Hunger Strike Ends On the 94th Day

MILLION AND HALF WORKERS IN EUROPE ARE REPORTED IDLE

TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DRAW UNEMPLOYMENT PAY FROM GOVERNMENT.

WEATHER HAS BEEN MILD WITH BUT LITTLE SUFFERING

CORK, Nov. 12.—The hunger strike of the nine Irish prisoners in the Cork jail was called off today, the 94th day of the strike.

DUBLIN, Nov. 12.—The remaining nine Irish hunger strikers in prison at Cork today abandoned their fast, according to a dispatch received here from that city. This was the 94th day of their hunger strike.

There were nine of the hunger strikers left, two having died.

Abandonment of the strike was brought about through the intervention of Bishop Cohan.

The nine were very weak and exceedingly emaciated, and it was believed they would not have survived many hours longer.

The nine were John Hennessy, Michael Burke, Michael O'Ryan, Thomas Donovan, Joseph Kenny, Upton, Pawan and Murray and one unknown.

Michael Fitzgerald died October 17 after 65 days of fasting. Joseph Murray, born in the United States, died October 25, after 74 days without food.

With two of the strikers virtually in collapse, prison physicians had doubts as to whether all the men will be rescued by any authenticated case.

Deaf Men Were Fed.

The record was so remarkable that throughout the time the men have been confined in the Cork jail there have been rumors of secret feeding. These always have been denied by jail officials and the strikers. The rumors were discredited to some extent when two of the men died.

The men were confined in separate cells, all opening into a common corridor. Down this corridor the nurses who nursed the prisoners, passed from one cell to the other. The prisoners were described as greatly emaciated and barely strong enough to whisper their needs to the nurses.

The prison physician, E. S. Whiggcomb, denied a few days ago that any effort had been made by the government to feed the men. He said Bishop Cohan had urged the men to break their fast and that he had ordered the nurses to procure food. The men refused to accept the nourishment and the effort was abandoned for the time being.

The nine surviving strikers at that time declared that two of their mates had given their lives and that Terence MacSwiney had died and that they were bound morally to follow their examples.

The bishop's task was to convince them that further sacrifice would be useless.

BRIEFS FILED CLAIM 980 ACRES OIL LAND NOW HELD BY DELANO

SUIT IS TO REGAIN CONTROL OF PROPERTY IN RIVER CONTROVERSY.

TWO COMPANIES CONTEND THAT LAND IS IN TEXAS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The Book-eye Petroleum company and the South-west Petroleum company have filed a brief in the United States supreme court seeking to regain control of 980 acres of oil lands held by Frederick A. Delano, receiver appointed by the court for the oil lands along the Red river, the title to which is in dispute between Oklahoma and Texas.

The two oil companies contend that their lands are on the south side of the Red river in Texas, and that the lands have always been in acknowledged Texas territory. Their titles to the property were secured through the general land office of the state of Texas, the original deed being executed to Sam Sparks, who also received an oil and gas permit from the state. The deed is filed under date of December 1, 1918 and recorded under date of May 6, 1919.

After expending about \$75,000 in oil well drilling, four wells were opened which produced, it is stated, about 16,000 barrels of oil per month on April 1, 1920, when taken over by Receiver Delano. Since then the receiver has been impounding the proceeds of which the oil companies claim \$25,000.

The oil companies pledge themselves to pay royalties to Texas and to take all necessary steps to perfect the titles and protect the personal property on the lands, should the property be returned to them.

The companies are represented by B. B. Blakeney and J. H. Maxey of Oklahoma City and Horace F. Baker and E. H. Wicks of Pittsburg, Pa.

PROCLAIM ADVISABILITY OF UNION OF STATES

GUATEMALA CITY, Nov. 11.

THE CONGRESS OF MUNICIPAL REPRESENTATIVES OF CENTRAL AMERICA, MEETING AT ANTIGUA, HAS PROCLAIMED THE ADVISABILITY OF THE UNION OF THE FIVE STATES—SALVADOR, GUATEMALA, COSTA RICA, HONDURAS AND NICARAGUA.

DAN IS PLACED ON MALT AND HOPS FOR USE BY THE PUBLIC

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Prohibition enforcement throughout the country has been instructed to prevent the sale of malt and hops, together with bakers and confectioners, but details of the order which tightens the ban on home brewing were lacking today.

In the absence of Commissioner Kramer, officials at the prohibition enforcement bureau said that the sale of hops and malt as component parts of home-made beer had been ruled to be in violation of the Volstead act. They would not discuss, however, the details of the new order which is said to have resulted from a construction placed on the law nearly two months ago.

GOMPERS DECLARES ORGANIZED LABOR IN FAVOR OF PROGRESS

WILL WELCOME ASSISTANCE IN ADVANCEMENT OF MODERN INDUSTRY.

EFFORT TO SADDLE ON LABOR THE ODIUM OF OPPOSITION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Organized labor will welcome whatever assistance research and science can offer to modern industry, President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor today told delegates gathered here today for the preliminary conference on industrial research. A part of organized labor's own work, he said, has been directed toward the scientific study of conditions surrounding production and to the assembling of data.

A persistent effort has been made to saddle upon labor the odium of opposition to improved methods and machinery in production, Mr. Gompers said. "This is not true as a general statement. What labor has opposed is an effort to exploit them by the use of improvements that are intended as a blessing in disguise. Labor is rightly suspicious of changes which are introduced without explanation and whose effect upon their welfare is not considered."

"Labor is not opposed to increased production or improved methods. Quite the contrary. We recognize there can be no permanent betterment of standards of living for all except by increasing the things that contribute to the better and more satisfactory living."

"But we hold as a fundamental that material products are not the ultimate end of production, but service in a better life for humanity."

"I take it all of us have too much vision and experience to think we can solve the world's problems by a simple problem that will last as long as life."

"This conference is concerned with the fields of science, management and labor which we can for convenience divide under two heads, the lawmaking function and the administration. Experience has taught organized labor that we have only one opportunity for freedom and well-being when laws for industry are made by those directly concerned—the management and the workers. The formulation of laws to govern industry is not the function of any organization suggested by this conference. Science and research may furnish the law makers with data and suggestions to assist the law makers in reaching the best considered judgment. Labor should meet here to pass blessing on any attempt to usurp prerogatives."

HOME RULE BILL UP TO HOUSE OF LORDS FOR THEIR APPROVAL

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The Irish home rule bill for more than a dozen years is now up to the house of lords for approval.

OTTAWA BANK TELLER TO ANSWER BURGLARY CHARGE

OTTAWA, ILL., Nov. 12.—Francis J. Carey, 21, bank teller, was to be arraigned here today on charges of burglary in connection with the theft of \$4,500 from the vault of the Ottawa National City bank Wednesday night. The money was recovered when the robber dropped it in his flight.

Carey surrendered after hiding in the woods all night. He was bruised and cut and authorities believed he was beaten up by accomplices who became angered because they lost the loot.

WRANGEL WITHDRAWS FORCES IN CRIMEA TO MAIN DEFENSE LINES

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 12.—General Baron Wrangel, head of the southern Russian anti-bolshevik government, is withdrawing his forces in northern Crimea toward the main defense line, which runs through the village of Lushun, about 13 miles south of the town of Perekop. This operation is being carried on in the face of attacks in force by soviet troops.

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LIBERAL MEMBER OF HOUSE OF COMMONS ARRAIGNED IN COURT

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Lieutenant Colonel Fitzroy Maclean, liberal member of the house of commons, who was arrested Wednesday night in Dublin, where he had gone by invitation to speak in a meeting of the house of commons, was arraigned in Bow street police court today for the use of language likely to cause sedition among the civilian population. The proceedings arose from a speech delivered by Lieutenant Colonel Maclean in Albert Hall here last Sunday.

SON OF THE CONDUCTOR IS BURNED TO DEATH WHEN TRAINS COLLIDE

SHREVEPORT, LA., Nov. 12.—As the result of a rear end collision between an extra and a regular freight train at Ford's switch, near Gibsland, La., on the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific railroad early today, Pete Wilson, son of Conductor Wilson, who was riding in a caboose, was burned to death.

REVOLUTIONARY PLOT DISCOVERED IN PERU

LIMA, PERU, Nov. 12.—Discovery of a revolutionary plot with ramifications in the provinces of Madre de Dios, Huallaga and Lambayeque and the other cities of Cuzco and Arequipa, was announced by high officials at the government palace this morning.

PLAN TO STRENGTHEN LABOR BODIES IN THE STEEL TRADE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Representatives of the labor organizations that participated in the steel strike last spring were in Washington today at the call of President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor to confer with the federation's executive council in holding its regular fall meeting here.

CONSPIRACY WAS TO CULMINATE IN AN ATTACK UPON PRESIDENT LEGUIA

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SERIOUS RIOTING IS REPORTED AT GENOVA

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Serious rioting has occurred at Genoa, near Potenza, Italy, according to a Milan dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company. A priest is said to have been severely beaten during a church ceremony at which he praised the Italian soldiers, and a general strike followed the arrest of 200 persons accused of having participated in the disorders.

NEWSPAPERS OF ROME CLAIM ITALIAN VICTORY IN ADRIATIC SETTLEMENT

ROME, Nov. 11.—The newspapers of Rome agree generally that a victory has been gained by Italian diplomacy in the settlement of the dispute between Italy and Jugoslavians. The organs of the nationalists and the newspapers voicing the sentiment of the right party in parliament, however, express a certain amount of discontent and demand a more radical solution of the controversy.

THIRTEEN HUNDRED MEN IN PENNSYLVANIA SHOP TO BE LAID OFF NOV. 16

ALTOONA, PA., Nov. 12.—Announcement was made at the Pennsylvania railroad offices here today that 1,300 men in the Altoona shops, or ten per cent of the force, would be laid off November 16. All departments are affected.

PRESIDENT IS PREPARING THANKSGIVING MESSAGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—President is preparing his Thanksgiving day proclamation and he is expected to issue it within a few days, it was said today.

MONARCHIST COUP IS EXPECTED IN GERMANY

Statement is Made by Foreign Minister in Address at Prague.

PRAGUE, CZECHO-SLOVAKIA, Nov. 10.—Dr. Eduard Benes, the foreign minister, addressing the German members of the foreign affairs committee today in the German language for the first time, said that a monarchist coup was impending in Germany. Czecho-Slovakia, however, he declared, was prepared for any eventuality and would not meddle in Germany's internal affairs.

Complete Agreement on Adriatic Problem

CAPT. KILPATRICK IS BEING HELD PRISONER

PARIS, Nov. 12.—Washington reports that Captain Emmet Kilpatrick, American Red Cross worker in south Russia, was not killed by the bolsheviks, but is being held a prisoner, were confirmed in a telegram received at the Paris branch of the American Red Cross from Sebastopol today. The telegram was filed November 8.

GERMANY TRIUMPHS IN ITS FIRST CLASH WITH THE RADICALS

BERLIN, Nov. 12.—The German government was triumphant today in its first clash with radical workers who attempted to emulate Italian workers in the seizure of plants.

Metal factories, seized by strikers, were abandoned when police suddenly surrounded them. There was no violence, the workers realizing they would be starved out if they did not yield. In like manner, a "soviet" which seized a gas plant on the north side of the city was compelled to withdraw.

Electrical workers returned after a strike of two weeks. The government had recruited a staff of students and experts to replace them.

Despite these settlements officials feared this early restlessness among workers portended a series of strikes greater than occurred in Germany last winter. Lack of employment and increasing food prices were recognized as a disturbing influence. At the same time Russian agitators are busy throughout the republic, urging workers to rise.

Street cars went into service this morning for the first time in a week and factories dependent on electrical current began resuming operations. Unemployment here was relieved somewhat by this occurrence.

LARGE SHIPMENTS OF GOLD FOR FEDERAL RESERVE BANK

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—News of \$12,000,000 gold which arrived on the steamship Adriatic today, \$9,500,000 was for account of the federal reserve bank of this city and the final transfer of \$11,000,000 held for that institution by the Bank of England for upward of a year.

The balance of the Adriatic's gold was consigned to Kuhn, Loeb & Co., making a total of about \$43,000,000 received by that banking house so far this year.

APRILISTS ARE CLAIMING A CURE FOR RHEUMATISM

ALLUW, OKLA., Nov. 12.—Aprilists here today claimed that they had concocted a cure for rheumatism.

Lester Fry, teamster for the Amity Gasoline Company, set out recently to loot a beehive and was so badly stung about the eyes that they were closed. Fry's satisfaction from the stinging was that the rheumatism he was suffering with vanished.

UNIVERSITY FRESHMAN OF CLEBURNE IS DROWNED

AUSTIN, Nov. 12.—Raymond Stephens of Cleburne, freshman student of the University of Texas, was drowned in Lake Austin this morning when a canoe in which he and three other students were crossing the lake, capsized. The party had just started on a duck hunting trip.

Stephens' body has not been recovered.

ELECTED CONSTABLE BY A "PLURALITY" OF ONE VOTE

GALVESTON, TEXAS, Nov. 12.—The landslide which swept Senator Harding into the presidency also swept Reuben Barrow, a High Island man, into office. Barrow, who had been elected by a "plurality" of one, a solitary voter writing his name down on the ballot for that office. He had no opponent.

FORTY THOUSAND OF ORPHANS PROTECTED BY EIGHT AMERICANS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10.—The Rev. Dr. Ernest Yarrow, a missionary stationed in Turkey-Armenia, telegraphed from the Caucasus that eight Americans at Kara are protecting 40,000 orphans and that the stores of food for the number of 25,000 have reached Alexandropol panic-stricken. The Georgian national guard and the mobilized Georgian army, says the dispatch, are protecting the orphans. The constituent assembly has decided to maintain its war footing, apparently contemplating assisting the Armenians who are struggling against the Turks.

LAWRENCE ARMOUR AND PARTY ON A VISIT TO FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH, Nov. 12.—Lawrence Armour and party arrived here this morning on a visit to the Fort Worth and other offices of the packing company in Texas.

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DECLARES AMERICA CRAVES FRATERNITY WITH ALL NATIONS

STATEMENT IS MADE BY PRESIDENT-ELECT IN SPEECH AT BROWNSVILLE.

WILL NOT SURRENDER ITS OWN NATIONALITY

Says Government Should Protect Its Citizens Anywhere On Lawful Mission.

POINT ISABEL, TEXAS, Nov. 12.—A whistling "norther" blowing across the bay kept President-elect W. G. Harding off the water today. Early this morning he was waiting on the weather before deciding whether to go into Brownsville for golf or to lounge around in his cottage.

The sharp gale which blew up out of the north made the water too rough for the small boats used in tarpon fishing, causing the senator to abandon for the day his fishing plans.

The sharp drop in temperature and the overcast skies that the "norther" brought with it drove away the semi-tropical aspect of this little fishing village. It resembled more the bleak settlements on the New England coast.

Members of the Harding party went about bundled in sweaters and heavy clothing instead of the tropical duck and thin shirts they had found so comfortable here.

Unofficially, members of the party are receiving a welcome from the Mexican side of the border that rivals that given by the Americans. The Mexican hospitality is of the warmest kind. Members of the party who crossed the border found excellent order being preserved. Gambling resorts were locked up and dark. Barrooms

were running but there were no signs of disorder.

Friendly Feeling Manifest.
Friendly feelings on either side of the Mexican border have been increased perceptibly as the result of the visit of President-elect Harding here.

Relations between Mexicans and Americans have been more amicable here than anywhere along the border, according to prominent citizens. The appearance of Senator Harding on the northern side of the Rio Grande has given many Mexicans a closer view of the man who is to shape the foreign policies of the United States for the next four years and they feel confident that their country will have nothing to fear from the incoming administration so long as the American nationals and their property are respected by the Mexicans.

Speaking at the armistice day celebration at Brownsville, Senator Harding declared America craves fraternity with other nations but does not mean to surrender its own nationality.

With many Mexicans present and within sight of Mexican soil the next president said he liked to think of a government which protects its citizens wherever they go on a lawful mission anywhere under the shining sun.

Desperate Effort to Secure Money Prior to Suicide

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Testimony given by Coroner Hoffman that Miss Thelma Sanders' last desperate effort to obtain the financial aid which would have permitted her to remain near the man she loved before she stabbed herself to death last Tuesday, was revealed today.

Her bills at the hotel were overdue and so she decided to pawn her only article of jewelry, a diamond stickpin, witnesses said, rather than return to her home in Laredo, Texas.

Fred W. York, a diamond broker, related how she had visited his office on Monday afternoon. She was particularly eager to dispose of the pin, he said.

"She told me a girl friend had died

and she wished to send a remembrance to her parents," she said.

Diamond Had Flaw.
"She didn't have any money and it was necessary that she raise funds," she told me. I looked at the pin. The diamond had a flaw.

"Won't you buy it please," she pleaded.

"Leave it with me; I'll let you know," I said. She left. She returned in two hours.

"I am despondent, unhappy," she said. "I do hope you are going to buy the pin. That will help me a little."

"I have bad news for you," I told her as gently as I could. She paled.

"You mean—You mean you won't buy it?"

"I mean I cannot buy it. Its value is slight."

Great Mental Strain.
"She began crying. I tried to comfort her. She was inconsolable. I could see she was under a great mental strain. I asked her what was wrong. She merely looked at me in an odd way and left."

Miss Sanders then visited the office of three other diamond brokers in the building. None would buy the pin. She applied to the elevator operator as she left the building.

"Won't you please buy my pin?" he quoted her as saying. "I need the money so badly. I don't know what I'll do if I don't get money somewhere. Please but it. I, of course, couldn't buy it. Besides, I didn't know who she was. She was crying when she left the building."

The coroner will continue the inquiry until a complete investigation has been concluded. It was announced.

AWARD NOBLE PRIZE FOR LITERATURE FOR 1919 TO SPITTELER, SWISS AUTHOR

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 11.—The Nobel prize for literature for 1919 has been awarded to the Swiss author, Carl Spitteler.

The literature prize for 1920 was awarded some time ago to the Norwegian writer, Knut Hamsun, who some years ago lived in the United States and at one time was a street car conductor in Chicago. He was charged from his job as a conductor because he read books instead of collecting fares.

TULSA PRACTICALLY WITHOUT GAS WHILE HEARING PROGRESSES

TULSA, OKLA., Nov. 12.—After the coldest night of the present winter, during which a freeze was noted and on the very heels of early morning when there was hardly sufficient gas for the housewives of the city to prepare breakfast, the gas hearing was resumed here this morning with the forces opposing the proposed rate increase to be heard.

Resumption of deliberations were scheduled for 10 o'clock. A statement accredited to R. E. Echols, state corporation commissioner, last night was to the effect that he expected to hear testimony no different than he had heard in other cities and it was intimated that increased rates might be expected.

City Attorney Frank E. Duncan, who is fighting the cause of the citizens, today expressed the belief that the increase would be obtained by the corporation commission of the Oklahoma natural gas company's confession that but little if any relief could be furnished this winter.

UNION OF ALL FORCES IN NEAR EAST NECESSARY TO PREVENT ANOTHER WAR

GENEVA, Nov. 11.—The immediate use of all naval and military forces in the Near East to prevent a union of the bolsheviks with the forces of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, the Turkish national leader, is declared necessary in order to save the Armenians from annihilation and prevent another general war, by a resolution adopted this afternoon by the International Armenian league here. The United States was unofficially represented by Walter G. Smith of Philadelphia of the Near East Relief and W. W. Jaquith of New York.

COMPARES LEAGUE COVENANT WITH A COURT AS PLANNED

LATTER SUGGESTION VERY SIMILAR TO SUPREME COURT OF UNITED STATES.

PROPOSED COURT WITHOUT A PROVISION TO COMPEL

Claim That Moral Force And Public Opinion Will Be Sufficient.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The fact that the League of Nations, after being the dominant question in American politics for close to two years preceding the election instantly returns to the head lines in the same capacity is proof of the vitality of the idea. Inasmuch as America will be considering this subject for at least six months to come, and perhaps longer, it is desirable to make clear the distinction between what was rejected at the recent election and what will be presented for our approval after the new leaders have reduced their ideas to definite form.

It would be roughly correct to say, in a confessedly tentative and incomplete discussion as this is, that the new plan contemplates a world court which shall be to the nations of the world what the supreme court of the United States is to the state of our own union. The court will not be the whole of the new plan, but it will be the principal part of it, and the only part that will have any power.

Points of Simplicity. There are a great many points of simplicity between our supreme court and the court that is planned by those whose thought will be dominant in attempting to bring about the new association of nations. There is not space here to go into these points of similarity, nor, farther to describe this still incipient plan. But one question which will arise in the minds of every one can be partially answered.

It will be asked, what force will be at the command of this new court to enforce its decrees? What constable will it have, or what sheriff, or what marshal, to compel a nation against which a decree is handed down to obey that decree? That question has been at heart of every discussion of the present League of Nations and of every other proposed form of world association to enforce peace.

The League of Nations frankly relies upon armies and navies to enforce its decrees, and that is precisely the feature of the League of Nations which was deemed objectionable by its most violent critics. The idea that the American army or the American navy might be so used was the most successful appeal made for popular support by those opponents of the league whose position was endorsed at the recent election.

Court Without Authority. As to the court which is embodied in the new plan, the answer to this question about a sheriff or a marshal or some other form of force is that the court is not to be allowed to have any force at its command. It is to

have neither an army nor a navy nor a constable nor a sheriff nor a marshal.

At this point all who advocate and support the feature of force as a necessity to success in any league to enforce peace will probably throw up their hands. They will say that without some equivalent for sheriff or a marshal to enforce its decrees the new court will amount to nothing and will be helpless to keep the peace.

The answer of those who favor the new world court, modeled upon the supreme court of the United States, will come as a surprise. It will come as a surprise even to many lawyers. The answer given is that in disputes between the various states of the United States our own supreme court has no force and no way of enforcing its decrees if a state should refuse to obey its decree.

Facts Forgotten. This is a fact that nearly all Americans have forgotten. It is so uniform a practice for our states to obey a decree handed down by the supreme court of the United States that we all take it for granted that the defendant states do so for the same reason that most of us obey the decree of a court—that is, because of the fear of the power over our persons and our property that the ordinary courts have. The fact is that when one of our states sues another state in the supreme court, and when the decree is handed down, that ends the matter. If the defendant state should choose to ignore the decree, there is no way for the supreme court to punish such a contempt or overcome such a resistance.

Nevertheless, all our states do obey such decrees when they are handed down. They do so not through fear of any force that the court possesses, but solely because of the moral force of public opinion.

Example Is Given. For example, within a very recent time the state of Virginia sued the state of West Virginia for a sum amounting to upward of \$10,000,000. The supreme court handed down a judgment in favor of Virginia, and West Virginia had not chosen to pay, the supreme court would have been helpless to enforce the decree.

In this very case, after a decree against West Virginia had been handed down, there was a period when very real concern was felt lest West Virginia should refuse to obey and should take the position of publicly flouting the supreme court of the United States. During this period a good deal of thought was given to whether any way could be devised to prevent or punish such a contempt of the court's decree if it should occur.

There is no way inherent in the law, but there was much speculation as to whether, aside from the law, some way could not be found for visiting upon a contemptuous defendant state the unpleasant results of that moral force which the court necessarily had to rely upon.

Obeys the Decree. In this case, however, West Virginia obeyed the decree of the court. The West Virginia legislature took appropriate action, bonds were issued and the judgment was paid.

This case is cited to illustrate how the supreme court of the United States functions in disputes between states. It is true that 100 years ago the very first decree that the supreme court of the United States handed down in a dispute between two states was wholly ignored by the defendant state, which in that case happened to be Georgia. That, however, was a mere incident in the growth and development of the supreme court to the point where its dignity and moral force is the equivalent of an army. In all the cases since this one, the defendant state has obeyed the decree and has done so, not through fear of armed force, but wholly because of the moral force of the decree and of the public opinion behind it.

No Armed Power. The advocates of the proposed supreme court of the world, so to speak, claim that what happens between states within the jurisdiction of our supreme court would also happen as between nations within the jurisdiction of the new court. They do not propose to give to this new court any armed power to enforce its decrees. They claim that the moral force of the decrees and of the public opinion behind it would be enough. If you reply that, theoretically, it would not be enough, their answer is that they do not concede this to be true, and that if it should be so there is nothing to be done about it.

This article does not purport to treat the subject except in the most incomplete, tentative and possibly even inaccurate way. The plan is yet too tentative to be accurate or definite about. However, it is not practicable to be as detailed in an article designed to aid popular understanding as in a technical discussion for lawyers. But the heart of the idea lies in this analogy between the supreme court of the United States and the proposed supreme court of the world.

KESSLER HERE WITH PLANS FOR FUTURE CITY DEVELOPMENT

READY TO PRESENT IDEAS AND SUGGESTIONS TO THOSE INTERESTED.

FINAL DRAFT OF PLANS HAS NOT BEEN MADE

Expects To Confer With J. A. Kemp Regarding Plans For Rural Community.

Plans for the future development of this city are ready for the consideration of Wichita Falls citizens. George E. Kessler, landscape architect, who is under contract to prepare a detailed guide to the city's physical progress, arrived here this morning from St. Louis and will spend several days in Wichita Falls presenting his ideas and suggestions to members of the city council, the business council of the chamber of commerce and to individual citizens who may have property interests affected by some of the plans.

The final draft of the plans has not been made, inasmuch as Kessler is anxious first to receive any suggestions and criticisms that may be advanced by local interests.

"I am ready to present my own ideas and suggestions," he said this morning. "All matters affecting property interests are, of course, subject to some protest, perhaps, and I am here now to be told just where your authorities consider I am wrong. I do not care to construct a monument on paper that will lie in your public library; I want to present to you something that will be of service."

There are two main features to every set of plans of this nature. First, the thing that costs the city no money—the zoning plan. This can be applied without expense, and, while it affects all residence and industrial property, it assists in stabilizing values. Second, the plan for general public improvement, which plan does call for expenditures. In this second scheme I attempt simply to furnish a guide for the city's future development. Here and there you will find funds on these matters as such funds become available."

Before he leaves the city, Kessler expects to confer with J. A. Kemp regarding plans for a rural community outside Wichita Falls in connection with the Wichita valley irrigation project. Kessler stated today that he is particularly interested in this matter, as he is convinced that the irrigation project, when successfully completed, will be a remarkable contributing factor to this city's future.

SENATOR FAIL TO CONFER WITH THE PRESIDENT-ELECT

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, Nov. 11.—United States Senator Albert B. Fall of New Mexico will arrive Sunday morning and presumably discuss Mexican relations with President-elect Harding. It was learned here today that Senator Fall is the republican chairman of the Mexican investigating committee of the senate, and in the past has urged drastic measures toward Mexico. This was before the Oregon revolt and establishment of the present provisional government, however. His attitude toward the present government is unknown. Fall may go to New Orleans with Harding. It was said.

THIRTY BIRTHS AND TWENTY-SIX DEATHS MONTH OF OCTOBER

Life gained another lap on death in Wichita Falls last month, vital statistics released today by Dr. M. M. Walker, city health officer, showing thirty births recorded in this city during October as compared to twenty-six deaths.

The month was comparatively peaceful insofar as the death record was concerned, only two persons meeting death violently and three through the medium of accidents. Natural causes claimed twenty.

MEMORIAL TO LETTER MEN WHO DIED DURING THE WAR

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 11.—A bronze tablet, hereafter will hang in the men's gymnasium of the University of Texas as a memorial to the five letter men of the institution who died in service during the recent war.

This memorial was presented to the university by Luther Stark of Orange. The names to be inscribed on it are: Louis John Jordan, died in Llanview sector, March 5, 1918; James A. Edmond, died in Argonne forest, October 11, 1918; Mahlon Wallace, died at Elbert September 12, 1918; Bothwell Pierce Kane, died at Villers-sur-Fere, July 28, 1918; James Frank Greer, died at Issoudun, October 21, 1918.

Jordan was a four-year football man and a T man in tennis. Edmond won letters in football, basketball and baseball. Kane was a two-year football man. Wallace was a two-year tennis man and Greek T tennis and wrestling star.

MAN WHO DESIGNED ELEPHANT BUTTE DAM MAY VISIT THE CITY

Louis C. Hill, who designed the Elephant Butte dam and Rio Grande irrigation project and who is admitted by his professional fellows to be the foremost reclamation and irrigation engineer in the world today, has been invited to visit Wichita Falls and study the proposed Wichita Valley irrigation project. Vernon Sullivan, consulting engineer of the local project, who was in this city from El Paso on a brief business visit, stated this morning there is a good reason to believe that Hill, who is now in California, will accept the invitation.

Sullivan is leaving Wichita Falls tonight for Dallas to confer with the heads of several construction companies who expect to present bids for the Wichita Valley project. 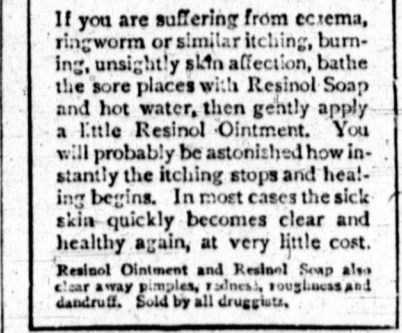

MARLOW MAKES A FORCIBLE PLEA FOR FAIR ASSOCIATION

BUSINESS COUNCIL RECOMMENDS ACTION TO HOLD 150 ACRES.

POSTOFFICE INSPECTOR DISCUSSES IMPROVEMENTS

George E. Kessler is Present And Discusses Plans For City Development.

"I'll give \$10,000 for the privilege of putting on a round-up show in Wichita Falls next spring."

With this and other two-faced arguments, J. B. Marlow drove home to members of the business council of the chamber of commerce today his plea for a fair association for this city, and persuaded them to recommend to the chamber's directors that the association be organized and 150 acres east of the ball park be effectively tied up against private sale.

Marlow dissipated early any belief that his own interest in the matter is a selfish one.

"I'm laying my cards on the table," he declared, "I own 127.500 of that land, which is a mighty small part of it. I'll sell it for just what it cost me, and I'll take the purchase price complete in stock in an association. I'm ready to go. Wichita Falls gave me everything I've got, and I want to help Wichita Falls. You've got my proposition; now get the other fellows, Kemp, Kell, Bullington, Scurry, Langford, Jr. If you don't, you'll be wondering four or five years from now why you didn't say that land."

Carries His Point.

Marlow carried his point, even though there were some present who, favoring the project, still doubted whether the financing could be handled at this time. J. C. Hunt, chairman of the committee that investigated the matter, reported that the land could be obtained for \$150,000, "a fair price," that a grandstand to hold 20,000 people could be built for \$27,000, and that the necessary fencing could be paid for from the advertising.

Postmaster Ed Howard, referring humorously to the recent republican landslide and its possible effect on federal officials, introduced Postoffice Inspector Wallace, who spoke briefly of improvements planned by the local postal department.

"Due largely to your own co-operation and to the untiring efforts of your postmaster," Wallace said, "we have been able to remove some of the restrictions which have hampered the work of the postoffice in the past, and we are now able to supply between 5,000 and 7,000 additional citizens of Wichita Falls with mail delivery."

Kessler Attends Meeting.

George E. Kessler, who is under contract to provide a city plan for Wichita Falls, was a guest of the council, and stated that in the next few days he will have definite suggestions to present to city officials.

"A city plan means only a rallying point around which you can meet for future development of Wichita Falls," he said. "We have plans of the city which show, we believe, how this city should occupy its lands in the future, so that every business man and home owner may know the course his own development can best take."

All of the data prepared by Kessler will be available for study by the city council, chamber of commerce and by interested individuals, and the next two weeks will be spent in outlining the details of the general plan as it will be finally drafted.

The council's luncheon and meeting was held in the new Kemp hotel, and Manager Allen welcomed the members in a brief speech in which he invited future criticism of any kind, and assured them he wished the hotel considered as the property of all Wichita Falls citizens.

It was announced at the close of the meeting by Hubert Harrison, secretary, that the chamber of commerce has closed a year's lease for 1921 on the former quarters of Howell & Howell, adjoining the City National Bank of Commerce building.

WILKIE TALBERT WILL BE UNABLE TO ENTER CENTRE FOR SHRINE DIAMOND RING

J. Wilkie Talbert has got a "bum hoof"—that's ancient Assyrian for a sore foot. And having a sore foot, Talbert has mournfully resigned himself to the fact that he will be unable to take the Shrine on November 17 when Maskat Temple holds its second ceremonial.

More than that, Wilkie now ceases to be a candidate for the diamond ring to be given to the most popular novice taken into the temple. He intends, however, to shy his hat into the ring later, as witness the following letter he sent today to the editor of The Times:

"I notice in this afternoon's paper that some gentleman who is endeavoring to make a race for the Shrine ring, has used my name very much in vain by stating that I am also a candidate for this great and unusual honor. It happens that I am not because of an accident to my foot recently that will cause me to defer this race until the next ceremonial at which time I will call on my good friends to help me out over the greatest race for a ring ever known in these parts. In the meanwhile, however, I take this occasion to announce the platform on which I will make the race and to warn any of the present candidates from infringing on any of the copyrights that I have procured on this platform. This ring-winning platform is: 'Give me help but give me the ring,' and I expect to get both."

"I will greatly appreciate it if you will publish this notice to the world, that I am on my way, but slightly delayed."

FLEET OF AIRPLANES CONTINUE SEARCH FOR MISSING NAVY PLANE

GREAT LAKES, ILLS, Nov. 12.—A fleet of airplanes was to continue the search today for the missing navy seaplane, S-2-L, which left here Wednesday morning with a crew of three aboard, and was last seen Wednesday afternoon riding the waves 12 miles off Sheboygan, Wis.

The airplanes were to leave here and comb Lake Michigan shore as far as Manitowish, Wis. They are keeping hope that any of the crew have survived was abandoned by experienced seamen today. They say that it would have been impossible for the plane to have stayed above water in the swirling snowstorm and 75-mile wind which roughened the waters last night.

A revenue cutter and a submarine chaser were still at work today along the short searching for a trace of the missing plane. They are keeping in wireless touch with shore stations.

The S-2-L was commanded by Ensign E. M. Clarke of Peoria, Ills. Clarke is a son of a New York manufacturer here today appointed C. S. Jobes, a local bond broker, receiver for the Kansas City Journal, which has been published as a morning newspaper since 1854. The receivership was made permanent and Mr. Jobes was directed by the court to continue operation of the newspaper.

The receivership was granted on application of E. B. LaFogus, a citizen of France, and the Citizens National Bank of Port Scott, Kan. The application stated that LaFogus and the bank each hold unpaid notes of \$5,000 owed by the paper's management.

The application placed the newspaper's indebtedness at \$150,000 and stated that the company owns property and equipment in excess of that amount but is not in position to meet current expenses that require payment in cash.

Frank S. Sebree, attorney for the company, agreed to the receivership.

OKLAHOMA DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN COSTS \$36,342.82

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Nov. 12.—Total democratic state campaign expenses amounted to \$36,342.82, according to a statement made public today by Ernest Davis, treasurer of the committee. The statement will be filed by the election board within a few days. Contributors numbered 2,184, the statement said.

AMERICA WILL APPROVE ANY MUTUAL AGREEMENT

ROME, Nov. 12.—Count Forza, the Italian foreign minister, has received from the Italian charge d'affaires at Washington, a telegram reporting that the American government has formally declared it will be happy to approve any solution of the Adriatic question reached by direct agreement between Italy and Jugoslavina. It is announced by the semi-official Stefani agency.

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WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Officials of the savings division of the treasury department conferred here today with a number of educators regarding plans for making the principle of the saving and investment of money a permanent and compulsory part of the American public school curriculum and for the use of government savings securities as the practical medium for applying these principles.

The conference will continue tomorrow, and the committee of educators, appointed at the national education association convention at Salt Lake City last July, will confer with Secretary Houston during its stay in Washington.

PROMINENT MASONS LEAVE TO ATTEND DALLAS MEETING

Mayor W. D. Cline, E. M. Belcher, N. M. Clifford, C. O. Fritz, Martin Rowe and a number of other prominent Masons of this city left Wichita Falls last night to attend the conferring of 1st and 2nd degrees of Masonry by the Dallas Consistory.

The Wichita Falls men also plan to attend the Mosiah Temple ceremonial in Port Worth Saturday afternoon, and similar Shrine work to be held by Helia Temple, of Dallas, Saturday night.

BRITISH INTERESTS ACTIVE IN MEXICO, ECUADOR AND PERU

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—British oil interests are showing renewed activity in Mexico, Ecuador and Peru, while the British government itself has started a survey of the Hungarian oil field, according to advices received today by the American government.

The survey of the Hungarian fields, the advices said, is being made by the British commercial commission at Budapest.

Alfred MacKinnon, a British subject, is said to have been granted an oil concession in Mexico covering two hundred miles along the Pacific coast of Lower California.

The British Controlled Mine Fields, Limited, which has interests in California, Texas, Ecuador, Peru and Venezuela, the advices said, has begun work on its lease in Ecuador and is seeking large concessions in Peru.

KANSAS CITY JOURNAL IS IN HANDS OF A RECEIVER

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PLAN SUIT TO TEST RECENT RULING AS TO MALT AND HOPS

COLUMBUS, OHIO, Nov. 12.—Suits to test the recent ruling of the prohibition enforcement bureau prohibiting the sale of malt extract and hops to any one except distillers and brewers, was filed in the United States court here today by a local distributing company.

ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS ARE STUDYING THE LAW

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Prohibition enforcement officials today were studying the Volstead law to determine whether they can regulate the sale of malt and hops to discourage their use in home brewing.

When a decision is reached a treasury statement will be prepared and laid before Secretary Houston for formal approval.

Enforcement officials are not yet sure that they have authority to interfere with the two commodities. If this authority is contained in the law it is included in section 18, officials believe. This section prohibits the sale of malt and hops to anyone other than the "unlawful manufacture of intoxicating beverages."

PLAN FOUR PERMANENT CEMETERIES IN FRANCE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Decision of the war department to authorize the maintenance of only four permanent cemeteries in France was announced today. These will be at Suresnes, on the outskirts of Paris; at Romagne, in the Argonne region; at Belleau Wood, where American soldiers and marines met the Germans in the first important engagement; and at Bony, in the department of the Aisne, which shall be known as "Flanders Field." A permanent cemetery also will be established near London for those soldiers who died in England while en route to France.

Americans returning overseas vary as to details, but they are all agreed that the European country which is being most rapidly brought back to before-the-war conditions is Belgium, parts of which suffered worst. And it is more remarkable that they all agree that the reason for this act is, so waiting for indemnities nor out-of-pocket help, but just depending upon themselves to get the needed job done. There is no substitute for work, and it applies equally to physical restoration as to mental rehabilitation.

Texas is democratic, but that doesn't keep Texans from doing everything in their power to render pleasant the stay in their midst of the republican president-elect. Governor Hobby's tender of a state launch to the distinguished visitor was a gracious action that will be generally approved in Texas. We fight those "devilish republicans" as hard as we know how down here in Texas, when they are either as visitors or citizens nevertheless and think highly of them during at least three years and nine months of every quadrennium.

For the first time since the Brownsville district sent a republican representative, the next legislature will not have a solidly democratic personnel. There will be at least one republican and two "Americans" in the house and possibly one republican in the senate.

Cash and Credit in Plenty. The November statement of money in circulation allows each of us \$59.48, against \$54.62 a year ago. The total this year is \$6,375,140,821, against \$5,819,874,145 last year. These are the figures of money in people's pockets and tills, including the money in the treasury and banks, not circulating. The total is \$8,254,819,120, including \$2,663,517,682 in gold. It would be a pity to publish these figures and deny credit to those deserving it. As a matter of fact, credit is not denied to those deserving it, but only to those not establishing their right to it by meeting the conditions of credit which are regarded as right and proper by competent judges. The crop-moving period begins with August. From that date up to Oct. 29 the Federal Reserve increased its discounts from \$1,250,612,000 to \$1,597,292,000, and the circulation of Federal Reserve notes has increased from \$2,129,158,000 to \$2,351,292,000.

The trouble with the agriculturist who complains that they cannot sell their crops is less that prices are low than that there are few buyers at the decline. Their best customers are foreign buyers who have neither cash nor credit to spare, and who are not able to supply goods in payment for lack of raw materials from which to produce them. Those who have goods have credit, if only they will sell instead of holding. The crops will move themselves if only buyers and sellers can be brought together. There is no lack of cash, credit or crops. There is only derangement of financial machinery, and it is most serious in the case of our least experienced exporters—the farmers. They have been accustomed to let others sell their property and a profit belonging to them if they will earn it. When they become as good exporters as our manufacturers, they will have less to complain of.

A Land of Wealth. (From the Fort Worth Record.) There are over 8,000,000 automobiles in this country, one for every 14 inhabitants, and over 2,000,000 are owned by farmers. Almost another million are trucks. The doctors of the country drive more than 100,000. There is an automobile for every 14 persons in the United States, but in Kansas, Iowa and some of the other grain belt states there is an automobile for every six persons. That means that there are enough automobiles in these states to move their entire population out of the borders over night. While we have an automobile for every 14 of us, the rest of the world has an automobile for every 25,000 inhabitants.—From bulletin issued by the American Exchange National Bank of New York. 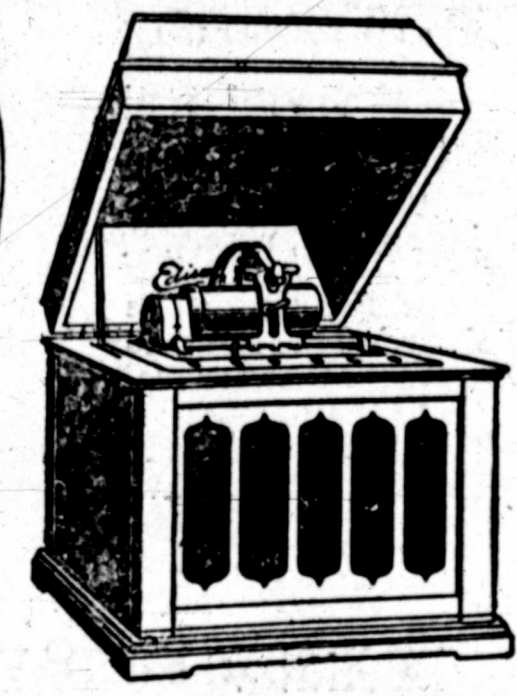

WAGE AWARDS FOR SHORT LINES TO BE MADE PUBLIC SOON

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Wage awards which will affect more than a hundred thousand men employed on close to 600 short line railroads throughout the country will be announced within the next few weeks, according to United States Railroad Labor Board officials here today.

The wages sought are similar to those asked by the big four brotherhood and employes on big roads. These employes, numbering two million were recently awarded approximately 69 per cent of their demands.

Though there are 600 shortline railroads in the country, employes on only 27 have asked the board to apply the recent award to them. Originally 115 made application to the board but officials of 18 of these voluntarily applied the award and the applications were withdrawn. In addition to these 18, 25 other roads have applied the recent award, making a total of 52 roads voluntarily applying the award.

The decision in the case now being studied by the board will be of tremendous importance on other shortline roads. What action is taken in this case is believed almost certain to be applied to all of them. It is considered most probable that the board will cover all shortline roads in its decision.

The short line road employes are lacking in their demands by officials of the Brotherhoods and the American Federation of Labor. Practically all of them are members of the Brotherhood of the department of Railroad Employees of the American Federation of Labor. Their request was not included in the earlier demands, because short line roads were operated under private control. It was only employes on roads that were formerly under federal control that asked for a raise.

The latter originally made their demands when the government operated the roads and by the time they obtained the action sought, the roads were back in private hands.

The same union officials who pushed the demands of the 2,000,000 railroad employes earlier in the year handled the presentation of the short line road employes case. President Timothy O'Shea, of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, President L. E. Shepard of the Brotherhood of Railroad Conductors, and H. M. Jewett, president of the railroad shopmen's union, were chief counsel for the short line road employes.

Demands sought by the short line workers, if granted, would mean an approximate annual pay increase of 100,000 pay envelopes of \$50,000,000, it is estimated.

Huckleberry Finn Second Yields to Money Temptation

NORTON, KAN., Nov. 12.—Carl Johnson, 17, never had more than \$12.50 at one time. He said when Elmer Heiserman offered him \$200 to kill the other five members of the Heiserman family it looked pretty big.

"Why \$200 would buy a couple of ponies and a dandy new gun," Carl exclaimed, and the boy's eyes shone bright as he contemplated the small fortune.

Johnson shoved a grimy coffee pot back of a small stove in the county jail, tilted back his chair, his wool stockings feet on the edge of the stove and unemotionally told of his attempt to exterminate five members of the Heiserman family.

He frankly admitted wounding a daughter and grandmother of the Heiserman household and repeatedly insisted Elmer Heiserman had hired him to do the work of an assassin.

"Don't see why they want to keep me here when Elmer's out on bond," Johnson complained. "He's the one that suggested the shooting. He promised me \$200 but I ain't seen none of it."

Wanted to Kill Somebody. Johnson said Elmer asked him if he wanted to make some money. He said Elmer told him he wanted him to kill somebody.

"Then he told me he was in trouble with a girl in Norton," Johnson continued. "He said he didn't have any place to take her. He wanted to take her to his home, he said, but didn't want his folks around."

Johnson then told in detail of Elmer's alleged promise of \$200 to kill the family and arrangements for furnishing a gun.

"I went to the Heiserman home that same evening," Johnson explained. "Looking through the window, I saw the whole family sitting around a table. I just closed my eyes and pulled the trigger. Then I ran. That's all there is to it. I just tried to kill them, that's all. But I wouldn't have done it if Elmer hadn't said he would give me \$200. That's a heap of money."

The youthful prisoner is a second Huckleberry Finn. Dressed in overalls and a blue denim shirt, Johnson's whole being savors of the outdoors.

The shirt open at the collar exposed a neck unmarred by a linen collar. A tattered cap pulled at a rakish angle over his left eye surmounted a head of unkempt hair to which comb and brush were strangers. A nail fastened his eyes to the wall.

Johnson in stocking feet paced around his cell nervously, leaving tracks in the dust accumulated during a long vacancy. His only company is a shaggy shepherd dog which lies shivering outside the jail whining lonesomely whenever its youthful master speaks.

WASN'T SURPRISED WHEN YOUTH WAS ARRESTED

ALMENA, KANS., Nov. 12.—Almena wasn't surprised when Elmer Heiserman was arrested in connection with the attempt to kill the rest of the Heiserman family.

For this little Kansas town knew Elmer as "Toughy"—the black sheep of the well-to-do Heiserman family, "Toughy" whom Carl Johnson

claims offered him \$200 to exterminate the Heiserman family so he could inherit the property, has been in trouble before. He runs with a corner drug store crowd that has made much work for Sheriff Goudy in minor disturbances. This accounts for lack of surprise at "Toughy's" arrest. But Almena is surprised at release of "Toughy" on \$1,000 bond furnished by his father. Already a petition has been circulated for signatures asking that Elmer's bond be increased to \$5,000 for the "good of the community."

Trying to Arrange Bond. Meanwhile citizens are trying to arrange Johnson's release on \$1,000 bond.

"Toughy" was at the drug store as usual. Most noticeable was a silk shirt, with collar to match, box back coat and a cap pulled carelessly over his eyes—a contrast to his "Huck Finn" accomplice.

Leaning indolently against the show case Elmer told his story. "It's all wrong," he protested. "I never airily told of his attempt to exterminate five members of the family. I think Johnson is sore at me and wants to get me into trouble. I don't know who's against me, for I never had any trouble with him."

"My dad don't believe I tried to do it. I'm still living with him, ain't I?" Owing a large tract of rich land, the Heisermans are well fixed. The Johnson family are poor tenants on a farm near here. No attempt has been made by the elder Johnson to obtain release of his son. The boy quit school two years ago to help earn a living for the family.

Complete Test of Practicability of New Refrigerator

The refrigeration, invented by W. K. Knutson, of this city, which is on exhibition in the show window of the Wichita Hardware company and which was stocked with ice on Friday of last week, was re-tested Thursday of this week, after an interval of six days.

Being on exhibition it is opened much oftener than it would be in regular household use, and this particular refrigerator, being the first to be built on the new plan, has no insulation whatever in its entire front, a defect which will not exist in those to be built for sale. Also, the inventor states that in this experimental refrigerator he purposely refrained from using any insulation other than his patent vacuum unit, so that there could be no question as to the effectiveness of the vacuum as an insulator.

In the commercial product he will place insulation between the outside walls of the refrigerator and the vacuum unit. The absolute freedom from moisture in all parts except the ice box and air chambers makes the use of sawdust possible though it cannot be used in ordinary refrigerators because the moisture swells it and causes it to distend the walls.

The food placed in the food container last Friday, is in perfect condition, and the matches placed beside it to test the question as to the effectiveness of the vacuum as an insulator, were ignited as readily as matches fresh from the match factory. The food consists of butter, celery, cabbage and sausage.

GERMANY TURNS EXPLOSIVE FACTORIES TO NEW USES

By CARL D. GROOT. (United Press Staff Correspondent). BERLIN. (By Mail)—Factories which formerly made the stuff to lead death on the west front are now turning out wondrous artificial silk to adorn womanhood and mankind.

The artificial silk industry, already under way before the war, has been greatly augmented and is now in position to establish a considerable competition not only with the real silk industry but with the artificial silk factories of other lands.

German experts are striving now to overcome the drawback attendant upon the artificial brand, or "Kunstseide," as they call it. Dampness has a deteriorating effect but research work shows that this disadvantage will soon be disposed of.

American buyers are manifesting a strong interest in the new business and declare that there is a great demand for this product.

Herr Geheimrat Hagemann, chief of the artificial silk branch of the government's economic ministry, told the United Press:

"This silk was made in Germany even before the war in considerable quantities. The demand for it has increased since the war, since the spirit of all peoples since the war and revolutionary period is for a better life and this is expressed in one way through the universally prevalent de-

sire of the woman's world for gay colors.

In addition to the old silk factories of pre-war times, there are now a number of former explosive factories engaged in producing the artificial product. This is explained by the fact that both explosives and artificial silk are derived from cellulose. Among others, the big explosive factories in Koenigsbottel are being converted into silk factories, while the explosive factory at Zehlendorf, near here, along with numerous other factories are engaged in the same occupation.

"This industry is especially important for Germany because we do not need to import the raw materials for it. And, despite the fact that in recent weeks the industry has been limited by coal shortage, the nation is producing a considerable quantity of raw silk as well as finished products like neckties, ribbons, cords and so on. We feel that we are especially in a position to meet competition since we know about dyeing and the goods have proved durable and of manifold variety."

Geheimrat indicated his belief that the pre-war demand for German "made-articles" would spring up again, especially since Germany was in a position to deliver them on the world market at low prices.

Recently American experts have been looking over the field, and it is

believed that they are either preparing to buy large quantities of the German product or else to attempt to acquire German silk factories.

CRITICIZES INVESTIGATION OF FLEET CORPORATION CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Charles Pies, former director general of the emergency fleet corporation, criticized the house committee investigating the fleet corporation in a statement here today, declaring that the body had overlooked the "wholesome atmosphere of the hold and deck of the structure" and was "just a bilge water committee."

"Twice within eight months," Mr. Pies said, "the so-called Walsh committee has caused the publication of statements reflecting on the competency, honesty and integrity of the members of the United States shipping board and the emergency fleet corporation."

"The first statement was graded as indicating a billion dollar graft among the shipbuilders and emergency

fleet corporation officials of the Pacific coast.

"The indictments when brought totaled less than \$20,000, and when the first case was brought to trial, the government's case was so flimsy that the judge decided it without letting it go to the jury."
