SAYS MUST AVOID TRADE COMPETITION WITH THE BRITISH

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 5.—America and Great Britain must avoid national trade competition "organized by government and supported by political action," Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambassador to the United States, declared today in an address at a chamber of commerce luncheon. If the United States of Great Britain, he said, could begin to organize areas of exclusive economic advantage, there would inevitably come a clash of interests that would at least strain the friendly relations between the countries.

OKLAHOMA DEMOCRATIC HEAD SAYS SOCIALISTS AND NEGROES ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEFEAT

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Nov. 5.—The republican victory in Oklahoma, while unexpected, can easily be accounted for in view of facts shown by the results in the various counties. Disaffection in the democratic party as the result of the bitter primary contest between Senator T. P. Gore and Scott Ferris, was not a deciding factor in the race.

Briefly the cause can be summed up as follows:

The coalition of the socialists and republicans was perfect. There were approximately seventy-five to eighty thousand socialist votes in the state. The count shows that approximately 75 per cent of this vote cast their ballots for the republican ticket.

This, in a great measure, is accounted for by the fact that the socialists objected to President Wilson's vigorous war measures and that Congressman J. W. Harrell, republican candidate for United States senate, voted to let Victor Berger retain his seat as a member of the house.

In addition to this, a campaign of hate, conducted against President Wilson for over two years by the republican party, could not be counteracted in a short campaign of two months.

A few weeks before election the bottom dropped out of the cotton market, thereby causing great disaffection among the cotton growers in the southern part of the state.

Other elements of chances reacted toward the benefit of our opponent. Aid to this fact that over 25,000 negroes were registered and voted and you have the answer to the reason why Oklahoma for the first time in its his-

tory, entered the republican column. Contrary to the announced belief of the republican leader, Oklahoma is not a republican or even a doubtful state under normal conditions. Normal conditions will return within less than four years and we are confident that the democracy of Oklahoma will reassert itself in even more positive terms than it has at any time in the past.

RECONSIDER PROGRAM TO BE DISCUSSED BY CENTRAL AMERICAN REPRESENTATIVES

SAN SALVADOR, REPUBLIC OF SALVADOR, Nov. 4.—Reconstruction of the program to be discussed by representatives of Central American republics at their meeting to be held at San Jose, Costa Rica, early in December, has been requested by unionist groups in this country. They asked the San Salvador foreign office to propose that if all five republics are not able to enter the proposed union at once, a union may be formed by others and those which refuse to become charter members may enter later after due consideration.

This request has been forwarded to the international central American bureau by the Salvadoran foreign office, which is asked to reply by telegram.

GERMAN TREASURY IS FACING BIG DEFICIT

Approximately Seventy Billion Marks Declares Dr. Karl Helfferich.

BERLIN, Nov. 4.—Germany's treasury faces a deficit of approximately seventy billion marks, Dr. Karl Helfferich, former vice-chancellor, declared in the reichstag here today. He said that in the face of expenditures amounting to one hundred billion marks, the receipts would total thirty billion. He declared it was impossible to vote the credits demanded for the inter-allied high commission in the Rhine territory and reproached the minister of finance, Dr. Wirth, for not having done anything to remedy the situation.

Dr. Wirth, in answering stated the cabinet had decided to introduce a bill providing for a "sacrifice tax" adding that the government would ask a credit of one billion marks to buy cereals abroad. He declared the financial difficulties of the German people could be solved "only if they can live."

RENEW DEMAND FOR THE RECALL OF THE MEMPHIS MAYOR AND COMMISSION

MEMPHIS, TENN., Nov. 5.—Demands for a recall election directed against Rowlett Paine, mayor of Memphis and the four other members of the municipal commission, were given again before the city clerk today with the filing of a supplemental list of petitioners seeking an election to determine whether the present city administration should be replaced.

The signatures to the supplemental petitions were secured at the polling

places Tuesday, according to leaders in the movement "who claim they contain the names of 4,800 qualified voters. The original petitions, filed about two weeks ago, were held by the city clerk to have been about 3,600 names short of the number required to enforce the demand for a recall election.

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REPORT SALT WATER ENCROACHMENT IN THE OLD MEXICO FIELDS

HOUSTON, Nov. 5.—The Mexican producing situation interlarded with conditions affecting the oil operators of Texas, it is pointed out in news reaching the Houston office of National Petroleum News from Tampico regarding the salt water encroachment in Los Naranjos territory wells. A survey made of the Texas producing situation causes this publication to call attention to the prospect of smaller exports of Mexican crude oil than the record high level of 17,311,217 barrels moved out in September, the recession from the peak forecasting the return of tankers from the Atlantic coast. Mexico traffic to coastwise shipping lanes and the consequent greater call upon Texas production to supply eastern seaboard refineries.

Salt Water Encroachment. Appearance of salt water in two wells on the Amatlan hacienda of the Los Naranjos high point on the 40-mile "riffle-edge" belt between Tepetate and Alamo (constituting the lower country, light oil producing area of Mexico) was significant of the encroachment which is rapidly felt under operating conditions existing in the Spanish speaking republic. The wells affected were the Mexican Eagle Oil company's No. 18 on lot 113, three miles south of the Chinampa well (lot 114) of Woollet, Thompson & Bucklew, which has since shown salt water in the head of the northern (Chinampa) development of the Los Naranjos territory; and the International Petroleum company's No. 4, lot 251, Amatlan. The Transcontinental Petroleum company well on lot 97, which was pinched from 26,000 to 20,000 barrels daily when it showed one per cent of water about two months ago, is again showing up sediment.

High Spot Enters Three. National Petroleum News points out that these four wells in the Los Naranjos territory considered in conjunction with the Compania Mexicana de Cidoctos, S. A. (Island Oil & Transport company) original salt water failure in the same lot where its unaffected producing well was drilled makes certain to the operator familiar with conditions in Mexico that the fifth high spot on the known producing fold between Tepetate and Alamo has entered its threes. Other high points to have been brought to a minimum of production by salt water encroachment were Alamo and Petro del Llano at the south end and Tepetate and Juan Castens at the north end of the 40-mile strip, leaving only Los Naranjos, Cerro Azul and the newer Zacamitla pool where the Huasteca Petroleum company discovery well was completed October 8, last, for 75,000 barrels daily at 2,425 feet.

Find Pay 200 Feet Higher. A well completed by the Mexican Eagle Oil company a mile north and a little west of the Huasteca's lot 24 Zacamitla well, both being rated at 75,000 barrels daily, found the pay at about 200 feet higher. The Mexican Eagle well is on lot 228 Amatlan, but properly considered in the Zacamitla area rather than in the Amatlan part of Los Naranjos.

Operators in Mexico anticipated months ago, says National Petroleum News, the situation now developing at Los Naranjos and laid their plans on the assumption that Zacamitla would prove another productive high spot along the lower country fields, these "high spots" being separated by "saddles" or "dikes" in the formation. Whether these separations come from "saddles" (low spots) or "dikes" (volcanic intrusions) makes little difference in the producing situation existing.

cept that salt water encroachment, traveling from both ends of the fold, might make speeded headway through "saddles" than it would through "dikes."

Facilities Not Available. The immediate point made is that the Los Naranjos encroachment has assumed sufficient proportions that it appears a certainty that facilities can not be extended into Zacamitla in time to maintain the continued record production and exporting of oil that has been coming out of the so-called "lower country" of Mexico over the last few months.

Tankers that have been taken away from the coastwise traffic around the Atlantic seaboard from Texas ports and which conditions has held back the movement of Texas crude that otherwise would have found its way to eastern refineries in tanker shipments, may, therefore, come back into the domestic service within the next few months, creating a fresh demand for gulf coastal heavy crude that had to some extent moved more slowly than it would had it not been for the record exports from Mexico.

Interesting Study. It is pointed out further that geological survey figures showing lower production of crude in September as compared with August, also record plant consumption in the United States bringing up an interesting study when considered with relation to the situation governing the industry in Mexico. Gain in American stocks of oil from Mexico amounted to only 350,000 barrels for September, notwithstanding the survey points out deficiency in domestic production was offset by importation of 11,500,000 barrels of Mexican oil, or about two-thirds of the Mexican exports.

Since there was an accumulation of oil in August that exporters were unable to move from Mexico the record September shipments reflected some stored crude with the probability mentioned by National Petroleum News that the October figures will be smaller, naturally, the salt water encroachment possibly being reflected also to some extent. Thus it is predicted September shipments out of Mexico were at their peak, from which month to month recessions will result until the building of pipeline facilities into Zacamitla permits its taking the place of Los Naranjos, which by that time is expected to be only offset in its decline by the fresh supply from Zacamitla.

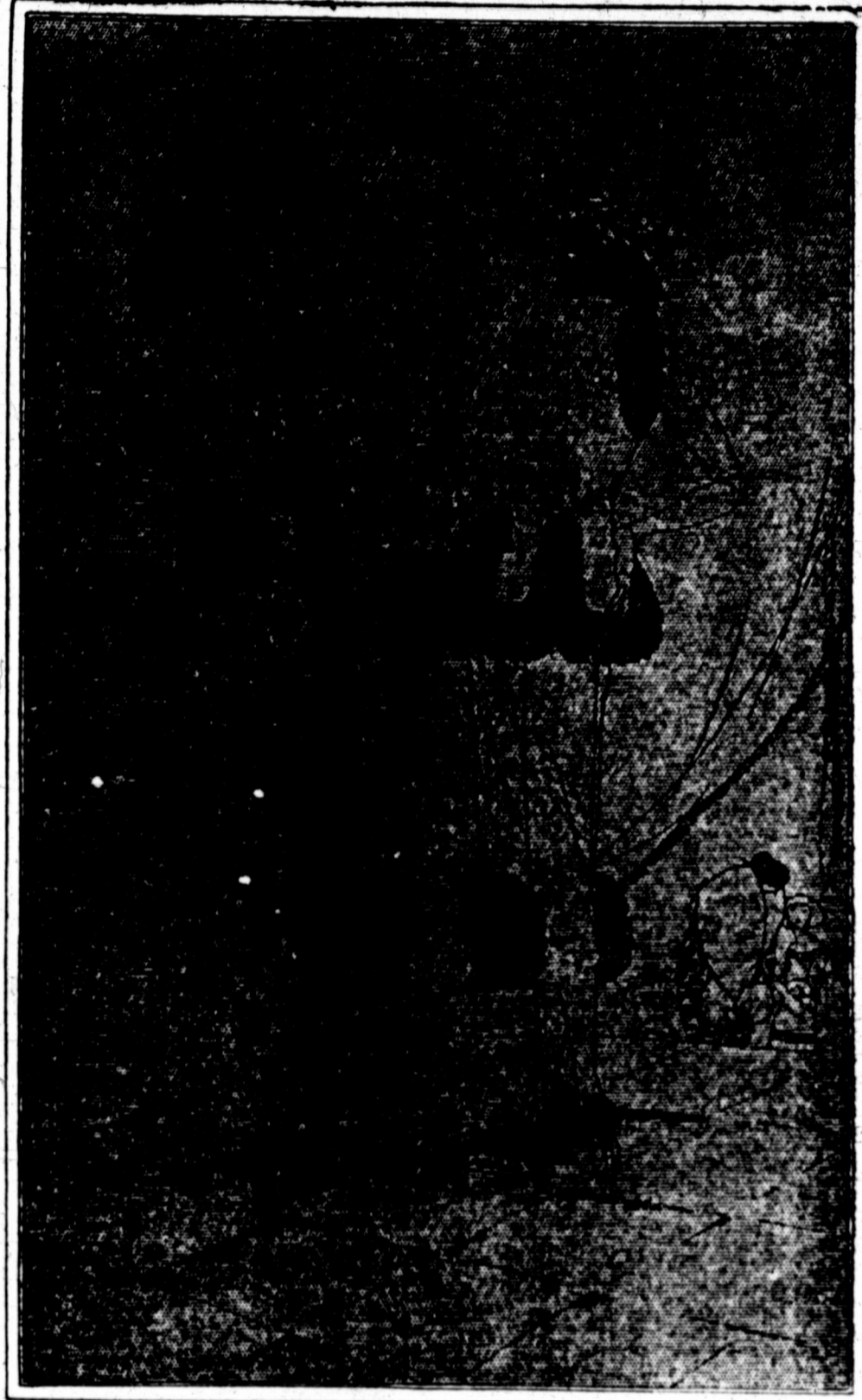

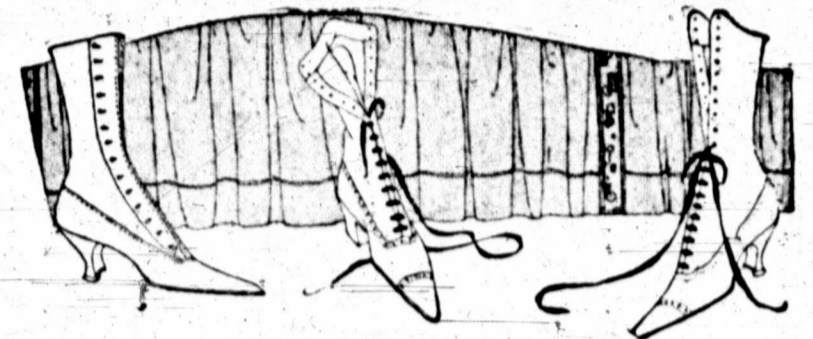

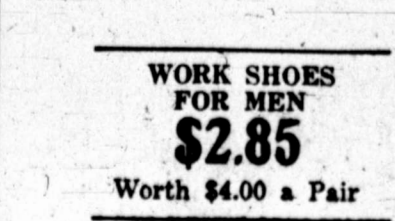

PREPARE A PETITION ASKING COUNTY VOTE ON HOSPITAL BONDS

WILL BE PRESENTED TO COMMISSIONERS AT MEETING IN DECEMBER.

FOR \$75,000 AS VOTED BY THE CITY RECENTLY

Combined Sum Will Give City and County One Of Best Institutions In State.

A \$150,000 addition to the Wichita general hospital building on Eighth street will make it one of the finest and best equipped hospitals of its kind of the state of Texas.

This possibility, which is regarded as a necessity for the city and county, looms up at present as a realization, inasmuch that a petition is in its making to be presented to the court of county commissioners at its next regular session which will be the second Monday in December.

The petition sets forth and asks the court of county commissioners to vote a bond issue of \$75,000 to offset the same amount provided by the city in the last bond election. Just what action the commissioners will take on this petition is sufficiently problematical but it is believed that the members of the board realize the necessity of a larger hospital and that they will take favorable action.

No Additional Tax. It has been cited that should the commissioners vote this bond issue that there are sufficient funds in the sinking fund to take care of the issue and that no additional tax will be required to be levied.

In the enlargement of the hospital, the capacity will be more than doubled. At various times within recent dates the present building has been overcrowded and city and county officials believe that an addition is necessary.

Should the county commissioners see fit to vote this bond issue and when the building is completed the entire cost will be \$200,000. At the present time repairs are in progress at the hospital. All the floors are being tiled and improvements and repairs are being made on the heating and plumbing.

The hospital at the present time has sufficient space on its property to build the contemplated addition. With this already on hand the entire amount can be utilized for the erection of the building and the material to be used.

TWO NEW LOCATIONS ARE REPORTED THIS WEEK NEAR BISSONNET & CIZAUX WELLS

Two new locations near the Bissonnet and Cizaux wells were reported this week. A rotary is being rigged up on the Riggs farm, about 300 feet west of the Bissonnet and Cizaux wells. Cannon while Bass and Dillard have a rig up on the same farm about 1,000 feet west of the Bissonnet and Cizaux.

Operations at the Bissonnet and Cizaux wells are still being held up by water, according to the latest reports.

NEW TYPE REFRIGERATOR PLACED ON EXHIBITION IS ATTRACTING ATTENTION

In one of the big show windows of the Wichita Hardware company on Ohio avenue, W. K. Knutson, a Wichita Falls inventor, is exhibiting a new type of refrigerator which may later be manufactured in this city.

The new refrigerator is insulated by vacuum spaces surrounding the food and ice containers instead of the ordinary so-called non-conducting materials as sawdust, cork, etc. Another departure is the complete separation of the icebox from the food container. The air cooled in the box passes by gravity into the lower part of a chamber which encases and practically

surrounds the food-containing section. This air takes heat from the food container and in proportion to the amount of heat so taken it expands and is displaced and lifted by the colder air that is coming fresh from the icebox. On reaching the top of this chamber it finds an opening through which it again enters the icebox from the top thereof, is again cooled and once more passes into their chamber on its circuit. Thus as long as there is any heat in the food container the icy air is circulating about it and absorbing the heat, and the inventor says that it is only at such times that any appreciable melting of the ice occurs. At other times, he says, the insulation is so perfect that the ice does not melt, even in the hottest weather. He claims that a block of ice large enough to practically fill the icebox will last with ordinary family use, ten days.

THREE FOREIGNERS WHO ARE ACCUSED OF VAGRANCY FEATURE POLICE COURT

Three foreigners, accused of vagrancy, furnished the main attraction at the morning session of the police court. The men were arrested Thursday after having been picked up in a local hotel by operatives of the detective department and were locked up in the city jail for the night.

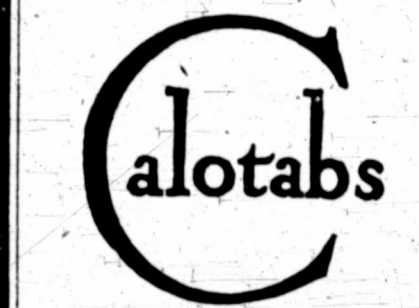

"Hubby" for Deputy as Precaution Is Plan of a Woman Sheriff

ROSCOMMON, MICH., Nov. 5.—Mrs. Jane Johnson, 65 years old, mother of three children and sheriff-elect of Roscommon county, today outlined the platform on which she will go into office next January.

"I can land a bad man, or a bad woman, myself, if necessary," she said, "but as a matter of precaution, I will appoint my husband deputy. In the intervals between searching for and caring for prisoners I will look after my children—two girls and a boy—and the domestic duties in the county jail."

Mrs. Johnson added that in case it should become necessary for her to arrest a bad man, he will know some one has been after him.

The sheriff-elect gained her experience from her husband, who has been sheriff for the past six years and whom she married forty years ago.

BRITISH RECOGNITION OF MEXICO EXPECTED SOON AFTER ACTION BY U. S.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—British recognition of Mexico is expected to follow recognition by the United States, according to Miguel Covarrubias, former Mexican minister at London, who resigned his post as foreign minister under the present Mexican regime in August and returned to England on a mission for his government.

Since his arrival Senor Covarrubias has had only informal conversations with the British office, but he takes the view that the recent statement by Secretary of State Colby on the Mexican question and also the legislation by the Mexican congress last week of General Obregon's election to the presidency, are leading up to full recognition of Mexico by the United States and Great Britain.

Senor Covarrubias, a Mexican diplomat for 40 years, holds credentials from Provisional President de la Huerta, which, if not received by the British authorities by November 30, must be reauthorized by General Obregon when he becomes president. The envoy is planning to reopen the Mexican legation here, which has been closed since 1915.

Election of Woman Political Shock in Muskogee District

MUSKOGEE, OKLA., Nov. 5.—Flooded with congratulations from all parts of the state, Miss Alice M. Robertson, familiarly known as the "Jane Adams" of the west, a congresswoman-elect from the second Oklahoma district nevertheless, continued today to see that the Sawolka cafeteria gave service. She owns the cafeteria.

Never was a greater political shock administered to any community than the election of Miss Robertson in this district.

While every individual in Muskogee is her friend and while she is admired for her wonderful life of service, it was not thought possible that the democratic party could lose a congressional seat in this territory.

NEWSBOYS GUESTS OF MANAGER OF THEATER

The Wichita theater has jeopardized its chances of future existence extending invitations to 25 Times newsboys to come as guests of the management to the first show Friday evening. All the youngsters who have any connection with the Times in the capacity of regular route carriers or merely juvenile salesmen on the streets have been included in the invitation and will descend en masse on the theater this evening.

The bill this week is composed of acts that are calculated to delight the heart of a small boy so Manager Cossible has thrown open the doors of the theater to the unappreciated, but all important department of the newspaper which is responsible for conveying the finished product of the press to the readers of the city.

REPUBLICANS GAIN THREE SEATS IN THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

MEMPHIS, Nov. 5.—With Tennessee definitely a republican column, returns gathered by newspapers indicated early today that the republicans had captured five of the state's 10 seats in the lower house of congress. Two members of Tennessee's present congressional delegation are republicans.

In the fourth district, on the face of returns, still incomplete, W. F. Clouse, republican, was leading Representative Cordell Hull, democratic national committeeman from Tennessee, by less than 200 votes. Republican leaders in the district claimed complete returns would show Clouse a winner by at least 1,000. Incomplete tabulation of the vote in the eighth district gives Lon A. Scott, republican, a slight lead over Gordon Browning, democrat. Early returns had indicated the election of both Hull and Browning.

The election in the third district of Joseph Brown, republican, over John Joon, democratic incumbent, has been conceded by the democrats, while in the first and second districts, republicans were elected. Both districts at present are represented in congress by republicans.

With returns in from practically the entire state, Senator Harding continued today to lead Governor Cox by approximately 10,000 votes, while the majority of Alf Taylor, republican candidate for governor, over Governor Roberts, democrat, was nearly 40,000. Figures compiled by the Commercial Appeal from all but 40 scattering precincts in the state gave Harding a majority of 9,400 votes and Taylor a lead of 39,242. The vote was: Harding 202,579; Cox 193,179; Taylor 211,143; Roberts 171,601.

with W. F. Clouse, republican, still indicated the re-election of Hull. With Morgan and Pentress counties missing, Hull has a lead of 2,603 votes. The Nashville Tennessean reports that Pentress has given 1,100 majority for Clouse and that Morgan county was carried by Clouse by 700 to 600 votes. This would give Hull a lead of 700 to 500 votes.

TO DIE ON GALLOWES FOR SHERIFF'S MURDER

STATE PENITENTIARY, SALEM, Oregon, Nov. 5.—One of the three lives which, the law decreed, shall be given for one, was to be choked off here today when Emmett Bancroft, alias Nell Hart, was scheduled to go to his death on the gallows.

Bancroft, an Indian half-breed, with four other prisoners, escaped from the county jail at Pendleton, Ore., July 25, this year, after killing Sheriff Tili Taylor, one of the best-known and popular officers in Oregon.

Bancroft admitted, during his trial, it was he who fired the shot which killed Sheriff Taylor. It was largely due to his testimony, at a subsequent trial, that Elvin Kerby and Jack Rathle, fellow-conspirators in the jail-delivery plan, were convicted of first-degree murder. They are under sentence to hang December 3. From the time he was captured, three days after the jail delivery, until he was brought to the penitentiary, Bancroft maintained the stolid demeanor which characterizes the Indian.

But once behind the prison bars, his manner became subdued. He told the prison warden he wished to accept the Protestant religion and at his request he was frequently visited by a clergyman.

SATISFACTORY INCREASE IN RECRUITING FOR NAVY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Recruiting for the navy is progressing so satisfactorily that naval officials believe it soon will be possible to send to sea a large number of vessels of all classes now carried on paper as part of the fleets, but actually tied up at the navy yards for lack of crews.

Recruits are entering the service at a rate exceeding 2,300 a week and the training stations are daily sending large numbers of men to the fleet after the usual four months of training.

On November 1 the navy was only 28,000 men short of the authorized strength of approximately 142,000, and it is believed at the department that the full strength will be reached before March 1.

As a result of the shortage of experienced men, it became necessary last winter and spring to place a large number of vessels entirely out of commission or to lay them up with greatly reduced crews. Eighteen battleships are now with the Atlantic and Pacific fleets on cruising duty, however, while four others have reduced crews. Thirteen of the older type are out of commission entirely.

Of the 224 destroyers completed and turned over to the navy, only 85 are in full commission and of these 25 are in European waters or are outfitting for service abroad. Of the remainder, 139 are laid up with crews of 30 men aboard and the others are out of commission entirely.

It is explained at the navy department that there is no expectation of ever placing full crews aboard all the destroyers in time of peace as the navy now has a super-abundance of this type

of vessel. About 50 per cent of the destroyers eventually will be kept fully manned and on duty with the fleets and the others given only large enough crews to keep them ready for duty in time of emergency.

Can Depend on Reserve Force.

The naval reserve force, naval officers say, can always be depended upon to provide trained crews for both destroyers and battleships in reserve when occasion demands.

No modern submarines are out of commission, according to naval officials, but 38 of these vessels of the older types are without full crews. Difficulty has been experienced in training men for the submarines, due to the peculiarly technical nature of the duty. Of the 55 eagle boats on the naval list, 31 are fully manned and 24 are in reserve or loaned the naval reserve force for training. It is stated, with 25 cruisers and gunboats in full commission and 24 in reduced commission or laid up.

The substantial increase in pay granted the navy at the last session of congress, together with the recent announcement of an extended cruise by the Atlantic and Pacific fleets this winter to ports in South America, Africa, Australia and New Zealand, have served to greatly stimulate enlistments, officials at the department say.

PLAN TO INCREASE NUMBER OF COUNTY VOTING PRECINCTS

Before the next election is held and in all probability during the coming summer Wichita Falls and Wichita county will be redivided and new precincts created in the city and all polling places renumbered and newly outlined.

This contemplated action on the part of the court of county commissioners is the outcome of the congested condition at some of the polls in the city and also an action in order to comply with the state statutes.

It is provided by law that in cities over 10,000 no one precinct shall contain more than 250 qualified voters. This is to be based on the last general election.

It was readily seen before the general election Tuesday that there were more than this number in several of the precincts in the city but the law provides that the redivision should be made on the basis of the last general election.

Since the last general election four years ago, the city and county has grown so rapidly that the congested condition at this last election could not be avoided.

Judging from the number of qualified voters in the city of Wichita Falls, in all probability the city at the next election will have at least 12 voting precincts and possibly 15. The county as a whole will be laid off in different precincts and Electra and Burkburnett will undoubtedly have two precincts each.

In view of the fact that there are approximately 2,000 qualified voters in the county at present, there will be at least 28 voting precincts at the next election in the county, in place of the 14 now existing.

EXPECT CHANGE IN RULE GOVERNING INCOME TAX ON COMMUNITY PROPERTY

Word has been received by the firm of Ammann & Jordan, from Hon. Lucian W. Parrish, congressman from this district, giving new encouragement that the regulations of procedure with reference to income from community property will be altered in the near future, so that the taxpayers can reasonably get the benefit of the reduction in liability affected by this ruling.

As this ruling now stands, it is necessary to file two reports, showing a division of the income to the husband and wife, respectively, and even though the total liability of the two as reported originally may be fully paid, it is required that the full amount of tax is attached to the wife's return in making amended reports, and requiring the husband to make claim for refund for his overpayment.

The anticipated change is to permit the overpayment by the husband to apply on the wife's liability and make claim for refund for the net difference, thereby avoiding putting up large amounts of money when the government is already due the taxpayer a refund.

HARDING SAYS ORDERS ARE TO SCRAP LEAGUE

IN FIRST REFERENCE TO SUB
JECT INDICATES QUESTION
IS DEAD ISSUE.

WILL SOON UNDERTAKE TO
PROMOTE ENTENTE CORDIALE

Parade Carries Effigy Of Corpses Which
is Labeled The "League Of
Nations."

By RAYMOND CLAPPER

MARION, OHIO, Nov. 5.—The League of Nations has been pronounced dead by President-elect Warren G. Harding. In one smashing sentence the next president of the United States sounded the death knell of the covenant.

It came as the climax of his first speech since the election, delivered to his Marion neighbors from the front porch last night when they came by thousands to congratulate him on his election.

The American people, by the unparalleled majority they gave the republican candidate, ordered the League of Nations scrapped, according to the interpretation Senator Harding placed on the solemn referendum. He made it clear that this mandate will be carried to the letter.

The Marionites, in their parade carried up to the front porch a stretcher bearing the effigy of a corpse labeled "League of Nations."

"You didn't want surrender of the United States—you wanted America to be free, and unmortgaged. That's why you didn't care for the league which is now deceased."

Accepts Opportunity.

Senator Harding thus took the first opportunity after his election to clear the air on the league matter.

But simultaneously he will undertake the rebuilding of an entente cordiale between the United States and the rest of the world. This policy contemplates America taking an active part in restoring normal international conditions. It means resumption of relations with Germany as soon as possible and with Russia and Mexico ultimately, and negotiations looking toward an "association of nations."

Two moves are expected to be made by Senator Harding in the near future—meeting of Mexican leaders, including probably President-elect Obregon on the border while vacationing at Point Isabel, Texas, and conferences with senate leaders over drafting of a resolution declaring war with Germany at an end, and providing for resumption of normal trade relations. Although Secretary of State Colby has intimated the Wilson administration may recognize the Obregon administration, the feeling at Harding headquarters is this step will be left to the discretion of the new administration. The terms on which Senator Harding will extend recognition to Mexico will be firm but fair, it can be stated authori-

tatively. Mexico's national dignity will be fully respected but the Harding administration will insist on her completely and wholeheartedly adhering to the code of international honor.

Will Require Assurance.
Mexico will be required to give unqualified assurance of her willingness and ability to protect American lives and property within her borders. It is not likely that the Harding administration will go to the extent recommended in the recent report of Senator Fall's investigating committee in demanding American supervision of Mexican internal affairs. The Harding policy is expected to lie somewhere between that and the policy of President Wilson. Senator Harding will meet the reasonable demands of American business interests throughout. It can be said, but he will be disposed to allow Mexico to work out her own salvation with such American aid as he may desire.

Conferences with senate leaders over the resolution of peace with Germany will not begin for at least a month.

Has No Plan for His Own.
Although the question of Harding's plan regarding the proposed "association of nations" is uppermost, it may be stated Senator Harding has no plan of his own and he will propose no detailed plan for some time to come. Ultimately he intends to call together a great bi-partisan conference to map out a course.

It is probable under President Harding the group of treaties negotiated by President Wilson at Paris will not see daylight again. In this category are included the treaty with Germany, sent back to the White House by the senate; and Austrian treaty, never submitted by President Wilson

to the senate; the Franco-American agreement, untouched in the executive vault of the senate, and several lesser pacts.

"There is a new world relationship to be established," Senator Harding told his neighbors last night. "When the next administration comes into power it is going to ask for a combination of nations associated together in the spirit of justice and right in a way that surrenders nothing of American national freedom."

TELEPHONE OPERATOR ASKS JUDGMENT FOR \$250,000 IN BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—Charging that George E. Hibbard, wealthy lumber dealer, "used every artifice to impress upon her mind that her love and company were indispensable to his happiness" to such an extent that she became "wholly wrapped up in him," Miss Lillian Lee, telephone operator, filed suit for breach of promise, asking \$250,000 damages.

Hibbard, age 54, president and general manager of the Steele-Hibbard Lumber company, and a director in the National Hardwood Lumber association, recently eloped with Miss Lillian Jackson, another telephone operator. They were married in Clayton, a suburb of St. Louis.

Miss Lee, in her petition, asserted that Hibbard courted her for several months and they agreed to be married within a reasonable time. She further declared that wide publicity was given their engagement and that the shock of his marriage caused her great "bodily and mental anguish."

PRICE OF CLOTHING AND SILK HOSE OFF 25 PER CENT

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Further reductions in clothing prices were announced here today by mail order houses. Prices of men's suits and women's silk hose were slashed 25 per cent and women's waists and dresses, blouses, comforters, woolen yards, ribbons and overalls were reduced 20 per cent. A 15 per cent cut was made in colored cotton goods, flannels and in some lines of hose. Commission men said turkeys for Thanksgiving will retail at 50 cents a pound.

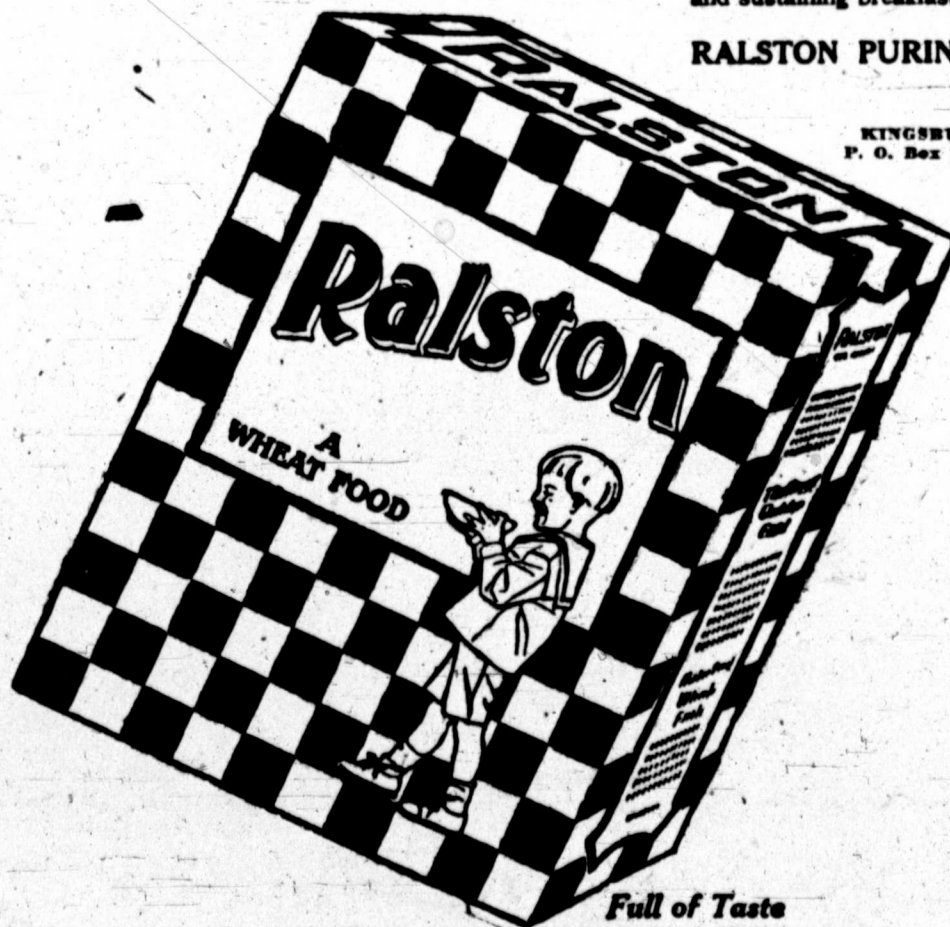

CITY ENGINEER IS OF OPINION BLOCKS SHOULD BE COATED

A report showing that waterproof treatment of all the wooden block areas in the business section of the city can be accomplished at an approximate cost of \$25,000 was submitted Thursday evening to Street Commissioner W. S. Curlee by Julian Montgomery, city engineer. Montgomery's report, submitted to the commissioner in letter form, follows:

"There are in the city of Wichita Falls over 46,000 square yards of wood block paving. In my opinion, unless it is desired to remove the wood block surface and put down some other type of surfacing, the best thing is to disturb the wood blocks as little as possible, and give them a surface treatment of tar and asphalt in order to waterproof them. Of course, it will be necessary to relay a few of the blocks where they have buckled or become completely worn out. It will be advisable to obtain something like a car load of wood blocks as soon as possible, in order to expedite this work. To that end I have already telegraphed several places to see if such a quantity could be obtained immediately.

"According to the information I have obtained, there is a good concrete foundation under the street car tracks, and the rails themselves are set in concrete. Such being the case, the condition of the pavement between the rails would not affect the pavement outside of the rails from the standpoint of permitting surface drainage to enter this pavement outside of the rails. It is possible that immediately next to and outside of the rails the condition of the pavement is such that water gets under the pavement at such points. In my opinion it would be well to surface treat all of the pavement, including that between the rails, with tar and asphalt coat, and waterproof all of it. If it is found that this does not prevent water from getting under the pavement, immediately next to and outside of the rails, then the most economical method of preventing this would be to build a concrete curb six inches wide, flush with the top of the pavement, and about two feet outside of the rails. This curb would be effective in preventing water from getting under most of the wood block pavement.

"It is thought advisable to treat all of the wood block pavement while the work is going on. It is true that some of it is in pretty fair condition, but it will be very economical from a maintenance standpoint to give all of this wood block pavement a new treatment. The total cost of this surface treatment, including the resetting of the blocks, will be something in the neighborhood of \$25,000."

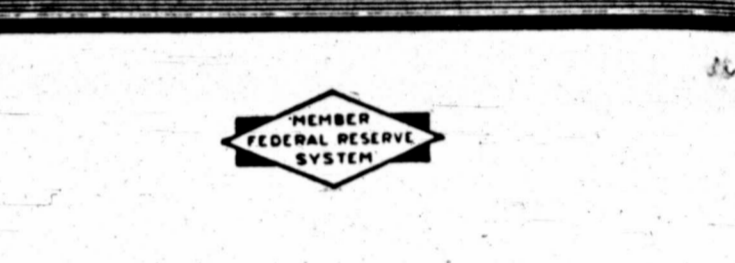
