



### CROWDS GATHER FOR START OF SEAPLANES

Three Thousand Mile Flight to Panama Begins From San Diego, California.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., Dec. 30.—Crowds gathered early on the hills of Point Loma today to watch the start of the navy's 3,000-mile seaplane flight to Panama. Across the "silver gate," the entrance to San Diego bay, on the skidways and in the water at North Island, could be seen a line of big seaplanes ready for the flight.

The ships, fourteen in all, with a personnel of 70 officers and men, were the largest number of aircraft ever gathered on the Pacific coast for such a long flight.

The first ship carried the pennant of the fleet commander, Captain Henry C. Mastin. It was one of the dozen seaplanes in the expedition and was under command of Lieutenant L. D. Spaulding.

The planes of this type were not used before. The triple-motored NC type being faster and therefore held back. The orders called for the fleet to pass out of the harbor, literally under the eyes of the watchers on Point Loma, in battle formation, and then swing to the left for its cruise southward.

Veteran Air Navigator. Captain Mastin is a veteran air navigator and has spent months of his life studying on problems incident to the Panama flight.

He declared the greatest difficulty would be finding suitable anchorage grounds for the seaplanes in unfamiliar west Mexican bays and harbors. The question of fueling also was an important one, he said.

Uncharted air lanes, treacherous air currents are other conditions the flyers will face. Optimism for a successful trip was expressed by the officers and men.

The seaplanes sent hourly wireless reports telling of their progress to the aircraft Arctostok, off Cedros Island, 250 miles south of San Diego. All carried star shells for night signaling, but no night flights are planned. Each has a two weeks supply of water and food.

### LACK OF STORAGE CAPACITY IS CAUSE OF RUN CUTS

The Constance Refining Company in leaving their order under date of December 23, and which took effect on December 27 wherein producers were cut on their daily crude runs to 50 per cent of the production of their wells, was prompted by the congested state of their pipe lines and tank storage capacity.

The company's pipe-lines from Burk Burnett townships, Texhoma and Northwest Extension fields has been in excess of 11,000 barrels per day for the last two months and with but a 6,000 barrel daily crude running capacity at this time, pending the full completion of their plant at Devol, an accumulation of crude has resulted that has caused the present congested state of their transporting and storage facilities.

Negotiations are now under way to provide additional storage for the crude surplus now accumulating over the amount of the present capacity of their plant which if secured will allow same to be stored temporarily for the advantage of the producer.

**ENGINEER ON STEAMER ROBERT E. LEE IS DEAD**

LOUISVILLE, KY., Dec. 30.—John West, 31 years old, who was second engineer on the steamer Robert E. Lee when she was from the steamer National in the famous race from New Orleans to St. Louis on the Mississippi river in 1870, died here last night.

West's work in repairing a broken water pipe and stopping a leak in the boilers during the race was said to have made victory possible for the Robert E. Lee. He was the last surviving participant in the race. For forty-four years he was chief engineer at the Louisville water company's pumping station.
