In keeping with our editorials and features recently on Americanism and patriotism, we were handed something this week which we think you would be interested in seeing.

Perhaps you've seen it before. If so, it still might be a good idea to review it with an eye to being on the defense.

This is an excerpt from a file on "Communist Rules for Revolution," obtained by the Armed Forces in Dusseldorf in May of 1919. It might explain some of today's happenings:

- "A. Corrupt the young. Get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial, destroy their ruggedness.
- "B. Get control of all means of publicity and thereby:
  - "1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays, and other diversions.
  - "2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.
  - "3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule and obloquy.
  - "4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.

"5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

"6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

"7. By specious argument cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues: honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

"C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with the view of confiscation of them and leaving the population helpless."

The above was printed in the Bartlesville-Examiner-Enterprise (Okla.) in 1919. Although that was 50 years ago, one can almost see a picture of America, 1969 as you read through the "rules." Looks like the communists are doing their job better than we as Americans are doing ours.

Thanksgiving seems as good a time as any for us to reflect on our heritage as Americans, and to resolve to do all within our power to keep our freedoms intact.

The Thanksgiving season isn't peculiar just to America, it seems. Each year, the two Baptist churches of San Pedro, a Guatemalan village on Lake Atitlan, celebrate a firstfruits or thanksgiving offering.

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday during the weekend celebration men, women and young people and children bring dried corn in baskets and sacks that resemble tennis nets. Baskets of coffee, lengths of hand-woven cloth, eggs, live chickens, and flowers form part of the ceremony.

Whether the custom springs from the Old Testament concept of firstfruits, from some ancient Indian custom, or simply from the spontaneous gratitude of Christian hearts, no one seems to know. But the custom is both beautiful and inspiring. Each man carries his load to the altar, and two deacons help him lay the gift on the platform.

The youth choir of twenty-five voices sings special arrangements, and preaching and Bible films complete the celebration.

During the next two weeks the members of the church will gather to shell the corn and prepare it for sale. The funds will go to repair and beautify the building and provide for general expenses. In a village where the field hand earns forty cents a day, last year the members gave \$140.00.

These Guatemalan Christians may have something to teach Christians in the United States about the real meaning of Thanksgiving.

## Contest Is Tossup Into Final Week

In keeping with its tradition, the Friona Star's annual Football contest is going "down to the wire," with no one in position to breathe easy, and several contestants still very much in the running.

The regular Friday, 5 p.m. deadline is in effect for games on the final week's contest slate. Jack Clark and Norman Mohr, who had forged to the lead a week earlier, rode the tide of upsets and "closies" during the past week's contest to remain tied for the top spot.

Both Clark and Mohr emerged with scores of 10 for the week, and lead the pack into the final week with season totals of 118 points. Elizabeth Peak, whose 11 was the best among the "contenders", is right behind the leaders with a 117 score, and F. G. Crofford and Mal Manchee of Hereford are tied at 116.

Several other contestants are grouped right behind these, and it's hard to draw the line of those "out of the running," because only a week ago a contestant gained five points on the leaders. Using this as a guide, there would be at least 30 contestants with a shot at one of the top three spots.

Contestants are shooting for three grand prizes in the season contest, including tickets to the Cotton Bowl Game which will feature the Southwest Conference Champion, either Texas or Arkansas, against Notre Dame.

Second grand prize will be two tickets to the Sun Bowl game, and third prize will be two season tickets to the Friona Chiefs' home games of 1970, or \$15 in cash. Winners of the top two prizes also receive expense money.

Winner of the weekly prize the past week was Pilo Castillo, who used some kind of crystal ball to come out with a score of 13. He was the only one of the contestants to score that high, and won the first prize of \$5.00 hands down.

The second place weekly winner, Larry Mabry, was like-

wise the only contestant to score a 12. Mabry, who won \$3.00, missed the Floydada-Frenship and Oklahoma-Nebraska games. Castillo's only miss was the Floydada-Frenship match. Mabry's younger brother, Terry, claimed third place money, with a score of 11, and he had to do some fancy guessing on the tie-breaker game to win the \$2.00 third prize.

Six contestants correctly picked 11 games. Eugene Ellis missed the Lazbuddie-Mat-

ador score by only six points, Eugene Bandy missed it by four, Elizabeth Peak by only one--but young Mabry hit the 28-8 score right on the head.

Others getting 11 games right were Mrs. E. V. Thompson and Roy Smith.

Contestants are reminded that in case of ties for one of the grand prizes, the ties will be broken by a tabulation of the tie-breaker scores for the entire season.

### IN BI-DISTRICT

## Lazbuddie's Opponent Will Be After Revenge

Lazbuddie's Longhorns, out for their second straight class B bi-district championship, will face a Groom team bent on revenge when the two meet Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Panhandle.

Lazbuddie school officials had been invited to hold the game in Friona, and wanted to do so, but Groom won the coin toss and chose the Panhandle site.

Coach Pat Casey's team is just a step under the 10-0 team he took against the same Groom eleven a year ago, but the 9-1 Longhorns of this season have not been nearly as impressive as last year's team, which downed Groom, 26-6.

For example, this year the "Horns have scored 338 points, compared to a modern school record of 473 by the 1968 team.

However, Lazbuddie has come up with an individual performer, halfback Derrrell Matthews, who won the area's scoring championship with 152 points, and the 171-pounder is a threat to score when he gets into the secondary.

Matthews has scored 23 touchdowns, and 14 points on conversions. He has carried the ball 185 times this season, and

picked up a healthy 1571 yards, or 8.5 yards per carry. Earlier in the season, Matthews was averaging better than 10 yards every time he handled the ball.

This output is better than the team-leading 1266 yards by Frank Hinkson on the 1968 team, and Matthews' 152 points tops Troy Steinbock's 147 from last season.

Fullback Larry Hodges, converted from a guard of last season, has added 622 yards rushing (5.0 per carry) and 50 points, backing up Matthews. Quarterback Monte Barnes has gained 198 yards rushing, passed for over 700 more, and scored 30 points.

Lazbuddie has averaged 381 yards per game, to 146 to their opponents, getting an average of 296 on the ground and 85 through the air.

The Longhorns have five men in the top ten scorers in District 2-B. Besides the three mentioned already, Arthur Graves has scored 34 points, ends Charles Lee and Mike Casey 28 and 24, reserve quarterback Mark Barnes 14 and guard Jim Noland has chipped in a TD. Groom, with a 10-0 record,

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## Pause And Reflect

"Oh wad some power the giftie gie us  
To see oursel's as others see us!  
It wad frae monie a blunder free us,  
An' foolish notion."

No, there is nothing wrong with the Star's type setter. It's just that Robert Burns is a little hard to read when he uses the Scottish dialect of 1786. We use it today as part of our Thanksgiving piece because it may help to remind us of how much we have to be thankful for.

Would it not help us to look at the American scene, and Friona in particular, through the eyes of someone else? How do we appear to the millions of people who live in bondage, oppressed by dictatorial rulers and deprived of liberty and the pursuit of happiness?

A visitor to the Statue of Liberty is confronted by a plaque bearing these words--

"Give me your tired, your poor,  
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,  
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.  
Send these, the tempest tossed, to me,  
I lift my lamp beside the golden door."

If only we, the middle class "silent majority," could realize what our country has meant to the oppressed of the world then there would be no need to tout patriotism.

We would know that here in the United States we bask in the warm glow of liberty's lamp.

We live, not behind an iron curtain, but behind the golden door of opportunity.

To illustrate, let's take a look at one of the world's best known areas--the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong, China.

The area of greater Hong Kong is approximately 400 square miles, or as we Texans would say, 400 sections of land. Living in these confines are about four million people. That figures out to be some ten thousand persons per section. Now consider our own county of Parmer here in the Panhandle of Texas.

We have a land area of 859 square miles, and a population of 11,280; giving us an average of 13 people per section. Expressed another way, Hong Kong is 770 times more thickly populated than is Parmer County.

Hong Kong is only one of thousands of places whose residents are less fortunate than ours.

Small wonder then that Frionans, being aware of their countless blessings, are in the forefront of the grateful on this, our National Day of Thanksgiving.

We made two long distance phone calls this weekend. One was to Washington, D. C., and one was to Greenville, S.C., the home of Judge Clement Haynesworth.

Both calls served to strengthen our conviction that he was knifed in the back by United States senators who kow-towed to the big money spent by organized labor and to the probable votes to be had by placating ultra-liberal civilrighters.

The consensus of opinion is that since the Judge has been placed under the glaring searchlights of a detailed investigation then why is it not meet that all Supreme Court Justices, and senators as well, be subjected to the same treatment?

Surely anyone smart enough to become a U. S. senator is aware that "those who live in glass houses should not throw stones."

We are keeping a list of all the senators who voted against the Judge; the purpose being to follow their actions on other legislations.

It is a safe bet they will be found standing a little bit left of center.

It might be a good idea for us voters to demand a thorough, soul-searching investigation of all candidates who come before us in all upcoming elections, especially senators.

Then we might expect to obtain government by statesmen, rather than by career politicians.

## Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 29, 1929

What might have been a most destructive fire at the gin Tuesday evening was averted by wise management and presence of mind of the overseer, Mr. Waddell. Some cotton became ignited, and Mr. Waddell kept the machinery in motion until the burning cotton reached the press, where it was covered with other lint and bound up in a bale and discharged, so that the only loss was the bale of cotton.

35 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 30, 1934

Many farmers of this locality are still busy sowing wheat; the rain that fell two weeks ago. Some of these farmers had been waiting for the moisture to complete their seeding operations; others had not sown any, and still others find themselves obliged to resow much of their acreage that had already been sown earlier but failed to get a stand on account of lack of moisture.

30 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 24, 1939

Reports reaching the Star office are to the effect that work on the Parmer County REA project is progressing at a most satisfactory rate, and that present indications are that the lines will be ready for energizing by the early part of December. Workmen are busy wiring homes of the subscribers so as to be ready for the current as soon as the lines are ready to receive it.

25 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 24, 1944

The biggest crowd in Friona's history is expected for the district title game which will be played on Thanksgiving Day in Friona between Friona and Hereford. Friona and Hereford won the right to play last week when the executive committee of the district met. Three teams, Friona, Hereford and Tulia, tied for the district's co-championship, but Hereford and Friona drew the right to play to see who represents the district in bi-district play.

20 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 25, 1949


The Rev. George Meyer of Baker, Montana, will arrive here during the week, and will preach at the Congregational Church Sunday morning. Rev. Meyer is coming here to look over the situation with a possible view to accepting a call to locate here as pastor of the church.

15 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 26, 1954

Less than \$9,000 stands in the way for construction planning for the new Parmer County Community Hospital, manager Jimmie Baxter said this week. The organized drive is still underway to secure the needed funds in the next few days, and over one-third of the contacts remain to be made in Friona alone. At last accounting, \$32,594 was in hand on the project with another \$8,688 on the books as pledged.

5 YEARS AGO--NOVEMBER 26, 1964

Nine members of the 1964 Friona Chieftain football team were named to the all-district teams chosen by District 3-AA coaches at a meeting Monday at Olton. Four of the players, tackle Dale Milner, fullback Doug Dodd, tackle Gene Weatherly and halfback Milton Hargus, were selected to the first teams. In addition, halfback Danny Murphree, tackle Ray Braxton, guard Bob Sims, center Bing Bingham and end Larry Buckley were named to the second teams.

Burial was in Rest Lawn Cemetery.





## GSPA Launches 1970 Membership Campaign

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association launched its 1970 membership campaign this week. Statements for dues have been mailed to farmers throughout this grain sorghum producing area. A. W. Anthony Jr., Friona farmer and GSPA president pointed out that "GSPA dues are not to be mistaken with the collection of the five cents per ton assessments, at the elevators for the research and promotion work to be carried on by the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers board."

All the legislative work of GSPA has to be carried on with dues paid to the association. The dues for 1970 have been set at \$10 per member in the area of Texas that farmers are paying the five cents per ton to Texas Grain Sorghum Producers board. In areas outside the 29 county referendum area, dues will continue to be based upon two pounds per 1000 pounds of production. The \$10 membership dues plus the assessment will average the same, for a million pound producer, as the regular two pounds per 1,000 pounds production.

"We feel the grain sorghum farmers must be represented when congress, farm organiza-

tions, U. S. Department of Agriculture, and others are writing laws that affect our future. This is our purpose," Anthony added. Of immediate importance are issues such as: (1) Extension of feed grain program (GSPA is working for an extension with income improvements), (2) Limitation of payments (GSPA is opposing limitations at any level), (3) And any legislation or government policies effecting our producers in labor problems, cost-price squeeze, export restrictions, etc.

Statements have been mailed along with the November issue of GSPA's newsletter. A return envelope is enclosed for use in mailing dues to GSPA headquarters at 1212 14th Street Lubbock, TEXAS.

All interested individuals are encouraged to make plans to attend this seminar.





### Answers to Turkey Questions

By Martha Logan

Q. What is the proper way to treat what is left of the roast turkey?

A. To refrigerate: Remove stuffing from body and neck cavities. Place in bowl and refrigerate. Leftover poultry may be refrigerated whole or stripped from the bones. Refrigerate broth and gravy as soon as possible. When cooled, meat, stuffing and gravy should be covered. Use

within 3 to 4 days.

To freeze: Poultry meat may be wrapped and frozen. Use within 2 months. Stuffing may also be wrapped and frozen. Use within 1 month.

Q. Are hen turkeys more tender than tom (male) turkeys?

A. No. Tenderness is primarily affected by the age of the live bird. All young turkeys whether toms or hens are tender.

Q. What is the advantage of a deep-basted turkey?

A. Each slice of white meat of deep-basted turkey is tender and juicy. This is because liquid fat is added where hand basting cannot reach and the turkey inner bastes as it roasts. Butterball Swift's Premium poultry meat, stuffing and







# Little-Known Facts On Thanksgiving Related

New York (NAPS)—Did you know that Thanksgiving didn't become a nation-wide observance until 1864? It's a fact! And this is just one of many surprising facts about our traditional American holiday.

It was Sarah Joseph Hale who first suggested that Thanksgiving should be a national holiday. For almost 20 years she campaigned through publications and letters to Presidents, state governors and other influential persons. Finally, she was able to win the support of President Lincoln who proclaimed the holiday during the third year of the Civil War.

There's a lot more to Thanksgiving and turkey than meets the palate, according to experts at Austin Nichols Company, who have compiled some wild turkey talk, as well as exciting recipes. For a truly wild Thanksgiving, try trotting out these ten tasty tidbits of information and watch your guests gobble them up before, during and after dinner.

1. The first Thanksgiving celebration lasted three days! After the first harvest of 1621, the Pilgrims invited Massasoit and 90 of his braves to take part in the feast of gratitude.

2. The greatest recorded weight for a turkey was for a tom aged 18 months at the International Poultry Show in London in 1964. It weighed 63 pounds 12 ozs!

3. The highest price ever paid for a turkey came about a year earlier at the same show. A 60-pound 13-ounce bird was purchased for \$784!

4. A "turkey shoot" was the term used during World War II to describe a mass airplane attack on the enemy.

5. While you may praise the distinctive flavor of turkey, Irishmen expect an entirely different taste when they sup on "Irish Turkey"—which is corned beef and cabbage.

6. Turkey feathers were used by American Indian medicine men as charms at sacred ceremonies.

7. The song "Turkey in the Straw", based on an old minstrel number, has been called by folklore authority B.A. Bodkin the "Liveliest and most popular of American fiddle tunes."


8. Turkey, according to one expert, got its name when merchants referred to it as "tukki," a Hebrew word meaning peacock. Other possible derivations stem from the facts that the wattles of the bird resemble the Turkish FEZ, that the bird makes a soft "turk, turk" sound, and that the Indians called the bird "furkee."

9. Our national bird is the bald eagle, but if Benjamin Franklin had his way, we might see a turkey rather than an eagle on the reverse side of our 25-cent coins. "I wish the bald eagle had not been chosen as the representative of our country," said Franklin. "The (wild) turkey is a much more respectable bird."

10. Indians of North America told many tales about the wild turkey. The Tewa Indians tell a story—probably a Pueblo version of Cinderella—about a poor girl who is befriended by turkeys. Like fairy godmothers, the turkeys dress her up, give her a beautiful hair-do, and send her to a dance where she finds a suitor. But, alas, the maiden and her Prince Charming do not live "happily ever after," for the girl flees westward with the turkeys, and her mother accuses her of being a witch! There's more to dish out than turkey facts and fancies, however. A recipe Properly prepared turkey with stuffing can drive holiday diners wild. These are the tempting ingredients:

12 lb. turkey, chop 3 cups fresh cranberries and blend in 3/4 cup sugar. Blend 3/4 cups melted butter or margarine with 3 quarts small bread cubes. Combine the two mixtures with 1-1/2 cups raisins, 1 tablespoon salt, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, grated rind of 2 lemons, 1/2 cup Bourbon and 1/2 cup broth or water. Mix well. The stuffing should be spooned into the cavity—not packed.

Tie wings to body; spoon in dressing; close opening with skewers and lace stuffed carcass shut with cord or heavy thread. Tie drumsticks to tail; grease skin thoroughly with butter. Pour water (depth 1-1/2") in bottom of roaster; insert poultry rack; place turkey breast down on the rack; put lid on roaster; roast in 350 degree oven about 20 minutes to the pound. Twenty minutes before turkey is done, turn turkey breast up, remove roaster lid, and brown breast until golden brown.






The bake sale and bazaar at Girl Scout House last Saturday was a great success and leaders and members of troops conducting the sales are most grateful to local residents who patronized them.
