#### **GOVERNMENT WINS VICTORY** IN LEHIGH VALLEY RAILROAD CASE ALLEGING COAL TRUST

The decision was a complete victory for the federal government, the court holding that the combination had resulted in a restraint of interstate commerce and violation of the commodities clause of the anti-trust statutes. The case was one of the famous authracite coal suits, the other against the Reading railroad combine being decided favorable to the government. The Lanigh valley combine was alleged to control the anthracite coal supply of the middle Pennsylvania or Lehigh field.

Business is the lifeblood of the nation and the greatest factor in prosperity and civiliza-tion-but business is being taxed to death on the theory that the present cost of the late war. I do not regard that as fair or proper. The war was fought for posterity as well as for ourselves, and posterity must help pay the cost. It is best that future generaone should carry some of the bur-en so that they will gealize what the ten and women of this day and age

hree hundreds of millions of obliations coming due in the next few ears should be refunded with long years should be refunded with long term bonds bearing a commensurate rate of interest. An immediate effect would he restoration of liberty bonds to their par value. It is a grying shame that the millions of patriots who bought Liberty Bonds should suffer the loss occasioned by their present status. Under no circumstances should the tax simply be levied on gross sales and collected out of gross revenues, for that method would tend to wipe out business, like the packing industry, which are conducted on such narrow margins that even a one per cent tax on gross sales would make maintenance and adequate expansion practically impossible unless the tax is collected as a separate expansion practically impossible un-less the tax is collected as a separate entity after the manner of the amuse-

ment tax. 'The government during the war be-came largely bureaucratic and exper-ience has demonstrated its inefficiency dence has demonstrated its inefficiency and unsuitableness in times of peace. There must be no continuance of bureauracy; it makes business baiting possible; it hinders rather than helps. What business needs is a freedom from harassment and uncertainty. The test of any proposed law should be; Willit make business better able to serve the public; does it hold forth something?

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Drunken-ness continued to be the principal cause for trial of enlisted men of the navy for desertion or overstaying navy for desertion or overstaying leave during the past fiscal year, ac-cording to the annual report of Rear Admiral George R. Clark, judge advo-cate general, to Secretary Daniels to-day. Of 1,725 such cases during the day. year, pleas of drunkenness were en-tered in 384, says the report. More than 41,000 cases were tried by court-martial during the year.

Dec. 5—Bills providing a duty on wheat and flour imports and regulating grain exchanges have been framed by Representative Steenerson of Minnesots, who expected to introduce both measures today in addition to his resolution authorising the federal trade commission to investigation wheat in the American grain markets. Duties of thirty cants per bushel on wheat, \$1.25 per barrel on flour, and thirty per cent ad valorem on semolin and other wheat products are provided for in one of Mr. Steenerson's bills. One of the causes of the slump of wheat prices, he declared today, was the dumping on United States markets of millions of bushels of wheat and several million barrets of flour from Canada free of duty.

Every bank in Wichita Fails today piedged three per cent of its capital loward the organization of a 36,000,000 anking corporation to extend credit to European mills and manufacturing industries—and thereby create a oreign market for the products of the south. Action on the matter followed a luncheon at the Wichita club given

a luncheon at the Wichita club given by the local clearing house association to Fort Worth bankers and a score or more representatives of country banks in this territory.

Many of the country bankers present promptly pledged their institutions to support the movement, while others gave their personal endorsement to the plan and promised to lay it immediately before their stockholders and boards. Jake L. Hamon, widow of the late oil magante, and her two children, left here today ostensibly for Ranger,

The meeting in this city was called for general discussion of the Federal International Banking company, now the co-operation of the bankers of twelve southern states, and under the provisions of the Edge export finance act. The plan, which it is believed, will be of tremendous assistance to the wheat, cotton and rice growers of the south, was explained to the local bankers and their guests by T. J. Caldwell, vice-bresident of the Fort Worth National Bank.

Plan It Outlined.

"Several weeks ago a group of bank-ers in meeting in New Orleans de-termined to create this organization," he said, "under a minimum capitaliza-tion of \$5,006,000, with no definite stock quota to be assigned to each southern tate. It is aimed strictly as a finance corporation, with its main function the financing of exports—and I believe it important that the bankers of Texas subscribe sufficient to give us a strong word in the corporation's management

and policies.

"Under the Edge amendment, federal corporations of not less than \$2,000,000 capital may be organized to extend credit in connection with imports and exports in an amount not to exceed ten times their capital and surplus.

At the same time the European party will draw is draft upon the banking corporation for the proper amount. The corporation will secept this draft and turn it over to the European party for the sale of will sell it for him as the case may be. The proceeds from the sale of the acceptance will be used in liquidating the draft of the Texas exporter. In this way the European mill has been enabled to buy the cotton and the Texas man has received cash for his product.

"The character of paper thus created will be subject to purchase by the federal reserve banks, and it is reasonable to suppose that at times when the investment market will not absorb this paper, the federal reserve banks will absorb a very great part of it.



A fresh hen's egg consists of a mass of yolk together with a quantity, of albumen, or what we call the "write" of the egg. This combination being heavier than water, the egg will sink beneath the surface as long as it is fresh. When an egg becomes addled or rotten, however, the yolk and white have split up into other substances—have taken the first radical step toward the formation of a chicken. In the course of this change they have given off a quantity of gas, which makes the egg considerably lighter than before. This alteration in specific gravity renders the egg lighter than the amount of water which it displaces, and the "bad" egg will therefore float while the "good" one will sink.

C., Dec. 6 .- In the discussions that will shortly begin at Marion, Ohio, between Senator Harding and the leaders of political thought summoned there to take counsel with the president-elect on the domestic and foreign policies facing the next national administration, the tariff, of course, will be very much to

the front.
On this subject the majority of the republican leaders take the old fashoned party view. They want a high sariff, and they want it very high and very quick; there is even talk of an embargo on some farm products like wheat and wool.

There can be no question that the opinion among the republican leaders is in favor of high tariff. But there a smaller number of republican haders—and they are the more studi-ous ones—who believe that the re-sults of the war have put the United States into a different relation to the world. They question whether a tar-iff policy was adapted to conditions preceding 1914 is possible or desira-

But the example is far from being a healthy influence. There are many wealthy men now who can take little interest in a game unless they have from \$1,000 to \$10,000 up on the outcome. When only big stakes bring a thrill you stumble upon one of the most unhealthy conditions that sport can know.

Only to a slight degree. The big part of football, even as the game is now, is a matter of tackling, blocking, interfering, kicking and receiving kicks. The forward pass is only one element in the attack—an important element, but not nearly the entire show.

It is a needed element for any modern attack where one of its main uses is in the nature of a threat to scatter the defense and give the running game a chance. A running game that has no forward pass threat to speak of has little chance of making any hadway.

Yet Centre College, with a weak line and only two backfield stars, made 170 yards and two touchdowns against Harvard without losing the ball. The plan to have a blocked forward pass back of the scrimmage line treated as a blocked punt may work out very well. It is, at least, worth a trial. But to have the pass cut down to any extent where it is no longer any dangerous threat means far less scoring and very little advancing between two fairly well matched teams.

One main trouble with the forward pass is that only a comparative few have acquired the knack of throwing and catching a football with any sure skill or any certain confidence. The fault hasn't been with the play itself but with the players.


