My countrymen, when one surveys the world about bim after the great storm, noting the marks of destruction and ylet rejoicing in the ruggedness of the things which withstood it if he is an American he breathes the clarified atmosphere with a strange mingling of regret and new hope. We have seen a world passion spend its fury, but we contemplate our republic unshaken, and hold our civilization secure. Liberty our civilization secure. Liberty-liberty within the law—and civiliza-tion are inseparable and though both were threatened we find them now secure and there comes to Americans the profound assurance that our representative government is the high-est expression and highest guarantee

Standing in this presence, mindful of the solemnity of this occasion, feeling the emotions which no one may know until he senses the great weight of responsibility for himself. I weight of responsibility for himself, I must utter my belief in the Divine inspiration of the founding fathers. Burely there must have been God's intent in the making of this new world republic. Ours is an organic law which had but one ambiguity, and we saw that effaced in a baptism of sacrifice and blood, with union maintaining the nation supreme and its concord inspiring. We have seen its concord inspiring. We have seen the world rivet its hopeful gaze on the great truths on which the founders wrought. We have seen civil, human and religious liberty verified and

In the beginning the old world scoffed at our experiment, today our foundations of political and social befoundations of political and social be-lief stand unshaken a precious in-heritance to ourselves, an inspiring example of freedom and civilization to all mankind. Let us express re-newed and strengthened devotion, in grateful reverence for the immortal being and utter our confidence in the supreme fulfillment.

Progress Proves Wisdom.

The recorded progress of our republic, materially and spiritually in itself proves the wisdom of the inherited policy of non-involvement in old world affairs. Confident of our ability to work out our own destiny and jealously guarding our right to do so we seek no part in directing the destinies of the old world. We do not mean to be entangled. 

SPECULATE AS TO THE MEASURES PROPOSED

Vague Hints That Gulf May Bridged But Report is Not Confirmed.

LONDON, March 4 .- Vague hints that discussions were going on between the allies regarding the possibility of bridging the buil between them and Germany were heard last night. Nothing tangible, however, developed and members of the German delegation told newspapermen at midnight they had heard nothing from Berlin relative to the address made yesterday by Premier Lloyd-George in presenting an ultimatum to Dr. Walter Simons.

Today's newspapers engaged in speculation regarding the extent of the allied military measures to be adopted if the Germans failed to meet the terms laid down by the supreme counett in Paris. The Daily Mirror claimed to have information that the British war office was ready to-place a division of infantry at the disposal of Marsha Foch, and the newspaper said it under-stood that the British would occupy Duesseldorf, Andrew Bonar Law remarked in the house of commons re-cently that the number of British troops on the Rhine numbered 12,909.

Artillery Dispatched.

Marshal Foch, it was declared by the London Times, believes the allies sufficiently strong in occupied districts of Germany to hold Duesseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrohrt, if necessary. A dispatch from Brussels stated a battery of ar-tillery had been dispatched to German territory occupied by Belgian troops.

The speech of Mr. Lloyd-George to
the German delegation yesterday drew high praise today, even from anti-gov ernment organs. The majority of this morning's newspapers professed little expectation that the German govern-




