It isn't that the candy manufacturers don't join the rest of the world in loving a lover, but, according to Albert Levy, general manager of D. Auerbach & Sons, large candy manufacturers, fancy box candy now was made six months ago when sugar prices were soaring.

The public generally does not realize that all of the best box chocolate candy has to go before it is good," said Levy. "All good box candy is about six months old. Fresh candy is harmful to the stomach and not so tasty as that which has been aged in the box."

Candy for the kiddies—jelly beans, creams, hard tack, lollipops and the like—will retail one-third cheaper, according to Levy. The sweets munched by children and the grown-ups whose teeth will benefit, will sell for 39 to 45 cents a pound lower than last year. The same grade last year brought around 60 cents.

Levy declared the price of candy has been gradually receding with sugar but the price is still from two to three times greater than before America joined the war. (Water restrictions have not taken place because the sugar price is not back to pre-war levels and labor is still more costly, he said.)

### MUCH EXCITEMENT REPORTED AT MEXIA OVER NEW OIL WELL

MEXIA, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Oil, the modern Aladdin, had rubbed Mexia today.

Last Saturday Mexia was just an empty town of four thousand persons who evidenced little more than mild curiosity as a "wildcat" drilling outfit laboriously drove its bit into a hillside two and a half miles to the westward.

Mexia came to life with a jerk when a catless, hatless, blue-shirted "roughneck" from the drilling outfit ran down main street and into a drug store, grabbed a telephone, called a number and yelled into the transmitter:

"Out on the hillside odorous liquid shot fifty feet into the air with a force that warped the derrick. The derrick of Mexia today had jumped 2,000. Leases were as high as \$1,000 an acre and going up \$100 a jump. Rooms are unobtainable at hotels—one hotel equipping its hallways with narrow mattresses and a blanket and renting them for \$10 a flop—and if you ask for a bed the hotel clerk tries to sell you a cot first—only fifteen miles from the well."

Main street is a riot of Jack London cosmopolitanism, with booted and mackinawed "roughnecks" elbowing with fur coated and diamond oil operators. The influx continues, afoot, by automobiles, trains and airplanes.

A farmer drove into town with a load of cotton. He left it standing in the street and started into the oil business. Mexia paused somewhat today for a "show down" with the well reported fifteen hundred feet in oil and the bit eight feet in the woodbine sand, E. A. Humphreys, owner of the well, flying from Denver in an airplane, announced that if the derrick could be repaired the well will be drilled deeper today to "see just what it will do."

If the well is "broken" Mexia sees itself as the Breckenridge of East Texas.

### LARGE QUANTITIES OF WAR MATERIAL IS NOW AVAILABLE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—That artillery troops for the American army in the world war were forced to drill with "improved" wooden guns, rope harness and other expedients because of lack of equipment is officially revealed today in the annual report of Major-General William J. Snow, chief of field artillery, to Secretary Baker.

"Large quantities of guns, howitzers, ammunition and other artillery material are on hand, left over from the war," the report said, "and the country thus, for the first time in half a century, has on hand sufficient stocks of artillery to equip a large size army. Should war unfortunately break out within the next few years, we would be spared the spectacle of artillery drilling with improvised wooden guns, rope harness and similar expedients which characterized the first year of the present war."

Demobilization difficulties made it almost impossible to carry on regular peace time training of the artillery during the year, General Snow reported, but he said an effort was made to keep two regiments trained and recruited up to strength for possible border duty.

The signal corps is now engaged in developing combination radio telegraph and telephone sets for the use of artillery firing with aerial observation, the report stated. The new outfit to be built for a telephone range of thirty miles and a radio telegraph range of 40 to 50 miles. The army accomplishments during the year were the motorization of four regiments armed with 75-millimeter guns, including the use of two and a half-ton tractors; the development of new gas and smoke shells and successful incendiary shells by the chemical warfare service, and an extensive test of pack equipment for mountain artillery under fire conditions.

### No Inaugural Ball For Governor Neff Is First Omission

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—For the first time in Texas history, the inaugural ball will be eliminated from ceremonies when Pat M. Neff takes oath of office as governor of the state, next January.

Neff, who is a prominent Baptist, requested elimination of the ball. An informal reception in the Texas capitol on the night of inauguration will be the only entertainment, it was announced.

MARTIN IS GOING BACK TO ANSWER INDICTMENTS

DALLAS, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—I'm going back and face the music, George L. Martin, former Louisville, Ky., banker and business man, declared here today following arrest for Louisville authorities who, according to local officials, want him on indictments charging embezzlement and forgery of several hundred thousand dollars.

Martin signed waivers of extradition and Louisville officers were reported en route here to take him into custody.

ANTI-POOL HALL LAW IS UPHELD BY HIGHER COURT

AUSTIN, Nov. 24.—The Texas anti-pool hall law which prohibits the operation of pool or billiard halls in the state for profit, was upheld today when the court of criminal appeals affirmed the lower court verdict under which J. A. Davis of Bell county was fined \$25 for violating the law. Contentions of the defendant that the passage of the law was irregular and that it was unconstitutional were not allowed by the court, which said in regard to the latter, "We do not think the legislature has exceeded its power."

### WOMEN PERMITTED TO SEE BOXING BOUTS IN NEW ORLEANS FOR FIRST TIME

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 24.—For the first time in the history of boxing in New Orleans, women tonight will be permitted to attend a prize fight. With an announcement by the promoters in the Harry Littleton of New Orleans meets Harry Krohn of Akron, Ohio, that women will be welcomed as spectators other promoters have declared future bouts under their supervision will have sections reserved for feminine ring devotees and their escorts.

"It will mean better order; eliminate some of the not always complimentary shouts to the participants and benefit the game," one of them stated.

Boxing matches in Louisiana have been placed under control of a state boxing commission.

DECLARE MINIMUM WAGE AWARD IS "RIDICULOUS"

DALLAS, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Minimum wage of \$12 a week for women employees of telephone companies, laundries, mercantile establishments, and factories in Texas as decided upon by the state industrial welfare commission was denounced as "outrageous" and "ridiculous" by welfare and labor leaders here today.

Labor leaders declared they would head a movement to urge the next legislature to increase the amount which was promulgated at Austin by F. R. York and Annie Webb Hixson, as a majority of the commission over the protest of T. C. Jennings, minority member and state labor commissioner.

The minimum wage law with such a scale attached can be of benefit to no one; it is absurd," Miss Catherine Porter, in charge of the women's employment bureau of the Dallas municipal welfare department said.

Welfare leaders pointed out that a recent survey conducted by the industrial welfare commission showed the

average cost of living for women in Texas industries was \$13.40 a week. Mrs. Lottis Cloud, secretary of the Dallas garment workers union, who urged a \$16 a week minimum, declared a woman could have that amount "to live decently" and denounced the scale set as "outrageous."

A special term of court had been convened yesterday to try Jacobs. It was during the selection of the jury that the mob stormed the court room.

PORT WORTH, Nov. 24.—Heavy livestock shipments from many points in the southwest are reported in the weekly statements from range inspectors to headquarters of the Texas Cattle Raisers association here. The reports are for the week ending today and show a generally favorable situation everywhere for the industry though prices are still complained about.

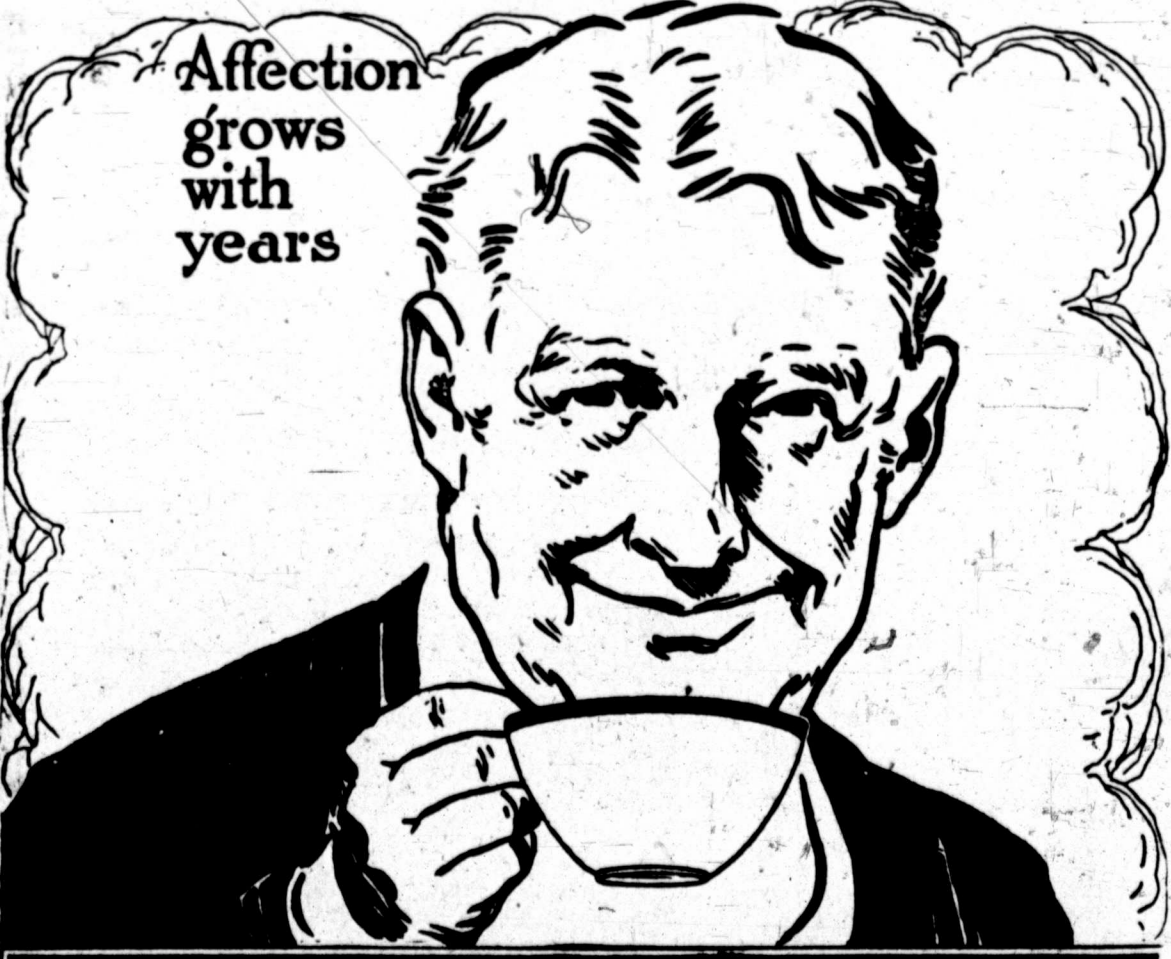

### FIRE TUESDAY NIGHT DESTROYED PLANT OF ACME PLANING MILL

An estimated loss of between seven and eight thousand dollars was sustained at the Acme Planing Mill, 103 Indiana-ave., when it was completely gutted by fire Tuesday night. The cause of the blaze has not yet been determined and it will in all probability go down on record as "origin unknown."

The flames were discovered shortly before 9 o'clock and had gained such headway that efforts of volunteer firemen were of no avail in the fight to quench them. The city fire apparatus was called but the entire building was a mass of flames when the firemen arrived, and they confined their efforts to the work of saving surrounding buildings from destruction. A small amount of lumber was burned and all the machinery was destroyed in addition to the mill building.

The frame planing mill of the Darr-Teale Construction company adjoins the Acme plant, with only a few feet of space between the two buildings, and it was only by quick work on the part of the fire department that the structure was saved. Two leads of hose were strung from the nearest fire plug, at Fourth and Indiana, a distance of 1,000 feet, and the water from this source was all that could be used to fight the blaze. The new combination pump and hose wagon purchased by the city late in the summer was given its first severe test and to the efficient work done by the big pump is attributed much of the success of the department in saving surrounding buildings.

### EPISCOPAL SERVICES AT OLYMPIC THEATER

Sunday evening services of the Episcopal church will be held at the Olympic theatre during the winter months, according to plans now being perfected by the pastor, Rev. F. T. Dawson.

The crop is the best ever known and the Thanksgiving demand hasn't even begun. The Texas supply, according to local packers, who have been filling northern and eastern orders by the carload. Last year's shipments were heavy but this year has equaled them. The price has been from a cent to two cents a pound under the 1919 quotations.

a year ago and pastures everywhere bloomed this spring. Feed crops were the best ever known and turkeys thrived. Farms teemed with turkeys and still have a plentiful supply, according to the local packers.

The north and west depend principally upon Texas for their turkeys and for the most part the fowls are handled, through the packing plants here. They are bought in droves all over the state, killed and shipped here for final dressing and crating. Many remain in cold storage for weeks before being sent north.

One local packer shipped eleven carloads of turkeys last week to the Chicago market; another sent 400,000 pounds to New York. A third sent 150,000 of dressed turkeys to Chicago. The prevailing price is 39 cents for the dressed meat and 32 cents for the birds on foot.

Reports received by the packers and wholesale produce men indicate that the supply on Texas farms is still practically untouched and that the Christmas demand can easily be filled.

RANGOON, BURMA.—Medical examinations for school children, to determine the connection between ill health and poor lessons, is being undertaken by the American Baptist missionary teachers working among the Karen people of the Southern Shan states.

The opening of schools at Toungou swamped accommodations, and Rev. E. N. Harris, head of the school, discovered that there was much more chronic illness among the newcomers than there had been in the school previously. One result of this has been the employment of a trained nurse, and Dr. A. H. Henderson, medical missionary, following an examination of most of the pupils, together with Dr. Harris, are planning a health campaign to raise the present health standards.

The extension of medical work and provision for additional schools are hoped for from the \$100,000,000 New World Movement fund which—the Northern Baptists of America are raising.

### EXPERIMENTS MADE IN USE OF TRUCKS FOR HAULING TRAINS

The use of gasoline trucks in substitution for steam locomotives in the handling of passenger trains over short hauls is being considered seriously by the Wichita Falls & Southern railway, it was learned today. Experiments were conducted early in the week on a short line between Archer City and Olney, and the results made a most favorable impression on railroad officials, it was said.

Frank Kell, general manager of the road, stated this morning that he had not been present during the experiments, but that it was his understanding that the idea had presented several points of advantage. While it would not be practical to apply the "truck-locomotive" idea to long hauls, it is generally believed that a gasoline truck can be so designed that it would haul passenger traffic between points not far distant from one another; that it would provide quicker service, perhaps, and that considerable expense might be saved in the difference between the cost of the two types of engines.

At present the light type of steam locomotive in use on such hauls costs approximately \$20,000. It is believed, however, that a gasoline truck could be manufactured at the plant of the Wichita Falls & Southern company that would cost at the most not more than \$10,000.

Monday's experiments were made with a regular stock model truck, the wheels being flange equipped for the purpose, and a heavy load being placed on the truck to give it traction in handling its railroad load.

### PRICELESS MANUSCRIPTS ARE DESTROYED IN FIRE

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—Fire early today partially destroyed the Sunday school building of historic Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, where the late Henry Ward Beecher formerly preached. The church itself was damaged by water.

A historic portrait of Beecher was destroyed and many highly prized religious relics were damaged by the fire. The building contained glass cases with manuscripts, notes and material for books and sermons collected from the personal desk of Beecher. The second cap and part of the uniform he used as a civil war chaplain were damaged.

### STUDENTS AT HARVARD EARN THEIR OWN WAY

CAMBRIDGE, MASS., Nov. 23.—The report of the Harvard university students' employment bureau shows that Harvard men earning, or helping to earn, the money to pay their way through college, are working as carpenters, clerks, reporters, ushers, ticket sellers, monitors, promoters, night watchmen, chessmen, tutors, salesmen, librarians, waiters and stenographers.

The employment bureau has made public its report for last year when Harvard men who secured employment through the bureau earned \$7,000, an increase of \$14,000 over the previous year. The total amount earned by students securing employment through the bureau and those who found positions from other sources was estimated at \$150,000.

Applications for positions this year have shown a marked increase. This is attributed in part to the effects of the war and its lessons in the value of education.

### FORD MOTOR CO. TO ISSUE BONUS CHECKS

Will Aggregate More Than Seven Million Dollars—Extra Dividend Declared.

DETROIT, MICH., Nov. 24.—Bonus checks aggregating more than \$7,000,000 for employees of the Ford Motor company are now being written and their distribution will start January 1, next, according to announcement this morning by Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor company.

Mr. Ford also announced a forthcoming extra three per cent for the six months ending December 31 on Ford investment certificates held by employees of the company. This, Mr. Ford said, is in addition to the guaranteed six per cent. He added that eight per cent had been paid July 21 last, making a total of fourteen per cent on the certificates for 1920.

Mr. Ford's statement was made, it was announced, to correct what he said was an erroneous report of testimony by S. H. Marquis, director of the Ford educational department, before Judge Aleschuler in Chicago yesterday to the effect that the recent reductions in the price of Ford cars had resulted in the bonus to employees being practically cut off.

The statement that 6,000 men of the Detroit force had quit work within the last 30 days was correct, it was said at the executive offices of the company here, but the men had left voluntarily and increased production of the remaining employees had made it unnecessary to replace them.

### RECOMMEND DEPARTMENT BE TAKEN FROM POLITICS

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Recommendation that the state pure food and drug department "be taken out of politics entirely and placed under civil service" was made by Commissioner R. H. Hoffman Jr. in his annual report to the governor.

A summary of the work of the department for the past fiscal year showed that with an appropriation of \$54,950, the department obtained 573 convictions in 469 charges of violation of pure food laws, collected \$22,016 in fines and \$10,155 in fees, analyzed 5,816 samples of food and drugs and destroyed 338,142 pounds of food found to be unfit for human consumption. In addition the department, in enforcing the pure gasoline law, tested 1,859 measuring devices in 257 towns and found 227 of them correct. At the request of the attorney general, 750 samples of beverages were examined to determine whether they contained an illegal percentage of alcohol.

Disposal of salvage goods, said the report, has taken much of the time of the department. Practically half a million pounds of canned goods, which otherwise would have wound its way to tables of the state, were destroyed.



### WOULD BEGIN NOW TO BREAK GROUND FOR Y. W. C. A. HOME

MISS BLANCHE GEARY, HEAD OF THE ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT, URGES ACTION.

CAPITAL OF \$125,000 SHOULD BE AVAILABLE

President of Local Gives Assurance There Will Be No Need to Collect Additional Money.

Ground may be broken within two weeks for the Y. W. C. A. home, if a "few fairly godfathers," as they were termed, will come to the rescue with \$125,000, according to a statement made at the weekly meeting of the Wichita club today by Miss Blanche Geary, head of the economics department of the association's national board.

Attention was called by Miss Geary to the unusual business conditions of the past twelve months which have made it impossible for a number of individuals to go through with the pledges they signed last year when the Y. W. C. A. put on its campaign for a building.

At the present time, she said, "there would be available \$125,000, provided the shrinkage should not be over 2 1/2 per cent. We propose to spend \$100,000 in housing accommodations for 75 girls; with the balance of the money, plus \$25,000 that we hope to raise through the efforts of the citizenship, we hope to build a pool, showers and dressing rooms and so arrange these building details that later floors may be added on."

Mr. W. W. Silk, president of the local Y. W. C. A. board, called attention to the fact that the association owns the lots on which it is planning to build, and assured the club members that there was no intention at this time to attempt to collect additional money.

"But we did feel that many of you men who donated generously last year should receive a report on what has been done, and what we are hoping to do," she added.

George E. Kessler, who was the club guest of Acting Mayor Curlee, spoke briefly of the status of the city plan as drafted by his office for Wichita Falls. He stated that the local committee handling the matter had decided on a preliminary zoning scheme "worthy of being presented to the public for opinion, and that some definite conclusions also had been reached regarding highways, parks and boulevards. Kessler especially stressed the importance of the judgment of property owners on these various matters, and stated that before any ordinance is passed the citizens of Wichita Falls should have a simple opportunity to approve or disapprove all details.

Kessler is leaving tonight for Dallas, and will not return to this city until after the holidays. It is expected the final plans will be ready soon after the first of the year, and that they will then be taken up systematically with the property owners affected.

### GUEST AT ROOMING HOUSE WHIPS LANDLORD, FINED \$10

City policemen may do very well as referees of fist fights, according to a man, owner of a local rooming house, who was severely beaten by one of his tenants last Sunday afternoon. The case was given a jury trial before six men in the city police court Wednesday morning, and resulted in some pointed accusations being made against the officers of the law, all of which were disapproved.

Arrests in the case were made Sunday by Officers Ogile and Wilson, and the two men were arraigned for trial at the Monday session of court. Testimony showed that the landlord had on many occasions used profane and abusive language in the presence of the ladies who were operating his rooming house, and that he had made himself objectionable to the roomers on several instances. One roomer resented being called a blank liar and proceeded to administer a good thrashing.

The charges against the officers were made on the grounds that two of the city policemen were in the house at the time of the affray and that they had stood idly by until the landlord had been rendered helpless by the blows of the roomer. These accusations were denied by both policemen, as well as by several witnesses in the case, and this testimony was thrown out by the court.

The charge of fighting against the landlord was dismissed and he was served with a warrant charging him with disturbing the peace and using abusive language. The other defendant was fined \$10 and retained by the state as a witness in the latter trial.

The jury before whom the case was argued Wednesday returned a verdict of guilty against the defendant and assessed a fine of \$50.

Word was received this morning by City Clerk George Thorburn from Kauffman, Smith & Emmert of St. Louis, that the \$900,000 in municipal bonds covering all contemplated city improvements except the sanitary sewers have been printed. They will be mailed from St. Louis next Monday and will reach here Thursday, by which time it is expected Mayor Cline will be back in the city ready to sign them.

DALLAS, TEXAS, Nov. 23.—Sugar was sold in Dallas today for 18.75 cents a pound wholesale, the lowest price in more than a year.

### EXPECT CHANGE IN RULE OF COMMUNITY PROPERTY TAXATION

Changes in the regulations covering the payment of income taxes under the community property law are being planned by the United States internal revenue department, according to information received today by C. W. Reid, vice-president of the City National Bank of Commerce, from Senators Morris Sheppard and Charles A. Culberson, and from Lucien Parrish, congressional representative from the 15th district. Representative Parrish's letter states plainly "that the matter will be reconstructed" and that "they will probably make some changes."

Reid recently wrote to the three Texas senators calling attention to the method of filing claims for refund or credit under the federal provisions that apply to the community property law, and added:

"As you know the ruling as it stands is grossly unfair to our citizens. It seems to me that it is absurd to require the payment of the wife's taxes in full before permitting the filing of a claim for the refund. The adjustment of the taxes on a community basis should be made all at one time in fairness to the taxpayers."

"I trust that you will use your influence to see that this ruling is changed, and I would appreciate a letter from you stating your attitude on the subject."

In answer, Congressman Parrish wrote Reid as follows:

"I heartily concur in your conclusions and wish to advise that I have already taken this matter up with a vigorous protest, and have a letter from the commissioner (it is assumed that Parrish here refers to William W. Williams, United States commissioner of internal revenue), advising that they are going to reconstruct the matter and will probably make some changes in the regulations in this particular, and he promised to notify me, whereupon I will communicate with you."

Senator Sheppard, after stating that the bureau cannot make adjustments of taxes on a community basis, as there is no provision of law under which an overpayment of the tax by one individual may be applied against the liability of another individual, added:

"I have made several representations to the bureau on this subject and they are trying to see if a more satisfactory arrangement of adjusting such cases cannot be evolved under the present ruling."

Reid's letter to Senator Culberson has been referred by the latter to Senator Simmons, ranking democratic member of the senate committee on finance.

### FIRST WOMAN ASSISTANT DISTRICT ATTORNEY IN TEXAS

DALLAS, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Mrs. Helen Marion Vignini, Dallas attorney, will be the first woman assistant district attorney to hold office in Texas. Mrs. Vignini was appointed as assistant district attorney December 15, announced today.

# RIO GRANDE IRRIGATED DISTRICT HAS EXPERIENCES THAT CONTAIN VALUABLE LESSON FOR THIS CITY

By JOHN GOULD.

Down in the irrigated district of the Rio Grande valley, around Brownsville and San Benito, they have been having some experiences that hold valuable lessons for Wichita Falls. Now that this city's fond dream of a great irrigated district is being realized, it is time to look into what has happened in the other end of the state, and to see if we can avoid some of the same mistakes.

The source of the trouble down there is land agents. It is not the first time they have made trouble for the man seeking a Texas farm. Their over-enthusiasm for commissions has resulted in two sets of difficulties: first, selling waterless land, and second, selling good land to men inexperienced in irrigation farming.

As a result of the rather numerous failures, due to these difficulties, commercial clubs in the Brownsville country have had to be reorganized. The one called by the good name of that section is not to suffer beyond repair. They are planning to advertise in all of the agricultural papers, and to send out five buyers to proceed cautiously, to be sure that they know what they are going to. Large signs are beginning to appear at railroad stations and along the valley. "Consult the chamber of commerce before you buy land," and while these commercial organizations encourage irrigation, the settlement of the irrigated lands they have come to understand more fully, perhaps, than commercial organizations are wont to do, their orders are not to be made and go back disgraced in just that much of a handicap to future development.

**Misuse of Words.**

The selling of waterless lands has been due to a misuse of words rather than to open and direct misrepresentation. The land agents and promoters for irrigation—that is, the ditches have been dug—but there is not enough water to supply them. The result is dry farming on land that sells for \$500 to \$1000 an acre, and dry farming won't pay on such valuable land.

Where an immigrant obtains bona fide irrigation tracts, his lack of experience may count against him. He may have been led to believe that all he has to do is plant, gather and harvest, and rest between times. As a matter of fact, irrigation farming means real hard work for the man who wins at it. It is no lazy man's pastime. The farms are sold in such sizes that a man with some family can make them go without hiring much help, but he and his folks have to hit the ball at all seasons.

Settlers in the irrigation valley who knew nothing of the technique of irrigation farming and who lacked the ambition and energy to put it over were unable to handle the water and lost out. Every time one of them went back to East Texas, or to the Middle West, or wherever he came from, he put all the blame on the land and the climate and none on himself, which was human nature, all right, and such reports did not serve to encourage new immigrants to take a try at it.

**One Lesson to Learn.**

One lesson for Wichita Falls to take to heart, then, is to see that there is no selfish exploitation; that there is plenty for all lands sold for irrigated lands, and that the buyers realize in advance that a small farm can't pay big money without hard work.

has been the marketing problem. The valley itself consumes a small part of its production, and the rest must be shipped to the consumer in the big cities. Co-operative associations are formed to handle this shipping, and they have been of great service in the Rio Grande country for most of the products, but for others they have been of little help. Where products cannot be shipped fresh, they usually cannot be shipped at all, and that makes quick marketing a big factor.

Wichita Falls ought to be more fortunate, in that respect, when the irrigation section becomes reality. This city ought to become the center of a manufacturing system that will make the irrigation farmer independent of the marketing conditions prevailing at the time his crop is gathered.

**Manufacturing Processes.**

There are many manufacturing processes that could be put into use here. Most important, of course, is canning, the time-honored method of keeping fruit and vegetables from one season to another. Do you know that a canning factory was built in Wichita Falls nearly fifteen years ago? It scarcely turned a wheel, for the excellent reason that there was little or nothing to be canned. Along with canning goes the making of preserves and jams, and the use of the "store" variety of these things, rather than the home-made, is rapidly increasing in this day of apartment houses and delicatessen meals.

The dehydrating process for fruits and vegetables is coming more and more into use. This process simply eliminates a great part of the water from the fruit without changing the chemical elements of it; the dry residue will keep indefinitely, can be shipped much more conveniently, and when the time for eating it arrives, all that is necessary is to add water. A. E. F. veterans can tell you about it; the process isn't so satisfactory for potatoes, but is very successful for other vegetables.

Another industry that should be developed here, when the time comes, is that of evaporating fruit. It is closely akin to the dehydrating process. The big northern companies that handle condensed milk and evaporated milk have been waiting for years for some Texas community to develop enough high-bred dairy stock to make it profitable for them to establish plants in the southwest. If irrigation does what it is expected to do for dairying, Wichita Falls will be in excellent position to bid for such a plant. Likewise the companies that handle cereal products, breakfast foods and the like could have branch factories here.

The possibilities of the irrigation district are even less limited than this optimistic view indicates, provided Wichita Falls views them in a large enough way, and begins early enough to seek to realize them.

Wichita Falls can confidently expect to benefit immensely from the irrigation farming community. But the mistakes of other sections must be studied well in advance, and a sound attitude that will steer us clear of them.

### FRANCE'S GREATEST ACHIEVEMENT POLITICS

(United Press Staff Correspondent.)

PARIS. (By Mail).—From his death-defying flights over the enemy lines, Fonck, the greatest aviator seen which the war produced, has since the armistice readjusted his life merely to making oratorical flights in the French chamber of deputies.

Fonck has abandoned the air for politics, or rather has taken up politics for the benefit of aviation.

Along with General Castelnau, General Hirschauer and a half dozen other great French military leaders who entered the field of politics. In all of these men only one motive has been predominant for the change and that has been to see to it that the French army, navy and aviation get a square deal and adequate support from parliament.

All of France's great military chiefs from Joffre, Foch and Pétain down are still convinced that if the French parliament before the war had listened to

their pleas for adequate financial support for the army, France would not only have come out financially ahead by many billions of marks, but by a million human lives at least.

Fonck has given for himself the task of seeing to it that France's aerial supremacy, to which he contributed during the war by officially bringing down 25 German planes, is assured by adequate support.

As a result of his efforts it is now certain that the French chamber of deputies will make appropriations big enough not only to keep up France's military aviation to the standard attained during the war, but also to secure the commercial supremacy of the air. Already as the result of the support thus secured Paris has become the center of commercial aerial lines linking practically every capital in Europe, as well as lines to France's colonial possessions in northern Africa.

Fonck had no difficulty whatever in getting elected to parliament from the district of the Vosges. He made his electoral campaign in aeroplane. With his Croix de Guerre bearing seventy-five palms for the German planes he brought down, to say nothing of decorations showed on him by allied and neutral countries alike, Fonck, when dress rehearsals take place at the Palais Bourbon puts in the shade even such veterans as General Castelnau.

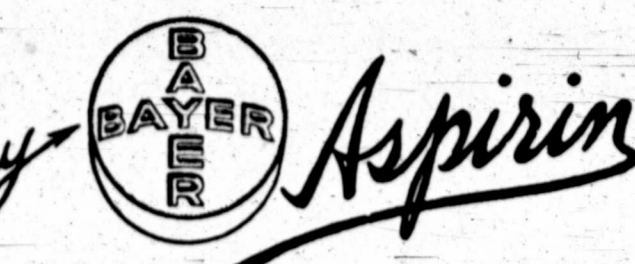

MESSAGE RECEIVED FROM TITLE HOLDER STATES HE WILL COME FOR \$2,000.

### BOUT WOULD PUT WICHITA FALLS IN SPOT LIMELIGHT

Match Between Irslinger and Young McFadden Will Be a Winner.

Following close upon the heels of the announcement made in The Times yesterday that Henry Irslinger and Young McFadden had been matched for a finish bout at the opera house the night of November 29 to come the announcement that George V. Tuohy, the best known wrestling promoter in the country had written to Wichita Falls stating the terms of the match. It is given that Waino Ketonen, the recognized middleweight champion of the world, here for a bout with Irslinger.

Tuohy stated that he will bring the champion here for a \$2,000 guarantee and that if Irslinger wants to take the belt which Ketonen holds, indicative of the championship, he will have to put up another \$1,000 against it. Irslinger will also have to make 150 pounds at the 3 o'clock on the day of the bout.

At the present time, Ketonen has his hands full in the east and will be busy until December 20. He will be available for any date after that.

**Bout May Go Through.** Although \$2,000 is a large guarantee for Wichita Falls, a much larger guarantee has ever before been given. It is not at all improbable that the deal will go through. The local fans here have always patronized the wrestling game well and if a bout with the championship of the world at stake were to be staged here it goes without saying that the "Standing Room Only" sign would be hung out long before the bout began.

The eyes of the sporting world would be turned to Wichita Falls for one night in the year at least.

However, that is a matter that will be taken up in the future and the matter for present consideration is the coming bout between Young McFadden and Irslinger next Thursday night. This bout will be the first since the one that staged recently between Henry and Bull Montana which came to an abrupt end when Henry tossed his opponent over the top.

**Called "American Apollo."** McFadden has been dubbed the "American Apollo" due to his wonderful physique. He is engaged in the most perfectly built man in the United States and his pictures have been sent broadcast over the country as the ideal type of American manhood.

Physical Culture magazine any day and you will find Young McFadden in various poses. He has more muscles than the average man and is more nimble "shimmy shaker" and has given exhibitions of his strength and muscle control in every nook and corner of the United States at one time or another.

But Young McFadden is a wrestler as well as a boxer. He has a string of victories over some of the most prominent men in the game and at the height of his career now. His most recent bout was in Ogden, Utah, last Saturday night when he threw Jack Hobson in two straight falls. **Will Meet Pet Brown.** After his bout with Irslinger he will hop to Houston to meet Pet Brown, a wrestler of American fame and of ordinary ability to meet either Irslinger or Brown so the fans can judge for themselves whether or not the bout will be worth the taking.

As soon as Irslinger heard that McFadden was willing to meet him, he started to buckle down to hard work, though that is hardly necessary as far as Henry is concerned. He is always in good condition and keeps trained up to the last notch.

His last bout was with Sailor Jack Woods in Vernon and he took him on more to shut him up than anything else. He refused to meet Woods here as he thought that the bout would not be thrilling enough to stage before the Wichita public. The game here has always been on a high plane and it is Henry's aim to keep it so. He is confident that he could throw Woods in less time than it takes to tell it.

He also feels confident of throwing Young McFadden, but he realizes that he will have to extend himself more than he did to throw Woods.

### HAUGHTON'S SUGGESTION DOES NOT MEET FAVOR

## CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE IN SOUTHWEST STILL A MATTER OF DOUBT

Arkansas University is Still in Running for Conference Honors.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Games of the past week clouded rather than cleared indications of who will win the southwestern conference football championship this year, and left a possibility that the title will remain open.

Arkansas University, as a result of the decisive defeat administered to Phillips Academies, maintained her place with the other two undefeated teams of the conference—Texas A. & M. and Texas University—and gave indication that Rice Institute, the strongest conference team the Arkansas Razorbacks will meet, may not be able to eliminate them from championship contention.

While conservative fans do not place much confidence in score dope when the two big Texas teams are concerned, they are pondering over the fact that the Texas Aggies defeated Rice only 7 to 0. They take into consideration the fact that the game was played on a wet field, but in comparing this score with the 21 to 0 defeat inflicted upon Rice by Texas University, they also note that the Aggie team scored their only score upon Rice following what may be termed a series of flukes. Fans concede that a player may be expected occasionally to retain possession of a pun which occurred just preceding A. & M.'s touchdown, but they maintain that it is out of the ordinary for a player to kick a fifty-yard pun which failed. Rice kicked the second attempt at a place kick and A. & M. recovered the ball and pushed it forward for a touchdown. Press reports are that following the touchdown, A. & M. played a defensive game. It is well known that this is a favorite tactic of the Aggies. It has been a large factor in helping their goal line uncrossed, and that probably accounts in some measure for the small score against Rice. However, Rice was credited with making appreciable gains through A. & M. line, something they were unable to do against Texas U. and this is regarded as more significant.

Despite the fact that Arkansas is still in the conference race, chief interest of the football season still centers upon the game between Texas A. & M. and Texas University game here Thanksgiving, which will at least decide the championship of the state. Neither team has much to lose, but the game is of importance. Rice plays Arkansas U. on Turkey day.

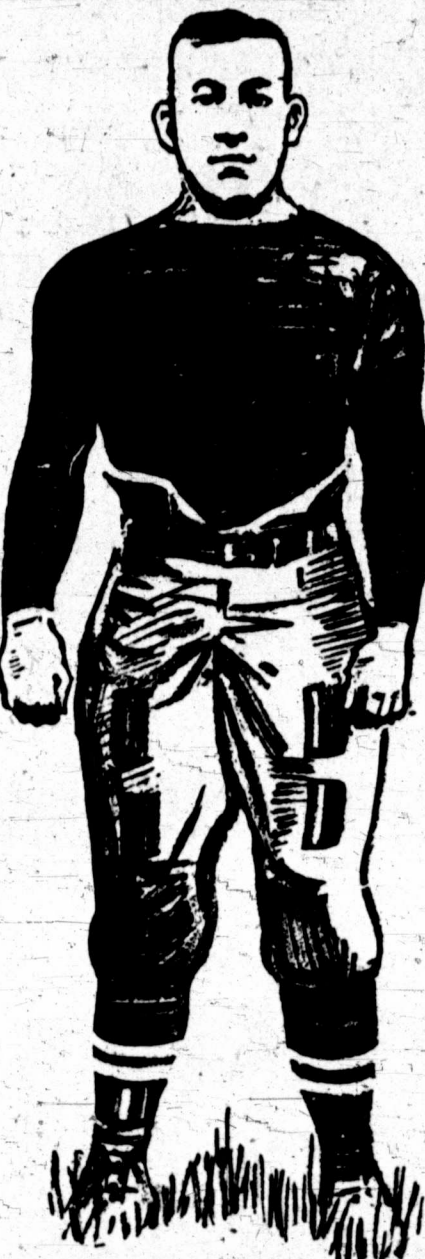

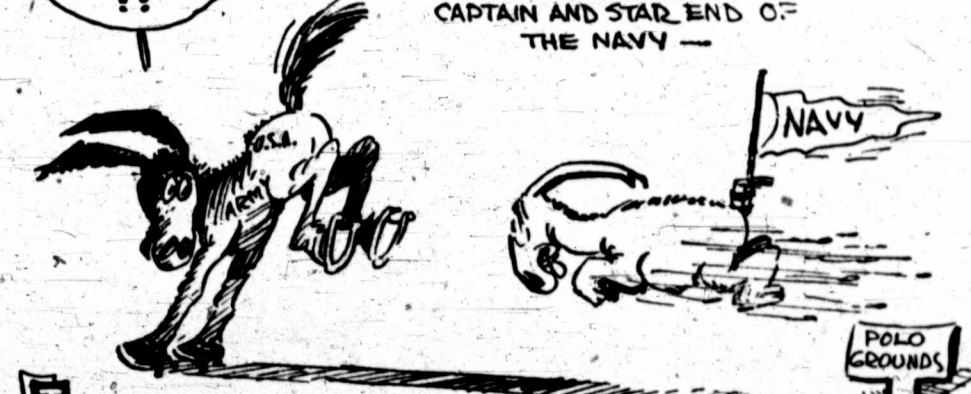

## STATE CHAMPIONSHIP WILL BE AT STAKE IN TOMORROW'S BATTLE

Rivalry Between Texas University and A. & M. Has Reached Fever Pitch.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—Another episode in the greatest sporting drama ever developed in the southwest will unfold Thanksgiving day, when A. & M. and Texas university student bodies and faculty go almost as a whole with their teams to the gridiron at Clark field here.

The rivalry between the two institutions has permeated the whole state, and Texas Aggie fans can be found in almost every city and village. It has invaded politics, more than one bitter fight in the legislature having originated from attitudes of officials toward these institutions.

The sporting rivalry developed to such a pitch in 1911 that a football game at Houston between the two schools was followed by a free-for-all fight between their respective students which got beyond the control of the police and raged for more than an hour.

The two first met on the gridiron in 1884. Since that time Texas has won 16 games and A. & M. has won seven. Texas has made a total of 325 points to 119 made by A. & M. However, much of this seeming superiority was the result of the first eight years, during which A. & M. failed to score against Texas. And during recent years results have shown A. & M. to be stronger.

The two institutions, in a manner, represent two different kinds of football. During recent years the greater number of high school stars, while A. & M. to a larger extent, draws hard, husky lads from smaller schools. 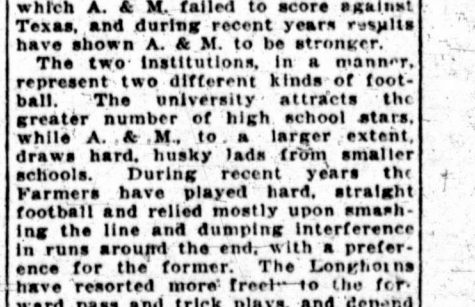

VERNON, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—J. M. Hanna, 79 years old, a retired farmer living with his son J. W. Hanna, one mile northeast of Oklaunion, died last night after a long illness. Mr. Hanna has lived in the county only two months, coming here from San Saba county. He is survived by a wife and two sons. The body will be shipped to San Saba county for burial.

### WILBARGER COUNTY REPORTS \$1,819 FOR THE RED CROSS

VERNON, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—A total of \$1,819 has been raised in the fourth Red Cross roll call in Wilbarger county. These figures include donations made until the close of the day Tuesday and are being enlarged continually, as the canvass has not yet been completed. Of this amount \$714 was paid for memberships by persons in Vernon and \$105 was raised in rural communities where box or pie suppers were held. In Sherwood \$45 was made at a pie supper; Doans raised the same amount and Ropda \$15. All of these districts turned in more than the amount set as their quota. The quota for Wilbarger county, as set by the national Red Cross apportionment, is 1,500 memberships of at least one dollar each. The goal this community has set for itself, however, is higher than that, as it is necessary to have as much as \$1,425 raised for use at home. A partial canvass of the business section of Vernon made Monday netted \$227. There are still many who have not been called upon. Although the roll call ends Thursday, the local director plans to continue with the solicitation until a thorough canvass has been made throughout the county. The campaign in Wilbarger county has been delayed somewhat due to bad weather.

### BOARD OF CONTROL SAVES STATE A MILLION DOLLARS

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Nov. 24.—The Texas board of control recently saved approximately \$1,000,000 by refraining from making a year's contract for groceries and dry goods for the state eleemosynary institutions during the unsettled condition of the markets at that time, according to A. R. Johnson, a member of the board.

Despite the fact that buying these supplies under a yearly contract would have reduced greatly the work of the board, Mr. Johnson said that because of the likelihood of prices declining in the future he decided to make only ninety-day contracts. The wisdom of this course, he said, has been vindicated by the fact that many articles already have declined fifty per cent in price since the beginning of this fiscal year, September 1.

The fall has been so rapid since the last ninety-day contracts, which expire at the end of this month, were made that the board has decided to make no contracts for the next ninety days, according to Mr. Johnson, who added that the board will purchase supplies as they are needed in the open market in as small quantities as possible in order to get the full benefit of further declines.

As an illustration of the tumble prices have taken, Mr. Johnson said that under the last contract the state paid 21.7 cents a pound for sugar which now may be bought for 11 cents; flour which then brought \$14.50 is now \$11.20; meat at that time was \$4.50 per cwt. but now is only \$2.30.

### Dry Goods, he added, have declined approximately fifty per cent.

The board acts as purchasing agent for sixteen state eleemosynary institutions, and approximately \$2,000,000 was provided this year for the purchase of dry goods and groceries. This amount, said Mr. Johnson, would have been woefully insufficient had contracts been made at prices prevailing at the beginning of this fiscal year.
