contract stipulation in depth. The owners of the well contend that the contract calls for 2,500 feet, while the contractors claim 1,800 is the contract depth. The well is now down 2,003 feet. Another party is negotiating putting the well down to 3,000 feet in consideration of a portion of the acreage owned by the company.

The S. & R. well on the Hancock lease is cleaning out casing preparatory to completing the well, which is said to be showing oil. A new contract is pending for the Carnar well in Farmers' Valley.

Well is Shut Down.
The McCadoe, Oakes & Shaffer well in section 10, in the Sigler territory, is shut down. The Big Waggoner well on the Katherine Waggoner farm, in the forks of Red-Pease rivers have completed their contract, but it will probably be drilled deeper under new contract.

The contractors of the Byars Farm Oil company, near Oklaunion, are preparing to start drilling operations of the well again.

Leasing in the Sigler territory has been brisk for the past ten days, the activity being caused by good reports from the Green and other wells in this section.

location and will drill another well about 200 feet from their present one. Other companies are preparing to drill in the same district, it is said, interest being renewed by the excellent showing of the Greene well.

A rumor is afloat that the Sigler No. 2 is standing 1,100 feet in oil. A driller at the well is sponsor for the report, but it lacks confirmation at the office of the Sigler Oil Co. This well is surrounded with mystery and many rumors concerning same are rife. A standard rig is over the hole and it is reported the bailer has been at work.

Reach Contract Depth.
The Buckeye National No. 1, which has been the center of interest, has reached their contract depth of 2,000 feet. A report is that another company will take over the property and drill the well to 3,000 feet. Favorable sands encountered heightens the hopes that the well can be made a producer.

The Magnolia Petroleum Co. reports their No. 46, Houston & Texas Central, in the eastern part of the county, a completion for oil producing 60 barrels daily from the 1750-foot sand.

Wells drilling along Red river and north of Vernon remain unchanged. The Greene firm is down about 3,000 feet. They recently bought 3,000 acres in this district for \$51,000.

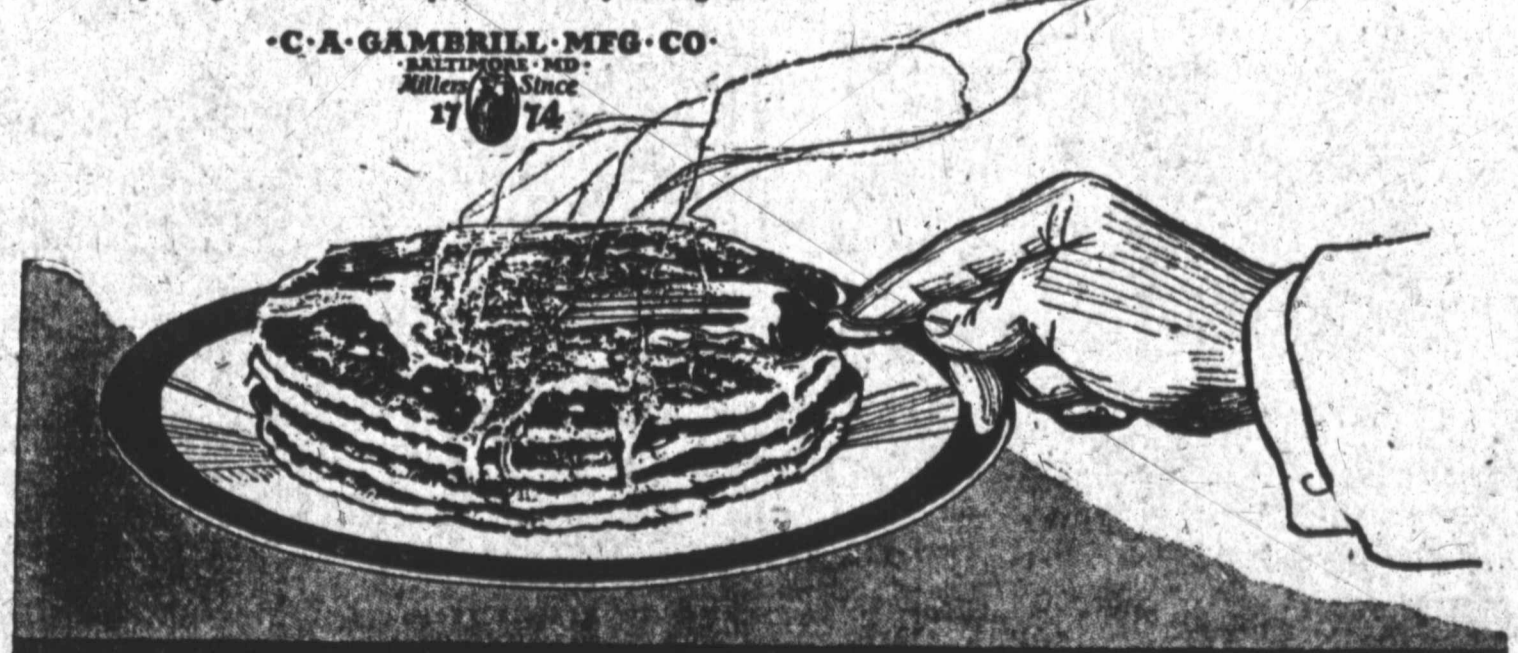

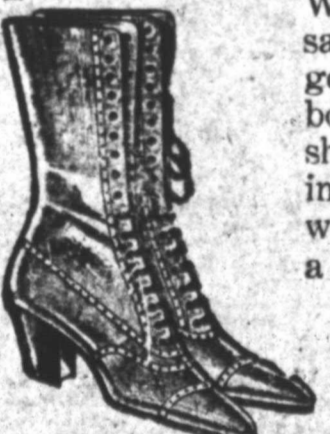

NEWS FROM THE COURTS

WOMAN IS AWARDED THE CAR IN QUESTION

Also Receives Judgment For \$900 As Damages For The Time Deprived Of Machine.

Substantiating her claim by other witnesses that she was under duress when she signed a bill of sale for an automobile, Rose Glenn, in the county court of law as plaintiff in the case against Flo Kirelle, was given possession of and title to the automobile in question by Judge Guy Rogers and awarded damages of \$15 a day for sixty-seven days, amounting to \$900.

The trial of this case was begun last Wednesday when the plaintiff took the witness stand and testified under oath that she was told by Deputy Sheriff Abe Willey of Newton that the case against her for stealing money from Flo Kirelle would be dismissed if she would sign a bill of sale for the automobile which she had lately come into possession of. The case was continued until Friday morning in order to allow the counsel for the defense to produce Officer Willey and several other witnesses.

It was testified by several witnesses that Rose Glenn, the plaintiff, and Flo Kirelle, the defendant, roomed at the same rooming house in Bridgetown that Flo Kirelle had some money, amounting to over \$300, which was stolen during her absence, that about the same time the money was missed Rose Glenn purchased a Dodge touring car. Testimony was to the effect that the Kirelle woman had a talk with Officer Willey, who testified that he investigated the case and talked to five or six people in the matter and he came to the conclusion that he had enough evidence to connect Rose Glenn with the theft of the money.

He testified that he placed her under arrest and put her in the jail at Newton, but that he did not have a warrant for her arrest and did not have any written charge against her. He said that it was not the custom to place a written charge against any person arrested there, but that they were held there and then brought into Wichita Falls, where written charges were preferred.

Under examination, Rose Glenn testified that M. A. Cohen had given her the money to purchase the car. She said that she was arrested about 5:30 o'clock one morning and held in the Newton jail until about 5 o'clock the next afternoon. She said that she had asked to see Flo Kirelle and that the latter came to her and spoke to her concerning the theft of the money. She also told that Officer Willey told her that he had sufficient evidence to convict her and that she had best give Flo Kirelle a bill of sale for the car which she had.

Her story further was to the effect that Officer Willey, the afternoon following her arrest the day before, took her to Bridgetown and that he left the car at a bank there and told her to go up to Flo Kirelle's room and that she would be there soon. She testified that she obeyed instructions and soon the officer came to the rooming house. She said that the officer and Flo Kirelle stepped into a room and had a private conversation which she did not hear.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 17.—Six companies of the Alabama national guard called into service last night by Governor Kilby for duty in the Walker and Jefferson counties, where bituminous coal miners have been on strike for two weeks, were expected to reach the strike area today. The troops will be under the command of Brigadier General Robert E. Steiner.

THREE COMPANIES HAVE GONE TO WALKER COUNTY

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 17.—Three companies of state troops, ordered on duty in connection with the strike of miners in the Alabama coal field, left here today for Walker county. It is understood they will establish headquarters in Jasper, a town in the center of the mining district where several clashes have occurred between mine guards and striking miners.

PROFITING CHARGES AGAINST CHICAGO FIRMS

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—O. E. Fagan, Washington expert, arrived here today to draw up indictments based on charges of profiteering in this part of the country. Profiteering charges were recently instituted against several Chicago firms and business houses.

This ranch contains 200,000 acres and was purchased by the Mexican government for Villa. It is valued at 1,000,000 pesos. The Rio Colorado runs through the ranch, which is in the northern part of the state of Durango, and will provide irrigation for a large part of the land.
