MACHINERY PUT IN MOTION FOR USE WHEN OCCASION DEMANDS.

COMMITTEE OF EIGHT TO STUDY THE SUBJECT

Will Report To Secretary General Charged With The Duty Of Advising Council.

GENEVA, Dec. 10,-Machinery putting the economic blockade into effect, when occasion should call for such action, was discussed by the assembly of the League of Nations at this morning's session.

FORT WORTH, TEXAS, Dec. 10.—
Reports that Clara Smith Hamon, wanted on a charge of murder in connection with the shooting of Jakes L. Hamon, Oklahoma millionaire, would arrive either in Fort Worth or Ardmore and aurrender today grew more insistent early today.

The reports were based on activities and conferences declared to have been had between the Fort Worth law firm of McLean, Scott and McLean, and Coakley and Mathers, lawyers of Ardmore. The proposed machinery consists of an international blockade committee of eight members appointed by the council of the league to study the subject and report to the secretary-general whom the league has charged with the duty of informing the council of facts which appear to show the

cil of facts which appear to show the covenant has been broken. On receipt of such information, according to the proposed plan, the council must meet to consider the situation and inform all the members of the

Duty is involved.

These members, says the committee report embodying the plan, shall be in report embodying the plan, shall be in duly bound to take measures to carry out the provisions of article XVI of the covenant, comprising the breaking off of all diplomatic relations except such as exist for purely humanitarial purposes. Where the covenant breaker has a malicard the council should forthwith consider, says the report, which members can conveniently be charged with the duty of carrying out the marine blockade.

SANTA ROSA, CAL., Dec. 10-George BOYS, Terence Fitts and Charles Valento, accused of having murdered MISS MACSWINE Sheriff James A. Petray of Sonoma county, and Detectives Miles Jackson and Lester M. Dorman here Sunday afternoon, last, were taken from the county jail here early this morning and hanged. Bralley is seriously considering a change in the present plans being used with the local motorcycle squad and expects to local motorcycle squad and expects to relieve the city of considerable expense in the future. The new plans, if put in effect, will compel the motor cops to pay for the upkeep and operation of their own machines, an item which mounts into large figures cach month. Mr. Bralley pointed out that the expense of the motorcycles in this city was exceptionally great, mainly because the officers who used them were not required to pay any costs, and consequently were inclined to be reckless and negligent. At the present time all gasoline and oil used is paid for by the gaseline and oil used is paid for by the city and any repairs on the motorcycles are also taken care of by the police

In practically every other commu-nity in the country, where wages paid are not as high as in this city, motor-cycle officers are required to furnish their own machines and pay for their upkeep and operation. In Wichita Falls, however, the city not only meets all expenses incurred by the use of the machines, but furnishes the mounts themselves.

In the past a few motor cops have been employed who, knowing that they would be caused no personal expense. have not been as careful in their operation, as was possible.
