



# HOLD ERIE RAILROAD GUILTY OF VIOLATING TRANSPORTATION ACT

## U. S. COMMISSIONERS OFFER MEDIATION IN THE ATLANTA STRIKE

ATLANTA, Ga., March 7.—Commissioners of the United States board of mediation were due to arrive here today to attempt a settlement of a strike which has affected approximately 5,000 employees of the A. B. & A. railway.

Commissioners Chambers of the board, who is being accompanied here by Assistant Commissioner Klutz, was said to have offered mediation on the ground that the strike was detrimental to the public interest. Reports from Macon, said to have emanated from union sources, that railroad crafts throughout the southeast were taking a strike vote on the issue of the A. B. & A. dispute, were subsequently denied here last night by neighborhood officials. They declared the strike would be confined to the single road and also that the purchase of Receiver Bug to resume operation of trains as soon as employees could be recruited, as announced by him last night, would not be opposed by the unions.

### BASEBALL MAGNATE IS ACTING RAILROAD ENGINEER

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 7.—The first mail train to move on the Atlanta, Birmingham & Atlantic railroad since the strike was called on that road Saturday, left here this morning with A. H. (Rick) Woodward, chairman of the board of directors of the Woodward Iron company and owner of the Birmingham baseball club, acting as engineer. Woodward was a member of the board of directors of the railroad before it was placed in the hands of a receiver. The train carried passengers. The other members of the train crew are officials of the road and the Woodward Iron company.

## GUSHER IS REPORTED IN ALASKA TERRITORY

Shoots Oil 100 Feet in The Air and is Reported Making Fifteen Hundred Barrels.

DAWSON, Yt., March 7.—Tales of an oil well which produces 1,000 barrels a day and shot oil 100 feet into the air before it was capped, were brought from Fort MacPherson today by a patrol of Canadian recruited police who left here in early January on a 500-mile trip to the mouth of the Mackenzie river. Fort Norman is on the Mackenzie river about 400 miles south of the Arctic ocean and 500 miles east of the Alaskan border.

The information was contained in letters received at MacPherson while the patrol was stopping there and said the cap of the well was blown off ten times during the first six hours after the well was opened. The first oil gusher reached Fort Norman some time ago from Fort Yukon by way of Fort MacPherson and the Arctic Red river.

The patrol included four mounted policemen, two Indians and five dog teams.

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# GOVERNOR HARDING TO CONTINUE WITH THE RESERVE BOARD

NOT EXPECTED TO RESIGN ALTHOUGH HE IS A DEMOCRAT.

CONFIDENTLY EXPECTED HE WILL BE RE-APPOINTED

President Will Emphasize The Non-Partisan Character Of This Institution.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 7.—The governor of the federal reserve board, W. P. G. Harding, who is a democrat appointed by Wilson from Birmingham, Ala., will not be expected to resign by President Harding, and will not take the office of president of a private bank for foreign trade but will continue in his position until the end of his term in 1922, and it may confidently be expected, will then be reappointed for another ten-year term.

In this news there is cause for great satisfaction. Within the past few weeks it has been apprehended, and very frequently implied in the news, that the dignity and permanence of the federal reserve board was menaced in two ways.

For one it has been taken for granted that President Harding would regard the governor of the federal reserve board the same as cabinet members, diplomats, and others would expect him to resign and would fill the office with a republican; in fact scores of names of republicans have been mentioned for the post.

But President Harding, on the suggestion of some of his advisors has determined to take advantage of his opportunity to emphasize the non-partisan character of this institution and to create for it that most important tradition of dignity and immunity from politics that is attached to the supreme court of the United States.

In the opinion of thoughtful persons desirous that the federal board should have the authority and the public confidence that go with acknowledged impartiality, this is one of the finest things in President Harding's conduct of the beginning of his administration.

One other apprehension arising out of news that has figured importantly in the papers recently is removed by this same attitude of President Harding. Some months ago it was announced that a group of bankers was forming a \$185,000,000 corporation for foreign trade, and that as soon as the formation should be completed they would offer the presidency of it to Governor Harding of the reserve board.

This seemed to threaten to make out of the governorship of the federal reserve board one of those less dignified and ephemeral federal offices in which men serve for a brief time in order to acquire experience, and then capitalize that experience by accepting office in private corporations at very much larger incomes.

If the federal reserve board, which is still comparatively in its beginnings, should become a stepping stone to the public mind as that kind of a body, it would be unfortunate. The thing to aspire to is that the federal reserve board should be regarded with the same confidence and as having the same sanctity as the supreme court.

No private corporation would dream of trying to take a justice of the supreme court off the bench by an offer of many times his present salary.

Of course, the suggestion of the

foreign trading corporation was justified to a degree by the expectation that the governor of the federal reserve board would be out of office anyhow because of the assumption that an incoming republican president would want the place filled by his own appointee. President Harding's attitude on this point, however, clears away all the apprehension.

In the course of time there will be minor statutory changes in the management of the federal reserve board. The two ex-officio members, the secretary of the treasury and the controller of the currency who are necessarily political will probably be removed from the board and by that act board a more and more purely non-partisan body. It is probable that the term length of the term of members of the board will be increased to twelve years, and this approximation to the permanency of tenure which is enjoyed by justices of the supreme court will go that much further in the direction of increasing the dignity of the board and the public confidence in it.

It is essential that the part of Governor W. P. G. Harding in this situation should be recognized. Everybody knows that he could make many times his official salary by going into private banking. That he should be willing to make the sacrifice in order to play in this new institution something of the part that John Marshall played in giving authority and direction to the supreme court in its beginnings is a fine bit of public service.

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# FLORENCE AUSTIN CHASE OPENS TIMES COOKING SCHOOL MONDAY WITH SPLENDID "HOME" LECTURE

Florence Austin Chase opened the Times Cooking School Monday afternoon, giving an interesting and enlightening lecture on the home to an enthusiastically interested audience of Wichita Falls housekeepers in the basement of the First Baptist church.

The school opened at 2 o'clock promptly, and there wasn't a dull moment from 2 to 5, when the last demonstration was completed and exhibited. The big gathering of women present was representative of the best home-making talent in the city, from those who came in limousines to those who came on foot. Pencils and notebooks were very much in evidence, and questions were asked freely during the demonstration.

Mrs. Chase struck a responsive chord in every woman's heart present with her opening talk on "The Home," and when she later in her lecture presented the beautiful art of concealing a delectable looking salad, making the dressing and baking the cheese biscuits to accompany it, a remarkably short period, her triumph was complete. She seemed to be taken into the "inner circle" immediately.

**Home Building.**

Practical suggestions in the opening lecture on "Home Building" embodied every angle of economy, utility and comfort in the home. In the discussion from the standpoint of interior woodwork and wall paper selection, Mrs. Chase said in part:

"The wall spaces, the woodwork, windows and doors make up the background of a room and their treatment is the most important part of the furnishings. If the available money is limited, start with the background. If more changes can be made let them be in the hangings and rugs, for next to the background, these are the most important things in the room.

Having disposed of backgrounds, rugs and hangings, ornate and decorative material can be dealt with easily, very simple and quite gradually with the continuous feeling of satisfaction that the room is growing better each day. The mistake made by most people is in trying to make things appear moderately satisfactory against impossible backgrounds.

**Things To Consider.**

"There are many things one must take into consideration when selecting color schemes for the different rooms. Room is located is important. The south side of the house on which the southeast rooms, with their almost continual sun, call for a choice of cool colors: those on the northwest with their natural grey light require warm and more luscious color.

"When one attempts to select a trim, a wallpaper or a rug, without first considering the number of windows in a room, from what direction the light comes in, how much light the room gets and what part of the day the room gets the light, the one thing which will assist in deciding on the right background has been omitted.

"Every room should have a predominant color. It is wise to keep wallpaper of neutral or unobtrusive color. Walls may be either papered or painted. Painted walls have some advantages over papered ones. If painted with oil the color will last for years and may be easily changed by careful washing with soap and water.

"In selecting wallpaper, tans and grays are good choice for backgrounds while a pattern or a stripe in the same or similar colors are more interesting than the plain color. Large color patterns are seldom suitable for any room, and although it is possible to use a pattern or striped paper in a hall, it must be similar in color to the paper used in adjoining rooms. Flower patterns are effective only in very simple bed rooms."

In discussing foods and the importance of salads, Mrs. Chase drove home these facts:

**Housewife Must Know.**

"Every housewife should know what food is and what part it plays in the

building of strong bodies. In many respects the human body resembles an engine and is often spoken of as a human machine.

"Like other machines, it must have material, first to build it; second, to repair its several parts as they are worn out; and third, to serve as fuel. Every thought, feeling and motion of the body contributes to the waste of tissue and requires that some tissue building material be supplied.

"The human body, unlike other machines, builds itself, repairs itself, and regulates its functions while in health. It can, when necessary, use its own material as fuel to produce heat.

"Just as different kinds of coal or wood produce different quantities of heat and force producing properties, so different foods have different heat and force producing properties. A perfect food contains all of the nutritive elements of the body—proteins, carbohydrates, fats, mineral salts and water. No one food contains all these elements, hence the necessity of a mixed diet, whereby one food may be used to supplement what is lacking in another.

"The proteins found largely in meat, fish and eggs furnish the greater part of the material needed for tissue building. Carbohydrates and fats, these include starches and sugars, oils, cream, butter and other fats, these contribute to the production of heat and energy. The minerals and water are found in nearly all foods, but in large proportions in the fruits and vegetables. In addition to the minerals, fruits contain a great deal of water, which is of use in regulating body processes and certain acids of pleasant flavor which does for the body what medicine might do except that they do it better.

"In addition also to the minerals which the vegetables contain, the leafy variety, such as cabbage, cauliflower, Swiss chard, Brussels sprouts, lettuce celery tops, turnips and other vegetables of like character, have an especially high value when combined with oil, as in a salad, furnishing one of the peculiar accessory substances commonly known as 'vitamines.'

"Recent experiments in the field of nutrition reveal the fact that health cannot be long sustained without eating the foods containing vitamins. Vitamins are found in butterfat and

whole milk but the value of fruits and vegetables cannot be over estimated.

**Salads Popular.**

"The salad has grown in popularity until today there are very few tables of the American people where it has not its place. For many years the salad was made of nothing but some one of the greens. They are now made in endless variety and are composed of meat, fish, eggs, fruit and vegetables.

"The dinner salad, unless it is the main dish at the meal, should be composed of vegetables, one alone or a combination of two or three, and it should be dressed with a French dressing. Every family would be the healthier for a green salad daily.

"The leafy variety of vegetables, such as cabbage, cauliflower, Swiss chard, collards, Brussels sprouts, lettuce, celery tops, spinach, turnip tops, and other vegetables of like character, are known as 'protective foods.' They have an especially high value when combined with oil, furnishing one of the peculiar accessory substances commonly called 'vitamines.'

"Children, unless they have heard their elders say they never could take oil, will eat vegetables dressed with oil and lemon juice and ask for more. There are so few fats palatable to children that the salad habit should be encouraged.

"With the variety of materials from which to select, the salad need never become monotonous. There are a variety of tastes to be considered in com-

binning flavors. Onion should be cunningly concealed or a perfectly good salad will not be eaten by some people. Sometimes just a drop or two of onion juice added to the dressing lifts a salad out of the commonplace class into the piquant. Rubbing the salad bowl with a clove of garlic gives to many vegetable salads that indescribable flavor so much enjoyed by the epicure.

"Many persons find the nut and vegetable oils as pleasant as olive oil for salads and the cost is much less. If the peculiar flavor of the olive oil is liked that may be obtained by using part olive oil and part nut or vegetable oil. The nut and vegetable oils have just as much fuel value as the olive oil.

**Wash the Greens.**

"All of the salad greens should be thoroughly washed, drained, put in a cloth bag and well chilled before being used. If the greens are free of moisture the dressing will remain on the leaves and that, too, will be eaten, instead of being left on the plate.

"Salads should not be dressed until serving time. If all materials are prepared beforehand, it is the work of but a moment to add the dressing at the last moment, and then the salad will

be a pleasure instead of a disappointment. I cannot imagine anything that is less appetizing than a plate of 'combination' salad that has been dressed so far ahead of serving time as to be wilted, rusty looking and luke warm.

"All materials for salad making should be cold. This is a part of a hard and fast rule: 'Serve all hot dishes

HOT and cold dishes COLD, neither should be lukewarm.

"The heavy mayonnaise dressing should be reserved for the meat and fish salads which are to be served as the main dish at a luncheon or evening collation. It may be also used in combination with whipped cream for a fruit salad to be served at a luncheon or

when the fruit salad is to take the place of dessert as well as the salad. A salad dressed with a heavy mayonnaise dressing should not be eaten with a dinner, which in itself contains sufficient food value. The fruit salad when served at dinner may be served last and take the place of both salad and dessert."

### NIGHT SCHOOL HAS ENROLLMENT OF 100, MANY FOREIGNERS

STUDENTS INCLUDE BOTH SEXES AND MANY NATIONALITIES, REPORT SHOWS.

#### SPANISH AND COMMERCIAL CLASSES MOST POPULAR

#### Special Attention Given Students Of Foreign Birth Who Want To Become Naturalized.

An even one hundred men and women are enrolled in the public night school being conducted under the supervision of the local school board, according to a statement made Monday by Principal A. K. Presson. This number, it is said, represents practically all classes and nationalities in the city and is about evenly divided among men and women.

The class for foreigners and those of the Spanish and commercial departments are proving the most popular, according to Mr. Presson, who states that an average of 15 or 14 students show up at each recitation time for the instruction given in the foreigners' class. None of the students at the first of the year could speak English, and but very few of them had the slightest conception of any American principles and ideas.

Instruction which prepares the student sufficiently to take out naturalization papers is being given, and English is of course being taught. Many of those who attend have showed a remarkable quickness in learning and are developing rapidly into useful citizens. A number of the foreigners, before coming to this country, had studied in European universities and were by no means devoid of education.

One European who applied for admittance recently spoke five languages and was well versed in sciences and the professions, but desired further tutoring in English and American citizenship.

The growth of the school has been extremely gratifying to those responsible for its welfare and plans are already being made for a considerable enlargement next year. It has been pointed out that Fort Worth, with a school five years old, now has a membership of only 800, whereas the local classes already number 100 and are still growing. The school here was organized only last fall.

### LIEUTENANT CONEY WILL BEGIN FLIGHT TUESDAY MIDNIGHT

JACKSONVILLE, FLA., March 7.—Lieutenant William Devore Coney, 51st Aero squadron, U. S. A., announced today that he would begin his transcontinental air flight from the Atlantic to the Pacific from Pablo Beach at midnight tomorrow. Coney will endeavor to lower his record of 37 hours 27 minutes flying time established on his recent flight from San Diego, Cal. He plans to stop only at Dallas.

### SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS CLAIM OF NEW MEXICO

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Claim of the state of New Mexico to certain lands filed on by it in lieu of tracts owned by the state within the limit of a national forest was upheld today by the supreme court.

### AD CLUB WILL HOLD MEETINGS HEREAFTER UPON WEDNESDAYS

Weekly luncheons of the Wichita Falls Ad club will hereafter be held on Wednesday instead of Monday, the directors of the club decided at a meeting following Monday's luncheon. The change is effective next week.

### SOME DAY THESE BOYS WILL LEARN IT'S NO USE ARGUING WITH WOMEN

A number of young ladies at the local high school are not speaking to their gentlemen friends these days, and after Thursday night the favors are likely to be returned.

This deplorable state of affairs has been brought about by action of the boys' and girls' club at the institution, the two organizations having recently arranged to inform each other, in public, of their respective shortcomings. At the weekly meeting of the girls' club, held last Thursday night, the program was presented by members of the boys' club and was featured by an address by Cornelius Chewning, wherein he assailed the habits and customs of the feminine element of school and made frank criticism of some practices of the girls.

According to members of the high school faculty, the talk was a wonder from first to last, and succeeded in enlightening members of the fair sex to a considerable degree. The talk, although given by Mr. Chewning, represented the sentiments of the boys' club as a whole and received their hearty endorsement.

And now the girls are waiting for next Thursday to roll around so that they can return the compliments with interest. Guendolin Walters, orator supreme of the girls' club, has been selected as the standard bearer, and will return an adverse criticism when the boys meet. Incidentally, a number of other addresses will be presented by members of the girls' club, but the address by Miss Walters will easily be the main attraction.

Hints of terrible retribution have been thrown out, and rumor has it that the undue hilarity of the high school's masculine portion is scheduled for a rapid descent when the smoke has cleared away next Thursday.

### SUSTAIN THE CONTENTION OF FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AS TO REED AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Supreme court today sustained the contention of the federal government that in a previous decision in the Dan Hill case it had upheld the Reed amendment passed before the days of the Volstead act to prohibit the shipment of liquor into a dry state.

By affirming the conviction of Willis D. and Axel Williams of Indianapolis in 1918, charged with bringing 105 gallons of whiskey from Cincinnati, then wet, into Indiana, then dry. The claim of the defendant was that the court had never upheld the Reed amendment.

### ATWOOD TESTIFIES IN MATEWAN TRIAL

Says Fighting Was Opened By a Signal From Albert Felts, Leader Of Detectives.

By J. F. BEAMAN, United Press Staff Correspondent. Williamson, W. Va., March 7.—When the Sid Hatfield trial opened here today, N. H. Atwood, who sat in defendant's row when the trial began, testified, adding his eye witness account of the May gun fight to evidence favoring the 17 men still charged with the murder of seven Baldwin-Felts detectives.

The indictment against Atwood was nolleed by the state when evidence taken began three weeks ago. The fatal fight was opened by a signal from Albert Felts, leader of the detectives. Atwood charged today. Standing within three feet of where the revolver was opened, Atwood saw Felts fire the first shot, fatally wounding Mayor C. C. Testerman, according to his testimony.

Felts raised up on his toes, gave a little nod to his men and about the time he came back down on his heels, he shot Testerman from his right side," the witness said. The mayor grabbed his sides and fell, and Felts swung his revolver around and fired into a small group of citizens nearby, the eye witness testified.

### UPHOLD DECISION BARRING BERGER'S PAPER FROM MAIL

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Refusal of lower courts to issue a mandamus requiring Postmaster General Burleson to restore second class mail privileges of the Milwaukee Leader, Victor Berger's newspaper, was sustained today by the supreme court.

The second class mailing privileges of the Leader were withdrawn by Mr. Burleson in 1917 on the ground that articles published by the Leader regarding the purposes of the United States on entering the war were calculated to interfere with the military operations and were in violation of the espionage act.

The District of Columbia supreme court dismissed the suit brought by the Leader. The opinion cited numerous excerpts from articles published by the government as showing the Leader's anti-American policy and the court condemned these in measured terms as "false" and tending to "disloyalty."

The case was brought on the apparent theory, the court said, that this government, "competent to fight an insidious enemy at home," The opinion of the court was delivered by Associate Justice Clark.

Justice Brandeis delivered a dissenting opinion. The question is not one of a war power or a statute, or of a fact incident to war, Mr. Brandeis said, but is only whether the postmaster general had the power he exercised. Neither the act establishing the postal service nor any other of the basic statutes mentioned any such condition as that imposed by Mr. Burleson, Mr. Brandeis said.

Mr. Brandeis contended that any issue of the Leader violating the law would be barred, but that there was no power existing to bar a publication indefinitely. "This would be an absolute censorship," he said.

Associate Justice Holmes concurred "in the substance" of Mr. Brandeis' opinion. "The right of free speech is almost as inherent as the right to use our tongues," Mr. Holmes declared.

### ARRIVES IN CHICAGO TO ATTEND FUNERAL OF WIFE

CHICAGO, March 7.—Bruno Steindel, first cellist with the Chicago Opera company, arrived here today to attend the funeral of his wife who killed herself by leaping into Lake Michigan. Friends of Mrs. Steindel declared that worry over her husband being under disloyalty charges during the war caused her to become mentally unbalanced.

# PRESIDENT HARDING TO DISCUSS PROGRAM AT DINNER TONIGHT

## INVITATION IS EXTENDED TO REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS.

## FIRST CABINET MEETING IS CALLED FOR TUESDAY

### Panama Trouble And Questions Of a General Character Will Be Considered.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Legislative policies of the new administration will be discussed by President Harding with republican congressional leaders at a dinner tonight at the White House. Tomorrow the president will preside at the first meeting of his cabinet. The call went out today and the hour was fixed at 11:30 a. m.

It was said the cabinet session would take up in particular the question of relations with Costa Rica and Panama and the program for the special session of congress. Information and advice received at the dinner tonight is expected to be laid before the cabinet by Mr. Harding and a definite decision on a date for calling congress into session may follow.

No definite schedule of cabinet meetings has yet been agreed upon. In the Wilson administration they were held ordinarily on Tuesday, but the impression is that Mr. Harding may desire to have a round table discussion with his advisers more often than once a week.

The date of the special session of congress was discussed today with Senator Underwood of Alabama, democratic leader of senate, who is understood to have urged a call for the first half of April.

### HIRAM JOHNSON INCLUDED AMONG THE "BEST MINDS"

WASHINGTON, March 7.—For the first time since his nomination, President Harding today included Senator Hiram Johnson of California among the "best minds" who are to help him shape the course of his administration. Johnson was one of a score of senators and congressmen invited to confer with Harding at a dinner at the white house tonight.

Following the congressional conference, the first cabinet meeting of the Harding administration will be held tomorrow at 11 a. m. and Vice President Coolidge will be asked to attend. The conference with congressmen probably will result in tentative decisions on the most pressing matters confronting Harding, and these decisions will be discussed and in most cases probably confirmed by the cabinet meeting tomorrow.

The date for the special session of congress, taxation and government expenditures, the military and naval situations in light of failures of both the army and navy appropriation bills, the project of making peace with Germany and general procedure of the next session of congress were understood to be matters likely to be taken up at the conference.

Senator Poindexter and Representative Kelly, who managed the naval appropriation bill; Senator Pease, chairman of the senate finance commission, and Representative Fordney, chairman, and Representative Longworth, Ohio, member of the house ways and means committee, were among the guests.

With Lodge, who is chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, chairman of the house foreign affairs committee, and Senator Knox. The presence of these three men means the question of delaying passage of the Knox resolution, declaring peace with Germany, because of Germany's present differences with the allies over reparations, will come up.

Among other important conferences today Harding had one with Elmer Dwyer of Tacoma, who has just returned from Mexico. Dwyer is understood to favor immediate recognition of the Obregon government. He also is mentioned for national republican chairman.

Secretary Hughes was the first cabinet member to call at the white house today. It was believed he came to report the latest developments on the ultimatum to Panama and Costa Rica to cease hostilities.

### PRESIDENT REACHES OFFICE AHEAD OF CLERICAL FORCE

WASHINGTON, March 7.—President Harding began his second work day in the White House by beating his entire force of secretaries and clerks to the executive offices. He arrived shortly after 8:30 o'clock, a full half hour before work usually begins, and for some time was the only official present in that end of the White House.

As soon as the president had settled himself at his desk, he called for his new Alredale dog, "Loddie Boy," who was assigned a place for the day on a couch in the president's office.

The unionists who made the assault on the jail and opened fire on the guards were met by the citizens, who had been armed, and all but five, who were captured and placed under arrest, were put to flight. They came from the Fabius settlement, supposed headquarters of the night riders, and officers announced that they would organize a posse today to invade the district.

CHICAGO, March 7.—Frederick Kantoff today confessed staging a fake hold-up in which his father was shot in order to collect burglary and hold-up insurance. The youth admitted doing the shooting. The father was seriously wounded. Duty of providing a living for the family of nine had

proven irksome to the elder Kantoff, especially in these days of unemployment and slack business at the little delicatessen store, he said.

The father and son were entering their home at 1:00 a. m. today after closing the delicatessen when the policeman on the beat heard a shot. He found the father wounded and the son telling of an attack by two men who

fired the shot and escaped with \$340—the day's receipts at the store.

Of these, there are but 22 who sing pure notes, without extraneous sounds and the almost universal tremolo effect. A singer's trill is quite a different thing from a tremolo. A trill can be and is controlled by the brain, but a tremolo is not within brain control and, so far, there has been no means found for correcting it. Most singers cannot sustain a note without breaking it up into a series of chattering, or tremolos. The number of waves varies from two per second to as high as twelve. When at the latter rate, the chatter can just be heard and is not particularly objectionable. When at a slower rate, it is very objectionable.

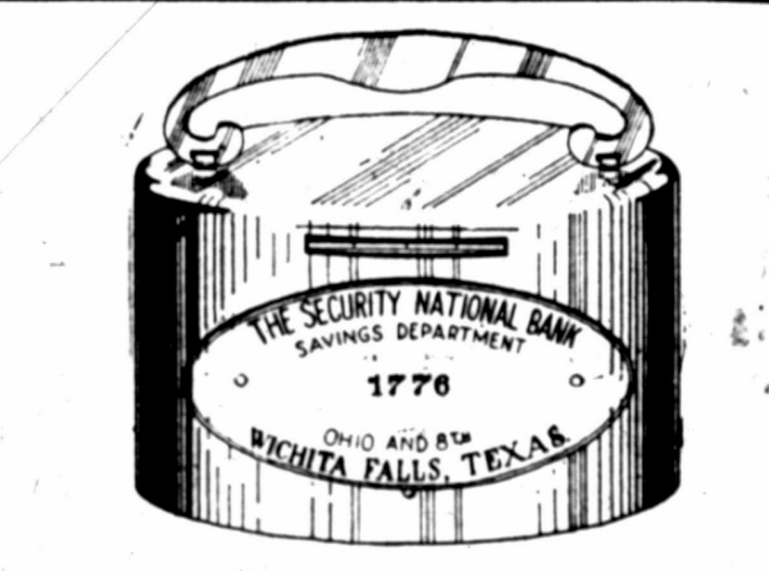
