SIXTEEN ON VESSEL ARE LOST

MAY ABANDON PLANS TO PROSECUTE WOMAN IN JAKE HAMON CASE

NO ACTION WILL BE TAKEN UNTIL AFTER THE FUNERAL MONDAY.

TRUNKS OF THE WOMAN ARRIVE AT KANSAS CITY

Search is Continued in Effort to Locate Her Whereabouts Since the Shooting.

KANSAS CITY, MO., Nov. 27.—Clara Smith Hamon's two trunks, checked in Ardmore soon after the shooting of Jake Hamon, arrived at Tulsa station here. Police are watching them for the possibility of appearance of a claimant. Detectives believe the woman, wanted on charge of shooting Hamon with intent to kill, may be hiding here.

ARDMORE, OKLA., Nov. 27.—Is Mrs. Clara Hamon of Ringling, charged with firing the shot that proved fatal for Jake L. Hamon, millionaire oil king and republican national committeeman, still in Ardmore?

Previous contentions that she never left the city bobbed up again today when two men notified the county attorney's office that they saw the woman on the streets yesterday. Their names were withheld. Other reports state that she fled to California. City and county authorities re-established their search for the woman Mrs. Clara Hamon following the death of Jake.

Persons from all walks of life began arriving in Ardmore to pay their last respects to Hamon. His body will lie in state in Convention Hall from 8 o'clock today until 2 o'clock Monday morning. The funeral will be held from the First Presbyterian church Monday afternoon and his body will be deposited in Rose cemetery, two miles south of here.

May Change Complaint. Some believed that County Attorney Russell Brown of Carter county will change his charges filed against the woman with assault with intent to kill the committeeman to a murder charge. Brown, however, said he would abandon his activities until after the funeral.

An inquest to delve into the death of Hamon may be called, Brown asserted. The local telegraph office was flooded with telegrams of condolence from many prominent men in the United States who knew the millionaire.

It was reported that Mrs. Clara Hamon was in Chickasha last Friday, Oklahoma City Saturday and Ardmore Sunday.

Plans are afoot. It was stated to have the county attorney withdraw his information and to drop prosecution. Five physicians and surgeons issued the following statement:

"We the undersigned physicians and surgeons are of the opinion that Mr. Jake L. Hamon died of a gunshot wound, which penetrated the abdomen, entering at the ninth intercostal space, midway the axillary and mammary lines, penetrating the right lung, the liver, passing downward, the missile beneath the skin one inch to the right of the spinal column on a level with the crest of the ilium. The effect was a gunshot wound of the stomach, resulting in acute dilation of the heart about twelve hours later. No autopsy was made."

Mrs. Jake Hamon and daughter were grief stricken and could hardly talk. Her son, who resides in Chicago, is expected to arrive today.

REPUBLICAN HEADQUARTERS AT OKLAHOMA CITY CLOSES

REPORT NO WHEAT STRIKE IN KANSAS

Bow Nearly As Large An Acreage This Fall As A Year Ago.

TOPEKA, KAN., Nov. 27.—There is no wheat strike in Kansas insofar as decreased production is concerned, according to a report by Secretary Mochler of the state board of agriculture. While Kansas farmers may be holding some of the 1920 crop for higher prices they have also sown nearly as large an acreage this fall as a year ago. This fall's sowing is the third largest in the history of the state, only six per cent below that of a year ago and fifteen per cent below the record year.

Thus while Kansas farmers are denouncing trading in wheat futures as partly responsible for the break in prices, they are not threatening to stop production and let the world starve.

LEAGUE IS PLANNING TO CONTROL TRAFFIC IN WAR MATERIALS

COMMISSION AUTHORIZES SIR CECIL HURST TO DRAW UP RULES TO GOVERN.

DECLARES ASSEMBLY DOES FAR MORE THAN EXPECTED

Will Reach Many Important Decisions Before Adjournment Says British Delegate.

GENEVA, Nov. 27.—The League of Nations' commission on disarmament has authorized Sir Cecil Hurst to draw up a tentative plan permitting the League to exercise the most effective control over traffic in war materials.

The "third commission" has named a sub-commission of ten to draft the final project for an international tribunal which will be presented to the league assembly within a fortnight. The commission has decided to retain the amendments to the Brussels court and start with the project of jurisdiction by agreement. This will be changed to compulsory jurisdiction only if public opinion so demands. When the assembly adopts the final project it will immediately establish the international court or ask the governments to call an international convention to inaugurate it.

Lord Cecil in an interview declared that the covenant of the league is nebulous, that it is a "great experiment" and "is not to be treated as a dogma."

It merely consists, he said, of the broad principles of a scheme which can be modified and amended most readily. The assembly has done far more than expected, he declared, and he holds the view that they are virtually larger views and made greater efforts to accomplish its aims. Before it adjourns it will have reached decisions on such subjects as an international court, started the machinery for universal disarmament, perfected its universal disarmament, perfected its disarmament, admitted new members, formulated a typhus campaign, and will, I believe, have assisted in solving the Polish and Armenian difficulties.

Regarding the questions of mandates, Cecil holds the view that they are virtually perpetual and irrevocable but that the recipients are bound by certain rules. He said that mandates should be regarded as a trust and not as guardian ships. They may be revoked when the territories attain maturity and are able to govern themselves.

EXPECT TO FINISH SESSION EARLIER THAN CALCULATED

GENEVA, Nov. 27.—Optimists at the meeting of the assembly of the league of nations are counting upon finishing the work of the session next week or earlier, according to the British delegate.

Some apprehension is still felt in some quarters, however, that the discussions in full assembly, which will be in reaching the decision whether to remain a part of Austria or not, Vorarlberg recently requested that it be attached to Switzerland, but this request was rejected by the latter country.

MEXICAN CABINET GETS OUT OF WAY FOR NEW OFFICERS

RESIGN TO GIVE OREGON FREE CHOICE IN NAMING SUCCESSORS.

NO INFORMATION GIVEN REGARDING NEW CABINET

Illness Of De La Huerta May Prevent His Accepting a Place In Government.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 27.—All members of the cabinet of Provisional President de la Huerta have announced their resignations in order that General Alvaro Obregon, the incoming executive, who will be inaugurated on December 1, may have a free choice in making department heads. It is probable these resignations will be accepted as the last official act of the provisional president.

General Obregon, who left for the country yesterday for a rest of several days, has steadily refused to give details relative to the personnel of his cabinet. He has asserted, however, that if reaction occurs in Austria, that a restoration of the monarchy, she will insist upon the right of the province of Vorarlberg to decide whether to remain a part of Austria or not. Vorarlberg recently requested that it be attached to Switzerland, but this request was rejected by the latter country.

PRESIDENT-ELECT TO CONCLUDE VISIT TO CANAL ZONE SUNDAY

CRISTOBAL, CANAL ZONE, Nov. 27.—President-elect Harding prepared to conclude his visit to the canal zone. His visit here ends tomorrow, when he sails on board the steamer Pastores for the United States.

Senator Harding returned here last night from the Pacific terminus of the canal, where he exchanged felicitations with officials of the Republic of Panama. Today he visited the fortifications and the submarine base at the eastern end of the waterway, played golf and took a swim in an outdoor salt water pool near his hotel. A plunge in the pool was his first act after his return here last night and he was out early this morning for another swim.

The Pastores will sail at noon tomorrow and is due to reach Kingston, Jamaica, at 8 o'clock on route to Norfolk. Senator and Mrs. Harding and their party will go ashore at Kingston, where they will take lunch and later they will go on an eighty-mile motor launch to the British possessions. They will board their ship again at Port Antonio.

CASKEY LOWERS HIS OWN WORLD RECORD STEER BULLDOGGING

FORT WORTH, Nov. 27.—Preston Caskey of Wichita Falls, a contestant in the Fort Worth rodeo, lowered his own world record for steer bulldogging last night from 11 seconds to 10 and three-fifths seconds. This Speaker of the Cleveland Indians, appeared in the ring with him.

TO HAVE A HEARING TODAY ON CHARGES OF BURGLARY

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Attorney Edgar J. Ader, an official of the Consumers Packing Company, convicted last month of using the mails to defraud, and Edgar C. Erickson, wealthy clothing merchant, were to be given a hearing today on charges of burglary.

They were arrested following theft of \$4,500 worth of jewelry from the apartment of Miss Helen DeWoody, said to be a relative of the chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice here.

Erickson, officials said today has confessed, Erickson, in the alleged confession, admitted giving the jewelry to Miss DeWoody and sending her on a trip to California. When he attempted to break with her he was threatened with blackmail, he said. Erickson said he then revealed his relations with Miss DeWoody to his wife. He said he asked Ader to get his jewelry back and three days later all except a \$2,000 diamond ring, was returned. Erickson claimed he was forced to pay Ader \$1,000 for the jewelry.

NO PASSPORTS IN THE NAME OF IRISH COMMITTEE

NEXT CONGRESS MAY OF NECESSITY HAVE TO INCREASE TAX RATES

PRELIMINARY SURVEY OF FINANCIAL SITUATION MADE FOR COMMITTEE.

CHANCES ARE POOR FOR EVEN SLIGHT REDUCTION

Explained That Present Rates Are Beginning To Yield Far Less Than Heretofore.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—The next congress may be confronted with the necessity of increasing tax rates, or providing for specific uses of some tax funds, according to preliminary surveys of the financial situation made for members of the house ways and means committee by treasury officials.

Indications are that chances are poor for even slight reductions of a few of the most obnoxious taxes. Some increased levies, particularly on non-essentials, will be recommended when congress reconvenes, according to reports at the capital.

The probability of increases is not brought about through increased government expenditures. Republicans plan to reduce these. The reason is that the present rates are beginning to yield far less than during the years of big war profits.

The current depression, treasury officials believe, will cut a big hole in the yield from the excess profits tax, which has brought in a large percentage of the government revenues.

Government expenditures continue high because of the tremendous war debt of the country, the interest of which amounts to nearly \$1,200,000,000 a year.

Secretary of the Treasury Houston had estimated that for 1921 the government departments will need \$4,000,000,000. Republican congressional leaders hope to reduce this total by a billion.

The belief prevails in the reports reaching congressmen that the present tax rates will not be yielding at the rate of \$2,000,000,000 annually.

Representative Kitchin, North Carolina, chairman of the present revenue law, is inclined to think there will be no big demand for the immediate repeal of the excess profits law when congress reconvenes.

LITTLE DALLAS GIRL KILLED IN ACCIDENT; SHELL IS DISCHARGED

DALLAS, Nov. 27.—Wayne Cunningham, six, was instantly killed last night when a revolver with which she was playing was accidentally discharged. The child was taking shells out of the gun, and putting them back in. It was during one of these operations that a steel jacketed bullet hit Wayne in the chest.

FIND NO TRACE OF THE BARGE THAT CUT LOOSE FROM STEAMER IN A HEAVY GALE LATE FRIDAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Storm warnings were displayed today on the gulf coast from Bay St. Louis, Miss., to Carrabelle, Fla., the weather bureau announced. A storm of considerable intensity was reported this morning central over southeastern Louisiana.

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 27.—No trace of the barge W. J. Pirrie, reported ashore near James Island, off the Washington coast, has been found early today, according to a wireless message from the coast guard cutter Snohomish, which went to the aid of the stricken vessel. Sixteen persons, including the wife of Captain A. T. Jensen and their baby, were reported on the Pirrie, which was cut loose from the steamer Santa Rita in a heavy gale south of Cape Flattery late yesterday.

SEATTLE, WASH., Nov. 27.—All efforts to ascertain the fate of the sixteen persons aboard the barge W. J. Pirrie, reported ashore 96 miles south of Cape Flattery, which was cut loose from the coast, had proved vain up to an early hour this morning, several hours after the vessel was reported to have struck on the rocks near James Island, where the last word concerning the Pirrie came at 11:30 last night in a message from the navy radio station at North Head, Wash., which said it saw the Pirrie, which was aground on the rocky James Island, off Quillayute, Wash.

No direct communication has been had with the barge since the steamer Santa Rita, which was towing her to South America, cut her loose shortly after noon yesterday in what shipping men described as the worst storm in years. Meager details of the struggle, of the barge drifting closer and closer to the rocks and finally of her probably grounding at James Island, were received by indirect routes from Captain J. Tibbotts, captain of the Santa Rita. For four hours nothing was heard.

Radio stations which could communicate with the Santa Rita were located from other land points. Then a wire into North Head navy radio station in Washington was made, which brought a little news of the fight for life trickled out.

Little Hope Held Out. Shipping men here today held out hope for saving any of those aboard the Pirrie if she actually was on the rocks, although the weather was reported moderating early today. The steamer Atlas, which was en route to Seattle, was released early last night that she was proceeding to the aid of the Pirrie and the coast guard cutter Snohomish left Port Angeles for Washington late yesterday, to give aid. Nothing further had been heard from the Atlas late today; the Snohomish was expected to reach the scene about 10 o'clock today. Meanwhile communication routes to many coast towns were blocked or broken, some roads were under water, which in some cases carried down telegraph and telephone lines in their fall, and repetitions of yesterday's extraordinary high tides were expected at some points. These tides yesterday flooded sections of Marshfield, Ore., and Aberdeen, Wash., and caused some lumber mills there to close down.

Two men took the latest electro-gram as a result of the storm. They were Joseph Velosky and Victor A. Mielow, fishermen, who received shocks while recovering the net, which was blown down by the wind and falling trees.

ONE PERSON KILLED IN STORM AT PORT ARTHUR

PORT ARTHUR, TEXAS, Nov. 27.—A tornado striking down on the Port Arthur Canal and Dock company's sheds near here late yesterday killed one, slightly injured scores of others and did approximately \$100,000 damage to the buildings. One woman is said to be missing.

Edward Erickson, riding a bicycle, was knocked from his machine and landed into a ditch by the sudden impact of wind. He was dead when picked up.

Searchers worked throughout the night looking for bodies and clearing the littered roadway.

Medical aid was rushed from Port Arthur, the call being sent into Port Arthur by wireless. All telephones were down and a wireless operator flashed the news of the wind from a nearby steamer wireless.

WILL CONTEND THAT ALL OFFICEHOLDERS FINISH THEIR TERMS

JACKSON, MISS., Nov. 27.—The new republican administration must permit democratic officeholders to complete the terms for which they are commissioned, or the democratic minority in the senate will fight against the confirmation of all presidential appointments, if the plan proposed by Senator Pat Harrison of this state, is carried into effect.

Senator Harrison will leave tonight for Washington and will endeavor to secure a conference of the democratic minority on this question during the coming week.

"I believe in the doctrine that to the victor belongs the spoils and am perfectly willing that all democratic now holding federal office be replaced with republicans," said Senator Harrison, but at the same time, men now in office, who were commissioned for specific terms should be allowed to finish their terms and not be harassed with letters conveying the polite but positive intimation that their resignations will be accepted. I hope a fight on the question can be avoided, but the democratic minority can prevent any confirmation of the democratic now holding federal office by the adoption of that policy if it is the determination of the republicans to cut all democrats as quickly as possible, without regard to their terms of office.

COTTON OPTIONS IN NEW YORK REGISTER NEW LOW RECORDS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Cotton options touched new record lows today, ruling unchanged to 24 points lower than the previous day, selling from Liverpool, Wall street and southern interests uncovered spot losses orders. On the decline, however, good buying appeared, and interest sold nears and bought distant futures.

DISCREDIT REPORTS OF MONARCHIST PLOT

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—Reports that organizations have been formed in Bavaria for the purpose of restoring monarchy and establishing Bavarian domination over Germany were discredited by Minister President Von Kahr of Bavaria, who in a statement to the Associated Press today said that rumors of separatist and revolutionary movements in Bavaria had been circulated by opponents of the present coalition government there which is bourgeois and violently opposed by communists and independent socialists in Germany.

"Much that is outstanding has been said," declared President Von Kahr, "about the einwohnerwehr in Bavaria. Recent reports stated that the 'orgesch' which was alleged to have been formed as a nucleus about which Wittelbach regime in Bavaria and carry out a program of far-reaching significance in Germany. Let me say that 'orgesch' does not exist in Bavaria.

"The einwohnerwehr is an organization composed of citizens and sometimes known as the Bavarian citizen guard." It is not unlike the law and order committees which some American communities have organized to protect themselves against rowdism, pillage and disorder.

"It is an organization of decent citizens of all political faiths to preserve order and prevent the recurrence of bolshevik riots. It is under oath to check revolutionary movements whether they start from our extremists or the extreme conservatives."

President Von Kahr estimated the organization had a membership of about 200,000.

Asked if he believed the entente would insist that the einwohnerwehr be disbanded on January 4, when Germany's military arm is being lowered, he said that the einwohnerwehr will be all the greater. How can we work and restore our ruined industry if a small bolshevik minority is allowed to foment disorder and breed unrest in Germany? The bolsheviks are trying to extend disorder throughout the civilized world, hoping to create a world revolution.

He explained that communists outside of Bavaria are helping today commencing in and for the adoption of that policy if it is the determination of the republicans to cut all democrats as quickly as possible, without regard to their terms of office.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Within the high rock bound confines of Coogan's bluff, surrounded by blue and khaki, the Army and Navy this afternoon will settle a little argument of years standing.

The fleet of Uncle Sam and his land garrisons must be officerless for every shoulder bar and every piece of gold braid in the service seemed congregated here for the 23rd annual football battle between the West Point cadets and the Annapolis midshipmen.

## JOE WELLING NEVER HAD A CHANCE WITH LIGHTWEIGHT CHAMP

Leonard Beats Aspirant To Title Almost Into A Pulp In Fourteen Rounds.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—At least 15,000 fans hereabouts were more convinced than ever today that Benny Leonard is the lightweight champion.

For two important reasons—he made 134 pounds, and he beat the rugged, punishment-devouring Joe Welling almost into a pulp in 14 rounds last night in Madison Square garden.

For twelve rounds Leonard waited his chance and seemed content to pile up a margin of points that assured him the decision if his opponent lasted the limit.

Early in the thirteenth round his chance came when he rocked Welling with a right hook to the jaw. Then the champion turned into a tiger. He opened with a shower of rights and lefts that sent the Chicago boy to the floor three times.

Leonard charged into him in the 14th round and floored him again. Welling was helpless. He couldn't see, he hardly could stand and his hands were hanging limply at his side. Leonard measured his jaw and started an uppercut but stopped and looked at the referee. The official stepped between them and raised the champion's hand and Welling staggered to his corner.

## Jack Dempsey Is A New Type of Ring Champion

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Jack Dempsey, king of the world's heavyweights, was in the center of a buzzing group of scribes during one of the recent conferences for the Dempsey-Carpenter bout.

"Called you up at eleven o'clock last night but couldn't get you," one of the scribes said to him.

"Eleven o'clock the big champ answered. "No wonder you couldn't get me, I'm between the sheets—every night at ten."

He was talking for publicity—he doesn't need a press agent. He was telling the truth.

From personal observations, Dempsey is an unusual heavyweight champion. Success hasn't turned his head, the same big affable boy with the same pleasant smile that won him friends by the legion in Toledo. He's the same clean living athlete in the same perfect condition that enabled him to bat down one of the biggest men in the history of the game.

Other champions in other days succumbed to the "bright lights," when found training a love and a task when they reached the summit of success. With greenback passports into fast circles, they went the pace that kills.

But not so Dempsey. Critics after looking him over in training have given the opinion that he's in better form now than on the fourth of July a year ago when he won the championship. He has the clear eye and the ruddy tanned skin of an athlete in perfect condition.

"How do you put in a day?" he was asked.

"Well, I pile out about 6 o'clock and after some setting up exercises I do a turn through Central Park," he said. "Then a good breakfast and a rest of an hour or so and then a long walk. After lunch I go over to training quarters and put in two or three hours with the rope, the ball, the medicine ball, some shadow boxing and a few rounds with Bill Tate, Ray Smith and some other boys who come around at different times. I mix with 'em every time I get the chance. It's great exercise and first class diversion."

Practically all the prominent fighters around New York occupy places of prominence at the weekly

boxing shows in Madison Square Garden, but Dempsey is seldom seen there. "I like to watch the bouts," he explained. "But late hours and an evening in a smoke-filled room do more harm than good."

Dempsey has a lot of personality. He has that happy faculty of meeting people well and remembering them the second time. He never "high-brows." He's accessible at all times and he'll dip in his pocket for any cause.

"Talk with him for an hour and he will search—ever speak in the first person. He's no master of English but he's grammatical and he isn't hampered with a lot of vulgar parlance of the ring."

It's a hard task to get him to talk about any of his conquests. He always refers to one of his vanquished opponents as a "mighty good boy."

During one of the recent fanling interviews—although of admirers he listened with tolerant politeness to one who insisted on telling him how good he was, how he had pleased him to bat down in three rounds and how he was going to rain capitalism.

"Say," the champion interrupted, "seems to me you're a bit more sure about it than I am. I'm not so certain I'm going to win that bout. Carpenter is a great boy. He's bound to be a fighter with the experience he has. I never wish a winner in advance on anything."

All parties agreed to the deal and came to an understanding, the plaintiff further asserts, and alleges that the owner of the house refused for some reason to assign the lease over to the plaintiff.

In her complaint the plaintiff goes on further to state that in company with Mrs. Gill she went into a dark room where they both concentrated their minds on the owner of the property, who resided in Fort Worth, and that she, the plaintiff, was told by Mrs. Gill that through her power the

owner of the property had now signed the lease.

She asks personal damages to the amount of \$2,000 and exemplary damages to the extent of \$1,000, and further prays the court that all outstanding notes, amounting to \$2,000, be cancelled.
