JEFFERSON CITY, MO., March 1.—Four armed men early today robbed George Williams, 36 years old, a post-office messenger, of three pouches of registered mail.

The handbag waylaid Williams at 2 a. m. abducted him and carried him in an automobile to a point near New Bloomfield, 15 miles north of here, where they handcuffed him to a tree.

JEFFERSON CITY, MO., March 1.—The three registered mail sacks taken by bandits from George Williams, mail carrier, here early today, may have contained from \$15,000 to \$20,000 in state securities, state officials here today said.

Such securities have been sent here in amounts ranging upwards from \$50,000 each day for the last week or so, these officials said.

The money is sent in form of government securities, state officials explained, from banks that have been chartered by the state's legislature, now amounting to more than 100.

EARLY WITHDRAWAL OF AMERICAN TROOPS ON RHINE PROBABLE

CRITICAL STATE OF EUROPEAN AFFAIRS CAUSES WASHINGTON TO MAKE PLANS.

REPUBLICANS TO ACT AS SOON AS THEY GET IN

Threat of Allies To Occupy German Territory Hastens Move For Separate Peace.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—With French troops and guns moving toward the German border, American troops on the Rhine are to be withdrawn very soon after the new administration takes office.

Harding's plans have already been announced. It was stated authoritatively today that developments now apparent will not change them.

Among officials here today there was greater interest in the League of Nations reply to the note on the Yap and Mesopotamian mandates than in the reparations conference, although it was agreed that the German proposals were too low and the allies too high.

HARDING NOW BACK IN OLD HOME TOWN FOR FAREWELL VISIT

MARION, OHIO, March 1.—President-elect and Mrs. Warren G. Harding were back in the old home town today to spend a few hours before starting to Washington.

The president-elect's train arrived shortly after four o'clock this morning and was parked in the yards until the party was ready to get up.

PARIS, March 1.—The council of the League of Nations in its reply to the American note on the mandates question invites the United States to send a representative to the next meeting of the council, to be held in April.

Concerning the island of Yap, the reply says the council was obliged to accept the decision of the supreme council. It indicates, however, that the whole question may be reopened if the Washington government sees fit to send a plenipotentiary to discuss the matter.

PARIS, March 1.—At least partial control has been secured in Petrograd by anti-Bolshevik forces, according to the French foreign office today.

Complete satisfaction to the claims advanced by the United States in its note to the council of the League of Nations relative to the Japanese mandate over the island of Yap is understood here.

PARIS, March 1.—Preliminary steps for the execution of military plans by the allies to force German obedience to reparations demands were taken today.

ALLIED CHIEFS HEAR GERMAN PROPOSALS AND THEN ADJOURN

LLOYD GEORGE SAID TO BE AMAZED AT OFFER IN BERLIN'S LATEST APPEAL.

VON SIMONS'S DELEGATION VERY COLDLY RECEIVED

Chief Indicates German Offer Is Far Very High Figure As Maximum Nation Can Pay.

LONDON, March 1.—Germany, through her delegates to the conference with the allies here today, made reparations offers and requested 600,000,000 gold marks, or about 17,500,000,000.

It was understood outside the conference that Dr. Simons, the German foreign minister, had finished his statement on reparations to the conference. Mr. Lloyd George, the British prime minister, replied in substance that unless the Germans had something more to offer than appeared in Dr. Simons's statement, there was no need for continuing the conference.

When the Germans left the conference they appeared to be greatly displeased. Premier Lloyd-George and Briand were smiling as they came from the conference chamber.

LLOYD GEORGE REPORTED AMAZED AT NEW OFFER

United Press Staff Correspondent. LONDON, March 1.—The allied supreme council adjourned suddenly today after hearing the German offer on reparations.

Premier Lloyd George was reported to have listened to the offer in amazement, and to have remarked that if the proposal was accepted, Germany would offer the conference might as well be called off.

Germany today made her last appeal to the allies for leniency in reparation demands. Working most of the night, she decided suddenly to call the conference to order at 11 o'clock Wednesday. The German delegation completed its data. Foreign Minister Von Simons permitted the belief that he had submitted a surprisingly high figure as the maximum for Germany.

The morning conference was held in the Lancaster house adjoining St. James palace.

The German delegation was received coldly in London. Porters hesitated to carry baggage and the representatives were snubbed at the Savoy, where they were quarantined.

Von Simons and others of the party took the snubs with apparent good nature. Asked how he was enjoying himself, the foreign minister declared he had only one complaint—that that the food was too rich and that he intended to ask for simpler menus.

The observation drew sneers from London patriots, and the remark was "quite in accord with the general shaming of the Germans."

The conference was awaited with some anxiety, but the fact that the allies apparently were in full accord was looked upon by the press as favorable to a settlement.

MEXICO PREPARING TO EXPEL RADICALS WHO MAKE TROUBLE

MEXICO CITY, March 1.—Mexican, German and Russian agitators, who have been conspicuous in every public demonstration held recently in this city are under closest surveillance and will be dealt with "as political insurgents," said a statement issued last night by Rafael Zubara, secretary of commerce and industry.

The secretary referred specifically to a parade held on Sunday by striking railroaders. Several foreigners in the parade carried communist banners and vehemently exhorted their comrades to continue the strike and to prevent more vigorously against "governmental oppression." Mexican labor laws are so liberal, the secretary declared, that a serious labor situation "should and would not exist if radicals did not overstep the bounds of mere agitation with the intention to overthrow the present government and set up a socialist regime."

American agitators have been exceedingly active during the past few months, having been especially energetic in organizing the strike against the Pan-American Federation of Labor during its recent congress in Mexico City. On several occasions when public demonstrations have taken place these same radicals have taken prominent roles and speeches made by them have been of an inflammatory nature.

Members of the American colony here have become much incensed over the boldness of the radicals. It is declared they contemplate not only aggression against Mexico, but also the United States. The American legation here has been considering the feasibility of taking energetic action.

SIMON LAKE, NOTED INVENTOR, TO RAISE SUNKEN TREASURES WITH SALVAGE SUBMARINE.



Simon Lake, inventor of the submarine, has perfected a device known as the salvage submarine, which he says will put the finishing touches to his dream of forty years. Mr. Lake's peace submarine will be used to recover some of the untold treasures of the deep seas. Plans to salvage wrecks all over the world, beginning with the vast tonnage of sunken coal barges on the Atlantic coast, are being made. Here are some of the things the new "salvage submarine" can do, according to Mr. Lake. Salvage sunken coal at the rate of 300 tons an hour, at a cost of fifty cents a ton; bring up precious cargoes of treasure ships sunk three centuries ago, investigate the diamond and gold deposits off the shores of South Africa; pump buoyant material into the hulls of sunken ships and thus raise them to the surface; permit a minute study of the ocean floor from a chamber which can be opened to the sea, the air pressure equaling the water pressure. The device is a sort of a submarine workshop connected with the surface ship by a tube adjustable by means of universal joints. In the workshop are the tools of the salvage trade; also the mysterious compressed air chamber in which workmen may breathe freely and keep dry while directing the work of the huge pump which sucks up the coal and treasures, and derricks which handle other sunken cargo. The salvage submarine can be suspended to any depth of water.

Mississippi Is Now One State Without Insurance Agents

JACKSON, Miss., March 1.—Fire insurance can't be bought today in Mississippi because there is nobody selling it. For the first time in the commercial history of the state not a single fire insurance company is operating.

The climax to the insurance situation was reached at the end of February when licenses expired. Not a company filed application for renewal. This means that no new business will be written in the state until the billion dollar anti-trust suit filed by the state revenue agent against 145 companies is settled, according to T. M. Henry, state insurance commissioner.

All funds of local agents have been tied up for two months by processes of garnishment and receivers have been named to handle these monies under court order pending determination of the suit.

In the meantime litigation piles up. The state revenue agent has filed an additional charge that the companies have failed to pay sufficient ad valorem tax and if this contention is upheld those companies operating after the original suit was filed will be compelled to pay additional penalties.

GERMAN "HORRORS" MEETINGS ATTACKED BY NEW YORK MOBS

NEW YORK, March 1.—Police were called last night to disperse a mob which collected in the heart of the theatrical district of Broadway to protest against meetings of radical elements in Madison Square Garden and numerous overflow meetings, all of which were held under the auspices of the Horrors of the Rhine committee, headed by Dr. Edmund Von Mach.

Hoists and catcalls from passers by forced the abandonment of efforts of the radicals to hold their meeting just outside the garden, and when they walked up Broadway planning to stop at another spot, the pedestrians followed, singing and ridiculing the speakers.

Before the assembly reached Times Square at Forty-second street, the police were called upon to clear the streets. They pleaded with the mob, who left peacefully for their homes. The overflow meetings of the Rhine committee were abandoned. Several arrests were made.

UNION OF SINN FEIN AND SOVIET FORCES IS LATEST PROPOSAL

LONDON, March 1.—Proposals of a union of sinn fein and Russian soviet forces were contained in documents captured in Ireland, the Irish office announced today. One document suggested that the Russians be asked to cease their present activity which was "to the disadvantage of Ireland, but store up their energy for action on a new and more revolutionary plane, thus denoting forces which can disintegrate the British empire from within, using the best soviet methods of north and south in a common revolutionary program."

It was suggested that a deputation be sent into Russia to discuss a definite alliance and to study soviet methods with a view to introducing them in Ireland.

GRAND JURY COMPLETES MOONEY INVESTIGATION

SAN FRANCISCO, March 1.—Investigation by the grand jury in the case of Thomas Mooney, serving a prison sentence after conviction for participation in the preparation day bomb explosion here in 1916, were completed last night, it was announced today. No action was taken.

John McDonald, who came here from New York where he was reported to have made an affidavit purporting to show his testimony at the Mooney trial was false, is said to have refused to make a statement before the grand jury unless granted immunity in connection with his alleged affidavit. Immunity, it was said, was refused.

ANNUAL HUDSON BAY DOG DERBY IN MANITOBA

THE PAS, MAN., March 1.—Nine drivers, with teams composed of from 7 to 13 dogs, are scheduled to face the starter at 11 a. m. today in the annual 200-mile Hudson bay dog Derby from here to Flin Flon and return.

ANTI-PROFITERS CHIEF SENDS IN RESIGNATION

NEW YORK, March 1.—The resignation of Armin W. Riley, special assistant United States attorney general, who for the last year has been chief of the government's flying squadron against profiteering here, was forwarded to Attorney General Palmer today. The resignation is to take effect at the convenience of Attorney General Palmer.

VELLER, REPORTED ROBBER IS PLACED UNDER ARREST

TORONTO, March 1.—Eggar Brown, reported robber in the Bank of Montreal here, which was robbed of \$21,300 in cash and certificates a few days ago, was arrested here today and charged with the crime. Brown, who is 37 years old was taken while at work in the bank.

LEAVES ART COLLECTION TO CITY OF PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA, March 1.—The art collection of the late John H. McFadden, millionaire cotton broker, said to be one of the most costly and magnificent collections of eighteenth century English art in the world is left in trust to the city of Philadelphia under the terms of his will filed for probate today. The remainder of the estate goes to his widow and children.

PANAMA'S CAPITOL IS SCENE OF FATAL OUTBREAK BY MOB

PANAMA, March 1.—One person is dead and four others are suffering from wounds received when the presidential guard fired upon a mob which broke into the executive mansion yesterday. One of the injured was Domingo Turker, who was the chief organizer of the demonstration here when General Urquiza visited the Canal Zone last year.

American troops arrived at the home of President Urquiza and quelled the disturbances. The demonstration is said to have resulted from a statement by the president that he favored settling the controversy with Costa Rica by diplomatic rather than military means.

CITY PHYSICIAN IS CLEARED IN INQUIRY

Verbal Complaints Arising From Case At Union Station Are Considered By Council.

The city council Monday night unanimously decided that no blame attaches to Dr. Mike M. Walker, city health officer, for his failure to answer a summons from Mrs. S. D. Crosier, night matron at the union station, on behalf of a woman who was ill.

Although no charges had been filed against Dr. Walker, the council felt that verbal complaints which had been given some publicity, made it advisable to investigate the matter, and after a lengthy executive session, it found that neither Dr. Walker nor the case was subject to censure in the matter.

Both Dr. Walker and Mrs. Crosier were before the council, and while their accounts of the telephonic conversation disagreed to an extent that resulted in some rather acrimonious remarks, it eventually appeared that the main facts were these:

A woman who came in from Frederick, on route to Dallas, reported to Mrs. Crosier that she was ill and in need of medical attention; it was made clear at the hearing that at that time the case had not become as serious as it did later. Mrs. Crosier called to Dr. Walker and told him that the woman was sent to the hospital, saying it would be much more convenient for him to meet her there. Asked by Mrs. Crosier to suggest some other physician who would come to the station, Dr. Walker said he did not know of any who would do so on such a night, a snow storm being in progress.

Mrs. Crosier then called the general hospital, and was asked if it were a charity case; learning that the woman was able to pay for treatment, the hospital attendants declined the case, saying there was no room for any save charity patients.

In the meantime, the condition of the woman had become much more serious than it was at the time Dr. Walker was called, and Mrs. Crosier then telephoned Dr. Q. B. Lee, who asked that the woman be sent to the Methodist hospital, which was done.

Dr. Walker contended that Mrs. Crosier had asked him to come down to the station and "urge" the woman to go to the hospital. Mrs. Crosier denied that she made any such request, and the disagreement on this point caused some wordy passages.

Mrs. Crosier told of other occasions upon which, she said, Dr. Walker had not co-operated with her to the extent she deemed proper, and some further disagreements as a fact resulted in the discussion of that phase of the case.

Dr. Walker sought to make it clear that when he learned it was not a charity case, his responsibility as city health officer ended, and in this connection it was brought out that his willingness to attend cases of all kinds had been demonstrated time and again.

The question arose at the hearing as to whether any case originating on a railroad property was not one for the railroad physicians to handle. Mrs. Crosier said she had been told, 11 months ago, to call for Dr. Walker, and she felt that she should have been advised if he were not the one to be summoned.

Members of the council took the view that the verbal complaints of Dr. Walker's action would not have been made had not the woman's condition become so much more serious after Mrs. Crosier had talked with him.

Some very distressing features of the woman's illness were brought out in the testimony, but it was shown that at the time Dr. Walker was notified, she was not in a serious condition. Mrs. Crosier said that her reason for being so insistent with Dr. Walker was that she believed the serious condition that did result could have been averted, had medical attention been given without delay.

Patrolman Graham, who heard Mrs. Crosier's end of the telephonic conversation, was also a witness at the inquiry.

INCINERATOR AWARD IS MADE BY COUNCIL

North Wichitans Promised Facilities—Several Paving Matters Brought Up.

Residents of North Wichita, represented before the city council Monday night by L. F. Scott and R. J. Moore, were promised co-operation in getting street lights, sidewalks and electric light extensions. The requests were submitted following a meeting of citizens last Friday night.

The council awarded the Superior Garbage Incinerator Co. the contract for the city's 40-ton garbage incinerator. This company's bid of \$20,250 was the only one submitted.

Paving matters were brought up by a number of residents, and prompt reports were promised. Eleventh street property owners, through Judge A. H. Carrigan, Ohio avenue, through Dan Hardy, and Indiana avenue, north of Sixth, through M. A. Quillian, presented their requests. On lower Indiana the property owners want to supplement the 11 feet of paving to be put in as part of the county road system, by paving eleven feet on each side, making a total of 49 feet.

The council issued the necessary order for the city election in April. No action was taken on the traction company's cutoff, owing to the absence of Councilman W. N. Bonner.

PREPARE FOR REUNION OF THIRTY-SIXTH DIVISION AUSTIN, March 1.—General Thomas D. Barton, adjutant general of Texas, has directed Lieut. Colonel John W. Young, inspector general of the Texas National Guard, to immediately proceed with the revival and complete organization of the 36th Division Veterans Association, according to a statement made at the adjutant general's office last night.

All national guardsmen who served in the various units of the Texas guard at the time of the great war, including units later transferred to the 42nd Rainbow Division, and the five companies of coast artillery, three being from Galveston, one from Corpus Christi and one from Nacogdoches, are expected to join their buddies in this big veterans association. A campaign to secure this result is now being mapped out by Colonel Young.

It is the plan of the backers of this movement to hold a reunion in Fort Worth, during the Fat Stock Show and the date selected is that of March 4, which is to be American Legion Day of the celebration.

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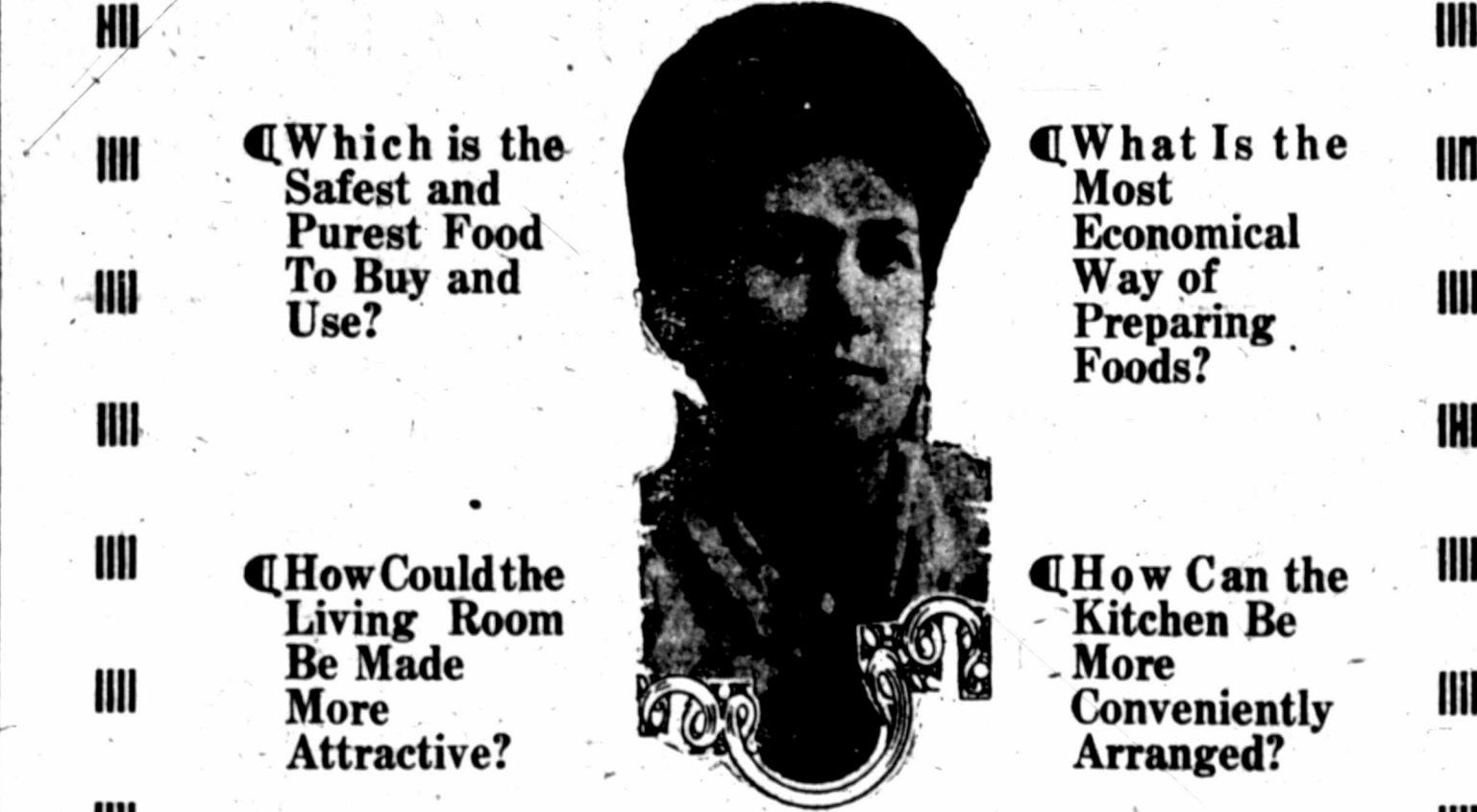

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GETTING READY FOR SUMMER SEASON AT LAKE WICHITA RESORT

IMPROVEMENTS BEING MADE AND TWO OF CONCESSIONS HAVE BEEN CONTRACTED.

VISIT TO GREECE CAUSES ONE CONTRACT TO FAIL

St. Louisan Who Planned To Take Charge Is Forced To Abandon His Deal Here.

Preparations are under way at Lake Wichita for the summer season. The dance hall and boat concessions have been let, and the swimming pool privileges will probably be awarded shortly. A new pavilion is being erected over the swimming pool, replacing the circle building torn down during the winter. All structures are being retouched and repainted, and shrubbery is being planted on a number of the bare spots with a view to make the resort as attractive as possible.

Mrs. H. H. Heard will have the dance hall and fountain concession, and Chas. Simpson will be in charge of the boats. Manager L. L. Albritton says that M. Akriovs, the Greek resident of St. Louis, who contracted last year for all lake concessions and who had planned extensive improvements there, will not be in charge.

Akriovs' failure to avail himself of his contract was due, it is learned here, to the fact that he visited his native land not long ago, and took a quantity of his America-earned money with him. Just what happened to him in Greece has not been learned, but when he returned to this country Akriovs had lost the greater part of his money, and was forced to abandon his plans for Lake Wichita.

FORD RUNS WILD AND SMASHES MOTORCYCLE ON CITY HALL SIDEWALK

Lossing control of his Ford for a short time Monday afternoon resulted rather disastrously for a man who asayed to navigate that portion of Ninth street directly south of the city hall. Just what happened, the driver was unable to tell, but a survey of the situation after the machine terminated its flight, revealed that a motorcycle officer's two wheeled mount had been smashed up considerably and that the Ford itself was more or less the worse for wear.

The accident took place shortly after 4 o'clock Monday afternoon as the driver of the Ford was travelling east on Ninth, when opposite the police station he lost control of his car and drove it onto the sidewalk adjoining the hall. Motor Cop Newton's machine happened to be in the way and received two broken fenders, a smashed lamp, and various other bumps while the assaulting machine broke its own headlights, dented the fenders and radiator and scratched off a large portion of paint.

The owner agreed to pay for all damage done by his auto, and was not arrested. His name was not learned.

Another occupant of the Ford made a grand leap to safety when he saw the car was going wild.

The signed petition of W. G. Bralley, candidate for re-election to the city council in the capacity of police and fire commissioner, was filed in the office of the city clerk early Tuesday morning. The petitions of M. O. McDowell and R. E. Shepherd, sanitary and finance commissioner, respectively, and are both candidates for re-election, were turned into the city clerk Monday afternoon.

Unless new aspirants are announced by Friday, five candidates will be voted upon for position No. 1, that of city commissioner, two for No. 2, sanitary commissioner, and one for No. 3, finance commissioner. R. E. Shepherd, the present incumbent in the finance office, who will be opposed by N. M. Conrad, Dr. J. F. Reed and Commissioner McDowell are both seeking the sanitary office, while Mr. Bralley has four candidates opposing him at the present time.

CHICAGO WOMAN IS HELD FOR SHOOTING IN HER APARTMENT

CHICAGO, March 1.—Herbert P. Zeigler, manager of a tire company branch office here, was shot and killed early today by Mrs. Isabelle Cora Orthwein, formerly the wife of a wealthy St. Louis oil man, in her apartment at 515 Burr street. They are said to have been friends since Mrs. Orthwein secured a divorce from her husband six years ago and she told the police they had quarreled over Zeigler's attentions to other women.

Her shrieks after the shooting aroused neighbors in the apartment building who summoned police. They said she told them that a quarrel started last night when the two met at an amusement garden, each in the company of others. Several hours later, she told police, Zeigler appeared at her apartment and demanded admission. She refused to let him in, she said, and he forced open the door.

When his screams became threatening, she said, she ran to her bedroom, secured a revolver Zeigler had given her for protection, and shot him twice through the chest.

According to information obtained by police, Mrs. Orthwein was granted a settlement of \$25,000 when divorced from her husband, Ralph Orthwein, millionaire St. Louis oil man, six years ago, and she has since made her residence in Chicago.

WARNS CONTRACTORS TO OBTAIN PERMITS

Thorburn Calls Attention To Ordinance—Only Fifteen Permits Issued This Year.

A warning to building contractors and citizens of Wichita Falls who erect residences, office buildings or business structures of any kind without first receiving a permit from the city clerk's office was issued Tuesday by City Clerk George Thorburn.

Records on file in the office show that but fifteen building permits have been issued since the first of the year and that an utter disregard of the ruling which requires the issuance of a permit by the city clerk has been made. Mr. Thorburn declared that local contractors were accepting orders and constructing buildings daily for which they had taken out no official permit.

Orders have been issued in the city building inspector, the electrical inspector and the gas inspector, that hereafter no clearances shall be given by them until a check has been made of the records and proof established that a permit has been taken out. A stiff fine for violation of the building ordinance is also promised for all offenders convicted in the future on charges of this nature.

SCHOOL BOARD AND COUNCIL TO ACT ON VACCINATION RULE

MEASURE MAKING IT COMPULSORY TO BE CONSIDERED BY BOTH BODIES.

SOME OPPOSITION TO IT IS ALREADY DEVELOPING

Would Require All School Children To Be Protected Against Smallpox Infection.

Whether smallpox vaccination shall be made compulsory for all school children here is to be decided this week by the school board and the city council.

The school board will meet at an early date to determine what its position will be. It is understood the trustees are practically unanimous for requiring vaccination, and that they will ask the council to enact the necessary ordinance. Such ordinances are already in force in several of the larger cities of Texas. In Waco, last fall, a referendum was demanded by opponents of vaccination, but the voters sustained the action of the city commission in passing the ordinance.

There are already signs of a contest over the matter here. Mayor Cline and members of the school board have received informal protests from several persons who, from religious beliefs or otherwise, object to the preventive measure.

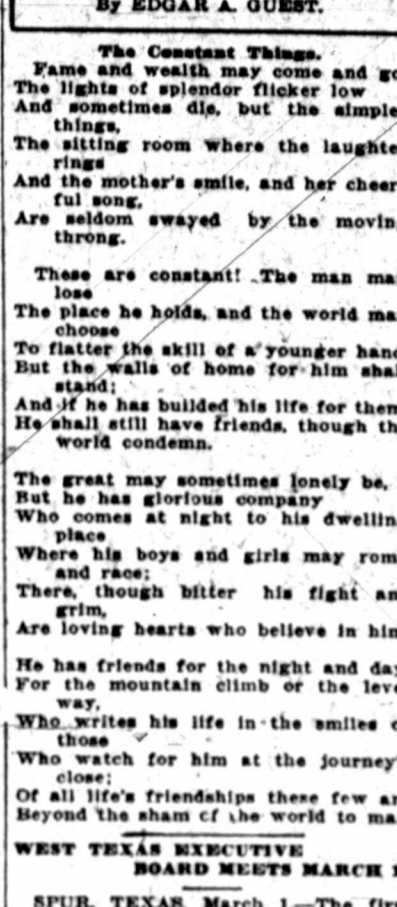

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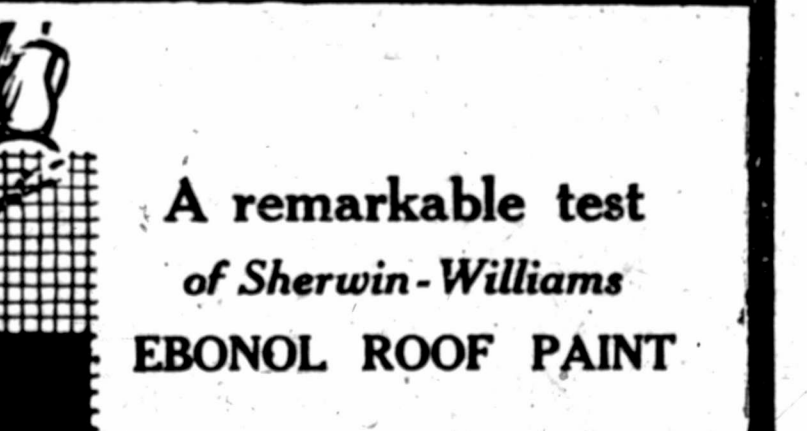

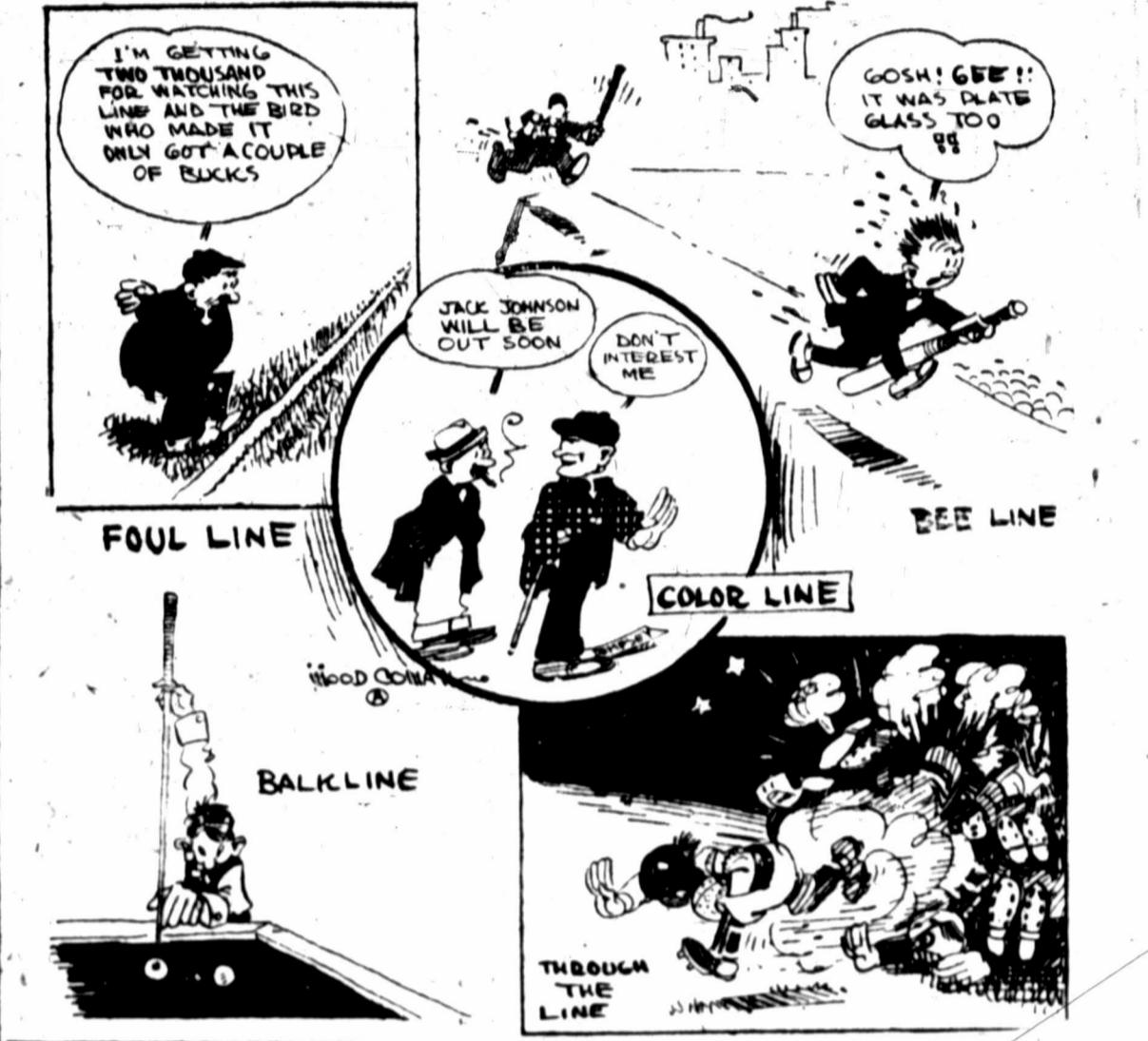

And whereas the protection of the public health demands that the entire community act as a unit in this serious situation.

Therefore, I hereby proclaim that tomorrow, March 2, 1921, shall be a half-holiday of the municipality of Wichita Falls, and by the authority vested in me as mayor, call upon all business houses and all good citizens throughout the community to concentrate their time and attention for this one-half day on the particular work of exterminating rats—killing them by traps, poison and other methods; by removing breeding places and hiding places, by burning and removal of debris and rubbish, rat proofing of outbuildings, elevation of lumber piles 18 inches above the ground, and by strict observation of all sanitary ordinances as outlined by the director of public health.

Realizing that good citizens will conform to these regulations, and realizing further that the work of those active in the campaign will go for nothing unless all participate, I am constrained to call the attention of the community to the fact that for those who are not willing to act readily upon this official request the full authority of the law will be invoked.

With full realization of your duty to your next door neighbor, your children and your neighbor's children and your entire community, let every real citizen of Wichita Falls see that his premises will pass inspection of the public health authorities and the police.

It is hoped to form a Red Cross nurse auxiliary branch of the American Legion here in the near future. There are numbers of former overseas nurses now residing in Vernon.

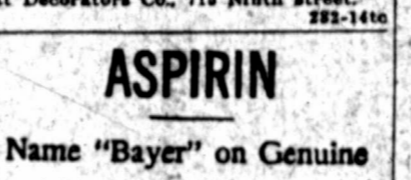
RAILROAD OFFICIALS HOLD MONTHLY SAFETY MEETING
