The commission talked first with the Polish and then the Lithu-

anian troops, pleading that the league's request for an armistice be heeded. Then they threatened punishment by the league. Late reports from Vilna were conflicting. Armistice plans were said to be progressing. It was also stated that the fighting continued with unabated fury.





The use of gasoline trucks in sub-stitution for steam locomotives in the handling of passenger trains over short hauls is being considered seriously by the Wichita Falls & Southern railway, it was learned today. Experiments were ducted early in the week on a short line between Archer City and Olney, and the results made a most favorable impression on railroad officials, it was

aid. Frank Kell, general manager of the road, stated this morning that he had not been present during the experi-ments but that it was his understand-Ing that the idea had presented several points of advantage. While it would not be practical to apply the "ruck-locomotive idea to long hauls, it is generally believed that a gasoline truck can be so designed that it would haul passenger traffic between points not passenger traffic between points not far distant from one another: that it provide quicker service, perhaps, and that considerable expense might be saved in the difference between the cost of the two types of engines.
At present the light type of locomotive in use on such hauls costs approximately \$30,000. It is believed, however, that a gasoline truck could be manufactured at the plant of the Wichita Falls Motor company that cost at the most not more than



The history of the celebrations of 'days of Thanksgiving' in general, is a long one, for many of these were mentioned in the Bible, and they were not uncommon in England prior to the reformation and y were not uncommon in Eng-d prior to the reformation and ong the Protestants ever afterwards.

The first public thanksgiving held in America was conducted by an English minister named Wolfall, in 1578, on the shores of Newfoundland, and the earliest record of any observance of a similar nature within the territory now occupied by the United States, is that of a ceremony held at Sazadahoc on the control of held at Sagadahoc, on the coast of Maine, in August, 1607.

These, however, were mere thanksgiving services. The real origin of Thanksgiving as a day set

apart for prayer and gratitude for apart for prayer and gratitude for benefits received, must be attributed to Governor Bradford, the first governor of Massachusetts. 



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BOARD OF CONTROL SAVES STATE A MILLION DOLLARS

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—The Texas board of control recently saved approximately \$1,000,000 by refraining from making & year's contract for groceries and dry goods for the state eleemosynary institutions during the unsettled condition of the markets at that time, according to A. R. Johnson, member of the board.

Despite the fact that buying these supplies under a yearly contract would have reduced greatly the work of the board, Mr. Johnson said that because of the likelihood of prices declining it was decided to make only ninety-day contracts. The wisdom of his course, he said, has been vindicated by the fact that many articles already have declined fifty per cent in price since the beginning of this fiscal year, September 1.

The fall has been so rapid since the The fall has been so rapid since the last ninety-day contracts, which expire at the end of this month, were made that the board has decided to make no contracts for the next ninety days, according to Mr. Johnson, who added that the board will purchase supplies as they are needed in the open market in as small quantities as possible in order to get the full benefit of further declines.

As an illustration of the tumble prices have taken, Mr. Johnson said that under the last contract the state paid 21.7 cents a pound for sugar which now may be bought for 11 cents; flour which then brought \$14.50 is now \$11.30; meal at that time was

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approximately fitty per cent.

The board acts as purchasing agent for sixteen state eleemosynary institutions, and approximately \$2,000,000 was provided this year for the purchase of dry goods and groceries. This amount, said Mr. Johnson, would have been woefully insufficient had contracts been made at prices prevailing at the beginning of this fiscal year.

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
