TAX ON BUSINESS TURN-OVER

NEW YORK Nov. 5 -Although only a few weeks have elapsed since the coming into force of the new French tax on business turn-over, according to information which has just reached the French commission in New York. the first results amply justify expectations as to revenue yield from this source. Even now the yield is estimated to bring in a minimum of 300, 000,000 francs, which is equivalent to 2,600,000,000 francs per annum. Financial experience shows that a

new tax on its first introduction rarely realizes more than 75 per cent of its normal yield, as it invariably takes time for a tax to become firmly established and properly applied. If this rule obtains in the case of the tax on turn-over, it is reasonably safe to assume that this tax, even after allow-ing for no material increase, in the volume of business, will produce 400.

LONDON, Nov. 5 .- British recognition nition by the United States, according to Miguel Covarrubias, former Mexican minister at London, who resigned his post as foreign minister under the present Mexican regime in August and returned to England on a mission for his government. his government.

Since his arrival Senor Covarrubias has had only informal conversations with the British office, but he takes the view that the recent statement by

The same prefix is also frequently applied in the case of animals or shell-fish—as, for example, "horse-leech," "horse-crab," and "horse-missel, in all of which there is a coarse resemblance to the varieties which bear the simple name, unprefixed. For the same reason, "horse" is placed in front of some words in order to designate-rough or uncouth habits or conduct. "Horse-play" and "horse-laugh" are two of the outstanding representatives of this class.

Etymologists who have looked into the matter state that there is no definite explanation of the reason for the "horse" prefix, but that it is probably a corruption of the word "coarse."

Colonel Kochlet is the officer who directed the physical training of 250,000 officers and enlisted men during the World War. He has no equal at this work, in adultion to being a master at detail, his enthusiasm for the idea was also unbounded. And when you get two practical enthusiasts on a job, with such assistants as Major Phil Hayes and Lieutenant Elmer Oliphant, there can be only one answer.

That answer will be, 1,000 men this year who will have a better groundwork, a better foundation, in the way of all-around athletic development than any one ever 'thought possible before.

It will mean after this that each West Point graduate, broadened mentally and physically in the great democracy of sport, will be able to play and instruct in a greater number of games than the greatest all around athletes at Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Michigan, or anywhere else.

These men will leave the academy not only better off in a physical way, but with a finer co-ordination brought about and a far broader vision. They will be more than officers who can drill a company, they will also be physical directors who will know how to handle and direct all company sports and who in this way will be brought in much closer contact with their men.

CITY ENGINEER IS OF OPINION BLOCKS SHOULD BE COATED

report showing that waterproof reatment of all the wooden block area in the business section of the city can be accomplished at an approximate cost of \$25,000 was submitted Thurs-day evening to Street Commissioner W. S. Curlee by Julian Montgomery, city engineer. Montgomery's report, mitted to the commissioner in let-

submitted to the commissioner in letter form, follows:

"There are in the city of Wichita Falls over 46,000 square yards of wood block paving. In my opinion, unless it is desired to remove the wood block surface and put down some other type of surfacing, the best thing is to disturb the wood blocks as little as possible, and give them a surface treatment of tar and asphalt in order to waterproof them. Of course, it will be necessary to relay a few of the blocks where they have buckled or have completely worn out. It will be advisable to obtain something like a car load of wood blocks as soon as possible, in wood blocks as soon as possible, in order to expedite this work. To that end I have already telegraphed several places to see if such a quantity could be obtained immediately.

"According to the information I have obtained there is a good concrete foun-

obtained, there is a good concrete foundation under the street car tracks, and the rails themselves are set in con-crete. Such being the case, the condition of the pavement between the rails would not affect the pavement outside of the rails from the standoint of permitting surface drainage to enter this pavement outside of the tails. It is possible that immediately next to and outside of the rails the ondition of the pavement is such that water gets under the pavement at such points. In my opinion it would be well to surface treat all of the pavement, including that between the pavement, including that between the rails, with tar and asphalt coat, and waterproof all of it. If it is found, that this does not prevent water from getting under the pavement immediately next to and outside of the rail. next to and outside of the rails, concrete curb six inches wide, flush with the top of the pavement, and about two feet outside of the rails. This curb would be effective in preventing water from getting under most of the wood block pavement. "It is thought advisable to treat all "It is thought advisable to treat all of the wood block pavement while the work is going on. It is true that some of it is in pretty fair condition, but it will be very economical from a maintenance standpoint to give all of this wood block pavement a new treatment. The total cost of this surface treatment, including the resetting of the blocks, will be something in the neighborhood of \$25,000."
