

CLERK AND ATTORNEY FRAMING A GENERAL TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

DESIGNED TO COVER PROBLEMS IN BOTH BUSINESS AND RESIDENCE SECTIONS.

SUGGESTIONS ARE SECURED FROM MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

Regulations Will Be Formed From Ideas Contained in Plans Thus Proposed.

A general traffic ordinance, extensive in its scope and aimed to answer all traffic problems of both the business area of the city and the residence sections, is being framed by City Clerk George Thorburn and E. M. Mann, city attorney. It is probable that the work of preparing the ordinance will continue throughout the week, as a general study of similar ordinances in other Texas cities is being made and an attempt also will be included to put into practical, legal form some of the ideas on the subject that have been advanced by members of the city council.

As an aid in the work each member of the council has presented to the city clerk suggestions that have been developed from personal observation of traffic congestion, and the causes of accidents on the streets of the city.

Favors One-Hour Parking. Judge W. N. Bonner, public utilities commissioner, is opposed to the repeal of the eighth street one-hour parking ordinance until a substitute measure has been passed by the board of aldermen. In his opinion it would be wise to reserve parking spaces thirty feet in length in front of every downtown building five stories or more in height. This, he believes, would permit the loading and unloading of freight and passengers without the present congestion so frequently noticeable in front of the larger office buildings.

Mayor W. D. Cline would prohibit "double-decking" in the business district for a period longer than two minutes—double-decking referring to the practice of stopping automobiles parallel with the street behind other cars parked at the curb. He also favors the raking of all cars parallel with the curb on Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets, thereby providing a wider thoroughfare for moving traffic.

Turn of the Crossings. In the opinion of W. G. Bralley, police commissioner, cars should be ranked in Tenth street only. He also advocates rigid enforcement of a statute against turning in the middle of any block, while at certain corners where traffic is heavy he would make it illegal to turn an automobile for the purpose of returning on the same street.

The most practical suggestion for the elimination of one cause of accidents has been advanced by Street Commissioner W. S. Curlee, who would include in the proposed ordinance a clause prohibiting anyone from passing another driver in the same direction at street intersections. This practice, owing to the fact that the speeding driver is on the left-hand side and his view of intersecting traffic is necessarily blocked somewhat by the car he is attempting to pass, has resulted recently in a number of accidents of a serious nature. Curlee also favors the parking of cars at an angle of 30 degrees, instead of the present 45-degree angle, believing that this would mean less congestion in backing out into the street. In order that space may not be wasted, he includes the further suggestion that each car should park within 18 inches of the car on its right.

Favors Banning on Tenth. Both M. C. McDowell, city finance commissioner, and R. E. Shepherd, city finance commissioner, favor the ranking of cars on Tenth street as one means of preventing congestion on this thoroughfare. McDowell, however, would repeal the eighth street one-hour parking ordinance, while Shepherd is inclined to believe this has proven a wise traffic measure.

In the opinion of City Clerk Thorburn, much traffic on the main streets leading into the business district could be eliminated if all slow-moving vehicles would keep close to the right hand curb. Also congestion and the danger of accident caused by the unexpected averting of automobiles would be lessened to a noticeable degree, he believes, if the many small holes and

breaks in the Tenth street pavement were repaired. The two main traffic evils in the business section of the city, Thorburn holds, are the double-decking of cars and the sharp cutting of corners by careless drivers. All of these suggestions are now before Thorburn and City Attorney Mann for consideration, and it is expected an ordinance covering every problem of traffic in this city will be ready for presentation to the city council at its next regular meeting.

A number of Burk Burnett citizens also have launched a new newspaper, the Burk Burnett Citizen. Wyatt said, "It will be a semi-weekly publication, the first issue of which will be out next Saturday."

BURKBURNETT SHOWS CONTINUE TO OPERATE ON SUNDAY IS REPORT

Operation of moving picture shows in Burk Burnett on Sunday has not ceased as yet notwithstanding the fact that fines to the amount of over \$1,500, not including the costs have been paid to the county treasurer by those who were convicted of guilty of violating the Sunday amusement law.

Last Sunday, according to information given by Chief of Police Allen, a picture show remained open and operated the result of which has caused complaints have been filed against G. Featherstone and Al. D. Hoard in the county court of law.

It is stated that the trial of the cases here in the county court of law it is said that the shows have continued operating on Sunday and pleas of not guilty were entered before the jury recorded at that place. Bonds were furnished the report states and at some time thereafter the city recorder advised that he had found them guilty and assessed a fine of \$50. The maximum fine in these cases as set forth by law is \$200.

A determination of fact has been put forth by the county attorney's office to stop this alleged violation of the law but notwithstanding the fact that fines have been entered against every person tried, the shows continue to operate. The next step remains unwritten but it is believed that drastic action will be recommended.

GIRL MAKES STATEMENT INVOLVING MAN ARRESTED

A written and signed statement by the thirteen-year-old girl involved in the case, has furnished the county officials with information which is believed will be important testimony in the case against a party whom the city police arrested last Sunday night.

The statement is to the effect that she is thirteen years of age and that she has been married, her husband, however, deserting her and is at the present time in the army.

The girl sets forth that the man arrested roomed at her parents home and that the improper relations had existed for a period of practically a year.

The girl was detained by officers as a witness and placed in the juvenile detention ward in the county court house. The man was placed in the county jail Tuesday and charges were to be preferred against him charging him with assault on a female person under the age of fourteen years.

"The Mikado" Scores "Hit" With Audience at Wichita Theater

Whatever impetus was needed to lift the Ralph Dunbar productions to unrivalled heights in the estimation of Wichita theatrical critics was given Monday night when his production of the world famous Gilbert and Sullivan opera "The Mikado" was presented to a packed house.

The production combined all the elements essential to a good comic opera, and it combined them in generous quantities. There is an abundance of humor and fun from first to last, a clever plot and excellent music. Add to this the fact that these elements were presented by a cast of true artists in every sense of the word and a slight conception of what "The Mikado" really is may be realized.

The lions share of glory in Monday's performance went to Ed Andrews, who took the leading role, that of Ko-Ko, Lord High Executioner of Titipu. This famous comedian romped through his part with a confidence that only years of association with the rolls could bestow and, from his first appearance on the stage he elicited howls of glee from the audience by his clever acting, imitable humor and pleasing singing. Ko-Ko, as Lord High Executioner, he found himself in rather unpleasant circumstances at various times throughout the opera, but the comedy reached its height in the last act when he was confronted with the alternative of marrying Katisha, a corpulent favorite of the courtier who many appropriate remarks.

Following Mr. Andrews in popular favor came Miss Ann McCashin, appearing in the role of Pitti-Sing, a ward of Ko-Ko. Miss McCashin played one of the important roles in a manner that completely captivated the audience. In modern terminology she "was very easy to look at," but these charms were enhanced many fold by a magnetic personality, a rich contralto voice and exceptional ability as a dancer.

Sewing on fresh collars and cuffs, replacing buttons and hooks, dyeing chiffon waists, darning stockings, and doing the many little things that business women haven't time for is taken care of by the shop directors, who are members of a volunteer committee.

DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE PENDING SMITH-TOWNER BILL?

At a recent local club meeting a member asked for information on the Smith-Towner bill, pending in congress now, and which she understood had the support of the national women's and mother's organizations.
The Smith-Towner bill is one in which all women and in fact all citizens interested in education will take a vital interest. It is a bill to create a federal department of education and give a federal aid for the states in the promotion of education. It would, through a provision for education research, keep the states in touch with each other educationally, so that progressive educational measures in one might be put in force in another.
The provisions of the Smith-Towner bill will not become operative in any state until they have been accepted by majority vote of the citizens, and until the state has appropriated a sum of money equal to that asked of the federal government. The state's right to administer these appropriations and to distribute them in accordance with its own laws, is recognized.
It is believed that passage of the bill would be a big step forward educationally in the United States. It is actively supported by the general federation of women's clubs, the National League of Women Voters, Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher association, National Women's Trade Union, National Society, D. A. B. and other women's organizations throughout the country.

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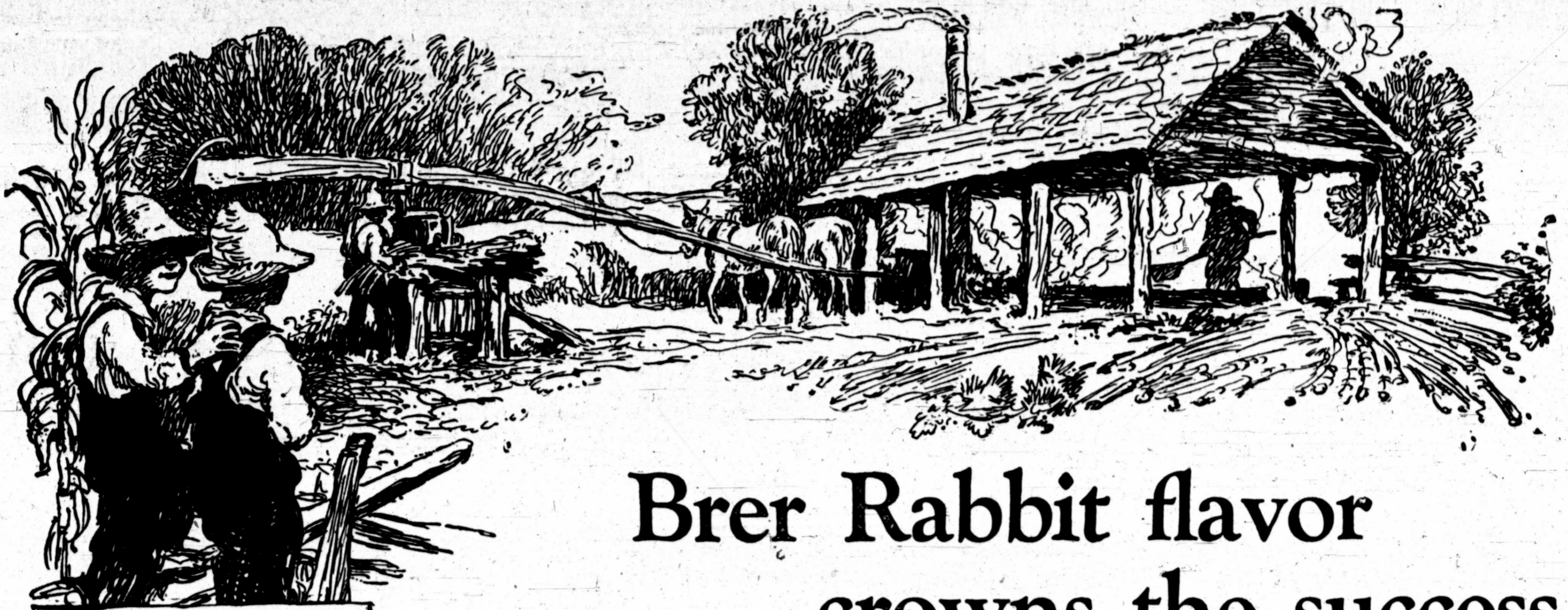

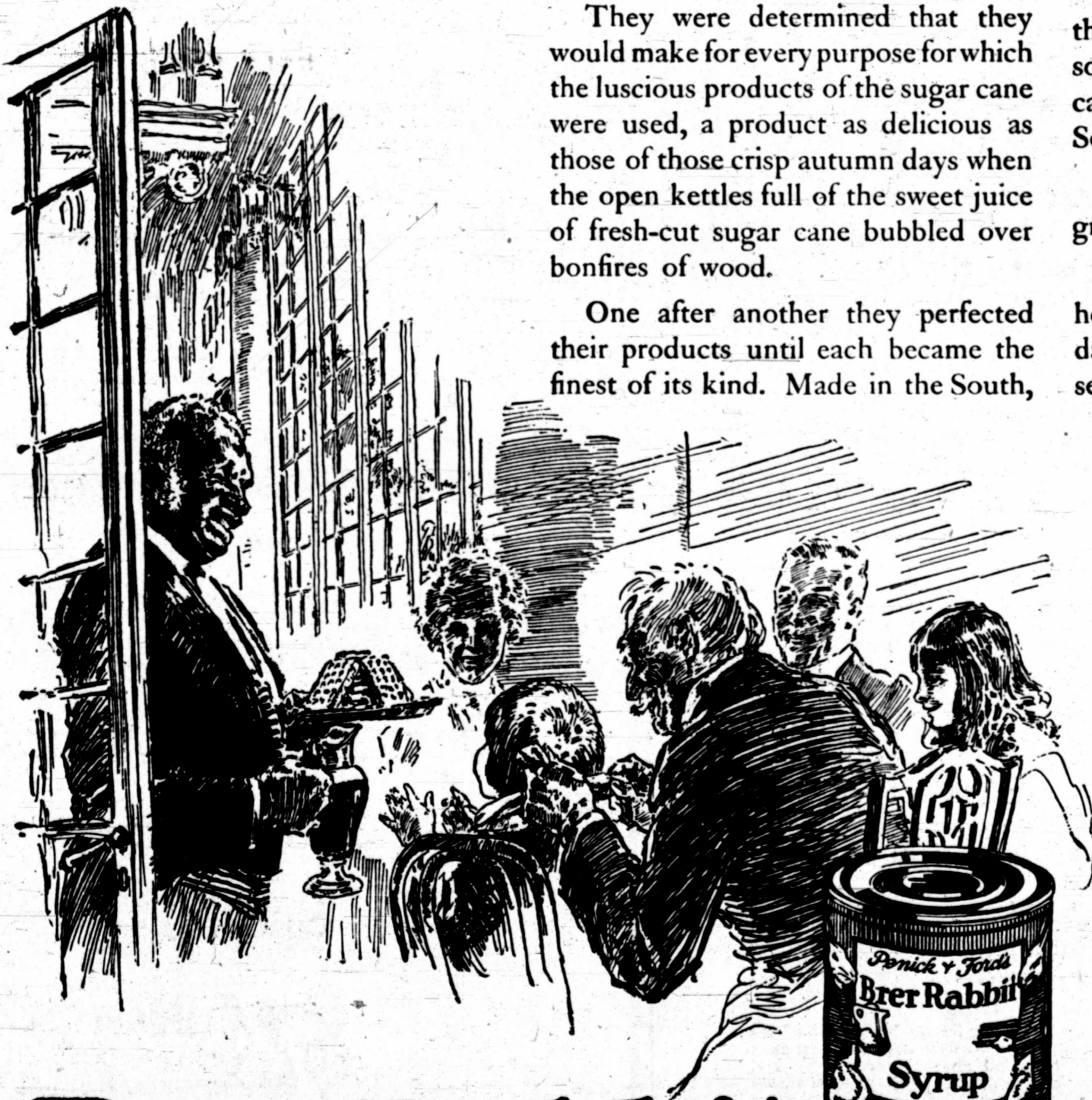

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PRELIMINARY WORK FOR ASSOCIATION OF NATIONS UNDER WAY

By L. C. MARTIN, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Preliminary work on the plan for an "association of nations," promised by President-elect Harding is well along. It was learned here today...

"Conversations" now going on between certain influential republicans and persons in foreign capitals have already developed interesting facts concerning the European attitude toward an entirely new association.

These exchanges have been, of course, entirely unofficial and informal and Harding has had nothing to do with them. The information thus obtained, however, is regarded as a much franker expression of foreign views than if it were official.

The whole of a considerable correspondence between certain Americans and their European friends in three countries, extending over many weeks shows a distinct willingness to meet Harding at least half way.

While this information is being gathered, other agencies are preparing for Harding an analysis of the domestic situation with regard to the league. Harding regards the election as a popular vote against the Wilson league. But he has to reckon with Root, Taft and other influential republicans who do not want to see the Wilson plan discarded entirely.

Indications are that democrats are preparing to negotiate with the republicans, perhaps at the short session of congress, to ratify the treaty. The League ratification, the democrats agreeing to vote for them.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Men's clothing for immediate delivery was offered today at prices 10 to 50 per cent below present wholesale levels. Goods for spring and summer delivery today shows a price 10 to 25 per cent under those of a year ago, and men's shirts and similar articles were shown at greatly reduced prices at the opening of the thirtieth semi-annual buying convention of the United National Clothiers of Chicago.

The public is not buying; manufacturers and dealers are overstocked, said W. L. Mohr, treasurer and general manager of the association today. "The price must come down. We have passed the peak in high prices of wearing apparel. Men's clothing will be considerably cheaper now on; the retailer can afford to sell at less, for his costs are becoming lower."

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 9.—A reduction of 23 1/2 per cent in the wholesale price of clothing is announced by one of Rochester's largest clothing manufacturing concerns. The reduction is effective from November 1 and applies to suits and overcoats. It is said the reduction, which is in addition to the usual cash discount of 7 per cent, represents a cut from \$33, the opening fall wholesale price, to approximately \$26.00.

TURIN, Nov. 8.—It developed today that the municipal elections in Turin had resulted in a socialist victory. That party, the count showed, secured a majority of 700 votes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—"Overproduction" in the United States is the reason assigned by British oil companies for an unexpected reduction of six cents a gallon in the price of gasoline in Great Britain after a sudden increase of fourteen cents a gallon in August. According to advice from the American chamber of commerce in London today to the department of commerce.

OVERPRODUCTION IN U. S. GIVEN AS CAUSE OF GASOLINE DECLINE

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Oil production in America in 1919 was about 2,500,000 gallons, the chamber pointed out, while in 1918, it was still under four billion gallons.

British consumers, however, the chamber reported, attribute the slump to the investigation of the central profiteering committee into the increase in price.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt, daughter of W. K. Vanderbilt, was today awarded a decree of divorce from the Duke of Marlborough.

Allegations of desertion and misconduct were made by the duchess, formal denial of the charges was made by the duke's counsel, but no evidence was given. The decree of desertion was based upon the duke's disobedience of the order for the restitution of conjugal rights which the duchess obtained last March.

Only two witnesses were called, an English detective who watched Blenheim palace, the duke's residence, and made a diary of his companion on a trip to Paris, and a solicitor's clerk, who witnessed the service of the court papers on the defendant.

PARIS, Nov. 9.—Rumors have been circulated here that the Duchess of Marlborough, following her divorce, would marry Jacques Balsan, famous French sportsman.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Officials at the war department said today that a reported request of the municipal authorities of Los Angeles for a loan of 5,000 army tents to relieve the housing situation in that city had not yet reached the department. It was said, however, that the request could not be granted owing to definite provisions in the law restricting the use of army tents and barracks to military purposes, with the exception of loans of tents to veterans of the civil war.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Nov. 9.—Mrs. J. H. Chaplin, Wichita, Kansas, who swallowed a small dose of poison here yesterday, was rapidly recovering, physicians announced today. Jealously is believed to have prompted the attempt at suicide. Mrs. Chaplin is said to have accused her husband of being "untrue."

GALVESTON, TEXAS, Nov. 9.—Nine men employed as checkers and clerks at the Southern Pacific docks, are in a local hospital suffering from burns received early today when the launch Ouida on which they were to go to the docks for their duty, caught fire at pier 22 early today.

Word was awaited today from Judge Kansas Mountain Landis, judge of the district court of the United States for Chicago, as to whether he would accept position of chairman of the board of control for a term of seven years at an annual salary of \$50,000.

AMONG THE BUSIEST OF BUSINESS MEN

MORE THAN HALF OF CALIFORNIA FARMERS IN CO-OPERATIVE PLAN

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., Nov. 9.—More than half the farmers in California sell their products through co-operative marketing associations, according to statistics being gathered by attorneys for some of these organizations.

There are about twenty-five active associations, these figures show, which in some cases control as high as 50 per cent of their particular crop and which range in activity from mere sales agencies to organizations that pack, distribute and advertise their products and even possess lumber mills to make their own box shooks.

The California Fruit Growers exchange, which marketed \$50,000,000 of citrus fruits last year from the orchards of 11,000 members, handling 70 per cent of the California orange and lemon crop is the patriarch of the associations. It not only sells fruit but marmalade and fruit juices as well, and through a subsidiary concern secures box shooks and other packing materials.

Among the other associations, with the number of members their volume of business last year and the proportion of the total crop they controlled are: California Associated Raisin Company, 10,000 members; \$22,000,000, 25 per cent; California Prune and Apricot Growers, Inc., 10,800 members, \$22,000,000, 50 per cent; California Peach Growers Inc., 7,500 members; \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000, 75 per cent; California Almond Growers exchange, 2,575 members, \$5,900,000, 100 per cent.

Large Poultry Business.
The Central California Poultry Producers Inc., who sold nine million dozen eggs last year claim to be the largest single concern in the United States handling poultry products and the second largest in the world, being surpassed only by a Danish co-operative concern.

Hog raisers have no association of their own, but a marketing association of the farm bureau of seven counties in the San Joaquin valley sold \$1,447,449 worth of hogs last year for the farm bureau members.

The growers of annual crops such as vegetables can turn their lands to other uses without loss or delay are about the only ones who have not been successful in farm organizations, the statistics indicate. Although beans and lima bean growers have been able to support marketing associations. Potato and tomato growers' associations do not exist, although berry growers are organized and in central California have accomplished the feat of combining American and Japanese farmers in one concern.

Many of the organizations spend large amounts in advertising. The raisin company spent \$450,000 last year, the prune and apricot growers \$500,000, the walnut association \$150,000, while 22 per cent of the annual citrus crop return is devoted to advertising and one per cent of a pound of the almond exchange receipts go for the same purpose.

The value of vineyards, according to a statement of the raisin company, has increased from \$200 an acre in 1913 to \$1,000 an acre in 1920. Prune growers report an advance from \$100 to \$750 an acre for orchards in 1917 to 1920 price of from \$2,000 to \$4,000 an acre. Other associations make similar claims.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN TEXAS IS EXPECTED TO INCREASE

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 9.—Unemployment in Texas is increasing, especially in the trades and among skilled laborers, according to T. C. Jennings, labor commissioner, who said that a number of men now are idle in the state and he expected conditions to become worse as winter advances.

The commissioner said that he thinks the situation is due to the fact that there has been a considerable slackening of all kinds of building and construction work, as builders think that prices of both material and labor will decline soon, and all possible work is being postponed. He added that the railroad labor situation is good, and that there still is a considerable demand for unskilled labor, due largely to the extensive employment of unskilled labor on farms at this time of the year. Wages of skilled laborers have not shown appreciable decline, the commissioner said, but unskilled workmen's compensation, especially those working upon farms and picking cotton have been reduced somewhat.

AMERICAN WILL BE CALLED ON TO FEED AND CLOTHE POLES

LONDON.—One of the aftermaths of the Polish-Soviet war is that Americans will be called upon to feed and clothe more than 1,250,000 Polish children this winter through the American Relief Administration. Up to the time of the latest outbreak of hostilities, destitution had been so reduced that the Relief Administration officials believed that Poland, with the organization the Americans had perfected, would be able to carry on the work after this autumn. That is considered impossible now and preparations are under way for caring for as many children as during the dark days of last winter.

This decision came after receipt in London of reports of a complete survey of the country begun immediately after the holocaust driven back. Trained observers report that the Poles themselves have not painted the picture black enough. After two armies had fought over the ground there was little left for the children, they report, and each requested immediate shipment of food and clothing. As far as possible, distributing agents of the administration are complying with these requests.

The organization by which about \$12,000,000 worth of food and clothing was distributed in Poland in 16 months at a cost of approximately \$30,000, is virtually intact. It includes between 1,500 and 18,000 Polish welfare services are paid for by Poland but who worked under the direction of a few American administrative officers. The Poles also pay for transportation from the ships, warehousing and distribution. In addition they supply all flour received by them through a \$200,000 credit granted them by the grain corporation. Although the distributing organization was considerably disarranged during the recent fighting, officials here say they can get into working order again very quickly after railroad repairs have been completed.

WOMEN'S DORMITORIES AT UNIVERSITY ARE INADEQUATE

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 9.—Women's dormitories at the University of Texas accommodate only 220 of the 1,430 women students in attendance at the institution, according to figures compiled recently, and 1,008 of the women stay in private homes and boarding houses.

OIL DEVELOPMENT WORK IN WESTERN CANADA WILL BE CONDUCTED ON BIG SCALE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Oil development in Western Canada will be conducted on a vaster scale next year than at any other time in the history of that country with the possible exception of the work done by the Imperial Oil Company D. B. Dowling, a Canadian government geologist, reports in advices communicated to the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce here by Consul Lydner at Vancouver.

The work will be conducted by the Whitehall company of England, which is composed of a group of British capitalists, at the head of whom is Lord Cowdray, the report declares.

Considerable activity is seen in the Canadian oil business according to Lydner's report. Members of local oil firms in British Columbia and members of the Vancouver stock exchange, acting as individuals, recently effected an organization known as the British Columbia Oil Operators' Association "to promote co-operation among operating companies, brokers and others engaged in prospecting for oil."

The organization plans a campaign of education and publicity to encourage the development of the possible extent of the Imperial Oil company has confirmed reports that it has struck at its well at Fort Norman, on the Mackenzie river near the Arctic circle. Earlier reports estimated a flow of about 1500 barrels a day. Eleven drills have been working this year for the Imperial company and the first strike was made in August when oil of about 40 baume gravity was found.

It is not expected that the oil will yield profitably for several years because of the location of the fields. Geologists for the Imperial company report, however, that there is a field of oil bearing rock in the Mackenzie territory "compared to which Mexico and Peru are in the miniature class."

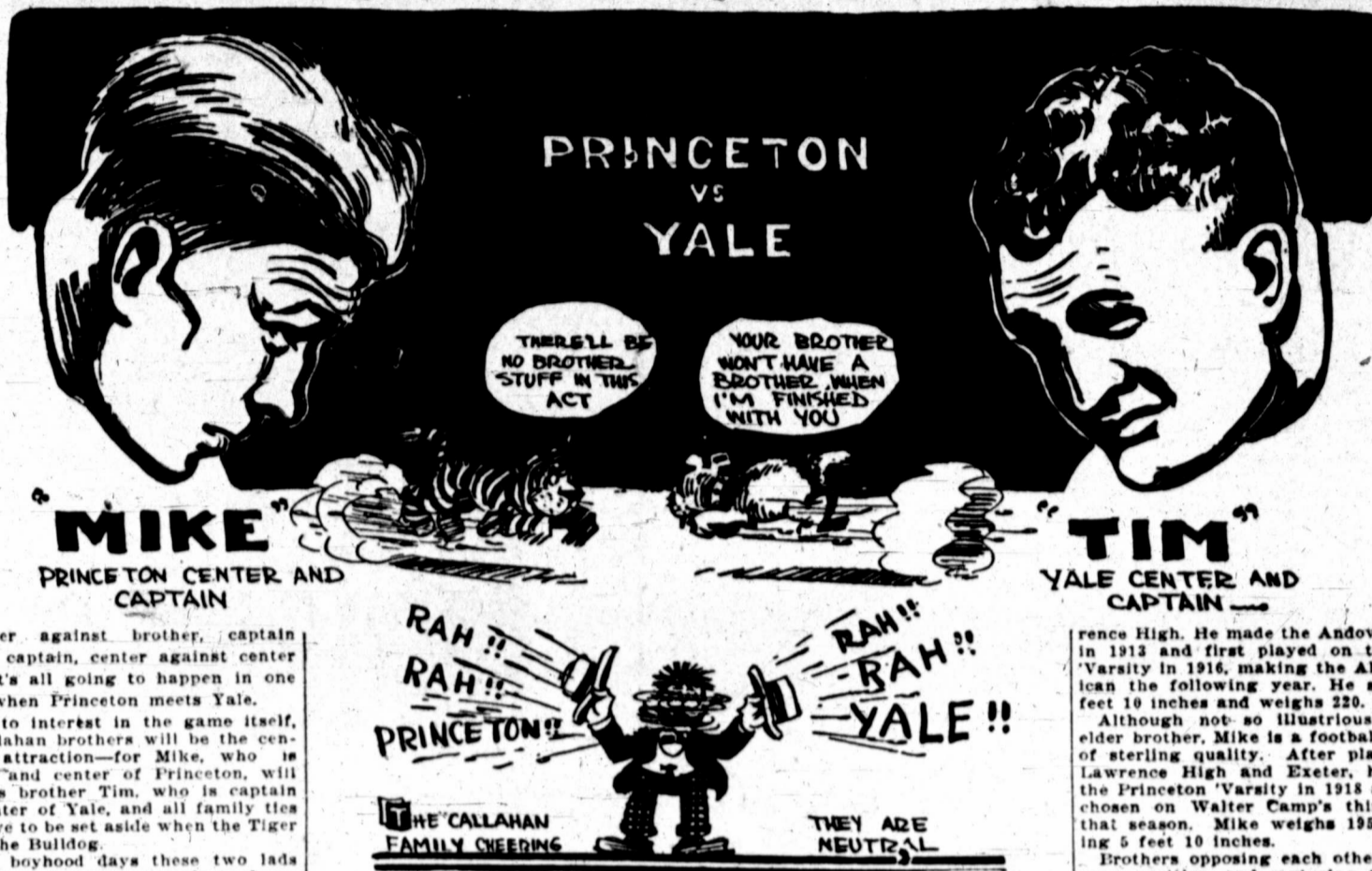

THE CALLAHAN BROTHERS



Brother against brother, captain against captain, center against center—and it's all going to happen in one game, when Princeton meets Yale. Next to interest in the game itself, the Callahan brothers will be the center of attraction—for Mike, who is captain and center of Princeton, will face his brother, Tim, who is captain and center of Yale, and all family ties will have to be set aside when the Tiger meets the Bulldog.

Since boyhood days these two lads have selected different roads to fame. When in knickerbockers they attended the annual contest between Andover and Exeter, and Mike rooted for Exeter while Tim cheered the efforts of the Andover athletes. Even then they had set their minds on Yale and Princeton respectively, after their academy days.

Tim first played football at Lawrence High. He made the Andover team in 1912 and first played on the Yale Varsity in 1916, making the All-American the following year. He stands 5 feet 10 inches and weighs 220. Although not so illustrious as his elder brother, Mike is a football player of sterling quality. After playing at Lawrence High and Exeter, he made the Princeton Varsity in 1918 and was chosen on Walter Camp's third team that season. Mike weighs 195, standing 5 feet 10 inches.

THE TWENTY YEAR TARGET.
A trifle over twenty years ago Princeton upset Yale twice in succession. In 1898 the Orange and Black predominated, over the Blue by 6 to 0, the margin of victory being due to Poe's great run after recovering a fumble. In 1899 Princeton again triumphed by the score of 14-10-10-Poe's field goal in the closing minutes of battle deciding the issue. So far as the records show from 1872 to 1920, that is the only occasion where the Tiger had two successive meals off Gulldog steak. Since that double triumph Princeton has been showing through a winner once every eight years—in 1895, 1911 and 1919.

THE SECOND CHANCE.
Now the Tiger has his second shot at the Bulldog in so far as consecutive victories go. Roper's team came through at New Haven last fall and his team will now be giving battle on Nassau sod. This, at least, is the opinion of the fans. And Roper also has a fine machine to take the field, one of the best Princeton teams of many years. So Princeton is at least lucky in going after an ancient landmark to have the test decided with one of her best teams playing at home. Yale, on the other side of the argument, will be fighting with equal determination to stem the Tiger rush. Having lost last fall, just what you count upon the Bulldog giving 100 per cent of what he has up on this next occasion, now only a few days away.

BY THE FUMBLE ROUTE.
Princeton beat Yale in 1919, in 1921 and in 1919 by recovering fumbles and pushing these recoveries to winning touchdowns. Johnny Poe, Sam White and Scheerer were the triple heroes. Her other two victories, won since 1898, were achieved by field goals—one by Dewitt and the other by Poe.

A victory is a victory, but it is the earnest desire of Roper and his men to beat Yale on Saturday by the touchdown route, where the winning score is earned through the speed and power of a stronger attack. It will take a slight tactical change to carry out, as Yale is coming with a strong defensive team and a team that also has a lusty punch to its attack. In 1916 the Tad Jones team lost to Brown, just as it lost a short while back to Boston College. But after losing to Brown the Blue machine whizzed back into line and stopped Princeton and Harvard abruptly.

ONE OF THE BEST.
This should be one of the best Yale-Princeton games of many years. Both machines are well coached and well trained, and both have a carload of exceptional material. The attack which each eleven can put under way should mean a hurricane afternoon, for after all it's the zigzag way up and down the field that lifts the big crowd to its collective heels. There will be a big cluster of ground gainers on the field—men such as Louis Gharrity, Kelly, Kempton, etc.—and this means action. In fact, quite an afternoon should be had all around.

IS HENRY IRSLINGER REAL MIDDLEWEIGHT WRESTLING CHAMP?
There is no doubt but that the wrestling game has more champions (?) than any other sport, but the question as to who is the bona fide middleweight champion has been asked in these parts several times since Henry Irslinger has claimed the honor and has defended his so-called title. It was asserted that when Henry flopped Ted Thyne the middleweight crown went with it, but we have our doubts. We have a hunch that the title rests in the east at present, where it has been for some time past. Waino Ketonen, a young Finn, has been throwing all comers for the past two years and recently met Mark Howard from the Pacific coast to whom he lost the title. Mark, however, was a game bird and gave Ketonen a chance to get the little back and the following is an excerpt from an eastern paper telling about this bout:

"Once more in Wino Ketonen the undisputed middleweight champion of the world. The doughty little Finn disproved critics who were so quick to jump to the conclusion in quick succession to Mark Howard and then to Tony Ajax. By his hard earned victory over Howard Tuesday night, Waino once more assumes away of his class and if appearances are worth anything, it will be a long time before any other middleweight comes along and bears him. Ketonen displayed everything he has ever showed in this contest with Howard. He has forgotten nothing. In the west the defeat of Howard will come as a shock as they figured he would hold the crown for some time.

ATTENDANCE RECORDS WILL BE SHATTERED ON THANKSGIVING DAY

Texas A. & M. Game in Austin Will Draw Over Fifteen Thousand Spectators.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 9.—Never before in the history of Texas football has there been such a gigantic demand for tickets as there is for the Texas A. & M. game to be played in Austin on Thanksgiving Day. The crowd which witnessed the game between the Longhorns and the Farmers in Austin in 1914 numbered 15,000 persons and was the largest Texas crowd up to that time. The number of spectators at that game, however, will not compare with that which will attend this year's contest.

Every effort is being made by L. Theo. Bellmont, director of athletics of the university, to meet the demand for seats. The original seating plans were made with a view of accommodating 15,000 spectators and extra stands on both sides of the field have been sold, and only the \$2 seats in the end sections are now available. The north half of the field was given to A. and M., the south half to Texas. The university reserved the covered grandstand for out-of-town alumni, and these seats were quickly taken. The half of the bleachers allotted to Texas was reserved for the faculty and the Texas rooters.

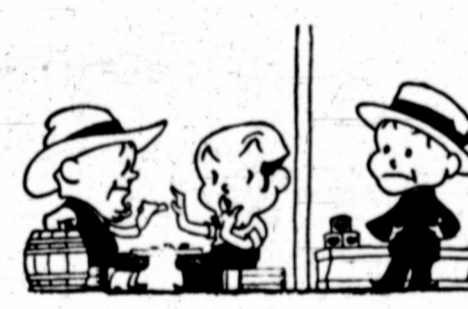
This game is showing just how badly the University of Texas needs a good athletic field with a permanent stadium. The permanent stands at Clark Field seat only 5,000 persons; and the athletic authorities of the university face the task of doubling this seating capacity for the big games played here. The temporary stands being erected will involve an expense of approximately \$8,000, and they will be torn down immediately after the game.

The expense and trouble of erecting these stands to satisfy the people of the state who wish to attend the big games played by the university must be borne year after year, and this useless waste will continue until the appropriation for the proper sort of athletic equipment is secured. The situation is said to be a false conception of economy," said Mr. Bellmont.

MRS. MACSWINEY IS STILL BEDFAST AS A RESULT OF ILLNESS

LONDON, Nov. 9.—Muriel MacSwiney, still bedfast from an illness which threatened her life, planned today to continue her fight for Ireland.

The lady mayoresse intends to return to Ireland to live because "Terry wouldn't be in Ireland to seek safety and tranquility."

Physicians feared for Mrs. MacSwiney's life following her collapse, made especially dangerous by her condition. Much of the last conversations she had with the lord mayor in long visits in Bridgton jail had dwelt on the expected arrival in the family.

Her collapse after testifying before coroner's jury robbed her of this hope.

Mrs. MacSwiney was taken to the home of friends where she has been under the care of Miss Kathleen O'Brien.

"Muriel has not been able to form her plans yet," Miss O'Brien said. "I think she wants to return to Ireland to see her baby daughter. Before she was taken ill she said perhaps she would go to America to testify before a committee investigating conditions in Ireland.

The stamina of the lady mayoresse was the marvel of all who knew her condition. Physicians said today her illness was the gravest that could have occurred to her at the time. At the crisis they feared she was to follow her husband. Then she rallied and today was reported out of danger.

MEDAL IS AWARDED FOR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE WHILE GERMAN PRISONER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Edgar N. Hayburton of Taylorville, N. C., who during the world war was a sergeant in company F, 14th Infantry, enjoys the unique distinction of having a distinguished service medal awarded him for service performed while a prisoner in Germany.

Sergeant Hayburton's citation, made public today by the war department, says that the sergeant while a prisoner in the hands of the German government from November, 1917, to November, 1918, voluntarily took command of different camps in which he was located and under difficult conditions established administrative and personal headquarters, organized the men into units, billeted them systematically, established sanitary regulations, made equitable distribution of supplies and established an intelligence service to prevent our men from giving information to the enemy and prevented the enemy from introducing propaganda.

ADDITIONAL PATROLMAN FOR FINANCIAL DISTRICT

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Twenty-five additional patrolmen, personally selected by Chief Inspector Leahy, after a conference with Police Commissioner Enright, today were distributed throughout the financial district to guard financiers and financial institutions.

While official announcement was lacking at police headquarters, it was understood this action was taken because of threats alleged to have been made at recent secret meetings of radicals. At the same time, the detective force in the Wall street district was greatly increased.

HEARING AT AMARILLO INSTEAD OF SAN ANTONIO

FORT WORTH, Nov. 9.—The grain supervision board from the United States department of agriculture, which will conduct a hearing in Fort Worth November 11 on grade changes, has cancelled its San Antonio hearing and substituted one in Amarillo, according to announcement at the Texas Grain Dealers' association here today. The Amarillo hearing will be conducted November 12.

OFFERS \$50,000 FOR BOIT LEONARD AN MITCHELL

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 9.—The Minneapolis Boxing club today offered a purse of \$50,000 for the proposed fight for the lightweight title between Benny Leonard and Ritchie Mitchell, according to announcement made by Billy Mitchell, manager of the local boxer.

NEAR EAST RELIEF WILL NOT VENTURE

Conditions in Asia Minor and Turkey Too Serious To Attempt Aid.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Conditions in Asia Minor and Turkey in Europe are so serious that the Near East relief will not run the risk of sacrificing American lives by sending further relief workers to the war torn areas.

This announcement was made today by a national official of the Near East relief following receipt of cables from Constantinople reporting that J. P. Coombs is being held by Turkish nationalists at Samsoun. Coombs is director of the relief's activities in the Samsoun region.

Fear for the safety of other members of Coombs' detachment was also expressed by officers of the Near East relief. Besides Melville Chater, a writer, who accompanied Coombs on all his tours of inspection through the war areas, the party consists of five Americans, three of whom are women. At last advices, these were quartered at Samsoun and reported safe for the immediate present.

Passage Is Cancelled.

On the strength of an alarming cable received at the commission headquarters here today, the passage of six relief workers who were to have sailed for Constantinople tomorrow, has been cancelled. The cable, signed by other members of the Coombs party at Samsoun are Gertrude E. Knox of Providence, R. I., Dr. George T. Pomeroy of Burbank, Cal.; Marjorie D. Pfeiffer and Dr. and Mrs. Robert H. McDowell of New York.

SHORT TIME REQUIRED TO ARRIVE AT VERDICT

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 9.—It took a jury just 45 minutes to sentence William Stambough, 25, a mechanic, to 25 years in the penitentiary after they found him guilty of attacking Pearl Smith, nine years old.

The girl was the only witness against Stambough. She told of going to his flat last spring and of being attacked while there. Stambough denied the charge but admitted the girl visited his flat.

NEGRO SERVES ON JURY IN EIGHTY-NINTH COURT

A. J. King holds the distinction of being the first negro to sit on a state jury in the history of Wichita county. He was selected on the jury which heard the evidence in a case in the 89th district court before Judge P. A. Martin.

Harry Hughes was being tried on the charge of illegal possession of liquor. The state and the counsel for the defense had a panel to select from and each was entitled to a definite number of challenges. When the first twelve men whose names appeared on both lists unchallenged were called, King was among them and he took his place in the jury box with eleven others.

A negro has served on the federal grand jury in this county, but this is the first instance where a negro has appeared on a state criminal case, it is stated.

That it was an oversight on the part of both the attorneys seems certain, as when asked as to the reason for a negro on the jury, an answer expressing embarrassment was given.

The case went to the jury at a late hour Tuesday afternoon.

AUTHORIZE PAVING OF FIFTEEN BLOCKS ON TENTH STREET

ACTION IS TAKEN AT MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL ON MONDAY NIGHT.

WILL RESET WOOD BLOCK BUSINESS STREET PAVING

Abandon Plan For Building An Addition to City Hall as Fund is Not Available.

Paving, concrete, wooden and asphalt, was on the mind of every member of the city council last night. Paving by the square yard and paving by the city block; the linking of intersections; the laying of new paving and the repair of old—these and a score of other matters incidental to a general program of paving were discussed by the city fathers throughout two-thirds of the council session.

The net result of the "paving bee" was a unanimous vote authorizing City Engineer Julian Montgomery to prepare specifications and to call for bids for 15 blocks of paving work that will relieve the tremendous traffic burden on Tenth street at the earliest date possible.

Attention will be centered first on Eighth street, one of the main thoroughfares into the business district. From Burnett street to Brook this city highway will be paved immediately. Only recently Eighth street was paved between Denver and Brook, and when this new concrete link, last laid in 1917, is completed, the engineering department will continue the pavement on Denver to Ninth street, thence out Ninth to join the paving already finished. When these various intersecting links are completed, motorists will have a new main highway into the business district that should aid materially in relieving traffic on Tenth.

To Reset Wood Blocks.

The council also voted to permit the city engineer to go ahead with plans for the resetting of the wooden block paving in the business section. Wherever necessary new foundations will be laid, and new blocks inserted. The old blocks will be reset, the entire system will be graded, and a water-proof surface of asphalt will be applied to prevent future swelling and buckling of the blocks.

In addition to the important work to be done on Eighth street, the council agreed heartily with Street Commissioner Curlee's plans to pave Grant street, from Tenth to Avenue H, there by joining the concrete highway to

Lake Wichita. Avenue A also will be paved to connect Tenth and Eleventh streets.

When all the work mentioned in the preceding paragraphs is completed, the engineering department will rest on its laurels for the winter as far as city paving is concerned. Commissioner Curlee pointed out to his fellow aldermen last night that unfavorable winter weather will probably make it impossible to go farther with the general paving program before next spring.

Ask Benefit of New Law.
Property owners on Ninth street in the 2400 block, represented by Judge W. E. Fitzgerald, appeared before the council in an effort to take advantage of the application of the state paving law to local paving work. Contracts for paving in this block were let before the state law was adopted, but the property owners now object to standing the entire cost of the paving, contending that they are entitled to the benefits of the state law whereby the city bears one-fourth of the expense. The argument was advanced, however, by Commissioner Curlee that the contract was made by the property owners through petition to the city council, and that the council has no authority in the matter unless this contract is deliberately broken. In the event this is done, the council then may consider the question of assisting the property owners and at the same time protecting the contractor.

Approves Appointment.
The council approved the recent committee appointment of F. N. Lawton as general manager of the water works system under municipal ownership, at a salary of \$350 per month. Mayor Cline, in that connection, assured property owners on Buchanan street, between Avenues H and L, that one of the early improvements to be

accomplished when the city actually has taken over the plant will be the extension of water mains into that section in order to provide adequate fire protection.

Lack of city funds with which to pay for the improvement caused the council to abandon temporarily the plan to build a two-story addition to the city hall to house the office of the water works system and the staff of the city engineering department. According to the architect's plans such a building will cost \$15,000—whereas, it was stated by Finance Commissioner R. E. Shepherd that the city has no funds available at this time for such a purpose.

Plans were approved, however, for the expenditure of approximately \$22,000 for a new fire station at the corner of Buchanan street and Avenue H.

It was expected that one result of last night's meeting would be the re-

peal of the ordinance prohibiting the parking of automobiles on Eighth street more than one hour. When the matter came up for discussion, however, it was the general opinion of the aldermen that no action should be taken until a general traffic ordinance, covering this situation and all other traffic problems, had been drafted. City Attorney Mann was instructed to go into this question with City Clerk George Thorburn and to prepare such an ordinance to be presented to the council at the earliest possible date.
