TAKE STEP TO REVISE COVENANT

CHARLIE POSTMASTER KILLED BY ROBBER LATE FRIDAY NIGHT

SHOT THROUGH RIGHT LUNG AS HE WAS LEAVING POST OFFICE.

POSSE SCOURING COUNTRY IN SEARCH OF BANDITS

Supposition That Three Men Took Part In The Attempt To Rob Office—All Roads Watched.

Reports from Charlie this afternoon were to the effect that Rangers had arrested two men, known in the neighborhood, as suspects, and that they had been taken to Hamilton for identification. Charlie is in Clay county, and the case will be handled by Clay county officers and Texas Rangers, probably assistance from the Federal officers.

B. F. Allison, postmaster at Charlie, Texas, was shot and fatally wounded by robbers who attempted to rob the post office at 7:30 Friday night. Allison died at his home at 2 o'clock this morning, without having regained consciousness. Allison was shot as he was leaving the office with his wife at the close of business. The postoffice is in a drug store owned by Mr. Allison, who is also postmaster. After finishing the day's work Mr. and Mrs. Allison had counted up the day's receipts and made up their reports. On finishing they stepped out of the front door, where they were accosted by a man wearing a fedora and a trench coat who commanded them to throw up their hands. Allison, evidently thinking it a practical joke on the part of some acquaintance, laughed and poked the man with his cane.

The robber fired, and Mr. Allison fell, shot through the right lung. Immediately the alarm was given and a hunt for the murderer resulted in tracing the footprints through several fields to the public road, where it was lost. It is thought the crime was the work of three men. While counting the money in a rear room, Mrs. Allison states that the faces of two men were seen at a rear window while the third man, who was left in front to keep watch. Mrs. Allison was able to give a fairly accurate description of the man who fired the shot, giving his description as being about five feet nine inches tall, weighing about 135 pounds, wearing a striped shirt, dark trousers and a dirty white cap.

Officers of the state and county immediately took up the hunt for the robbers, and did also a large number of citizens. The work across Red river is being guarded and all roads in the vicinity are being patrolled.

ATTITUDE OF GERMANY THE ONE BIG PROBLEM CONFRONTING LEAGUE

MUST PLAN TO MEET THREAT TO DISREGARD COLONY CLAUSE OF TREATY.

MAY DEPEND SOLELY ON USE OF ECONOMIC PRESSURE

British and French Headquarters Manifest Astonishment At The German Note.

GENEVA, Nov. 20.—The question of how the League of Nations will meet Germany's threat to disregard that clause of the treaty of Versailles involving allocation of her colonies under various mandates, occupied the attention of the League assembly today. Although other matters were to come before the assembly it was privately admitted by many delegates that Germany's attitude furnished the one big problem now confronting the league and that the assembly must necessarily devote much of its time to finding a quick solution.

Official conversations turned to what steps the league, entrusted with enforcement of the treaty, could take to compel Germany to acknowledge the binding nature of the entire pact. While none of the delegates would consent to be quoted to that effect, the impression seemed to be general that under present conditions the league would have to depend solely upon economic pressure.

DISPOSITION OF ESTATE DEPENDS UPON WHICH OF TWO PEOPLE DIED FIRST

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 20.—Disposition of an estate valued at \$100,000 depends upon whether George B. Sinclair or his wife, Mrs. Margaret Sinclair, died first, it became known today. The couple, both of whom were aged, were found asphyxiated in their apartment here about a year ago. A coroner's jury found the deaths were accidental.

NEW ORLEANS FIRE DOES BIG DAMAGE ALONG RIVER FRONT

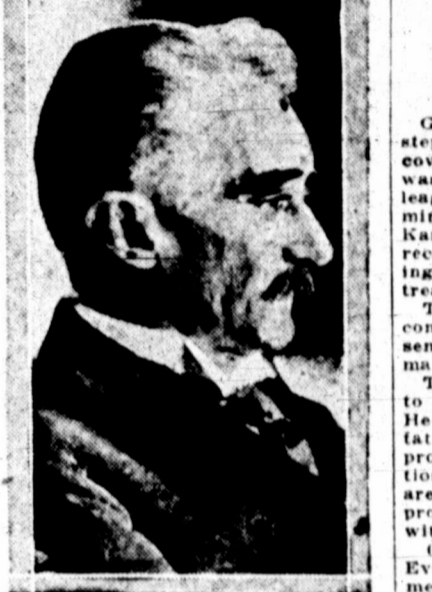

TEACHER IS FIRED FOR A FAILURE TO OBSERVE ARMISTICE

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Miss France Lloyd, teacher in a local school, was suspended today by Superintendent Mortenson on charges preferred against her by Miss Mary Taylor, principal of the school, that Miss Lloyd ignored the instructions of the school board and caused the pupils of her room to be the only school children in Chicago who were deprived of the opportunity to pay tribute to the nation's dead when at 11 a. m. on November 11, the 260,000 pupils stood at attention for one minute in memory of the second anniversary of the signing of the armistice.

NINE PERSONS DEAD RESULT OF FIRE IN A TENEMENT HOUSE

CICOTTE MAY NOT BE PUNISHED FOR PART IN BASEBALL SCANDAL

White Sox Twirler Will Turn State's Evidence When Indicted Men Are Tried.



CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Eddie Cicotte, former Chicago White Sox pitcher, whose confession resulted in numerous indictments by the special Cook county baseball grand jury in connection with the 1919 world's series scandal, probably will not be punished for his part in the game-throwing, according to officials of the state's attorney's office.

White no official announcement was made by the state's attorney office, an official let it be known that but for Cicotte's testimony the jury never would have had sufficient evidence to indict more than one or two persons, and that there would be little chance for conviction without the pitcher as a state witness.

Before Cicotte confessed, we had heard of hearsay evidence, said this official tonight, but none of it would have held in court. We might have returned a few indictments on it, but that would have been the end of the case. We wanted convictions and not indictments, conferring today with state's attorney, Cicotte was asked to get the evidence necessary to have to a confession.

This official refused to say whether an agreement for immunity had been reached with Cicotte before the pitcher confessed.

The ball players and gamblers indicted by the grand jury probably will be brought to trial in January, it was said. Judge Robert E. Crowe, newly elected state's attorney, takes office in December, and it is believed that immediate prosecution will be instituted.

LIGHTING SYSTEM WORK UNDER CITY INSPECTION

Complete copies of the plans and specifications of the ornamental street lighting system are being prepared by the chamber of commerce for the use of the city engineering department, and it is expected the city will appoint an electrical engineer to supervise the cable work in connection with the system.

George Thorburn, city clerk, called the attention of Acting Mayor W. S. Curlee this morning to the fact that the street lighting system is being installed through the action of the chamber of commerce, and that, aside from a general supervision maintained by a civil engineer, the city thus far has not made inspections and tests of the electrical end of the work. In view of the fact that the city will have to maintain the system at an annual cost of approximately \$15,000, exclusive of repairs, Acting Mayor Curlee at once ordered City Engineer Montgomery to obtain from the chamber all specifications regarding the system, and to maintain a daily inspection of every phase of the installation as a guarantee to the taxpayers and property owners that the work will be done under conditions that will warrant the city accepting all future responsibility.
