Friona is in the running to land the bi-district game involving the Lazbuddie Longhorns, it was learned this week.

The Chamber of Commerce and school officials have invited Lazbuddie to come here, and they have indicated an interest. In fact, Lazbuddie might use Friona as its "home field" choice if the decision were left to a coin toss.

It all depends on who wins in District I-B, Groom or Booker, and then how the coin-tossing goes. Also to be considered are where other area schools play in playoff games that weekend.

Naturally, Lazbuddie is interested in playing where they will draw the most fans. Personally, we'd like to see the good Longhorn team perform here, and believe that a good number of Friona fans would turn out if they do.

Lazbuddie Coach Pat Casey gave us one of the best quotes we've heard lately (although he might not have intended for it to turn out to be a quote.)

Casey, in pointing out that the team's scores in some games weren't as impressive as they might otherwise have been, said the team tended to lay "about as hard as the competition demands."

And the "spinach capital" is located in Crystal City—complete with the statue of Popeye.

As we approach the Thanksgiving we came across the following gem, which you might think about: The first fellow to do something is a hero; the last to do it is a bum. The first people to settle in the United States were Pilgrims. The last are foreigners.

Ninety-six new textbook titles expected to cost nearly \$11 million their first year in the public school classrooms were adopted last Monday by the State Board of Education.

The new texts, which range across subjects from arithmetic to Latin and grades one to 12, will be distributed to Texas public school students in September, 1970. They will continue in adoption from three to five years.

An estimated 2,765,093 copies will be purchased the first year at an average cost of \$3.96 per book. The total first year bill is expected to tally out at \$10,964,994.

The 96 different books published by 30 firms were selected from an original list of 264 books bid by 48 publishers.

The winning process began last May when the State Board of Education appointed the 1969 textbook committee, setting in motion a schedule that covered six months and involved 750 readers. Most members of the committee are classroom teachers.

Father Dies

Funeral services for Hoyt Randolph McCraw, 60, of Levelland were conducted this past week. He died Saturday in Big Spring.

Mrs. Johnson really led the way, being the only one of the one hundred plus contestants to tally a score of 12. Only games she missed were the Texas A&M-Rice and Baltimore-San Francisco contests.

Mr. Johnson was one of only five contestants who correctly picked 11 of the contest games, and his tie-breaker guess earned him the \$3.00 second place money.

Third place went to Ray Strickland. Others with scores of 11 included Wendell Garner, Benny Pryor and Norman Mohr.

Scores for the week ranged all the way down to four, so contest editor Bill Ellis reminds that anything can happen with two big weeks remaining. "This is definitely not the time to drop out, as we have some games on this week's schedule that can go either way. Just which way they'll go is anybody's guess," he commented.

Services Held For MBP's Gene Frye

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday for Robert E. (Gene) Frye, 53, president of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc.

Services were held at Scottsdale, Ariz. Frye passed away at 4 a.m. Sunday, after being in ill health for some time. Frye, who had earlier been president of Iowa Beef, helped organize Missouri Beef Packers, and had a major role in seeing the company become one of the fastest-growing independent meat packing companies in the nation.

Frye designed the Friona plant, serving as architect. He also had designed the Rock Port plant, and designed the company's third plant, under construction at Plainview.

Operations at Friona's MBP plant were suspended on Tuesday, out of respect for Frye.

Frye was well-known to several Frionans, as he worked closely with the local indus-

trial committee when the local plant was in its formative stage.

Frye is survived by his wife, Laurene, a daughter, Shannon, 15, and a son Neil, 13.

Bank Announces New Banking Hours

Friona State Bank announced new banking hours to begin December 1, which will find the bank opening during the noon hour on weekdays, and closing on Saturdays.

The decision was reached after a caucus of retail merchants and a sampling of opinion.

Beginning on December 1, the new banking hours will be 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Fridays (remaining open during the noon hours.)

The new schedule will actually give the institution more banking hours, according to vice-president Charles Allen. In a normal week, it would mean the bank will be open two additional hours per week.

In addition, whereas Friona State Bank currently takes eight holidays during the year, they would limit this to only six under the new setup, making the bank open two other days it would have closed.

Auto Wreck Kills Two Friona Teens

Tragedy struck the community of Friona another blow during the past week, as two city teenagers died following a wreck a mile west of town.

Becky Broyles, 14, was killed instantly, and Billy Rushing, 15, died Tuesday, after the car in which they were riding went out of control about 11 p.m. last Saturday night. Investigating officers said the right front tire on the 1967 Ford, LTD blew out, causing the car to turn over. The vehicle skidded some 250 feet, and apparently rolled over Miss Broyles. Both occupants were thrown out of the car.

The accident happened on Farm Road 1731, less than 150 yards from the Rushing home. Young Rushing was driving the vehicle, which was headed east.

Miss Broyles, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bearl Dean Broyles of Hub, was dead at the scene. A freshman at Friona High School, she was a major-ette in the Friona High School Band.

Rushing, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eric Rushing was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital, and then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where he underwent brain surgery Sunday morning. The young man, a member of the Chieftain B-team this year,

never regained consciousness.

The deaths brought to seven the number of fatalities to Friona residents during the year.

Funeral services for Miss Broyles were conducted from Sixth Street Church of Christ of which she was a member, at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday. Officiating ministers were Bill Gibson, Friona, and C.J. Horton, El Paso.

Pallbearers were Joe Boggess, Ted Procter, Miles Lillard, Bob Thomas, Johnny Bandy, Scott Lillard, Jayson Grimley and Bobby Moore.

Survivors in addition to her parents, and one brother, Larry, of the home; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Owen Broyles of Muleshoe, and a maternal grandmother, Mrs. W.D. Hale, Waco.

Burial was in the Friona Cemetery under direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

Funeral services for Billy will be held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday at Friona's United Methodist Church. Rev. Albert Lindley, pastor, will officiate.

Pallbearers are to be James Sides, Bill Bailey, Dave Buske, Jim Jones, Jerry Mahry, Rusty Lindeman, Tommy Long and Gary Phipps.

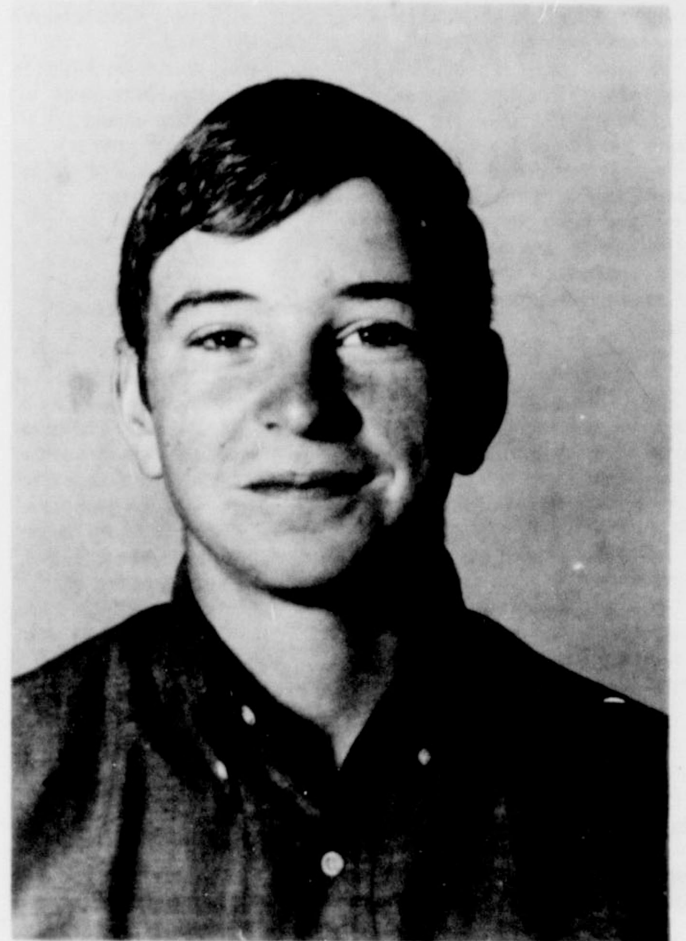

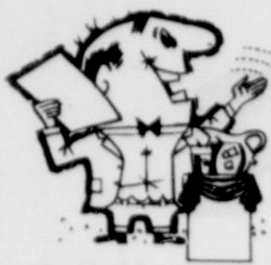
Canyon, and a daughter, Mrs. Jerry Loflin of Friona. Five grandchildren also survive.

Pause And Reflect

"Continual dropping wears away a stone" (Lucretius, 55-95, B.C.)

Have you noticed that we are being bombarded with a swarm of trite expressions?

It is as if we had forsaken the safe harbor of thoughtful speech and set ourselves adrift upon the sea of catch phrases. We have in our land a certain minority group whose spokesmen find it impossible to make a simple statement without the inclusion of their favorite—"You know."

What do they mean, "You know," If posed as a question it might warrant continued discussion and in that sense merit consideration. But it is not thusly expressed.

It is usually tacked onto the end of a statement and in effect assumes, or demands, your agreement. You then have a choice.

You may say, "No! I do not know. I desire that you explain more fully."

On the other hand you may simply nod in agreement and allow the nonsensical diatribe to continue.

Then we have the two "gans"—credibility and generation. The first is merely a polite way of lying; the second came to light when some mod intellectual discovered that our younguns are not in complete agreement with us oldsters in the areas of dress, food and music.

"Ethnic" is a handy little word to have around, although it was hardly considered a household word until the loud mouthed minority groups began to demand attention.

One would be led to believe that there is no such being as a real American—only a loosely organized country of more than 220 million souls representing many ethnic groups.

Years ago we called this banding together, for the common good, the "Great American Melting Pot."

Today that expression is scorned by the forces determined to divide and conquer our nation.

Witness the "peace" marches, that evolve into riots. Examine the S.D.S. (Students for a Democratic Society) their cry is for peace and democracy while they burn and loot buildings and their radical members deny access to classrooms.

There are dozens of words and phrases that are being drilled into our minds to influence our thinking.

We considered any form of public assistance to be a humiliating experience.

There are many honest folks who really need a helping hand and they deserve our sympathy and money; however we need not feel guilty because there are bums who quit trying to help themselves.

Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 22, 1929

Street commissioner F.W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places.

It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter.

If this can be done, Friona's main street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

35 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 23, 1934

The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H.L. Thurston, pastor of the local Methodist Church. All other ministers in the city will share in the services, and appropriate music will be provided.

30 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 17, 1939

The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the Entertainment Committee of the local chamber of commerce.

25 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 17, 1944

Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for the district championship. The Chiefs defeated the Tullia Hornets earlier in the season, and then fell to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tullia, then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran roughshod over the Hereford eleven. This makes Hereford and Friona still has a game to play with Dalhart, and could make it a three-way tie.

20 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 18, 1949

Don Edwin Lewis, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, will be the featured soloist on the Co-op round-up radio program over Station KFDA, Amarillo on Saturday. Young Lewis will sing two songs, "The Old Refrain," and "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling."

15 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 19, 1954

Organization of a local credit association Tuesday evening became a reality for Parmer County. The Friona, Texas, Federal Credit Union now chartered, completed organization at an open meeting in the Friona Legion Hall, with all supervisory personnel elected.

5 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 19, 1964

The First Baptist Church will officially observe its 50th anniversary this Sunday, with special services throughout the day. Former pastors and members will be the speakers for the occasion. Rev. Russell Pogue, now of Petersburg, will bring the message at the Sunday morning service.

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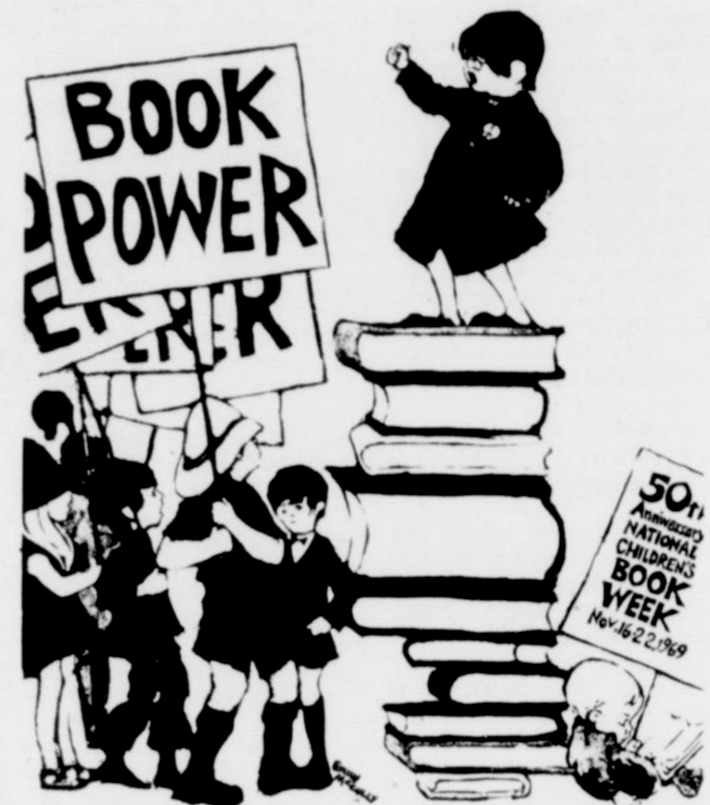
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LETTERS TO EDITOR

Planning a party? Plot your way out of panic with time-saving sprays to add gaiety without adding to the time you have to spend on decking the halls any time in the year. Here are a few ideas for making instant party atmosphere.

For the windows: If nature's a slow poke during winter, try trimming your windows with a splash of one of the glass cleaner sprays. The touch of "frost" around the edges of the windows adds a pretty backdrop to lights -- and the aerosol cleaner makes post-party grime melt faster than a snowflake.

For a gay buffet: Looking for a new backdrop for the punch bowl? Spray-paint an old tray in green, gold, or silver, drop a little glitter dust on it before the paint dries. If you use either a silver or glass punch bowl, both the sprayed-on color and glitter will reflect in the bowl.

Wet weather protection: If you're giving a party and it rains, snows or hails -- expect boots and rubbers to be added to the decor. Try spraying the bottom of a plastic runner with skid-proof spray, then spray gold paint on the corners (and maybe an initial or your name if you're really inspired).
