UNEMPLOYMENT HAS INCREASED STEADILY DURING PAST MONTH

SUCH IS REPORT OF SEVENTH FEDERAL RESERVE BANK OF CHICAGO.

REPORTS THAT VOLUME OF BUSINESS HAS DECLINED

Few People Are Buying Automobiles And Some of Plants Are Decreasing Production.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Unemployment has increased steadily in the midwest during the last month, while the volume of business has declined, the seventh federal reserve bank of Chicago reported today in a survey of conditions in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan and Missouri, and parts of Kansas and Nebraska.

While men are more plentiful than jobs, the report stated, the amount of idleness is no greater at present than at this period in the winter of 1914. Ten per cent of the men employed in the steel plants have been thrown into idleness, the report found. "The labor scarcity in the steel districts of a few months ago has vanished," the report said, "and men are again seeking employment every morning."

Those engaged in building lines estimated that fifty per cent of the men are out of work. "Workmen who are attracted to the industrial centers in the allocation of labor are now returning to their former homes," the report stated, "but so far the return flow has not relieved the situation on farms where wages approximating war-time figures are being paid cornhuskers."

The survey finds that in some basic industries little complaint is heard of unemployment. The Chicago stock yards was found operating with normal forces. "Speaking generally," the statement said, "wages have not been changed materially. Here and there concessions have been made in order that total employment may be avoided."

Railroad shop forces were being curtailed, the investigation showed, "but this is manifesting itself more particularly among larger trunk lines leading to the eastward." The report stated that the let down in business activity in the midwest appeared to be less than is being experienced in the east.

Discussing the conditions in the seventh district territory, the survey declared "uncertainty almost completely dominates business calculations. Distinctly uncertain conditions in individual prices are factors in retarding business activities."

The recession in prices which has "already manifested itself in food-stuffs and textiles, is reported extending to other commodities heretofore unaffected," the survey found, "but there are industries which have experienced little, if any readjustments."

Other findings were: Few people are buying automobiles, and with the exception of some of the larger manufacturers automobile plants are either closed or operating on such a small scale that their production is less than 20 per cent normal. Railroads are buying little rolling stock, although the purchasing of rails continues. The car loadings have eased up since the middle of October and the car shortage is being rapidly reduced. In nearly every section stores are attempting to liquidate the stock through special sales, and the buying is from "hand to mouth."

Cancellation of orders has been large in all lines of merchandise. Manufacturers report liquidation of debts is "very slow." Mail order houses business shows considerable decrease. Farmers are withholding their grains from the market due to the readjustment of market values. Forty per cent of last year's wheat crop is still in the farmers' hands. Cattle loan companies are facing the problem of financing the winter's needs of producers and the local banks are still carrying some of last winter's advances, as shrinkages in market values have wiped out a great many equities.

FURTHER PRICE DECLINES REPORTED FROM ST. LOUIS
ST. LOUIS, Nov. 29.—Further price declines; a tendency of business to slow down, and an increase in unemployment market the last thirty days in the eighth federal reserve district for the states of Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee, according to the report of the federal reserve bank of St. Louis today.

Paying in all lines has been narrowed to necessity basis. Orders for forward delivery are at a minimum, the report said. In certain lines, notably textiles, liquidation has progressed at a rapid rate, several leading wholesalers conducted sales which were well attended and at which merchandise valued at \$15,000,000 was sold. The slowing down of manufacturing and general industry during this period has resulted in considerable reduction in operating forces. A surplus of labor in virtually all lines is reported. The labor surplus is increasing. Wage reductions to date are insignificant. There are fewer strikes in progress than at any time this year.

KANSAS CITY NOW RANKS SIXTH IN POSTAL RECEIPTS
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 29.—Kansas City now ranks sixth city in postal receipts, according to postal statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920. The year before Kansas City ranked eighth, New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston and St. Louis rank above Kansas City in the order named. Kansas City receipts for the fiscal year were \$4,925,464.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Merry Christmas sentiment means very little in the lives of those who rush to the stores with a list in their hands on the day before December 25 in a frantic effort to buy Yuletide presents, Mrs. Mollie Metcher Newbury, Chicago's "merchant princess" and owner of the Boston Store, said in an interview with the United Press today.

"Those who wish to remember the ones they love do their shopping early because they wish to do their best," said Mrs. Newbury. "There is very little sentiment attached to the gifts of the last minute purchasers. At the counters on Christmas eve are usually those buying presents for people they are under social or personal obligations to."

"Department stores love a lover because they are the ones who start to shop weeks before Christmas. The pick of the store is none too good for those who have felt the 'comic urge'."

Mrs. Newbury said children, as a class, attach great sentiment to each item they spend for gifts and are always among the earliest shoppers. "Useful gifts and not meaningless fluff-dolls and knick-knacks are being bought to a greater extent this year than ever before, according to the 'merchant princess'."

"The day when the daughter of the house received a present—and after calling a family council decided it was either a candlestick or a skillet and then used it for a paper weight, has passed," Mrs. Newbury said. "Utilitarian gifts prevail now."

Stores are offering almost exclusively this year toys made in America, said Mrs. Newbury because the public has learned to favor the strong substantial playthings to the frail toys that were imported from Germany and Japan.

Prices this year are from ten to forty per cent lower than last, said Mrs. Newbury. "The greatest reductions are in wearing apparel. She does not expect the usual holiday rush to be slackened by the slight business depression."

HUNGARY SEEKS TO CENSOR NEWS THAT DISCREDITS NATION

VIENNA, Nov. 29.—Information reaching foreign diplomatic officials here is to the effect that Hungary is attempting the enactment of a rigorous law for the suppression of the dissemination outside of that country all news considered derogatory to the interests of the government. It is said that the legal committee of the assembly has framed a law providing for imprisonment of from five years to life and a fine of 100,000 crowns for sending over the frontier information of a criminal, political, economic, military or legislative character considered contrary to the national interests.

Foreign correspondents violating this law, it is added, will be subject to expulsion. It is understood that the foreign correspondents at Budapest have notified the government that if such a law is enacted they will leave in a body and make a world-wide protest, demanding that Hungary conform with the established press usage.

W. E. ALLEN IS NAMED DEPUTY SHERIFF FOR THE BURKBURNETT PRECINCT
W. E. Allen has been named by Sheriff-elect Fred K. Smith as deputy in the Burkburnett precinct. A feature of the appointment of Mr. Allen to the position is the fact that in doing so Mr. Smith has acted in accordance with the expressed wish of a number of leading citizens of that community.

Recently the sheriff-elect informed the citizens of Burkburnett that it was his desire to select a man for that community who would meet with the approval of the people whom he was to serve. Acting on the request a petition was circulated asking for the appointment of Mr. Allen, which was signed by seventy business men and representatives of business firms. The petition was presented to Mr. Smith Tuesday morning and the appointment was made as requested.

EYES OF THE LOCAL OIL FRATERNITY NOW TURNED ARCHER WAY

Once again the eyes of the local oil fraternity are being turned toward Archer county. Drilling in that section has been going on steadily since Bissonet and Ceseaux struck a good looking sand around the 1,750-foot mark on the Parkey several weeks ago.

It is expected that the Bass & Dillard No. 1 Riggs will be drilled in either today or early tomorrow. They were drilling around 1,725 yesterday and expected to reach the sand today. R. O. Harvey's No. 1 Ferguson was expected to hit the 1,610-foot sand today. The well was around the 1,620-foot mark yesterday. Bass & Dillard went through 14 feet of oil sand at 1,624 feet and had a small showing of oil, but bused it up.

The Bissonet and Ceseaux No. 3 Parkey was reported as standardizing.

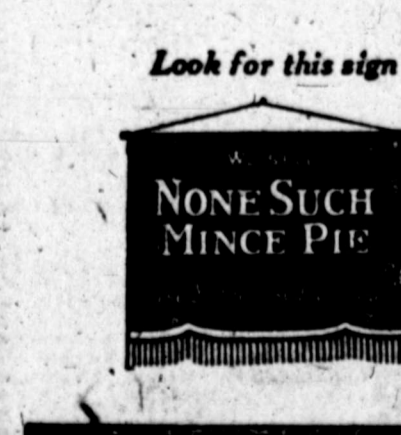

BOLLING DENIES HE ACCEPTED MONEY TO INFLUENCE CONTRACT

BROTHER-IN-LAW OF PRESIDENT ISSUES STATEMENT IN EXPLANATION.

ASKS INVESTIGATION OF BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS

Tells The Committee That His Personal Records Are All Available.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—A denial that he had ever taken money for influencing the disposition of contracts or machinery by the United States shipping board, as charged by T. K. Sands, former Washington banker, coupled with a request that all of his business transactions with Sands be investigated—"both for my own and my family's sake"—was made before the Walsh congressional committee here today by R. W. Bolling, President Wilson's brother-in-law and now treasurer of the shipping board.

Mr. Bolling told of business transactions with Sands dating back to 1916 and earlier years, out of which grew several financial transactions. He told the committee that his personal records were all available to its inspection. Sands has testified that he received \$40,000 from the Downey Shipbuilding corporation for "representing" before the board, out of which he paid money to Mr. Bolling.

Mr. Bolling said that after banking with the institution which Sands was connected with for several years, he had taken a contract in 1916 to build a house for the banker and in making a settlement for its cost with Mr. and Mrs. Sands, had foregone any profits because of objection by the Sands to a charge for extras.

Says Sands Agreed.

"I volunteered to cancel my share of this charge, which figure (\$500) represented most of the profit I had expected to make on the entire transaction," Mr. Bolling said in his statement, "because of their unpleasant attitude. Mr. Sands agreed to this agreement and gave me his note for \$5,000 which I endorsed and discounted. However, a short while afterward Mr. Sands told me that he did not want me to lose any of my commissions for building the house and that he had accepted this reduction only because his wife was very much worried. That the house should have cost more than they had originally planned and that he intended paying me the additional \$500 above referred to.

"Early in 1918 Mr. Sands sent a Mr. Cranor to see me in regard to some machinery, which was to be used in connection with construction of vessels. Mr. Cranor told me that the machinery in question was 'bending rolls' and was to have been shipped to his company from the factory, but at the last minute some other company succeeded in having the order changed and that this machinery would be diverted to them; that a great injustice was being done to this, Mr. Cranor's company. I knew nothing about the construction division, so in the presence of Mr. Cranor, I called up Mr. Lester Siler, who was then secretary of the shipping board, and explained the matter to him. He said he would look into it and subsequently told me that he found upon inquiry that the rolls had been promised to Mr. Cranor's company and would be shipped to them.

"A short time after this, Mr. Sands told me that he had made, or would

make \$1,000 in connection with this transaction—though he now states that he has no recollection of the matter—and that he was going to 'take care of me.' I told him I would accept nothing. He then mentioned the \$500 which he still owed me in connection with the charges made in his house, saying that he had not forgotten it and would pay it. I gave no thought as to what Mr. Sands' relationship was to the principal, but looked upon him as the vice-president of a large bank and a man who was justly indebted to me. I therefore told him that I would be glad to have him pay what he owed me, but that it could in no way be connected with fees or commissions involving government work and this was clearly understood. Upon my request he paid me subsequently the \$500 as follows: February 18, 1918, \$200; June 28, 1918, \$200; and August 5, 1918, \$100. I have no knowledge of where this money paid me by Mr. Sands came from.

"Sands also made me a loan of \$200 on May 21, 1918, for which I gave him my note. This was repaid by me to him July 14, 1918, with interest, at which time Mr. Sands said he was unable to find my note. However, I have my cancelled check bearing his indorsement. This represents every cent Mr. Sands has paid me since December 31, 1917.

"Of the \$40,000 which Sands says was paid for procuring contracts, I never heard until it was mentioned in anonymous letters coupled with threats that unless something was done to stop the proceedings of the department of justice against Mr. Sands that my name would be brought into it. Upon the receipt of these letters, I personally reported the matter to the department of justice, requesting that investigation be made of my transaction with Mr. Sands.

"I feel that it is unnecessary for me to say that I never, by word or deed, tried in any way, to assist the Providence Engineering corporation or any other company to procure a contract.

"Regarding the testimony given before the commission by Benjamin F. Fuller, who has been indicted for forging and sentenced to the penitentiary for four years, in which he stated that Mr. Sands gave me a check in his presence, I beg to say that statement is absolutely and unqualifiedly false. I therefore most urgently request the committee to require Mr. Sands to immediately produce all of his checks made to me since January 1, 1915."

Mr. Bolling said that the committee would find available an anonymous letter addressed to W. G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, and all other records in connection with the affair.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—R. W. Bolling, treasurer of the United States shipping board and brother-in-law of President Wilson, was the chief witness called to testify today before the Walsh congressional committee, which is investigating alleged corrupt practices in the shipping board.

The committee planned to question him regarding testimony recently given before the committee by Tucker K. Sands, a former Washington, D. C., bank official, to the effect that Mr. Bolling shared in money said to have been paid by the Downey Shipbuilding corporation to the shipping board to secure a contract. Mr. Bolling already has issued denial of the charge.

AMERICANS WELCOME BY THE MONTENEGRINS

United States Passport Furnishes All Sufficient Entry To Any Part Of The Country.

PODGORITZA, MONTENEGRO, Nov. 29.—No people are received in Montenegro with such general confidence and such frank welcome as Americans. A United States passport furnishes an all-sufficient entry to any part of the country. The people have a touching belief in the righteousness of Americans, in striking contrast to the aloofness and suspicion with which they greet other foreigners. This is due largely to the generous attitude of the United States toward Montenegro during the war and to the widespread relief work done by Americans.

The Montenevgrins, who are almost exclusively of the Greek, Orthodox church, are Serbian fugitives from the Turks. They speak the Serbian tongue but instead of deeming themselves on a par with other Serbians, they believe they are a sort of Serbian aristocracy.

The Montenevgrins as a rule are extremely poor and live in thatched huts. The men generally carry quite an arsenal of weapons in their girdles, which they regard as their most precious possession. Even the priests carry rifles. The women, though often beautiful, perform most of the menial tasks and soon lose their good looks. Large families are the rule and the people are melancholy and fatalistic and believe in vampires, fairies, witches and ghosts. They believe that disease is brought by evil spirits. To keep out these spirits or "jinn" they always close their windows tightly at night.

With the exception of a few well-wooded valleys, Montenegro is a mass of jagged, gray rocks, with little patches of earth that have been patiently gathered by the peasants from the road ways and valleys and carried to sheltered nooks. These little plots are jealously guarded and carefully cultivated. They produce only a few handfuls of grain, yet entire families depend upon them for sustenance.

The men are brave, proud, courteous and honest. Patriotism is a passion with them. They regard personal valor as the highest virtue. They show their solidarity with the new kingdom of Croats, Slovenes and Serbs by the mourning which they still wear in commemoration of Kosovo, the fatal battle in which Serbian independence was stamped out by the Turks for ever.

Both men and women wear a crimson cap with a broad border of black silk, as a token of mourning for their depar.

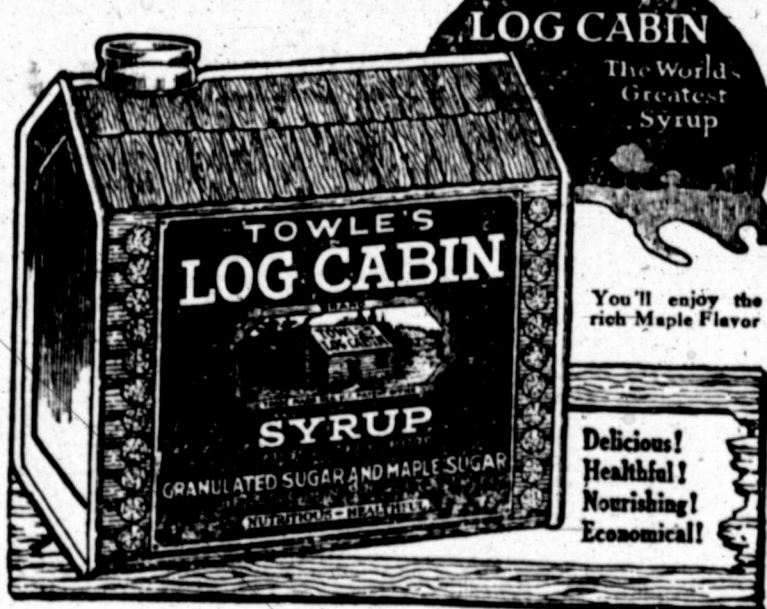

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JULIUS KAHN MOST TALKED OF MAN FOR THE WAR PORTFOLIO

CHAMBERLAIN MENTIONED ON THEORY HARDING MAY WANT A DEMOCRAT.

PERSHING AND WOOD ARE MENTIONED FOR THE PLACE

Disqualified By Some Because Of Fact That They Are Military Men.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 29.—Reporting what I said apologetically yesterday in discussing possibilities for secretary of state, namely that all of this kind of discussion is of dubious value and little value, and is only justified as a record of what is actually being done, I am glad to see that a good deal of the time of the republican leaders, let us consider the men who are mentioned for secretary of state.

The discussions and surmises on this point center chiefly about four names. General Leonard Wood, General Pershing, Congressman Julius Kahn of California, and Senator George Chamberlain of Oregon. Of these General Wood is the most obvious, he has favor of many republican leaders, and that rather important section of the party which supported him for the presidential nomination would be especially gratified at his selection. General Wood has in some degree the capacity Mr. Roosevelt had for inspiring an almost extravagant loyalty devotion among his followers and those who come in contact with him.

Has National Following. He is one of the very small number of public men who can be described as having a certain amount of national following. If cabinet appointments were to be made on the basis that they sometimes have been with the idea of cementing the loyalty of factions in the party, General Wood's selection would be one of the surest. It is true that Mr. Harding, having such a majority in the senate, would not consider the placating of factions in making his cabinet appointments, and also true that General Wood's friends do not need to base their claims for him on this factor alone. His qualifications for the office are obvious. But the same circumstances which qualify him, also in a sense disqualify him, that a man is a professional soldier in the minds of many, an objection to his choice as secretary of war. It is rather an American tradition that the army shall be under the direction of a civilian.

Deal Is Mentioned. In some of the gossip that has been published on this subject, the likelihood of General Wood being selected is put on the ground of a deal made by him, or by his leaders on his behalf, at

the Chicago convention with the victorious Harding. Considered in the light of the actual facts, this is absurd and is another example of the kind of subtle propaganda not infrequently resorted to by the forces about cabinet appointments, designed less to advance a man than to impair his chances. There may be some ground for the theory that the forces which nominated Senator Harding at Chicago have reasons for being grateful to Governor Lowden or to his leadership in the switching of delegates during the close ballots. But if it is true, Governor Lowden is the only one of the defeated candidates for the republican presidential nomination who can be said to have a claim on Harding for aid in getting the nomination. General Wood, as a matter of fact, was conspicuous in holding his delegates to the end.

Three Strength To Harding. All the republican leaders agree that after the Harding nomination was made, General Wood went out of his way to give conspicuous support to Harding and to induce his followers to do the same. The net of all this discussion of the political aspects of General Wood's relation to the office of secretary of war is that they neither qualify nor disqualify him, and the matter is left to the cabinet.

The objections made to General Wood by the republican leaders consist chiefly of doubts as to his temperamental adaptation to the teamwork that is necessary in a cabinet. General Wood's career and all the distinctions he has earned have been chiefly in situations where he had sole control and sole responsibility. This is not the case in the cabinet. In the various army posts where he achieved his honors. Some wonder is expressed whether this kind of one-man show is possibly he is not adaptable to that kind of friendly co-operation and teamwork and to the taking into account of political and personal considerations which republican leaders regard as essential in the new cabinet. It is cited as proof for his argument that General Wood is believed to be in a state of feud with some of the higher officers of the army, and the existence of this factional feeling is given as an additional reason why the selection of General Wood might be inadvisable. A cabinet should be a happy family, and the higher officers of the army notoriously do not compose a happy family.

Detachment to His Success. The truth is, these very qualities of decision and the habit of authority which make General Wood one of the outstanding personalities of contemporary American life, and cause so many to admire him devotedly, have been a detriment to his success in the field of politics. Incidentally, there is some reason for saying that the trustees of two large universities are considering whether they would enlarge General Wood as a national asset and take advantage of his capacity for inspiring young men by making him a university president.

Much that has been said about General Wood applies also to General Pershing. The traditional objection to putting an officer at the head of the war department applies to him, and also the objection that his appointment would renew or intensify feuds already existing among high army officers. Some republican leaders doubt whether General Pershing would care for the office. From youth up his experience has been that of an army officer only, with an army officer's personal authority and personal responsibility. Whether he would care

to exchange this or would, indeed, be successful in an attempt to exchange this for the greater give-and-take of a position that in all circumstances might have some political aspects, may reasonably be doubted. Any army officer, considering General Pershing's situation, would say that it would be foolish for him to exchange what he now has for a four years tenure as secretary of war, and that the thing which General Pershing might be expected most to desire would be the opportunity to continue to be in fact what he is in name, the military head of the American army.

Most Frequently Mentioned. Next to General Wood and General Pershing, the man most frequently mentioned in connection with the war department is Congressman Julius Kahn of California. The reason lies in the fact that Congressman Kahn is chairman of the house committee on military affairs and as such has a body of information and experience which is not duplicated by probably any other republican. On geographical grounds it is pointed out that the Pacific coast, which is the seat of the republican party, has proved his popularity there. In the recent election he had both the republican and democratic nominations.

On the same geographical grounds, however, it is pointed out that Congressman Nolan, also of California, is being urged as a cabinet possibility. The truth is, however, that geographical grounds do not need to have much weight either for or against any man. When a president is backed by an overwhelming majority in the senate, as in the case of Senator Harding, he does not need to consider the geographical distribution of his cabinet. The mention of Senator George

Chamberlain of Oregon rests chiefly on the theory that Senator Harding may wish to appoint at least one democrat in his cabinet. Mr. Chamberlain is the present senior senator from Oregon. He was defeated in the recent election by a bare three or four thousand votes, although Harding carried the state by an unprecedented majority.

Senator Chamberlain had tens of thousands of republican votes, and his popularity among the republican voters of Oregon is not less than the friendliness toward him by republican leaders in Washington. If the theory that Senator Harding may wish to appoint a democrat has any existence in fact, there is probably no democrat whose appointment would be more appreciable to so many republican leaders. The equipment of experience which suggests Senator Chamberlain for the particular office of secretary of war lies in the fact that he was, for the many years of democratic control in the senate, chairman of the senate committee on military affairs. Can We "See Our Breath" on a Cold Day? (Copyright, 1920, by Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.)

The phenomenon commonly referred to as "seeing one's breath" is really mis-named, inasmuch as we do not see all our breath, but merely the moisture in it.

On a warm, dry day this moisture is taken up by the air, and mixes with the surrounding atmosphere without any apparent change. In cold weather, however, it condenses like a cloud, and is visible to the eye precisely as the clouds are visible. It sometimes happens that on a damp, foggy day in summer we can also "see our breath," though the temperature is not nearly cold enough to appear to warrant it. Here, however, it is not a question of cold as much as of the fact that the air contains a large quantity of moisture, and the additional appreciable time before being absorbed or blown away.

Water-vapor hangs suspended for an instant in the air, and the condensation of moisture is apparent at all times when we breathe on a mirror. The surface of the glass holds the vapor, and the cloudy appearance persists until the moisture has had an opportunity to evaporate.

City Record Shows Public Has Behaved Better Past Month

The public has behaved itself better during the month of November than it did during October. At least that is the impression given by an examination of the police court records that are now being closed for the month.

At the close of Tuesday's session of court a total of \$4,350 had been collected in fines, while an amount in excess of \$5,000 was received during the month of October. Today's fines and bonds are still to be added to the month's report, but unless something decidedly unusual takes place the total will not be increased to much over \$4,500.

The police blotter shows that up until 5 o'clock Tuesday morning 528 arrests had been made during the month, or an average of more than 17 per day. October's records showed over 600 cases listed on the docket.

By far the larger majority of arrests were for violations of the traffic ordinances, speeding, wrong parking, driving without license plates or state seals. "Vags" and cases booked for investigation took second rank, while plain drunks, gaming and affrays brought up the rear.

RAT MENACE BECOMES A SERIOUS PROBLEM

Exterminating Campaign Is To Be Launched In The City At An Early Date.

Tail rats, small rats, fat rats, lean rats, big rats and little rats are multiplying west in the city. Complaints have been made by a number of residents to the state board of health and to Dr. A. W. West, all-time county health officer.

A rat exterminating campaign is to be launched in this city for this purpose the all-time county health officer is asking every household and property owner in the city to enlist and begin war on the pest that is wreaking damage everywhere.

Dr. West has made a survey of the city relative to this vermin, and he finds that reports that have reached him have not been exaggerated in the least. In one section of the city he found these rats in control of everything.

The county health officer happened to be present while a back yard cleaning campaign was being conducted by one property owner. Old rubbish, tin cans and boxes and wood were being removed. At all times there was a horrid stench here and there by the rats. A small trench in the back yard served to be the death cell for five large, immense rats.

Dr. West will appear before the city council at its next meeting, he states, and will ask that an ordinance be enacted or a clause inserted in the building code wherein it will be asked that all future buildings be constructed of rat proof material. In asking the general public to as-

sist in cleaning and ridding the city of rats the following methods are suggested:

Methods Suggested. Spring traps are very effective. The best bait is bread soaked in bacon grease carefully laid on the trap and the trap placed within two feet of the hole. The human scent should be removed from the trap by flaming the trap.

The poison method is effective, but is very unsanitary and dangerous and is therefore not recommended. For the lovers of sport, the shooting route is very effective, but of course all due care must be exercised.

All breeding places should be broken up. Wood that is piled in the back yards should be elevated from the ground at least eighteen inches and all rubbish removed. In buildings where wooden floors lay on the ground, the floors should be torn up. All food supply for the rats should be removed. This includes garbage, and people should exercise all care in the disposition of garbage.

It is a safe method to follow in cases where rats have been killed, to dip them in kerosene. Careful disposition of the bodies of the dead rats should be made.

All safeguards against the bubonic plague should be invoked as the last report from Galveston is to the effect that the eighteenth person has just succumbed to this dreaded disease, which is known to be distributed by rats.

A rat campaign was conducted in many cities of the state and Houston reports that officially 15,027 rats were killed during their campaign there.

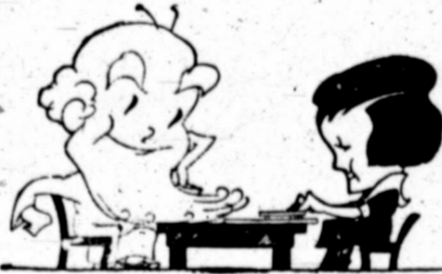

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COUNTRY WHERE LAW HAS BEEN ADJOURNED

Such is Description of Russia Given By American On Return From That Country.

MANHATTAN, KAN., Nov. 29.—A somewhat different picture of the Russian bolshevik from that set forth in popular cartoons and literature of the western world, is drawn by Dr. R. K. Nabours, head of the Kansas State Agricultural College, who has just returned to America from a year's trip to territory under bolshevik rule. Doctor Nabours headed a mission looking toward the establishment of a trade route from Russia to the United States. He was in the employ of a fur company which was interested in obtaining skins of the Karakul lamb. The Karakul are grown principally in Bokhara, Central Asia, formerly a principality of Russia now under bolshevik authority. During the war this trade was suspended, but through the efforts of Dr. Nabours's mission, a trade route has been reopened and commerce resumed between Bokhara and the western world.

ELECTRA FIELD HAS THE BEST PRODUCER REPORTED RECENTLY

One of the best producers reported from the Electra field in several weeks was brought in by the Gladiolus Oil Company last week at the No. 10 Burnett.
