AS PLANS MATURE FOR CONTEST.

PREPARE FOR A CLASH OVER THE CLOSED SHOP

Employers Claim Advantage On Ac count Of The Surplus Of Labor In Country.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9 .- Rumblings of impending industrial war were heard in Chicago and the midwest today as employers and union men prepared for a clash over the closed shop proposition. Employers of Illinois went on record recently as favoring the open shop, which gives non-union men the right to work alongside of organized labor when the Illinois Manufacturers Association in a formal resolution endorsed

the open shop and promised aid to any of its members who started a fight against the closed shop.

Re tis reaching labor federation here arters here from other industrial centers in the midwest indicate that employers are contemplating taking similar action as that taken by the Hillinois Manufacturers' Association. Those in touch with the situation hold that the fight between employers and labor will come to a head this iwnter, pointing to the fact that the supply of labor will come to a head this winter, and that these conditions make a clash advantageous for the employers.

Expect Fight This Winter.
John Fitzpatrick, president of the

## **CLERK AND ATTORNEY** FRAMING A GENERAL TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

DESIGNED TO COVER PROBLEMS IN BOTH BUSINESS AND RES-IDENCE SECTIONS.

#### SUGGESTIONS ARE SECURED FROM MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

Regulations Will Be Formed From deas Contained In Plans Thus Proposed.

A general traffic ordinance, extensive in its scope and aimed to answer ness area of the city and the residence sections, is being framed by City Clerk George Thorburn and E. M. Mann, city attorney. It is probable that the work preparing the ordinance will con-nue throughout the week, as a general atudy of similar ordinances in other Texas cities is being made and an attempt also will be included to put into practical, legal form some of put into practical, legal form some of the ideas on the subject that have been advanced by members of the city

As an aid in the work each member the council has presented to the leveloped from personal observation traffic congestion, and the causes accidents on the streets of the city.

Favors One-Hour Parking. Judge W. N. Bonner, public utilities commissioner, is opposed to the repeal of the Eighth street one-hour parking ordinance until a substitute measure has been passed by the board of al-darmen. In his opinion it would be wise to reserve parking spaces thirty 3617.
feet in length in front of every down-town building five stories or more in height. This, he believes, would perneight. This, no believes, would per-mit the loading and unloading of freight and passengers without the present congestion so frequently no-ticeable in front of the larger office

buildings.

Mayor W. D. Cline would prohibit "double-decking" in the business dis-trict for a period longer than two min-uce—double-decking referring to the practice of stopping automobiles par-allel with the street behind other cars parked at the curb. He also favors the ranking of all cars parallel with the curb on Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth streets, thereby providing a wider thoroughfare for moving traf-fic.

Turn of the Crossings.

In the opinion of W. G. Bralley, police commissioner, cars should be ranked on Tenth street only. He also dvocates rigid enforcement of a statute against turning in the middle of ny block, while at certain corners here traffic is heavy he would make. t illegal to turn an automobile for the purpose of returning on the same

The most practical suggestion for the elimination of one cause of accidents has been advanced by Street Commissioner W. S. Curlee, who would include in the proposed ordinance a clause prohibiting anyone from pass-ing another driver in the same direction at street intersections. This practice, owing to the fact that the speeding driver is on the left-hand side and his view of intersecting traflo is necessarily blocked somewhat by the car he is attempting to pass, as resulted recently in a number of accidents of a serious nature. Curiee also favors the parking of cars at an engle of 30 degrees, instead of the present 45-degree angle, believing that would mean less congestion ing out into the street. In ore that space may not be wasted, he in-cludes the further suggestion that each car should park within 18 inches of the car on its right.

Favor Ranking on Tenth.

Both M. O. McDowell, health commissioner, and R. E. Shepherd, city
finance commissioner, favor the ranking of cars on Tenth street as one ing of cars on Tenth street as one means of preventing congestion on this thoroughfare. McDowell, however, would repeal the Eighth street cone-hour parking ordinance, while shepherd is inclined to believe this has proven a wise traffic measure.

In the opinion of City Clerk Thorburn, much traffic on the main streets leading into the business district could be eliminated if all slow-moving vehicles would keep close to the right

hicles would keep close to the right hand curb. Also congestion and the danger of accident caused by the unexpected awerving of automobiles would be lessened to a noticeable degree, he believes, if the many small holes and

breaks in the Tenth street pavement were repaired. The two main traffic evils in the business section of the city, Thorburn holds, are the doubledecking of cars and the sharp cutting of corners by careless drivers. All of these suggestions are now be-fore Thorburn and City Attorney Manfor consideration, and it is expected an ordinance covering every problem of traffic in this city will be ready for presentation to the city council at its next regular meeting.

These exchanges have been, of course, entirely unofficial and informal and Harding has had nothing to do with them. spendence between criends in three and their European friends in three countries, extending over many weeks, shows a distinct willingness to meet Harding at least half way. Through it all runs the same idea—that Europe must have American cooperation and is not disposed to stick at the terms. this information is being gathered abroad, other agencies are preparing for Harding an analysis of the domestic situation with regard to the league. Harding regards the election as a popular vote against the Wilson league. But he has to reckon with Root, Taft and other influential re-publicans who do not want to see the Wilson plan discarded entirely. There are some republican senators ,too, who favor ratification of the Wilson league with strong reservations.

Indications are that democrats are preparing to negotiate with these re-publicans, perhaps at the short session of congress to ratify the treaty with the Lodge reservations, the democrats agreeing to vote for them.

There are about twenty-five active associations, these figures show, which in some cases control as high as 90 per cent of their perticular crop and which range in activity from mere sales agencies to organisations that pack, distribute and advertise their products and even possess lumber mills to make their own box shook.

## OIL DEVELOPMENT WORK IN WESTERN CANADA WILL BE CONDUCTED ON BIG SCALE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 .- Oll development in Western Canada will be conducted on a vaster scale next year than at any other time in the history of that country with the possible exception of the work done by the Imperial Oil Company D. B. Dowling, a Canadian government geologist, reports in advices communicated to the bureau of foreign and domestic, commerce here by Consul Ryd-

domestic commerce here by Consul Ryder at Vancouver.

The work will be conducted by the Whitehall Oil company of England, which is composed of a group of Brittish capitalists, at the head of whom is Lord Cowdray the report declares.

Considerable activity is seen in the
Canadian oil business according to Ryder's report. Members of local oil firms in British Columbia and members of the Vancouver stock exchange, acting as individuals, recently effected an organ-ization known as the British Columbia Oil Operators' Association "to promote

prospecting for oil.

The organization plans a campaign of education and publicity to encourage the development of the field. In this stead the Imperial Oil company has confirmed reports that it has struck at its well at Fort Norman, on the Mackensie river near the Arctic circle. Earlier reports estimated a flow of about 1500 barrels a day. Eleven drills have been working this year for the Imperial company and this year for the Imperial company and the first strike was made in August when oil of about 40 baume gravity

was found.


