

PEQUINA REPORTS WASHINGTON SWARMS WITH LOBBYISTS

PERSONAL REPRESENTATIVE OF PRESIDENT OF LA HUERTA MAKES REPORT. WHITE HOUSE FORTRESS IN MESHES OF INTRIGUE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Charges that the "petroleum intrigue" has been unable to reach the white house and has turned its attention to the department of state, which is overrun by lobbyists representing interests working against Mexico in petroleum, political and diverse other matters, are made by Roberto Pequeria, personal representative in the United States of Provisional President de la Huerta, in a statement issued tonight.

Senator Pequeria, who also is Mexican financial agent in the United States with headquarters in New York, has returned to Mexico City after a 100-day tour in the United States. The report made public by Senator Pequeria asserts that there are two main groups in the United States which are most active in opposition to Mexico.

The first of these groups, it declares, comprises the "speculators" including the speculators and money brokers who have acquired ill-gotten gains under the various fiat currencies which have contended for power in Mexico, but are now banished by the new order of things in Mexico and who have flooded the Washington hotels and state department corridors in unceasing hostility to Mexico.

The second group, the report alleges, consists of oil operators who have also carried on an active campaign against Mexico, but who have shown a willingness to accept Mexican administration difficulties equitably.

The report starts by saying that Secretary of State Colby and Under-Secretary Davis are being unjustly and unreasonably treated by President Wilson and refers to the white house as "a fortress which towers above human failings and misdeeds."

It asserts, however, that the lobbyists are "all striving together toward the same end, of preventing the just and equitable administration of the United States and every opportunity that the administration is offering to itself as an instrument of their purposes."

TREASURY CAN NOT BE USED TO KEEP UP ARTIFICIAL PRICES

SEC. HOUSTON REITERATES OPPOSITION TO REPRESENTATIVES OF FARM INTERESTS. SECRETARY'S STATEMENT FRANKLY CRITICISED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Secretary Houston reiterated today to representatives of agricultural interests in conference here that the treasury would not be a party to the withholding of any commodity from the market in order to maintain artificially high prices.

Spokesmen for the delegation were frank in their criticism of the secretary's recent statement, that prices had begun to recede, but the secretary told them as frankly that his statement properly represented conditions.

The delegation sought mainly to have the treasury revive the war finance corporation, arguing that through it they would be able to obtain funds to finance exports which they claimed were falling off, creating a stagnant market.

Secretary Houston asked if any members of the delegation would loan directly on German bonds or other securities, explaining that previous approval of cotton producers were that the government should make available to them the German market. A heated colloquy between the secretary and Senator Smith of South Carolina followed.

"Germany must live," the senator said. "You know she must live. I see no reason why her bonds should not be accepted. I would reply to your direct question, yes, a thousand times yes, for as I said before, Germany must live or the Washington hotels and state department corridors in unceasing hostility to Mexico."

HARDING ENROUTE TO LOUISVILLE WHERE HE SPEAKS TONIGHT

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE IS CORDIALLY GREETED BY SOUTHERN AUDIENCE. VIGOROUSLY ASSAILS THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

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LORD ROBERT CECIL JOINS IN ATTACK ON IRISH POLICY

JOINS GREY, ABQUITH AND MORLEY AND DEMANDS AN INVESTIGATION. POLICY OF REPRISALS SEVERELY ARRIGNED

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Denunciation of the government's Irish policy by the liberal forces of the country represented by the recent statements of Viscount Morley, seems likely to grow into a formidable movement.

The latest recruit is Lord Robert Cecil, one of the respected of the unionist leaders, who has joined Viscount Grey in a letter to the great cabinet for an investigation by a constitutional tribunal as to whether the government is responsible for the reprisals.

It is a very incomplete account of the reprisals as reported in the press. It is alleged on apparently overwhelming evidence that the armed forces of the crown have been employed systematically to burn or destroy buildings and other property in towns, villages and farms in Ireland.

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JAMIESON COTTON GIN DESTROYED BY FIRE; BELIEVED INCENDIARY

Flames believed by fire department officials to have been started by "fire bug" who first shattered the feed pipes and gauges of an oil-burning furnace, totally destroyed the J. Jamieson cotton gin at Wichita Falls, Tex., and Indiana early this morning.

Thirty bales of cotton on the platform and in the gin yard were saved by firemen. After several of the bales had been searched, the fire was extinguished.

The fire was discovered by the night watchman at the Jamieson gin, who alerted the firemen. # TWO MORE DEPUTY SHERIFFS INDICTED; RANGERS IN CHARGE

Following the indictment late Wednesday of three deputies of the sheriff's department, all of whom were stationed in the northwest fields, the enforcement of the law in this district has now been placed in the hands of Captain Aldrich of the Texas rangers and his assistants.

Charged with having accepted bribes, Deputy Sheriffs Abe Willey and Tom Crabbe were taken into custody late Wednesday afternoon following the return of true bills by the grand jury. Bonds were fixed at \$2,000 each. Both perfected bond Wednesday night, and were allowed to go free without spending any time in the county jail.

It is set forth in the indictment that each one of the deputies accepted bribes of \$100 from a certain man whose name is mentioned in the indictment in order to gain freedom after having been placed under arrest.

Officer Willey came to the sheriff's office and surrendered himself after he had learned that members of the Texas rangers were seeking him. He was the first to perfect bond. Officer Crabbe was taken into custody by Captain Aldrich in the oil fields.

Both of the officers indicted as well as John Canada who was indicted on Monday by the grand jury, were stationed in the northwest oil fields. Willey has been an officer in this district for over a year. Officer Crabbe has been there practically a half year. Canada had only been there about three months.

The district which these three officers had under their supervision included the oil fields surrounding and the towns of Bradley's Corner, New-town and Bridgetown. With the three officers now indicted leaves this district without any deputies from the sheriff's office but Captain Aldrich of the Texas rangers stated that he and his assistants would patrol these fields.

It is stated that the session of the grand jury and the return of several bills had its effect on conditions in the oil field districts as it was announced that practically all places which were under surveillance have closed up.

It was unofficially announced Thursday morning that the special grand jury would without a doubt be in session for 60 days in order to conduct the work of investigation of conditions in the county. This was not substantiated by anyone who is connected with the work of investigation, however.

The Times has been asked by officials to explain to the public that the return of a true bill against any person does not mean that the man is guilty of the charge as set forth in the indictment. It is merely an expression of the grand jury that it believes there is sufficient evidence to warrant a trial.

# PROBLEM FOREIGN TRADE IS DECLARED ONE OF FINANCE

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 14.—Changes in the constitution of the American Manufacturers' Export association, making banks and insurance and steamship companies eligible for membership, were voted on at the annual convention of the association here today. This departure from the policies heretofore governing the association was said to have resulted from the organization's desire for closer co-operation in foreign trade problems.

William C. Redfield, former secretary of commerce, was elected president to succeed W. L. Saunders.

In his valedictory address Mr. Saunders sounded the keynote of the convention, which he said was: "In order to obtain world trade, the American manufacturers must now take a leading part themselves."

"American manufacturers are not bankers," he said. "The critical situation in our foreign trade itself is one of finance. It involves banking and investment problems. This is not our job. If it were, we should probably be efficient in production. Surely we do not wish to adopt the German system in which the bank controls the industries."

James S. Alexander, president of the National Bank of Commerce in New York, declared that the banks had not failed to co-operate with business men in the fullest extent in the present business era. If business men felt there had been any such tendency on the part of the banks it was due to a misconception or a failure to give weight to fundamental facts, he said.

"During the period through which we have recently passed," he went on, "the loyal co-operation of the banks with business maintained the soundness of the business structure in a way never before witnessed in this country. If any one feels that the banks as a whole have not co-operated with business as they should, it is because he does not fully appreciate the fundamentals involved."

While the American credit structure was highly expanded, he said, the volume of gold had shrunk and it had become advisable for the banks to conserve their positions with the utmost care. He regarded this as the best service the banks could render to business for "weakened banks would have meant disaster."

"The peak of credit expansion must soon pass," he predicted, but he foresaw that there must be established stable price levels. "So that business could be conducted on the basis of confident judgment rather than of guess and speculation."

# COMMISSION ONLY TO ADVISE ON AMOUNT OF GERMANY'S REPARATION

PARIS, Oct. 14.—Abandonment by the reparations commission of the task assigned to it by the treaty of Versailles is the principal feature of compromise adopted during the conference between Premiers Delacroix and Lloyd George, of Belgium and Great Britain, respectively, says the Petit Parisien.

The commission was charged with the work of fixing the amount of the German indemnity and the matter of payment, but in the future, the newspaper says, it will probably sit only in a consultative capacity.

# 41 AUTOMOBILES BURNED AT HOUSTON THURSDAY

HOUSTON, TEX., Oct. 14.—Forty-one automobiles were burned today when fire destroyed the two-story office and garage of the Cricket Tailors company here. Both cars and building were a complete loss. Firemen believed the blaze started in chauffeurs' sleeping quarters.

# AMNESTY FOR POLITICAL OFFENDERS IN ITALY

ROME, Oct. 14.—Italy today proclaimed an amnesty for all political and military crimes committed prior to September 15, 1919. The act practically exempted all deserters from the Italian army from suffering the customary penalty.

The amnesty also includes former Austrian subjects now living in Italian territory.

# TARWATER CONVICTED FOR MURDER OF EDITOR

GALLATIN, MO., Oct. 14.—Hugh Y. Tarwater was found today guilty by a jury of second degree murder for the killing of Wesley L. Robertson, a veteran newspaper publisher here, December 23, 1919. Tarwater was sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary. The jury deliberated about 26 hours—the trial lasted 10 days. Defense

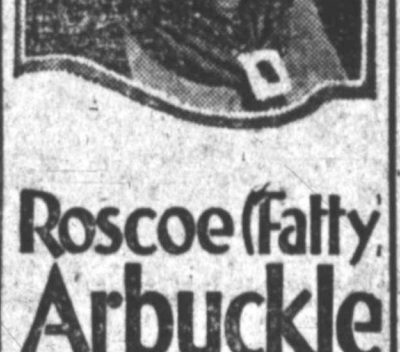

# BURKBURNETT PLANS CHAMBER COMMERCE FOR REAL SERVICE

BURKBURNETT, Oct. 14.—The committee for the organization of a chamber of commerce is working upon plans to be submitted to a mass meeting of citizens on the night of October 26, at which time all residents of Burk Burnett will have an opportunity to vote for or against their adoption.

The two weeks intervening between now and the 26th will be devoted to a campaign of publicity so that all may know the methods and purposes of the proposed organization. Following the mass meeting a four-day membership campaign is planned, and all citizens will be asked to join. Ordinarily about two per cent of a city's population is to be found in its chamber of commerce, but it is expected that this one will contain a far higher percentage.

Although the organization will follow the general custom of calling itself a chamber of commerce, in order that it may be affiliated with chambers of commerce in other cities, the organization will not be so much commercial as civic. It is planned to make it strictly a community organization, to assist in all worthy enterprises, and its object is to constantly and consistently make Burk Burnett a better place in which to live. It will be for the laboring man as well as for the merchant and will know no class distinction and no partisanship.

A. R. Thomas, who was president of a former organization known as the Boosters Club and who is a member of the present organization committee, says that the chamber of commerce is not being organized to influence new enterprises to come to Burk Burnett but to improve conditions for those who are already here and for those who may in the ordinary course, come here. That it is not antagonistic to the interests of any other community, near or far, for as the interests of the individual citizen are intermeshed with the interests of the community, so the

interests of the community are interwoven with those of all other communities and of the county, the state and the nation.

"We have no desire," said he, "to induce any one to move to Burk Burnett, except that we hope to make Burk Burnett such a good place to live that people will wish to live here. We hope to help the farmers in this region to improve their schools and their living conditions and their farming methods and their stock so that their homes will be places of comfort and happiness. It is not our purpose to induce them to move into the city to help swell the urban population. That would be calamitous both to them and to us for just as the town needs the country, so the country needs the town."

The committee is receiving the support of all interests here and has every promise of a huge success. It is planned to secure a paid secretary for the permanent organization. Hubert M. Harrison, secretary of the Wichita Falls chamber of commerce, is rendering to the committee valuable and much appreciated assistance.

The revival meetings being held in the big tent on Third street by the Baptists are resulting in conversions each night. Thus far the church has secured about 69 new members through these meetings. The Methodist church is co-operating, holding no services and its members

ship is attending the tent meetings. Each night people of some distinguished class or calling are especially invited and meals are reserved for them. The first night the Masons came, then the bankers, then the Methodists, then the Baptists, then the jitney drivers and last night the barbers. The plan is perhaps not so efficacious as the free-lunch attraction, but is less expensive.

The Y. M. C. A. has contracted for a gymnasium course to commence November 1 and end the last of January. One entertainment will be given each week, most of which will be musical or humorous with an occasional educational lecture. Miss Gordon, whose numbers proved so popular when she was here on the Chautauqua course, has been secured for one of the gymnasium entertainments, and she will give both readings and lecture.

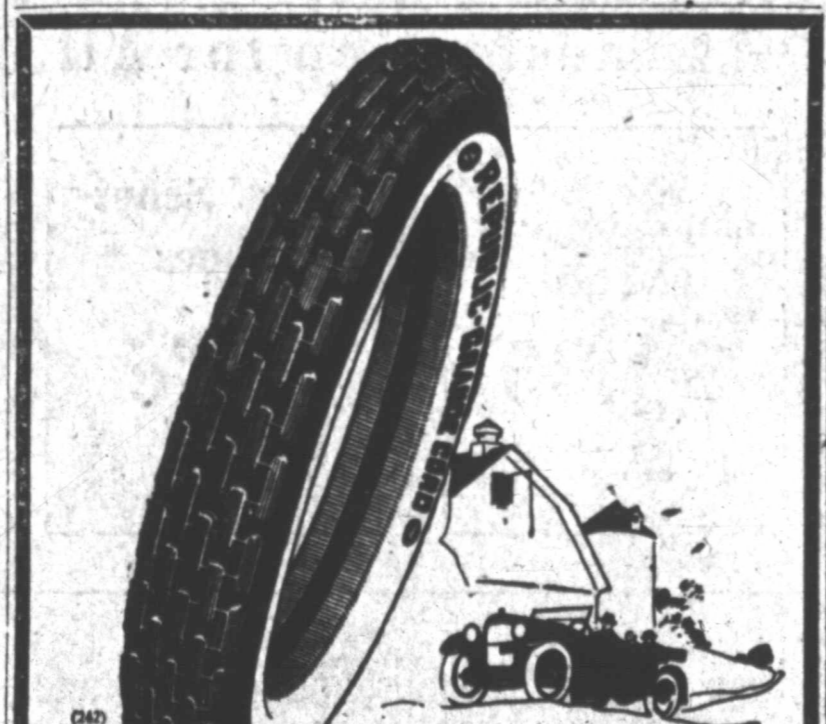

## REPUBLICANS SPEAK AT COURT HOUSE IN BEHALF OF TICKET

At a meeting held at the Wichita county court house last night in the interest of the gubernatorial candidacy of J. G. Culbertson, S. L. Franklin, Dallas, the principal speaker, alleged that the present state administration is squandering the people's money and that the election of Culbertson would usher in a sane, economical business policy.

He urged that two parties are needed in every state, the party in power being held in check by the fear that another party will supplant it. Said:

"The slogan in all states where progressive and efficient government prevails is 'One party in power, the other on watch.'"

"Lack of business-like administration of the state's affairs," said Mr. Franklin, "has caused Texas much trouble in the past and has resulted in the multiplication of offices and the squandering of the people's money in the paying of unnecessary salaries and expenses. The voters of Texas should embrace this opportunity to put the republican party on even terms with the democrats and bring a state of efficiency into the administration of their affairs which they cannot have with a single dominant party as has been the case in the past."

Speaking of the national election he said: "You do not have to worry about Harding and Coolidge. They are taking care of themselves." He criticized the League of Nations and referring to the obligations which Article X would impose upon the United States said that we should be continually embroiled in war over European boundaries in which we have no interest and no concern.

Charlie Dodgen, independent candidate for sheriff of Wichita county, was introduced by T. B. Smock, who presided at the meeting. Mr. Smock stated that in accordance with republican tradition of supporting a man because of his fitness for office rather than because of the party tag attached to him, the republicans had endorsed Dodgen, instead of nominating one of their own party.

Mrs. Myron A. Kesner of Dallas, also addressed the meeting, and urged the women leave their private house-cleaning and engage in public house-cleaning.

**WORK STARTED ON THE NEW STRAND THEATER ON SCOTT**

Work has been started on the foundation of the new Strand Theater on Scott street just south of Eighth. According to present plans the new playhouse will be ready to open in about three months.
