It was stated that there might be one day's delay before the allied armies got under way.

LONDON, March 7.—Allied troops will march into Germany tomorrow in accordance with the decision of the allies to inflict on Germany the penalties provided for because of the non-fulfillment of her reparations obligations, it was announced

After the Germans left the conference this afternoon the British, French and Belgian premiers telegraphed orders for the immediate occupation by the allied troops of Ruhrort, Duisburg and Duesselford.

The German delegation will return to Germany tomorrow, Its members said after the conference that they were not empowered to make any further proposals and that they regretted the possibility that the allied troops were already marching

upon Germany. The instructions to allied commanders on the Rhine were given after the premiers had requested Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Wilson to join in the discussion of the action to be taken. The allied representatives will meet again tomorrow to further the concerted enforcement of the various penalties.







Even those who have not visited the sesshore are familiar with the whiteness of foam, formed by the churning up of the water so that tiny particles of it are mixed with the air—and foam is very closely silled to snow, in that both of them are formed from water. In the case of snow, however, the water is frosen and forms minute crystals, which, under the microscope, re-solve themselves into structures of exquisitely delicate arrangement The microscope, however, would also show something else. It would indicate at once that the crystals of which the snowflakes are made up are each clear and transparent, be-ing tiny particles of ice, but lying together and being placed at vary-ing angles so that they throw the light in all directions just as salt

or sugar does.
In other words, the flakes of anow do not retain any portion of the light which falls upon them, but reflect it all, thus producing the dazzling white effect which we call "snow-white," provided, course, that the light is white. it is colored, the snow reflects just the same, appearing to take on the tint of the light itself.

that the student has learned during the regular university year in only a theoretical'way. But systematic military training for the purpose of quali-fying students as reserve officers in the military forces of the United States are not the only objects of these summer camps. Special attention is also given to the physical, mental and moral training of the young man during a formative and plastic stage in his life. In a recent interview Thomas A. Edison had the following to say regarding the imperfections of the human voice:

"I have collected, through my agents in Europe and America, phonographic voice trials by approximately 3800 singers. 

Vincent Richards still has a great chance to be a future champion. Time will add weight, stamina, experience and better judgment to what he already has. 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
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WOUND INFLICTED BY OFFICER FATAL TO MAN AT BURKBURNETT
