JAMIESON COTTON GIN DESTROYED BY FIRE; **BELIEVED INCENDIARY**

Plames believed by fire department officials to have been started by a "fire bug." who first shattered the feed pipes and gauges of an oll-burning furnace, lotally destrayed the J. B. Jamieson sotton gin at Third street and Indiana avenue early this morning; burned up five tons of cotton seed and weeked other equipment and materials valued at \$5,000. The total loss will run over \$20,000.

Thirty bales of cotton on the platform and in the gin yard were saved by firemen, after several of the bales had been scorched.

Fed by oil and fanned by a high south wind, the flames were beyond control, as far as the gin building was affected, before the firemen arrived.

The alarm was turned in at 5:13 o'clock and was answered by apparastation No. 4. Although It was a short run, the firemen found the entire gin building ready to collapse when they arrived. Farmers Endangered.

The flames had spread with such rapidity that three farmers, who had een sleeping in their wagons near the suilding, narrowly escaped being badly burned. The clothing of each man was scorched and sparks were covering many bales of cotton in the yard as the firemen "tied in" at the plug at Fourth and indiana. With only one fire plug and a small main, the uopartment could do nothing to save the gin. A second alarm brought the alan and apparatus from station No. 3, and the entire department spent three hours as ving the baled cotton and protecting buildings on Ohio avenue that were threatened by the flames.

The danger, from the Southern standpoint, is the likelihood of an effort to establish voting strength instead of population as the basis—a basis which, on account of our primary elections and their virtually determining the regular elections, would be a serious menace, for it would inevitably result in a reduction of Southern representation.
