Elevator Blast Kills Lazbuddie Man

This past week we received an article in our mail which is encouraging, to say the least.

It's about one of our minority groups which is doing something constructive in order to improve their situation.

The Alabama and Coushatta Indian tribesmen near Livingston will operate a summer tourist center on their reservation, with a program which runs until Labor Day.

Guests of the reservation, located 17 miles east of Livingston on U.S. Highway 190, will also be able to enjoy the Big Thicket tour into the deep forest over a new trail in specially-built vehicles.

On a "historical tour," new agriculture artifacts have been set up, and the Red Indian Chief Railroad Line will pass along the new animal kingdom where the buffalo and Texas Longhorns may be viewed.

Assistant Superintendent Roland Poncho has charge of the Living Indian Village, where craftsmen of the tribes will demonstrate their art in basketry, bead work, cooking, weaving sashes, arms work, pottery and costume making for the dancers.

In the Tribal Dance Square, Jack Battise will be chanting the Southwestern Indian songs and beating the drum for the "Na Ski La Dancers" as braves perform their dances in full plumed costumes and the squaws in buckskin dresses.

A new camping facility, some 2.6 miles from the main entrance, offers trailer and tent campers a new facility for camping, fishing and swimming.

The tribe has asked legislators for \$288,000 in funds for 1970, so that the tourist complex can be enlarged to accommodate up to half a million people per year.

The attraction, which ultimately will be self-supporting, is expected to create 30 full-time and 100 part-time jobs for members of the tribes, and generate a gross annual revenue of almost \$1 million after it is completed in 1974.

The project attracted 116,000 visitors last year, and raised the tribes' annual family incomes from \$1500 to \$3200.

The other day we saw the movie "Finnian's Rainbow." It was our first time to see this musical comedy either in stage or movie form, although we've been familiar with its music for many years.

Two of the production numbers seemed to make a striking parallel with our present "Great Society" programs, even though the story and numbers were written several years ago.

The numbers we're referring to are entitled "When the Idle Poor Become the Idle Rich," and "On That Great Come and Get It Day."

Three Persons Are Hospitalized

Three persons were injured in a two-car accident near Friona Monday.

Mrs. Jerry Powell, and her husband's grandmother, Mrs. Margaret Powell, both of Grady, N.M., were injured when their car collided with one driven by Leroy Nuttall.

Nuttall's injuries were more serious, and he was transferred to Lubbock.

The Powell women were reported in good condition.

Mrs. John Gaede was said to be in satisfactory condition on Wednesday in Deaf Smith County Hospital, after a gunshot wound on Monday.

Cloys Wayne Stanberry, 31, was killed, and two others injured in an explosion which rocked the Sherley Anderson Grain Company at Lazbuddie last Friday.

Stanberry was buried about 20 feet of grain and debris by the blast, and was not uncovered by rescue workers for five hours following the accident.

Ascension Borjas, 50, suffered a fractured leg, and Jesse Martinez, 41, had first and second degree burns in the accident.

Investigating officers said that the explosion was apparently touched off when Stanberry flipped a switch in the boot pit of the elevator. The air was filled with highly combustible grain dust, and a spark

from the switch may have caused the explosion.

The explosion blasted a 10x12 hole in the east end of the 300-foot elevator. Concrete slabs were scattered for 75 yards or more from the elevator, and tore gaping holes in a concrete block fence at the home of Joe Moore, some 60 yards from the elevator.

The debris also pierced the house, although no one was injured there.

Fire trucks and ambulances were summoned to the southeast Farmer County community from both Friona and Muleshoe. Both Borjas and Martinez were taken to a Muleshoe hospital. Borjas was transferred to Lubbock for surgery.

In addition, a Department of Public Safety helicopter from Lubbock was dispatched to the scene, and another from Cannon AFB near Clovis, in case they were needed in fighting the fire.

Some 50 rescue workers from the area spent hours shoveling away grain and debris in the search for Stanberry.

Mrs. Stanberry is the former Carolyn Stowers. Other survivors included two daughters, Deborah and Kay; two sons, Terry and Robbie; four brothers, Buford, Harold, Dean and Danny, all of Bovina, a sister, Brenda, Bovina; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thogal Stanberry of Bovina, and a grandfather, W.A. McCormick, Bovina.

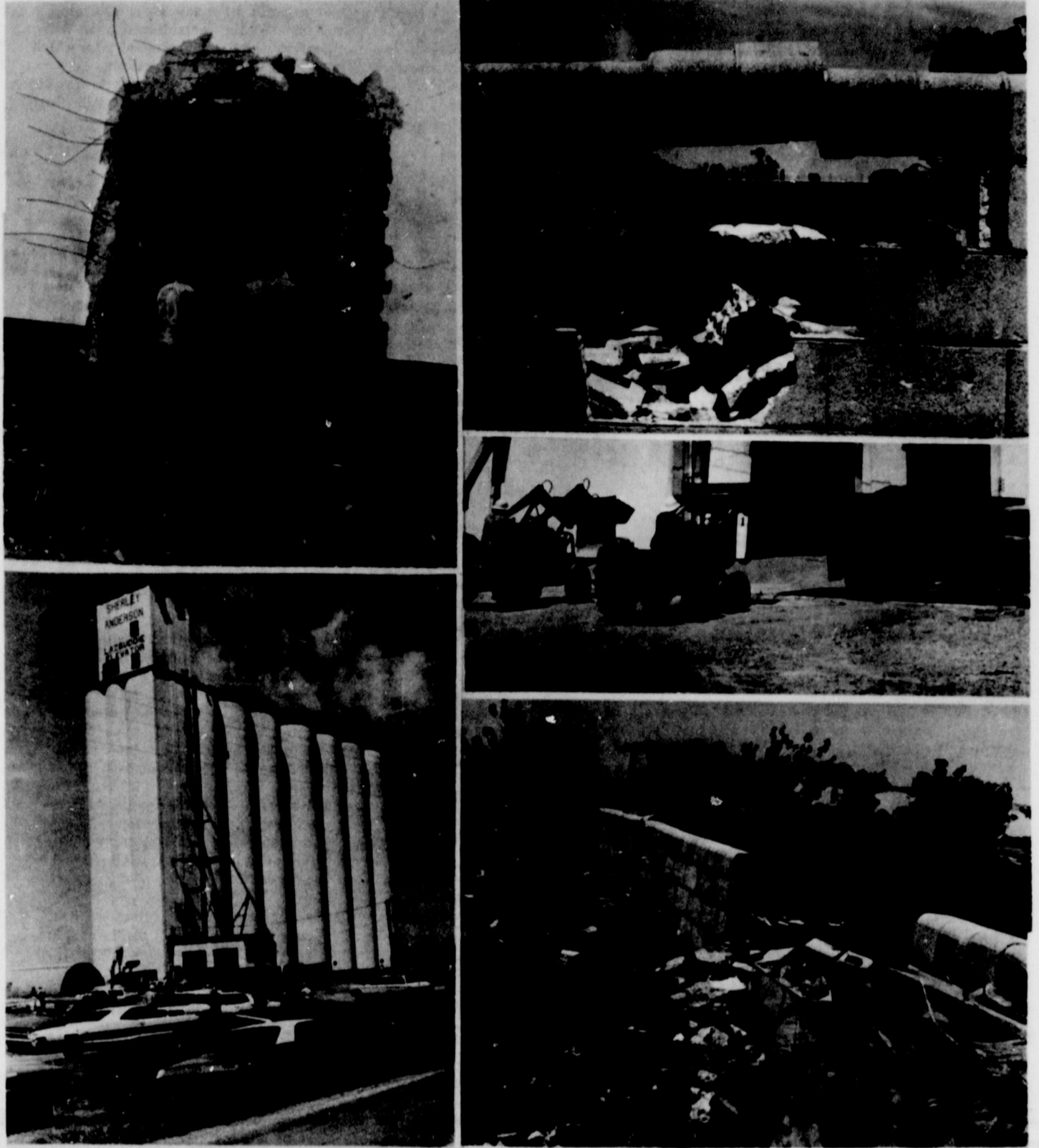

BY CITY COUNCIL

Library To Expand; Civic Center Eyed

A proposal for increasing city revenue by way of an increase in the water rate was one of the main items of interest at the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council last Thursday.

(See detailed discussion of this item in a separate article on this page.)

Also discussed was the housing arrangements for the Friona Public Library, and a proposed civic center for Friona.

The proposal for expanding the library's space was discussed at some length. Aldermen finally voted to expand into the east half of the bottom floor of the American Legion Hall, and to do the improvements necessary, at a rental fee of \$1200 per year.

The city preferred a one-year contract, especially in light of the possibility of building a civic center which might include facilities for the public library.

Such contingencies also caused the aldermen to decide against renting or buying the Congregational Church property as a library and museum. Mayor W.L. Edelman discussed the fact that a civic center is under consideration by the Friona Industrial Committee, which has mentioned a building complex in the neighborhood of \$100,000, thinking the city could raise half of the money, and the committee could raise the other half.

The aldermen seemed to think that a bond issue should be considered for the civic center, and that the matter should be publicized, with committees to study the proposition and devise the plan and later obtain

the services of an architect.

In other business, the council approved repayment of a water main contract with Rushing & Reeve in the amount of \$4,607.98 for the development of block 1, Western Addition. The

payment was due in that the block is now 75 per cent developed.

Ordinance 423, declaring the results of the public hearing on paving leave-out assessments was read. Noting that

TO BOOST REVENUE

Council Gives Water Increase Proposal

The Friona City Council, which has been debating the need for increased city revenue for some time, authorized the city manager and city attorney to draw up a proposed new ordinance which would raise city water rates.

The proposed increase would place the basic minimum charge at \$3.50 per 2,000 gallons used, as opposed to the charge of \$3.00 for the same amount at present. Previously, however, the minimum charge was for 1,000 gallons, at \$2.75. Average usage per household is around 17,000 gallons per month.

The charge per thousand gallons above the base rate would be increased from 20 cents to 25 cents per thousand gallons.

In addition, a water tap fee of \$80.00 per standard tap would be charged, with actual costs for oversized taps. The city office would require a \$20.00 deposit on all rental customers, with no deposit on home owners.

Lastly, the water rate for customers outside the city limits would be increased to double the rate for those inside the city. This rate is presently 50 per cent above the regular rate.

The increase in charges for water service was arrived at by the council after noting that such an increase would be more uniform in distributing the cost to all citizens, as compared to an increase in property taxes, which would only affect property owners.

The proposed ordinance will be presented to the council at its July meeting.

no citizens were present for the hearing, a motion was passed that the ordinance be adopted.

A request and petition for a street light at the corner of Third and Prospect Streets was presented, with three property owners' signatures. The request was granted.

The financial statement for the eighth month of the city's fiscal year was presented and approved.

Miscellaneous business included the future disposition and operation of the swimming pool, and the possible use of the present Friona State Bank building as a city facility after the bank builds its new building.

Speaking of Flag Day, I am reminded of one of the many interesting tales related to me by Mr. Oscar Lange, (by the way - Monday June 2nd was the 50th anniversary of his arrival in Friona!)

It seems that young Mr. Lange had a good friend in one R.S. Houlette, (Dale's grandfather) a Civil War veteran and staunch patriot.

Early in 1921 these two worthies became distressed at the absence of a flag pole in the up and coming city of Friona. Being men of action as well as imagination they decided to erect a standard upon which Old Glory could be flown to announce to one and all that patriotism was indeed keeping pace with colonization.

The question arose as to the best location and with true Texan forthrightness the center of the intersection at Main and Sixth Streets was chosen.

At this conspicuous and strategic location they dug a hole in the dirt street and therein implanted a flag pole.

And here it proudly bore our flag until the early thirties when progress (?) in the guise of the W.P.A. decreed that it must be removed in order to spread caliche rock in the roadway.

Today our city's business is graced with numerous flag poles; however, the residential areas are sadly lacking in this respect. This does not mean that we are really unpatriotic - just unthinking or too busy.

A case in point - for several days posters bearing quotations from famous statesmen have been in evidence all over the downtown area.

The American Legion Auxiliary, who is responsible for their placement, hopes that the citizens have not been "too busy" to stop and read the vital messages.

If we Americans don't start putting "first things first" we are likely to wake up some day and find that we have in reality been "too busy" doing everything except taking steps to preserve our priceless heritage of freedom.

STEAM FLAKE VS. MICRO-NIZED GRAIN SORGHUM

Recently a feedlot evaluation of steam flaked and micronized grain sorghum was conducted at the Lubbock Feedlot. Dr. Lowell Schake, area extension livestock specialist from Lubbock, assisted in coordinating and conducting this test.

The following information was supplied by Dr. Schake in a preliminary report on the feeding test.

INTRODUCTION
Micronized grain sorghum has evolved through the combined efforts of Mr. Charde Pierce of Lubbock and research previously reported. Originally, popping of the grain was thought to be essential to increase nutrient availability and was accomplished by dry heat produced by gas fired infrared burners. Data derived from feeding and digestion trials indicated that popping was not essential. These data suggested that dry heat treatment reducing the grain to about 7 percent moisture followed by rolling may produce a feed grain with certain unique feeding qualities. The term micronization was coined to describe this heat treatment since microwaves were emitted from the burners used during processing.

PROCEDURE
Four hundred uniform Hereford steers were made available for this study by the Lubbock Feedlot. Steers were randomly placed in 1 of 4 lots of 100 head each. Two hundred head of these steers received the steam flake grain and the other two hundred head received

the micronized grain. One replicate (or 100 steers) on each of the processed grains was treated with anthelmintic drugs.

Total weight of each replicate of steers was taken on December 2 and at 50-day intervals thereafter. Grain and ration samples were taken on a weekly interval. Steers averaged 150 pounds before shipped for slaughter. Detailed carcass data was acquired from a random sample of approximately 35 carcasses from each replicate.

SUMMARY
Feedlot performance of steers fed rations containing micronized grain rations gained 0.12 lb. more per day than steers fed rations containing steam flaked grain. Conversely, pounds of ration required per pound of live animal gain was 0.20 lb. less for steers fed steam flaked grain rations compared to steers fed micronized grain rations. These data are consistent with field observations comparing steam flaked and popped grain rations.

Carcass characteristics tend to be rather uniform except for several minor advantages for carcasses resulting from steers fed micronized grain rations. Most of these differences appear in accordance with observed differences in feedlot performance of the steers.

Results of this field trial indicate that both of these processed grains produced carcasses with near equal value with slightly improved feedlot performance of steers fed the micronized grain rations. Most of the improvement in feedlot performance occurred early in the feeding period.

The damp weather we have been having may cause some problems with mildew. Here are some suggestions for removing the spots from clothing. If the clothes are dry, brush off the surface growth of mildew. A stain may remain on

the clothing. If this happens, laundry the washable clothes at once. It is also important to rinse the clothing well and dry in the sun. Sometimes stains will remain after washing. If this happens, dip white cotton, rayon or linen in a diluted solution of chlorine bleach. Then rinse the garments thoroughly and dry in the sun. Before using the diluted bleach solution on colored fabrics, it is a good idea to test it on a sample of the cloth.

City Has 11 New Water Connections In Month

Eleven new water services were added by the City of Friona during the month of May, bringing the total number of active services to 1163 as of the last of May.

The increased services represented nine new water taps and two reactivations, according to the monthly report compiled by City Manager Jake Outland.

Records also showed that 19,274,200 gallons of water were pumped during the month. This

is an average of 621,748 gallons per day, an increase from the previous month. However, water usage was no doubt lowered by rainfall during the month, which amounted to 4.71 inches.

There were ten new sewer taps installed during May, to bring the number of active taps to 117 as of May 31. A total of 1740 feet of sewer mains were serviced during the month.

There were 16 changes of ownership involving city property, as reported by the county clerk's office during the month.

A total of 161 delinquent tax notices were mailed on May 20. A few responses had been noted by the first of June.

Only two fire alarms were sounded during May. One was an automobile at Highways 60 and 214. The other was an air conditioner at the Wayne H. Stark residence, which was brought under control after the alarm was turned in.

The police department reported 27 arrests. Twenty-two were for traffic violations; two for drunkenness, two for drinking in public and one for shoplifting.

Seven complaints were investigated. Two each were for theft, break-ins and vandalism, with one attempted break-in. Norman Mohr was employed as caretaker for the cemetery during the summer, beginning work on May 16.

The City Street Department spent several days on street and alley maintenance during the month, following rains early in the month. Two days were spent spreading gravel as some streets began to "bleed" with the onset of hot weather.

Principal business at the regular meeting of the library board on May 21 was planning for the summer reading program, which began June 2.

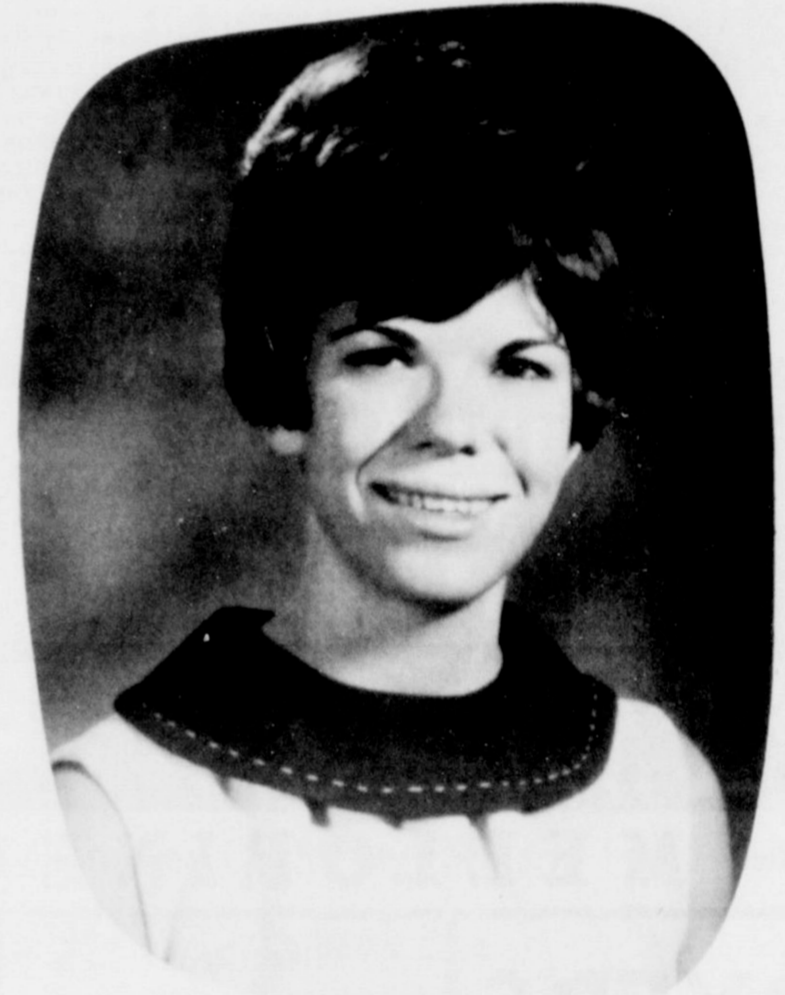
