GENEVA, Nov. 20.—The first formal step loking toward the revision of the covenant of the League of Nations COMPLETE TAKING was taken by the assembly of the league at today's session. The Dutch minister of foreign affairs, H. A. Van Karnebeek, introduced a resolution for reconsideration of article XVIII, having to do with the registration of The resolution provides that the re-consideration be conducted by the as-

sembly itself or by a committee, to make the meaning of the article clear. The Dutch minister called attention The Dutch minister called attention to this point at yesterday's session. He said there were several interpretations of the article, which in brief provides that treaties between nations shall not be binding until they are registered with the league, and proposed that it be studied carefully with a view to its clarification, (The text of article XVIII reads: Every treaty or international engage-Every treaty or international engage ment entered into hereafter by an member of the league shall be forth with registered with the secretariat and shall as soon as possible be pub-lished by it. No such treaty or international engagement shall be binding

We are very strongly in accord with hat feature of the American Federaion of Labor's program of reconstruction which urges drastic restrictions upon immigration from all parts of the vorld and we wonder that the American people, who during the war were convinced that never again would the chilly, are not more concerned with the present situation than they show themselves to be. The United States has seen some great tides of immigration from overseas, a new country whose growth was contingent to a considerable extent upon the influx of desirables from other countries, the new arrivals were welcomed. The character of those immigrants for the most part was such that they sought a place of liberty of conscience and of advancement, they assimilated readily with the pioneer stock that already was here; and some of the best blood we have in this country today was from those hardy immigrants who braved the terrors of a distant and unknown world for the higher satisfactions as much as for the more material rewards. But the hordes of "sureenough foreigners" that reached their climax up to that time in 1913, with the arrival of a million immigrants, are being outdone in 1920 with a prospective total of at least a million and bars on immigration be let down are being outdone in 1920 with a prospective total of at least a million and quarter. And the worst feature about the present movement, which is almost a migration, is that it is made up largely of elements slow or undesiring of assimilation with too large a proportion of radicals who come here for none-but a sinister purpose—missionaries, in effect if not in fact, of that new form of anarchistic government that has set out to bring the civilized world to acceptance—and support of its political ideas and ideals, which are utterly foreign and antago.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—All classes of stocks fell to new low records for one to three years this week, the record, in several noteworthy instances extending to five years. Liquidation was extensive at all times and heavy short selling added to the depreciation of values. The further reaction, which had its inception the latter part of October, was attended by almost continuous readjustment in every branch of trade and commerce, these indicating steady curtailment of production, increased inemployment and impaired dividends. Suspension by the American International Corporation of quarterly disbursements on both the common and preferred shares, came as a surprise to the financial community, although the tecent weakness of the junior issue seemed to foreshadow such action.

Rails were the only stocks to manifest a degree of steadiness, but losses in that division, including the seasoned transcontinentals, grangers and transitions, effaced much of the rice of the strength of Southern Pacific.

Grain and Previsions.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—War prices on grain met their Waterloo this week. Uneasiness over the general business outlook proved more than an offset for buillsh factors, notwithstanding the many big cuts which the value of cereals had recently undergone. Compared with a week ago, wheat this morning was down 3½ to 6c, corn was off 7½ to 8½c and oats 3½ to 4½c. In provisions the net changes varied from 80c decline to a rise of 5½.

At the beginning of the week material upturns in wheat prices took place owing largely to signs of European buying and to the assumption that bolshevik successes had rendered improbable for a long time any important grain shipments from Russia. There was also much talk of an effort to arrange credits in this country to enlarge exports to Germany. Confidence hased on such grounds, however, did not last and aggressive selling set in. Weakness in corn and oats started with a sharp break in cash corn prices at Kansas City. Later liquidation became general.

Except for November delivery, provisions tended downward in sympathy with grain and hogs.




