The Nobel peace prize carries with it a grant of about \$40,000, which is one-fifth of the annual interest on about \$9,000,000 left for that purpose by Alfred B. Nobel, the Swedish scientist and the inventor of dynamite, who died in 1896. The only two Americans who have in the past received the Nobel peace prise were Theodore Roosevelt in 1906, and Elihu Root in 1812.

In closing his message to congress today the president wrote a paragraph which might be regarded as a valedictory saying:

"I have not so much laid before you a series of recommendations as sought to atter a confession of faith, of the faith to stand by until my lasting fighting day. I believe this to be the faith of America, the faith of the future, and of all the victories which await national action in the days to come, whether in America or elsewhere."

Thompson, former president of the New Orleans cotton exchange in an address today before the cotton conference here, called to inaugurate a campaign for a material inaugurate a campaign for a material cotton acreage reduction and crop div-ersification during the coming planting

"The south is determined to reduce the cotton acreage in 1921 to at least one-half of that of last year," Colonel Thompson said. "That will mean that the coming crop will be reduced to aix million bales or less. The convention here is called for the purpose of solidifying this determination and serving notice on the world that the cotton producing south will no longer permit its chief agricultural asset to be also ughtered and its producers impover-

here is called for the purpose of solidifying this determination and serving notice on the world that the cotton producing south will no longer permit its chief agricultural asset to be alaughtered and its producers impoverished by any combination of circumstances or interests whatsoever."

After outlining the course of the market in recent months. Colonel Thompson declared the reduction movement was made necessary by "the appalling decline in prices, due, we are told by apologists for the ruthless deliation emmpaign to over-production.

"In spite of the fact that in the ipring the farmers were urged and encouraged by financial authorities at Washington to produce all the cotton possible," Colonel Thompson continued, "we are after the prices has declined to be contract for paving 15 blocks in the city, as per specifications submits the byte by the city.

PERMIT A LIBERAL CREDIT TO FARMERS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 .- Immediate onsideration by the senate farmer relef legislation was considered probable oday with the report of a joint resoluion by the agricultural committee reviving the war finance corporation and directing the federal reserve board to permit extension of "liberat" credits to farmers. Senator Grouns, chairman of the committee, announced he would urge immediate action on the resolution and members of the committee ex-pressed confidence that sufficient votes

were in sight to insure its adoption.

The war finance corporation, which
the resolution would revive with a view to securing greater sales of surplus farm products abroad, had made total advances of \$253,061,404 up to May 10 last, when its loan activities were suspended by the secretary, according to the annual report of the corporation made public today. Repayments of \$235,334,580 up to November 30, had left a balance outstanding of \$117,726,824, the report showed.

the report showed.

During the past year advances made by the corporation have been principally to aid in financing exports. It was said, the total of such loans amounting to \$45,347,654, of which \$4,324,012 has been repaid, leaving outstanding a balance of \$42,023,641. Sumarizing its export advances the corporation showed that \$12,229,000 was loaned to send flour, grain and foodstuffs to Belgium. During the past year the report declared the corporation had made every effort to liquidate its outstanding cattle loans without entailing unfue hardtle loans without entailing unflue hard-ship upon borrowers. At the beginning of the year, the amount of these loans

loans was \$7,827,278.





New York Dec. 7.—The recovery of about 2 cents a pound from recent lower cords was followed by moderate reactions in the cotton market during today's early trading. The cables were lower than due with trade advices attributing the decline to Manchester selling and a smail offtake and the market here opened unchanged to 20 points lower. There was not much southern selling and there were slight rallies right after the call but prices soon eased again, under continued realizing and Liverpool selling. January declined to 16.94 and March to 16.15, or about 20 or 25 points net lower.

The early decline was checked by reports of a steadier spot situation in the south and an improved inquiry from Liverpool. and the southwest. Prices rallied from 16.14 to 16.22 for March on covering but otherwise there was very little demand with the market becoming very quiet of the advance and later on turning assier under renewed liquidation. January sold off to 16.19 and March to 16.16 early in the non-hour, or 24 to 25 points net lower.

Weakness of foreign exchange and less favorable Wall street reports had an unsettling effect on cotton. Trading was quiet during the middle of the afternoon but prices were barely steady around 18.39, for January and 16.55—16.65—18.69.
